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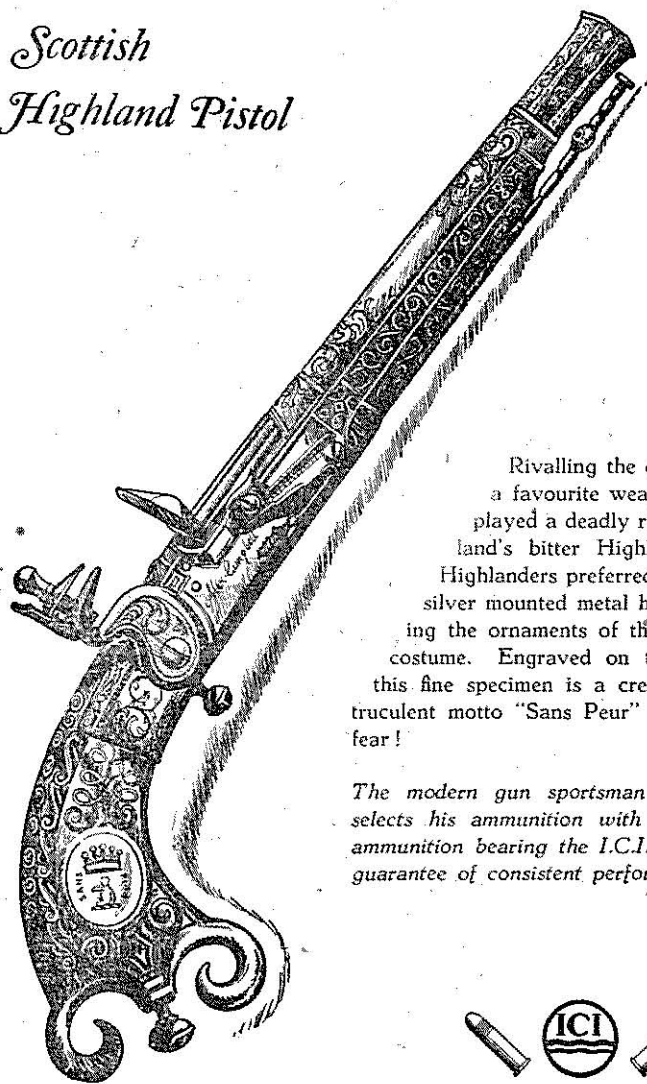

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THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

International status in the sphere of clay pigeon shooting is an honour and achievement known only to a few Australian sportsmen. Hence the opportunity provided by the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association when the first post-war International series is staged on April 24 and April 26 next is creating an interest and expectation greatly in excess of that usually noted prior to major contests.

In 1939 when the first International between teams representative of England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales and Australia became an established institution it was expected that, ere this, the tournament would have become an annual fixture. The war years and what has happened since threw all these hopes into the cauldron of world mix-up. Checking back on some of the 1939 comments we find that the pioneers of the International were hopeful of the International Trophy (presented in that year by the veteran

Melbourne sportsman, Mr. Donald Mackintosh) "occupying space on ocean liners as frequently as does the Davis Cup in International tennis."

Nineteen forty eight International shooting conditions vary slightly from those originally agreed upon for the 1939 initiation, and concerns the number of team members only.

The zest of the "International atmosphere" and the thoughtful pride attached to the honour of shooting for one's country has been in no way lessened by the Home Country's austerity ordained slight reduction in team complement.

The winning team will be correctly designated as the "Champion combination of the British Empire."

England won in 1939 with a record score and holds the Trophy until defeated.

Australia has a great chance to gain possession of the coveted title in 1948—let us hope our men possess the physical fitness and the brilliance to be equal to the occasion of lasting out the herculean 100 birder. May the best team win!

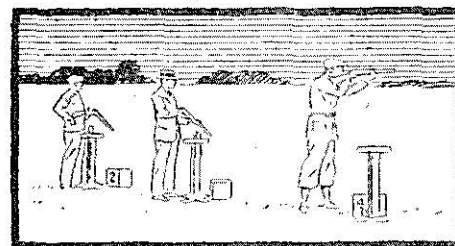

We have no doubt that Ollie Cox will be more than delighted to learn that his good shooting has carried his name so far afield.

BLACKBURN CLUB (V.)—The veteran champion trapshot "Calrossie" (J. W. Sutherland) officially opened the club's new shooting grounds at East Burwood (comprising 30 acres) on February 14. Committeeman, Harry Ball, arranged an ingenious tripod contraption, whereby, "Calrossie" was enabled to break two clays, which released and broke the traditional bottle of Champagne with a single shot. "Calrossie" remarked that it was the first time he had broken so many articles with one barrel and also added that it was his first experience of having birds "tied" up and waiting. Some 85 shooters attended the function as well as a host of visitors. President Dave Watson was as usual equal to the occasion,

for in addition to making one of his best speeches, enjoying a goodly quantity of the product of his home Heather Country, he capped the lot by winning the main event after 37 rounds of strenuous shooting. His form was reminiscent of his Champion of Champions title win in June of 1947 in which he promises to be hard to beat again when the 1948 event is shot on April 24. The main event, shot at 20 birds, drew 80 nominations. The winner, with "Bendigo" (Harry Ceresa) and the Dandenong front-marker, A. Hamilton (who had not pulled a shot for 18 months) each stopped 19/20. The final result was "Doch-an-Doris" (Dave himself) 34/37, Hamilton 28/32, "Bendigo" 26/30, front-marker's trophy, E. Wignell, 18/20. An event off the backmark was cut by "Calrossie", "Doncaster" (Jim Bienvenu), Les. L. Schilling and Alf. Hall, each 4/4. The final February shoot was on 28th. A feature of the final February fixture was the success of the N.S.W. visitor Wal. Eather, of Boggabri. He won the main single barrel event and finished third to Bert Goodear (Glen Iris) in the 10 bird D.B. contest. Others in winning brackets were the new shooters A. H. The event is open to any shooter registered with the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association who is a member of an affiliated club in any part of the Commonwealth of Australia. No championship qualification is necessary.

PRIZE LIST—CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS CUP

The winner of the Champion of Champions Cup event will hold the Donald Mackintosh Perpetual Silver Cup (valued at 75 guineas) for 12 months and will also receive the following awards—

Replica of Champion of Champions Cup,

A.C.P.T.S.A. Champion of Champions Sash.

Special Winner's Trophy.

These trophies presented by Mr. J. M. Wilson (President of the A.C.P.T.S.A.).

Trophies will be awarded to the next highest scorers, down to eighth position. Four special trophies will be awarded to competitors registering the best performance whose Association handicaps come under the following categories—12/13 yards, 14/15 yards, 16/17 yards, 18 yards and over (a competitor finishing anywhere in the first eight will not be eligible for the sectional handicap trophies).

The two Interstate competitors (resident outside Victoria), registering the best performance in the Champion of Champions Cup and not winning any other award, will be allotted special trophies.

A special trophy will be presented to the Lady drawing the winning shooter.

ENTRANCE FEE.—Entrance Fee for the Champion of Champions Cup will be 50/- (birds free). Optional sweepstakes of 20/- and 10/- will be conducted in conjunction with the Champion of Champions Cup. In addition an optional 5/- sweepstake, restricted to shooters whose Association handicap does not exceed 15 yards will also be available. All sweepstakes above will be divided (without deductions), First 60%, Second 30%, Third 10%.

AUSTRALIAN TEAMS' CHAMPIONSHIP

(To be shot concurrently with the Champion of Champions Cup)

Australia's Second International Teams' Match

Competing teams, England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Australia, for the DONALD MACKINTOSH INTERNATIONAL TROPHY, valued at 100 Guineas.
(Results by cable)

The Australian Team of 20 men for the International Match will comprise the 15 highest scorers in the Champion of Champions Cup event 1948, plus 5 others to be chosen by the A.C.P.T.S.A. Selection Committee. In the event of any selected shooter being unable to take his place in the team his place will be filled by another shooter agreed upon by the Selection Committee.

CONDITIONS

100 Birds per member from 16 yards, five track shooting system, in four stages of 25 each. Automatic angle trap, double-barrel, "kills"; only to count 24". Cartridges loaded with not more than 1½ oz. of shot, No. 6 English size.
Best 15 scores will count in the competition. Five lowest scores will be counted out.

PRIZE LIST—INTERNATIONAL MATCH

Highest scorer in the Australian Team will hold the special Hartley International High-Gun Cup (presented by Hartley's Ltd, Melbourne) valued at £20 for 12 months (or until the next International Match) and will be awarded a special replica trophy valued at £5/5/ (also presented by Hartley's Ltd) and the International High-Gun Sash. Second and third trophies will be awarded to members of the team registering the next scores to high-gun. In the event of ties, to be shot off in batches of ten clay pigeons until finality.
Every member of the Australian Team will receive the special "International 1948" Badge.
ENTRANCE FEES—The Entrance Fee for each member of the team will be 50/-, including birds.
Optional sweepstake of 10/- will be conducted in conjunction. Sweepstake money divided 60%, 30%, 10% without deductions.
PRACTICE BIRDS—Members of the International Team will be permitted ten practice birds before the competition, in accordance with the International conditions. Practice birds 2/-.
CARTRIDGES—Special cartridges, loaded in accordance with the conditions governing International competition, will be available to members of the team only, at current rates. Only these cartridges may be used.

PROTESTS—In the event of any protest or protests, 20/- accompanying each protest, which are required to be written in ink, must be lodged with the Secretary A.C.P.T.S.A. during or within 15 minutes of the conclusion of the competition concerned. The Executive Committee's decision shall be final.
REFRESHMENTS—Refreshments and light luncheon will be available on the ground throughout the day.

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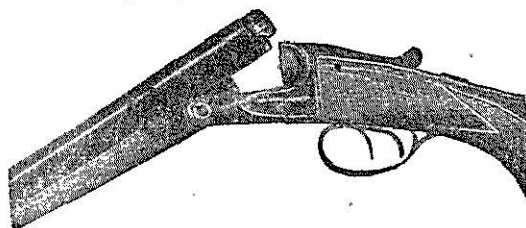

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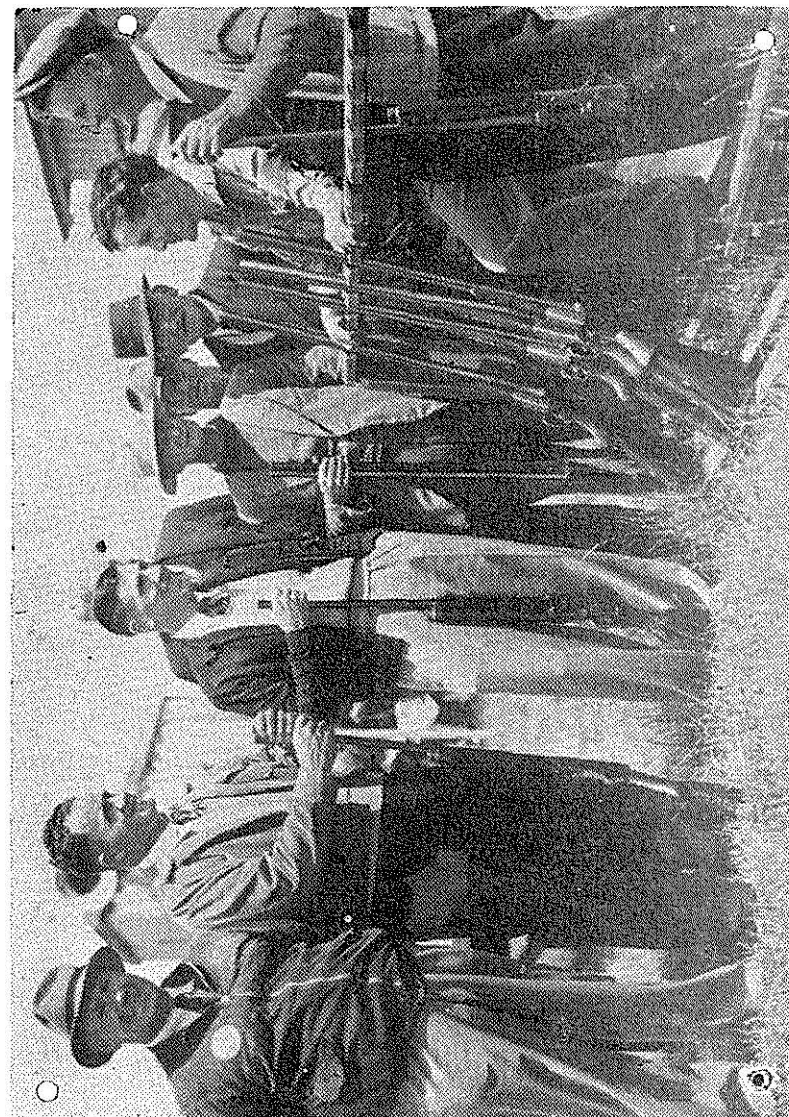

OVERSEAS ITEMS

(From Mr. W. P. Grosvenor—Famous English Shooting Authority and Coach).

In one of my previous articles I mentioned about my methods of coaching men for clay target shooting. As the methods I adopted when working up our best men in England to make a good team for match shooting was rather successful I will now cover the method in as concise a way as possible. It may be of some assistance to your men in Australia, particularly having in mind the forthcoming International Teams Championship and other events.

The first and most important of all is accuracy, because if you do not hit you do not break the target. This fundamental every man has to acquire for himself, but of course, individual coaching by one who can tell the shooter exactly where the charge has gone (if a miss) is a great help. What I have in mind is the training of a squad of men to develop speed, or "time" as it is generally called. A slow shot, however accurate, is certain to come unstuck sooner or later by a certain proportion of his birds being outside the pattern of his gun—and he is unlikely to become a real target breaker, which is of course, every shooter's ambition. No doubt, the accurate but slow shot will with a full choked gun, almost always hit his target with one or two pellets, but this does not make a certainty of a break. Even when the bird is broken in this manner, it generally means it has been tailored, or in other words, "just broken" into some four or five pieces. It is usually admit-

ted that three pellets are the minimum to ensure a "kill" of the ordinary kind. To achieve a spectacular break it is necessary to at least double the number of pellet hits to register a complete smash up and leave only a puff of dust like smoke hanging in the air. The real experts smash their targets so completely because they literally plaster them with shot and this can only be achieved by the very close pattern which their fully choked guns give at around 30 to 32 yards from where they stand. The average man probably keeps around 37 yards, with an occasional lapse or slow shot. The good shot will likely be killing at about 35 yards, but the crack shots will be averaging much better than this and keeping around some 30 to 32 yards. This latter are a pleasure to watch. You sometimes hear an onlooker say "He is killing them on top of the trap house" and that is what it looks like from the back of the line. I used to put up poles, two at 32 yards and a second pair at 37 yards, with string stretching across the field from side to side and thus marking out a space of 5 yards in width. I then used to take my stand at one side and referee or call the results from there. My approbation or disapproval was conveyed to the shooters by the quality or incisiveness of my call. If a break was made near or on the farther line (37 yards) I would announce "kill" in a slow and weary voice, for those breaks in about the middle of the

space I would give my verdict in an ordinary referee's call. But, when a break was made at the nearer line, I used to put vim and go into my voice and when, now and again, some one or other broke a bird well in front of (nearer the trap house) the first string, my incisive and jubilant announcement conveyed my great approbation. This method proved a kindergarten way of teaching speed, but it was surprising how quickly my men got into the spirit of the thing and quite unconsciously were doing their utmost to avoid any suggestion of ridicule I managed to convey by my tone of voice when calling.

The International

The programme of the 14th International Tournament (the second in which Australia will compete) is necessarily curtailed in some respects in view of conditions prevailing in Great Britain. Chief among these, insofar as it applies to Australia, is the reduction in team complement from 25 to 20 with the best fifteen scores to count (20 previously).

Each member of the competing teams is required to shoot at 100 clay pigeons (kills to count only) in four 25 bird stages from 16 yards. Guns must not be of larger calibre than 12 gauge—cartridges will be supplied and only these may be purchased for use in the competition by the team member. Length of case must not exceed 2½" and the charge of shot must not exceed 1½ oz., nor may a larger size of shot than No. 6 (British) be used. Referees decision is final.

The "No Bird" rule shall apply as in Rule 10 of the A.C.P.T.S.A. Handbook, (a) to (f). Each team member must shoot at five birds from each track in 25 bird stages. Shooters must not move to the next firing track until the scorer rings a bell. (This regulation will be strictly adhered to).

Practice at 10 birds each will be permitted for each team member.

Entry fee in England has been fixed at "£4/10/- per person"—this figure will be considerably modified as far as Australia is concerned.

The Great Britain teams will shoot on the Ely Racecourse at Cardiff in Wales on June 25 and 26, 1948.

Australia has received permission to stage its section of the International on April 26 (Victorian Eight Hours Day Holiday)—this will follow the 50 bird Champion of Champions Cup on the preceding Saturday, April 24. The venue will be on the Blackburn Club's new shooting area of 30 acres at East Burwood, Victoria. (On the property of Vic. L. Fankhauser—who was high-gun runner-up for Australia in the 1939 contest).

Following a large number of requests, we reprint the scores of the 1939 International. England's record score was 1878 with three equal high-guns of 97/100. After a tie shoot the three finished in order, Major Northover, E. C. Ledger and W. E. Harris. England's gross total was 2313, then followed Scotland 1821 (gross 2242, high gun 3 93/100's). Wales was third 1756 (gross 2128). Australia was next 8 points below Wales with 1748. Ireland whipped in with a nett total of 1725 points. In England's gross total four 88/100's and one 83/100 were counted out. Scotland's high-guns were W. Wilkie, A. J. McLeod and J. M. Buchanan, each 95/100. Enoch Jenkins, the dour Welshman who is still one of the best shots in Great Britain, won the individual high-gun for the contest with a splendid 98/100. Jenkins made up his score with 24, 24, 25, 25—some shooting!

Wales which counted out an 80, 79, 78, 68, 67/100, was behind Australia in gross total, but was 8 points up in scores to count. Ireland whose best was 92/100, registered by P. Power, included a woman shooter, a Mrs. Peard who with a 76/100 was counted out.

The individual scores of the Australian team are as follows. Athol Love (now a resident of Nhill, Vic.) 93/100, (missed his 17th, 39th, 42nd, 43rd, 53rd, 65th and 77th birds) with tie shoot 118/125 (high-gun), "Dubbs" (Vic. Fankhauser) 93/100 (missed 1;

8, 50, 59, 64, 81, 89) tie shoot 117/125 (2nd), J. Bryant 93/100 (missed 8, 11, 21, 51, 65, 80, 89) tie shoot 112/120 (3rd), then the Hobart surprise packet Rowley Pitt 92/100, (4th), A. F. Burns (Victoria) 91/100, J. Cooper (Benalla, Victoria) and G. Barber (Warrnambool, Victoria) each 89/100, W. R. Johns (Malvern, Victoria), "Duxbac" (H. G. James, Bentleigh, Victoria), Don Muir (Griffith, N.S.W.) and A. E. Poxon (Launceston, Tasmania) each 88/100, S. Rossiter (Koo-wee-rup) 87/100, "Pee-Wee" (J. C. Thompson, St. George, Queensland) and W. Rainbird (Launceston, Tasmania) each 86/100, E. J. Parow (Brunswick, Victoria) 85/100, W. B. Wilkinson (Geelong, Victoria) 84/100, H. Wright (now of Ballarat, Vic.) and G. A. Purcell (Launceston, Tas.) each 83/100, G. C. Rutledge (Brighton, Vict.) and Geo. Daniels (Narre-warren, Vict.) each 81/100—all scores to count.

Those counted out were—"Brown-ing" (J. L. Lowe, Trafalgar, Vict.)

and Commander C. R. Price (Toorak, Vict.) each 80/100, E. R. Ball (Colac) 79/100, "Pentland" (Jim Stoddart, Elsternwick, Vict.) 78/100 and A. W. Hall Coburg, Vict.) 77/100.

"Dubbs" break of 42 straight was the best for the team, gained between his 8th and 50th releases.

The high-gun winner A. Love, was at the time of his success a member of the Metropolitan Fire Brigade in Melbourne and his success was a tribute to his physical fitness. Many of the team were much more worn out than Love and the experience gained in the marathon struggle proved that sportsmen have to be at their top physically for shooting as in any other form of sport.

Messrs. Hartley's Ltd. of Melbourne, have decided to sponsor the Australian International High-gun Trophy for perpetuity, together with annual replica.

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A.C.P.T.S.A. HANDICAPS

The following are the Association Handicaps for all registered shooters competing in OPEN events. Where no handicap has been declared, insufficient record of performances are known.

Handicaps have been declared with the limit mark shooters commencing at 12 yards in accordance with the rules of the Association. Clubs are requested to conform to this rule and begin handicaps at 12 yards. Unknown shooters should commence no nearer than 16 yards.

In order to ensure satisfactory Association handicapping, Club officials are requested to show each shooter's full surname and initials (shooting name if any in addition) when forwarding handicap returns to the Association office.
