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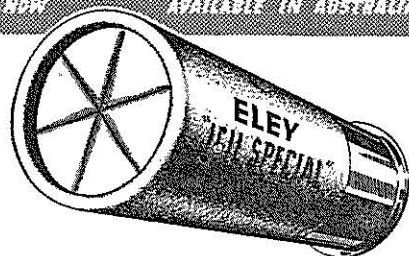
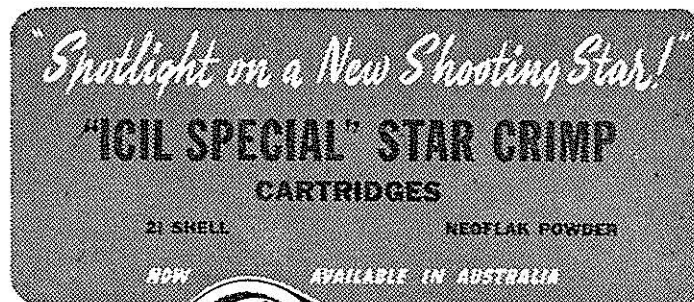

THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Of premier importance to shooters who for long years have waited for the day when the International series is resumed, the following letter is quoted from the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association—

"At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association, held in London on 31st October, 1947, it was decided that an effort should be made to revive the International Clay Pigeon Shooting Tournament in 1948, and the dates provisionally selected were 25th and 26th June. As you already know, it is the turn of the Welsh Association to stage this meeting in Wales, and we are in communication with their secretary as to whether they will be able to do this.

"At the meeting of the Committee above referred to, the view was expressed that the teams for the International should consist of 20 shooters, all of whose scores would count, and that reserves be confined to five shooters.

"We shall be much obliged if you will let us know at the earliest possible date whether your Associa-

tion proposes to enter an Australian team to compete for the 'Mackintosh' Trophy in conjunction with this Tournament. As soon as we have your reply we will go into further details with you concerning the conditions governing the meeting."

Needless to add the reply of the A.C.P.T.S.A. was an immediate agreement to enter an Australian team. It is likely that permission will be sought by the A.C.P.T.S.A. to shoot its section of the contest in the autumn. In 1939, when the series was last held, the Australian combination shot on King's Birthday. The Great Britain and Irish teams concluded their section of the meeting a fortnight later—in perfect weather. Many have felt, that by shooting in mid-winter Australia's men were self-handicapped. This hazard should be overcome when permission is obtained from Great Britain for an autumn assemblage.

The competition to secure a coveted place as an International representative in Australia's team should be one of the high-lights of the 1948 shooting season.

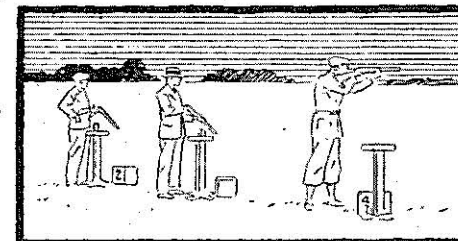

He recently won the Tasmanian double-rise title and followed this last month with a first class performance in winning the Commonwealth Walk-up blue-riband at Brighton (Tas.). Shot under the rule of "holding the gun in any position consistent with safety," this departure from the previously accepted style of "gun below elbow and against side," worked satisfactorily. When the instruction appeared in October "News" (Stop-Press section) a few shooters were inclined to feel that differences of opinion would result with the change. Happily these did not eventuate. Over the scheduled course of 25 releases E. Nelson, Morgan and J. M. Tyquin tied each with scores of 21/25. A tie shoot over five additional rounds brought forth scores as follows: W. R. Morgan 25/30, E. Nelson 23/30, J. M. Tyquin 20/25, Eric McRae, "Drongo" (L. Tibb, Vict.) 16/20, F. and J. Blake, A. Nelson 15/25, Ron Goodrope (Coburg, Vict.), Bruce Fraser, Bruce Filby 14/25, J. Neenan 13/25, D. Bridges 12/25, Peter White (Brunswick, Vict.) 11/25. The last-named recently registered his shooting name as "Peters" and will in future use this non-de-plume.

"Peters" signalled his new registration by winning a 3 bird practice sweepstake outright. He immediately donated his winnings, £4/4/ back to the Hobart Gun Club, officials of which warmly thanked him for his generous gesture. 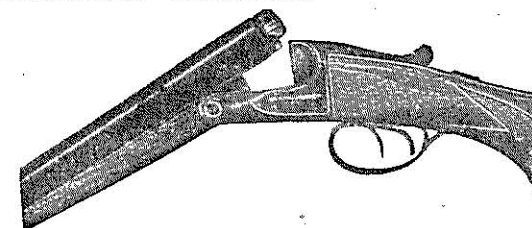

Association 11th Annual Meeting

Thirty delegates and members of the Executive Committee of the Association attended the 11th Annual Meeting of the A.C.P.T.S.A. held at Scott's Hotel, Melbourne last month.

The chief items of discussion centred around the production of the Association monthly "News" bulletin, increased registration fees for individual shooters and the annual election of office-bearers.

The President, Mr. J. M. Wilson, occupied the Chair.

After animated discussion, it was moved on the motion of Mr. O'Callaghan (Hornsby delegate) that the Executive Committee be commended for its action in arranging for the commencement of A.C.P.S. "News." Mr. O'Callaghan added that the production was of worth while interest, was satisfactory for keeping country and interstate clubs in closer touch with headquarters, was authentic and was written in language all shooting men could understand. Mr. Johns (Rockhampton delegate) seconded and supported Mr. O'Callaghan. The motion was carried.

There was only isolated opposition to the motion.

Mr. Cox (Holbrook delegate) moved a Notice of Motion that individual shooters registration fee be increased to 10/- per annum. Mr. Cox said he considered the service provided by the Association was being inadequately financed at the small fee of 5/- per year. The President said he thought the Association should have additional revenue, taking into account its present commitments.

Mr. Cole (Coburg delegate) vigorously opposed the motion.

Mr. Tyquin (Hobart delegate), Mr. Ridge (Deniliquin delegate), Mr. Biggs (Jerilderie delegate) and Mr. Johns (Rockhampton delegate) supported the motion.

Mr. Ridge further added that the Association "News" was the only means by which country shooters knew what was happening elsewhere.

Mr. Burns (Molong delegate) seconded and the motion was carried to operate as from 1st January, 1948.

(The 10/- registration fee for individual shooters will now conform to the fee charged since 1946 by the English C. P. Association with which A.C.P.T.S.A. is affiliated.—Ed.).

Four additional Notices of Motion with the object of increasing revenue for the Association, were withdrawn by permission of the Chairman, following the passing of the increase to 10/- registration.

Mr. Bragg (Wagga, N.S.W.) said he hoped the Association would stage its annual Champion of Champions Cup on some other weekend than King's Birthday holiday in middle of June. It was agreed that a suitable date would be Victorian Eight Hours Day holiday weekend, 24th and 26th April. (The Executive Committee later agreed to this date for the event.—Ed.).

The question of a resumption of referee classes was discussed. It was agreed that these be resumed in the autumn, under the supervision of Mr. G. H. Watts. A postal course will be available at that time for shooters desirous of securing a certificate and residing outside of Melbourne.

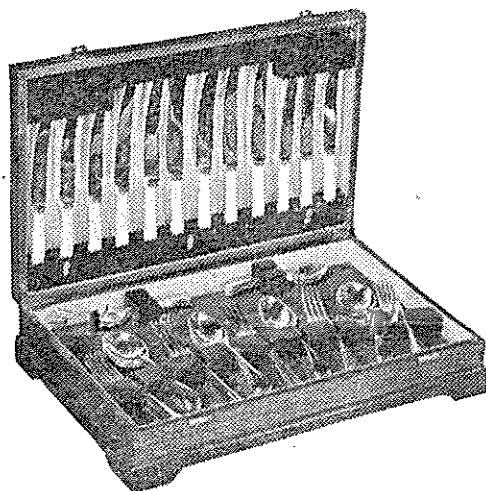

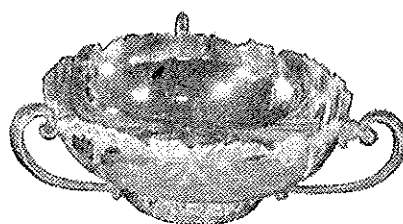

Two nights after the Annual Meeting the newly elected Executive Committee held a full meeting. Ten Years Ago

Ten years ago this month "Duxbac" (H. G. James) achieved an ambition most shooters aim for, that of winning his 50th championship. His success was gained with the Blackburn Club's premier title event at double-barrel—20 clays from 18 yards. The winner and "Browning" (J. L. Lowe, now of Trafalgar) were the only possible scorers. In the tie shoot "Duxbac," shooting first stopped all five with first barrels. "Browning" missed his first in the shoot-off and did not continue, the scores read "Duxbac" 25/25, "Browning" 20/21.

J. C. ("Pee-Wee") Thompson and his brother H. T. Thompson of St. George, Qld., both well known in Victoria for their memorable 4000 mile trip to complete in the 1939 Champion

of Champions Cup and their fine sportsmanship, are recorded as having presented a challenge cup for team competition between A.C.P.T.S.A. affiliated clubs within a radius of 300 miles of St. George. Teams to comprise not less than five members. These fine sportsmen both saw long service in the recent war.

Victorian Chief Secretary Bailey hurled a bombshell among Victorian shooters when he announced in December 1937 that there would be no open season for wild duck during 1938. This was the first time in Victorian legislative history that such a drastic step had been taken.

OVERSEAS ITEMS

CLAY PIGEON SHOOTING FOR WOMEN

By MRS. IDA GROSVENOR

Equipment

I recommend the novice to start right away with a double 12 bore gun—any of the smaller bores will be found to be a great handicap later on. I started with a 20 bore gun and it was not until I changed over to a 12 bore that I began to really improve. The handicap of a small shot charge is very great and impossible to overcome. Provided the gun weighs not less than 6½ lbs., fear of the recoil or kick need not be taken into ac-

count—it would indeed be an advantage if the gun weighed some few ounces more, say 6¾ lbs. I shoot with a gun weighing 7 lbs. The suggested minimum weight is ample to absorb most of the recoil. By using cartridges 1/16th oz. less shot than the standard load to commence the kick is hardly noticeable. Any of the small bores should be ruled out, owing to the light shot charge they throw and also the fact that generally they possess a sharper recoil, quite out of proportion to the lesser weight of the load. The boring of the gun should give a close pattern with both barrels, either a fully choked one of

70 per cent., or the right barrel could be a shade more open, say a 7/8th choke, giving a 65 per cent. pattern.

"For a beginner I would suggest that No. 7 shot in both barrels would perhaps be best. Later on 6½ or even 6 in the left barrel will be found more suitable. A rubber heelplate to the gun has advantages. Not only does it cushion the shoulder and so further reduce the recoil, but it also prevents the stock from altering position after firing the first barrel. An ejector gun is not necessary.

"With regard to suitable clothing, the only requirement is a shooting jacket, which should be on the loose side with plenty of room under the arms—two pockets for taking cartridges is an advantage.

Practice.

To gain confidence, I advise a novice to start near to the trap, say 10 to 12 yards distant. Commence at birds thrown straightaway and travelling only about 45 yards. Have only one cartridge in the gun—the main idea is to get the knack of "killing" with the first barrel. All second barrel "kills" would be in the nature of a fluke at this early stage. I think that an ordinary single throw trap is best to commence on. By this type of trap the same bird can be repeated over and over again until it is mastered. When this straightaway target can be broken with certainty first one and then the other angle birds can be practiced upon and the necessary "lead" grasped. Finally, after several practice lessons, the loader may vary the birds at will and when, under these conditions, the shooter can break about half of those thrown, then it is time to try one's hand at the regular "down-the-line" shooting over the automatic trap. Anyone with reasonable eyesight is bound to succeed and even if there is a defect in vision spectacles can be obtained to correct this. To ensure the gun fits properly a visit to a shooting school or first class gunmaker will disclose what stock alterations will be necessary. At a rough guess, for the average woman, a stock measurement of 13 x ¾" and with a drop of 1½ x 2" and a cast-off of about ¾"

will be about right. One thing more, make it a golden rule to only have a cartridge in the gun when actually on the shooting line and facing the trap house.



The following verse has been forwarded by a Queenslander who received it from a former U.S.A. serviceman whom he entertained at various times during the war years. The American lad, Johnny Malone is now married to his boyhood sweetheart and settled back in his home town of New Haven, Connecticut, but he has apparently not forgotten his Australian friends. Johnny incidentally is a first class shot both with the rifle and shot-gun.

"In these days of many changes,
It's wonderful to know

That Christmas holds the same old warmth,

The same old friendly glow;
And in this Christmas message,
There are wishes old, but true,
And just the same old friendliness
We always feel for you."



In a letter to the Secretary of A.C.P.T.S.A. Mr. W. P. Grosvenor writes:—

"I must really congratulate you on the second issue of your "News" (the first one still has to reach me). To my astonishment I find, by the time-honoured way of counting up the number of names in one column and multiplying it by twenty that you have no less than one thousand registered shooters. This is going to make the Old Country sit up, as we cannot boast of so many per million of population. No wonder they think well of you over here.

"Enclosed is a contribution from my wife. Her "Golden Rule" remarks you may think should be deleted, as you may possibly feel that no shooter in your country requires such a caution. Over here, however, I have seen instances of the most damnable carelessness, even on the part of shooters of real experience. As far as my memory goes I think she has told the story of her training by me (my methods) correctly. I do

think my first choice of a gun, a double 20 bore, handicapped her progress. She really had to thank the members of the U.S.A. Olympic Team of 1920 for their excellent coaching as from then on she became a very good trap shot and able to hold her own with a good many men.

"My wife has always had in mind that the sport of clay pigeon shooting is the one where woman's possible limitations have the least effect. She will find the same difficulties I have met with, i.e., to keep the "great I am" out of it. It takes an experienced correspondent to do this successfully, to hammer home points and ideas without dragging in oneself to illustrate them. Mrs. Grosvenor is a bad hand at swanking so I will do so for her. It is an undoubted fact that at "down-the-line" shooting there has not been any woman shooter her equal or near equal for some 25 years in Great Britain and she is altogether the outstanding woman shooter this side of the Pond.

She has been woman champion of England since 1912 and is an equally good shot, both with .22 rifle and shot gun. She has been beaten only twice in all that time. Her best scores at clays are 98/100 twice, but to my mind her two best efforts were a 96/100 and a 94/100, both of which were made "in the pit" in competition with the best men shooters we have here.

Her effort in visiting Berlin in 1936 and shooting against the pick of 22 nations on level terms and coming 53rd out of over 150 shooters was a great feat. Out of the 15 shooters England sent to Berlin she was 6th throughout and with a little luck would have been nearer 30th than 53rd over the full course. This, mind you, was shot under the most difficult Continental conditions of 15 traps, all set to beat the gun.

"There you are, you must pardon my eulogies. I will give you some of my own coaching hints in future articles."
