# ACTA REPORT

Mal Dyson – President Paul Gilbert – CEO



It's been another busy month at the ACTA National Office especially for our admin staff who

have been attempting to update important member information on our database. This has included email addresses and phone numbers, which would hopefully have been originally provided to clubs with membership subscriptions. Over time, people get new phone numbers and email addresses and sometimes these fail to reach us. We have also been attempting to clean up, correct and reinstate email addresses that may have been incorrectly entered into the database, causing them to bounce and be locked out by the email service provider that sends the monthly newsletter. Thanks to all of you who have taken our calls and assisted us to maintain our contact with you. Our only ambition is to keep you informed and across everything that is ACTA-related, so thanks for your help in this regard.

Those of you who have visited our website in the last few weeks will see that it has been completely overhauled and updated. This was largely due to the devoted efforts of Aileen Storey prior to her resignation from the ACTA at the end of July. We wish to thank Aileen for her contribution to the Association during the short time she was with us and wish her well with her future endeavours.

Meetings, meetings and more meetings . . . that's been the regular activity of the management team over the last 4 weeks. This has included meetings with My Club, My Scores, Shootmaster, Executive Committee, Management Sub-Committee, Constitution Sub-Committee, Enhancement Committee, Expansion Committee and, finally, a National Executive Committee Meeting. A number of positive outcomes have been achieved here which are listed hereunder.

#### **Constitution Sub-Committee**

Following the release of the Governance Proposal, feedback from clubs and members was minimal, (which we take as a good sign!). Nearly all of it was supportive of the new direction being suggested.

Main suggestions included the transition process from the old to new structure, how the States and

National organisations remain effectively interconnected and how the voting process will occur. The Sub-Committee has taken each of these suggestions into account and will respond to them accordingly through procedural provision.

The Enhancement and Expansion Committees are sub-sets of the Executive Committee. The functions of these are: Expansion: Rules, Coaching, Championships, ISSF Matters, Referees and Officiating, and Enhancement: Governance, Finances, Hall of Fame, Promotion. From these meetings, recommendations come forward to the National Executive Committee Meeting.

Decisions of the National Executive Committee included:

#### 2021 Events:

In a likely, continuing Covid-19 environment, if legislation and health compliance requirements can be satisfactorily addressed and met, the currently proposed dates for the 2021 National Titles are:

DTL: (Wagga Wagga) 20–26 March (final program format still to be determined)

Skeet: (Wagga Wagga) 16–23 May

ISSF: (WA) 18-23 October

#### **Database Access Policy**

The Executive Committee has tightened up this process as it protects our member's privacy information. While access will still be provided to each of the club secretaries, moving forward from 2020, a Confidentiality Agreement will now be required to be signed by each individual who is provided access, stating that they have read the ACTA's Privacy Policy and will comply with the Federally-Legislated Australian Privacy Principles.

#### **Coaching Committee**

This group has been working tirelessly over the last 6 months to reinvigorate and unify the content of

the ACTA's National Coaching Program. This has included the gathering and updating of all elements of the pertinent coaching content, inclusion of recent legislative requirements, (i.e.: Child protection, Code of Conduct, Risk Management, etc.), and the current intent towards development and delivery of Coaching packs for State Associations and future Coaches. They have also developed Youtube coaching videos through Russell and Lauryn Mark which have been extremely well received and successful as a coaching resource.

#### **ACTA Finance Report**

2020 finances are tracking well against 2019 July Year to Date, mainly due to the ACTA's successful obtainment of Covid-19 Stimulus, Boost and Jobkeeper packages.

#### **Function Centre**

The Function Centre is still majorly closed due to Covid-19 restrictions. A number of November bookings for end-of-year School formals have also been cancelled in the last month due to changes in NSW Government school restrictions.

#### Clay Target e-News Advertising

It was agreed that the current situation to suspend advertising charges in the Clay Target e-News will continue until 31 December 2020. This means that all ads up till the January edition of the e-News, (published in mid-December), will be complimentary. This will give the clubs a chance to freely advertise their events leading up to the festive season in order to help them reduce costs while getting back on their feet and back running, and hopefully encourage them to add this important content to the newsletter.

As we move into springtime and daylight savings in the next month, we trust that many of you will get back out into the open air and sunshine and enjoy the opportunity to reengage with your sport. As always, please be kind and supportive to your club officials and each other.

#### Club Coach Course

At the recent National Executive Meeting the Club Coach course developed by the State Coaching Directors' Committee and endorsed by the National ACTA Coaching Committee was ratified by the Executive.

The Club Coach course is made up of ten documents and coaching aids and will shortly be available on the ACTA home page/coaching/club coach course.

A full kit in a satchel will be assembled and forwarded to each state coaching director thus ensuring all states are using the new endorsed club coaching course documentation.

### **Constitution Sub-Committee Update**

The Constitution Sub-Committee ("CSC") has received several submissions addressing the Governance outline that was published in the most recent Clay Target. We are diligently working through all of your comments, suggestions and questions. The CSC will meet again towards the end of the month to discuss any amendments that may be required and will advise if any changes are made to the initial outline. We will also clarify any areas of concern in our next update.

We have determined that the Members of the Company that were included in clause 5.1 of the previous draft Constitution are appropriate and do not propose to make any changes. For your information we have included those Member categories below:

Members of the Company shall fall into one of the following categories:



- (a) Member States, which subject to this Constitution, shall have the right to receive notice of and appoint a delegate to attend General Meetings and the right to debate and vote at General Meetings;
- (b) Life Registered Shooter, who subject to this Constitution, shall have the right to attend General Meetings but will not have the right to debate or vote at General Meetings;
- (c) Clubs, who subject to this Constitution, shall have the right to receive notice of and appoint a delegate to attend General Meetings and the right to debate and vote at General Meetings;
- (d) Registered Shooting Members, who subject to this Constitution, shall have the right to attend General Meetings; or
- (e) Such other category of Member as may be created by the Board. Any category of Member created by the Board under this clause 5.1(e) may not be granted voting rights.

This process has highlighted the need for a complete overhaul of the membership categories available to the clubs to increase their membership base, participation and ultimately increase profit. The CSC agree that there is no requirement for this to be included in the Constitution but will pass a recommendation back to the ACTA that regardless of whether this new Constitution is or isn't adopted, revisions to current membership categories will likely need to occur. Any new membership category needs to benefit the ACTA, Clubs and the individual members. If we can provide any further information on new categories in our next update, we will do so.

We must say that the submissions received to date have been overwhelmingly positive and at our next meeting we will consider if it is appropriate to engage a law firm to draft the new Constitution. If that decision is made, when it is complete, we will provide it to you so that you can read it in its entirety and make further submissions.

# Celebrating the Old Alexander Clay Target Club's 67th Birthday

Still upholding the traditional birthday shoot of the merged Alexandra Club with Monarto. This year was their 67th celebration and we celebrated it on the 19th July with some fine shooting from some talented competitors.

The weather was pretty filthy, with a cold-front bringing wintry cold winds, blowing up from the South Pole, and with rain showers predicted, already happening throughout the Adelaide Hills. We were not holding our breath as to the number who would dare to venture out in what some described as 'weather for ducks'. We were expecting a middling crowd to attend but the cars kept coming and we ended up with nine squads, though two of them were only partly filled. A great turnout of 49 competitors and some 16 visitors.

The first event on the program was the 25 target Double Barrel Championship for the Ian & Phillip Campbell Memorial Team Shield. Martin Collumb, Siegfried 'Ziggy' Drewing and Robert 'Bobby' Dower

who had each shot a possible of 25/25 went out to shoot for the championship sash. AA grade and overall sash went to Martin Collumb with his score of 47/47 while Luke Higgins took second in the grade following a lengthy shoot-off with Barry Sims, Luke shooting a 77/78. Bobby Dower won A grade with a 46/47 over Ziggy Drewing on 28/29. Rob Umback shot a 23/25 taking out B grade over Bruno Quinzi on 22/25 and the places for C grade went to Michael Schuman 21/25 over Evan Gunby on 22/27.

Six teams from the following clubs (Lower North, International, Southern, South Australian, and Monarto), were competing for the Campbell Memorial Shield, and the winning club was that put forward by International Clay Target Club after their combined scores of 120/125 was posted. Team members were Rito Borzillo, Gary Coppola, Wessam Daou, Bobby Dower and Martin Collumb.

Event 2 was another 25 target Double Barrel Championship. This time shooters were vying for the Woodrow Shield Team Championship. We saw another three possible scores on the board at the end of the event and this time AA grade shooters Barry Sims, Molly Bretag and Rob Clark went out

Event 3 was yet another memorial event with a beautiful perpetual trophy on offer for the winner. The Don Fleetwood Memorial Championship is a 25 tgt Single Barrel event and in the windy conditions it would be test of concentration.

Martin Collumb took out his second Championship sash for the day winning Overall and AA grade with his score of 27/28 over Molly Bretag who shot

# QCTA – South East Zone Trap Carnival

The annual Zone Carnival was shaping up to be a big event with many shooters keen to have a go after the long break due to the Covid outbreak. Queensland figures were looking good with zero to an occasional case when suddenly on the 21st August there was a jump in cases. Early Saturday morning on the 22nd we thought that the Carnival was a goner, when the Premier announced that gatherings would be reduced to 30. Later however, we were relieved to find that sporting clubs with Covid plans in place were exempt.

For the first time, it was decided to take prenominations for the event as this would reduce crowding and assist with meeting the Covid 19 guidelines. By Friday 28th August, 102 Shooters had already pre-nominated and we knew that with only 4 traps we were in for a tough time.

Event 1 was a 25 target Double Barrel cash divide. Amazingly, 43 of the 142 shooters shot the possible.

Next event was the 25 target Single Barrel. There were 12 possibles. After a shoot off, Grahame Noffke took out Overall with 41/41, Kevin Jarick took the AA with 40/41, followed by Brett Ward on 39/40 second. In A Grade, Con Koutsakis was the winner also on 40/41. Second was taken by Irvine Wynyard on 47/49. B Grade went to Warren Corby on 31/32 with Russell Behrens second, on 27/28. C Grade, Louise Wilson on 25/27 took first and Lennox Blackmore on 24/27, second. Erin Guy took the junior on 20/25, Merinda Welke, the Ladies on 47/48 and John Porter, the Veterans on 37/38.

The next event was the 30 target Medley. After a shoot off Graeme Turner, with 75/75 took out the Overall. Keith Simpson on 123/125 took out AA with Shane Weeden on 121/125 second.

A Grade was won by Irvine Wynyard on 74/75 and Lyndon Anderson was second on 72/75.



By the start of the shoot, 142 shooters had nominated giving 24 squads and 6 full waves.

Vic Tipman, the Shoot Marshall, instructed the shooters that we would not be able to wait for anyone and late shooters would have to be re-squadded. A big thank you to all who attended as not a single shooter had to be re-squadded except those in the Double Barrel shoot off. Conditions were near perfect with a great background, little wind but partly cloudy.


In B Grade, Russell Behrens was first with 49/50 followed by Lyndon Anderson, second, on 47/50. Pierre Naude, 141/150, took out C Grade with Lennox Blackmore on 135/150, second.

Event 4 was the 25 target Double Barrel. A total of 43 shooters shot the possible, giving 8 squads to shoot off. Light was fading and so this commenced at 8.30 am Sunday.

A long shoot off followed. Geoff Cafferky emerged the winner on 259/259. Next in line was Andrew Miano on 258/259. Andrew was shooting in A Grade at this time and so took first in A Grade. Grahame Noffke on 213/214 took out AA, followed by Clayton Cusack on 203/204 to take out second.



B Grade first was Wade Wiemers on 89/90 and John Tait, second on 74/75. Robert Burdett, 81/84 took first in C Grade with Pierre Naude on 76/78, second. Lennox Blackmore took the Junior prize on 73/75. In the Ladies, Tracey Harker on 83/87, and Col Gurski, the Veterans on 110/111.

Also, the Meadow's Shield was shot on this event. A beaming Mike Swale with a list of Brisbane scores deflated Phil Keller, whose Toowoomba team shoot a brilliant score of 372/375. Brisbane shooters shot an amazing 374/375 to win the shield and put Toowoomba in second place and just a point in front of Toogoolawah on 371. Tremendous scores all around.

The final event for the program was 25 pair Double Rise. Fewer than 10% of shooters had a Provisional Grade in Double Rise despite it being the end of August and many of them had been re-graded in their Trap handicap. This meant a lot of work in grading shooters for the shoot, but fortunately we anticipated this problem, and this had been attended to prior to the commencement of the shoot.

With twin Laporte traps and the afternoon sun, the targets were great. Grahame Noffke and Tim Williams, both shot 48/50. Tim won the shoot off with a 10/10 beating Grahame's 9/10 to take out the Overall with 58/60. Grahame took out the AA. Kevin Jarick was second on 47/50.




Thank you to Viv Tipman as Shoot Marshall, who kept everyone organised and no doubt was the man who kept the squads on time.

# **RULE CLARIFICATION**

This clarification is in response to questions asked by Clubs as to how grading should be applied when conducting Mixed Target events.

#### **Rule 1.17 – MIXED TARGETS**

A mixed target event shall be a combination of a series of Double Barrel, Single Barrel, Points Score and Double Rise targets shot in any order. Shot squad system under rules applicable to the appropriate section with target numbers and shooting marks in accordance with the appropriate championship.

With the introduction of Double Rise grading in January this year it was ruled that shooters would be given a provisional grade determined by their Trap grade as at January 1, 2020. (You can read an explanation of Double Rise grading on page 6 of the April Clay Target.) However by now many shooters will have achieved a Double

Rise grade possibly different from their Trap grade and Clubs will need to decide which grade to apply to these shooters entering a Mixed Target event.

If a shooter has established that both his Double Rise and Trap grades are the same then obviously there is no issue.

If the shooter has a Trap grade higher than their Double Rise grade, use their Trap grade. If the opposite applies, and their Double Rise grade is higher than their Trap grade then use their Double Rise grade. In other words, a shooter's grading for a Mixed Target event will be determined by whichever grade, Trap or Double Rise is the greater.

This ruling will also apply to Medley events that have a Double Rise component and High Guns over a program will also follow this logic.

# FROM THE PAST

## John W Sutherland -"Calrossie"

John was born at Wallan on the 4th April 1878 and like his father and brothers had a great love of shooting. He grew up in an atmosphere of gun powder, his family were all excellent and keen rifle

John's early life was spent with his older brother George, helping to manage the local general store at Katandra. He was also the local mail man, he commenced his mail run in about 1896 and continued until he left Katandra about 1905.

In 1905 he became manager of the Calrossie butter factory, about six miles from Yarram in Gippsland. Living and working on Calrossie estate were many men called "John" or "Jack" and so to distinguish one from the other, they acquired nicknames like "Long Jack" and "Tall Jack". John Sutherland became known as "Calrossie Jack" and it was from this nickname that his anonymity in the field of shooting came from.

John took up trapshooting in 1895 at 17 years of age and made his first appearance in a pigeon match in Shepparton. Although he was unsuccessful at first he persisted and it wasn't long before his name began appearing on the winner's boards. He won his first championship in 1901 at Kerang and continued to win from then on.

He won his first Commonwealth title in 1906 when he won the Commonwealth Sparrow Championship and from this time on he became the most prolific winner of trapshooting championships in Australia.

As a result of his growing prowess in the sport he was able to gain employment with Kynochs in 1907, his job entailed the practical use of guns and ammunition for field and trap shooting.

John married Isabelle English at Caulfield on October 23, 1912 and they lived at Ormond, they had three sons Leslie, Donald and Keith.

Kynochs was later acquired by ICI and so the "Calrossie" ICI era began. Throughout the 1920's he travelled extensively throughout Australia both



working with ICI and competing in the major trap shoots of the time. He won state championships in Victoria, New South Wales, South Australia and Tasmania and gained recognition as the best trap shooter in Australia.

In 1928 he went to Europe to compete, whilst in Europe he won championships in England, France, Italy and Monte Carlo. He won the aggregate for the season in Monte Carlo and was subsequently recognised as the best trap shooter in the world.

Whilst he was in Monte Carlo he created a new world pigeon record of 128 birds straight. He was now at his peak and would go on to dominate trapshooting until the outbreak of war in 1939.

In 1932 he set the Australian record of 121 starlings without a miss at Melbourne Gun Club. This record was never broken.

He won the Commonwealth Pigeon championship a record six times, the first time in 1916 and the last time in 1941. He also won the Commonwealth Sparrow and Starling championships

multiple times. In all, he won more than 20 National championships.

Calrossie eventually won more than 100 trap shooting championships, the last of which was the Commonwealth Galah Championship at Kerang in 1948 at the age of 70 years. He competed in his last trap shoot in 1958 at 80 years of age, after which live bird trap shooting was discontinued.

Calrossie was the most influential trap shooter of the time, he was the key figure in the transition from live targets to clay targets and in conjunction with Horrie James and Donald Mackintosh he was instrumental in the formation of the ACPTSA.

He has left us a legacy that is firmly entrenched

in our sport, his shooting style. He developed his style over 30 years of competition and then passed it on to the great Fred Burns and Newton Thomas who in turn passed it onto the generations that followed.

He died in 1968 at the age of 89 years and was cremated at Springvale in Victoria

Calrossie amazed the world with his ability with the gun for 50 years. He was to shooting what Bradman was to cricket.

Kenneth Gordon McWhirter (known as Ken), ACTA Member Number 2972, passed away peacefully on Thursday 23rd July 2020, aged 80.

Ken was synonymous with PMCTC. He officially joined the ACTA and PMCTC in Dec 1st 1974 Member for over 46 continuous years. However I believe he has been shooting since he could stand on his feet.

Ken was a great clay target shooter. He reached AA Grade in DTL and B Grade in Skeet. He represented the Northern Zone in both disciplines and cleaned up the prizes at nearly every shoot he attended. When it came to shooting in the bush he and the family never went hungry, or so he told me.

Ken was passionate about shooting. He was always on the PMCTC committee, he worked tirelessly and held Treasurer and Secretary positions numerous times over many decades.

He was instrumental in the club being relocated and established at the Hastings Regional Shooting Complex in Port Macquarie after it had to move from the airport. He helped build trap houses, storage sheds and the club house and also acquired all the materials for the road into the complex with a little help from his employer, the then DMR.

I have known Ken for 14 years and he taught me to shoot clay targets and he coached me, regularly helping me with my shooting. He is the reason I have became an accredited coach. He gave freely his time, encouragement and advice to me and now I try to

follow in his footsteps and do the same for new shooters.

On Tuesday afternoon 2 days before his passing he advised me that if we ever get approval for the club to expand he has all the plans drawn up and specifications for the building of a third trap. Andrew, his son, would just need to find them.

Ken has been a constant adviser to each and every committee at PMCTC that he worked on. He had a depth of knowledge that was unsurpassed when it came to shooting and our club. All I had to do was ask and he knew the answers.

On the Tuesday prior to Ken's passing, when I visited Ken, he wanted to know what he had been missing at the club while he was in hospital. The club was in his thoughts even then.

PMCTC members, friends and the shooting community will miss Ken. It will never be the same without him. Hopefully we have learnt so much from him. I know I shall try to emulate his passion for our club and always make decisions in the best interest of our club & members, just as he did.

Thank you Ken for everything. You always called a spade a spade, had a wardrobe of politically incorrect T-Shirts and a wicked sense of humour. We will miss your knowledge, directness, friendship and support immensely.

# Psychological Skills for Shooting

### Pieces of the puzzle

Hopefully, it won't be long before we are all back shooting again. In some States there are already competitions happening and things are starting to look better for Victoria each day. When we are all back on the tracks, what can we do to achieve that ideal performance state of being in the zone.

The research and literature tells us there are eight mental and physical conditions that have been identified by athletes as being characteristics of the feelings they have at those moments when they are doing something extraordinarily well;

- Being mentally relaxed or in a state of inner calm. Sometimes this can be described as the sense of time being slowed down and having a high degree of concentration.
- Being physically relaxed so that muscles feel loose and fluid.
- Confident/optimistic; feelings of self-confidence, being optimistic and positive about our own performance. This is very important during challenging times within the competition.
- Focused on the present. Shooting is a here and now sport and we feel a sense of harmony when the body and mind is able to work as one unit. So in order for the body to perform in the here and now, our minds must also be in the here and now. This means shooting this target and not the one missed (in the past) or not the ones

in the shoot off (in the future). By controlling the thoughts about the future and the past the body can perform automatically without conscious or deliberate mental effort.

Highly energised.
 A high energy state is frequently

described as feelings of joy, ecstasy, intensity or being 'hot'.

- Extraordinary awareness: A state of mind that allows the athlete to be acutely aware of their own bodies and of those around them.
- In control. The body and mind seem to do automatically what is right without the need to exert or impose control.
- In the cocoon. This involves feelings of detachment from the external environment and any
  potential distractions, where the athlete has
  complete access to one's powers and skills.

Just walking out on the tracks doesn't transport you straight into the zone. What does it take to get to this ideal performance state? There are a number of other components that go together to complete the puzzle. In his article 'The Final Piece' Clay Shooting January 2019, Henry Hopking argues that you need to think about all the components of your shooting. Hopking identifies being in the zone as the last piece of a 150 piece puzzle. This last piece only appears after all the other 149 are in place. Therefore to get into the zone requires the shooter to focus on the process that lead up to the outcome, not the outcome itself.

The other components of the puzzle can be grouped together. TA for Technical ability; EQUIP

for Equipment; CM for competition management; MS for mental skills; Belief for confidence and belief in your ability.

#### And Zone the final piece when you are in the zone.

Technical Ability: This is the back to basic stuff. Technical skills are foundational blocks that keep your and your ability grounded. How you stand. How you mount your gun. Your hold point. Seeing the target and acquiring the target in relation to the gun. Pulling the trigger and following through.

**Equipment:** This should be obvious. Are you satisfied with your gun and the cartridge combination. Have you had a vision check recently and are the glasses you are wearing the correct colour or prescription. Has your gun been reliably serviced or is it being held together with gaffer tape. Because you depend on your equipment you must have confidence in it.

Competition management: Hopking argues that to get to the zone, you need to comfortable within the competitive environment. Appropriate factors may include level of tiredness, nutrition and hydration, people and squadding, shooting times and conditions. In Australia, some of these factors are beyond our control but we have to be mindful that they may impact on our performance.

Mental skills; consistency, pre/post shot routine, focus, concentration, attention, anxiety control: Do you have specific goals? Do you try to concentrate for a full round of 25 targets or do you concentrate on 1 target 25 times? Do you have a

pre shot routine to facilitate the narrowing of your attention? Can you focus on the process and not the product? Are you relaxed and can you concentrate on your breathing to bring you back to the here and now?

Confidence/belief: This section involves the psychology of performance. Do you trust your ability? Are you confident you can stay focused on the process? Can you keep your mind quiet to limit self-doubt?

Now that the 149 pieces are complete it is likely that you have or can achieve being in the Zone.





## Insight on Sight

#### PART 2: An Optometrists Thoughts on Dry Eye Syndrome and the Tear Film

#### Part 2 – Treatment of dry eye syndrome

In the previous article I discussed a common issue that shooters encounter on the range – dry eye syndrome. I covered the symptoms and the cause of dry eye syndrome and for a full overview I encourage the reader to re-visit the previous edition/article. In this article I will discuss the common treatment options available for dry eye syndrome.

Now before I get into much detail, I would like to encourage any shooters that are having issues with their vision to visit their optometrist. The details discussed in this article are not a replacement for clinical advice from your regular optometrist, who can provide tailored diagnosis and management of their patients. This article aims to enhance the reader's knowledge of a particular part of our vision that is essential for good vision on the range, and highlight issues that can occur.

Dry-eye syndrome is a broad term used to define a range of conditions that impact the tear film.




Figure 1: A normal tear film showing the three different layers of the tear film

Our tear film is made up of three layers – an oil (lipid) layer, a water (aqueous) layer and a mucin layer. These three layers work together to help

maintain the health of our eyes and ward off infection. It is a disruption to any of these layers function that results in dry eye syndrome and the annoying symptoms on the range that can have a big impact on performance (See Table 1).

*Tear quantity* is determined by the aqueous layer whereas *tear quality* is generally dependent on the oily and mucous layers.

#### Types of Dry Eye Disease:

There are two main forms of dry eye disease – these are typically called evaporative dry eye, caused poor quality tears, and aqueous **insufficiency** due to low tear quantity.

- Evaporative dry eye accounts for around 80% of dry eye disease and is caused by poor functioning and/or blockage of the meibomian glands, also known as meibomian gland dysfunction (MGD – see also below). Decreased oil secretion by the meibomian glands results in rapid evaporation and breakup of the tears.
- Aqueous insufficiency occurs when the lacrimal gland fails to produce enough of the watery component of the tears. This results in hyperosmolarity of the tears, which means the tear salts and proteins become highly concentrated. In turn these high concentrations irritate the front surface of the eye, causing it to become inflamed.

Table 1 (see next page) lists the common symptoms of dry eye syndrome.

#### Diagnosis:

The key to management is a careful diagnosis by your clinical optometrist. Your optometrist will take a careful history of your symptoms, and will perform a careful evaluation of your tear film.

There are a range of clinical tests that will help diagnose dry eye, and this list is constantly expanding as our knowledge of the tear film evolves with research:

- Tear film volume
- Staining dyes to highlight your tear film and stain areas of dryness or inflammation (sodium fluorescein, rose Bengal, lissamine green)
- Tear film evaporation/break up time
- Slit-lamp microscopy to evaluate lid structures
- Meibomian gland evaluation
- Tear film osmolarity

- Lipid volume
- Tear duct and drainage evaluation

Once a careful diagnosis has been made, a targeted treatment plan can be provided. Often dry eye syndrome is classed as either 'evaporative dry eye' or 'aqueous deficiency', but has secondary components that must also be managed.

An example of this is a patient presenting with evaporative dry eye that is caused by meibomian gland dysfunction (very common in Australia), secondary to blepharitis and a build up of bacteria on the lids. The treating optometrist will prescribe a treatment for the meibomian glands, and a treatment for the blepharitis. The point I am making with this is that there is no one size fits all'approach, and that is why there are a lot of treatment and management approaches depending on the cause and associated issues.

It's actually quite rare in my own clinical practice to prescribe just one treatment for a patient with dry eye, often it is a 'multi-prong' treatment plan that is required to achieve acceptable and sustainable results.

Table 2 lists the common treatments available for dry eye:

Table 2 is designed to be a broad overview of the treatments available, and not an exhaustive list – there is many treatment products, and methods available, designed to be tailored to an individual patients issues.

Hopefully these two articles on dry eye syndrome have helped the reader develop an understanding of the condition, and developed the reader's appreciation for a careful diagnosis and management. If you are having issues with dry eye, a trip to your optometrist will be well worth the time as it can have a real positive effect on your performance.

# Badge Collecting THE BEST PART OF COLLECTING

#### **Written by Murray Gruar**

I have found the most satisfying and fun part of collecting is when you come across a badge or badges you have been trying to find for years, more especially if they are a part of a set or group and you need that one or two to complete the set.

It's ironic that you can be looking for a particular badge for years on end and as soon as you find one then you almost certainly come across more badges the same.

One of my US friends had been looking for the particular Colt badge for 35 years and one came up on eBay for sale, then others saw how much it went for, so anyone else that had one put theirs up for sale. There were 4 more of them sold in a very short time. Usually the more that are for sale the cheaper they become, unless like the Colt badge, because they are so rare, each time one comes up for sale the price goes up.

The Winchester Junior Rifle Corps and later the NRA Junior Rifle program distributed many badges to encourage juniors to learn gun safety and marksmanship. One of their badge sets was the 5-8ths of an inch pins which match the larger medallions. The smaller pins could be worn much easier on their uniforms than the larger bulky medallions.

Note the gap is for the Expert Rifleman pin. I have only ever seen one and it wasn't for sale. I have only just managed to pick up the Sharp Shooter pin a few weeks ago after waiting 25 years for one.

#### New Guinea Club Badges

There were seven New Guinea gun clubs when they were affiliated with the ACTA. I have managed to find badges from five of the seven clubs so far.

team and more recently to the different categories.

I don't have an open ACPTSA team badge with the Blue center the same as the one pictured first.

If anyone could donate one, I am sure the ACTA would be pleased to have one in the collection.

#### National Championship Badges

Nationals badges were also put out by the State they were held in, but because of the duplication they were ceased.

Skeet Nationals badges were only ever produced in the years 1984, none in 1985, then from 1986 though to 1992 in this form. From 2013 the Skeet badges have been produced in the same form as the current Trap Nationals badges.

The Australian States have all put out their own State badges over the years both cloth and metal versions.

As well as Australian Gun Clubs and the ACTA, manufacturers of everything to do with shooting have given out badges as a way of promoting their products to the shooters.

Winchester being one of the bigger companies has from the very beginning given out lots of badges and smaller samples to promote their gear.

I don't have the two Ice Skating pinbacks (see page 63), they are valued at around \$600 US each. There are literally hundreds of Winchester enamel

badges brought out from the 1930's through to current times. There are dozens of variations of the famous Horse and Rider logo.

I started collecting Winchester cartridges years ago and I bought some through Wards Auctions

in the USA. The only trouble was I wasn't allowed to bring them home to Australia without a lot of trouble. I knew a guy in the US that makes cartridge badges, so I had them sent to him and

he disarmed them and made some badges for me, it was an expensive exercise but I am very happy with the outcome.

Winchester have badges for just about every product they have produced, every anniversary they have had, and break badges of all sizes and disciplines, for the Winchester gun clubs, ladies club, war workers badges, service badges and all types of cartridges they put out. Not only did they advertise with badges, they had belt buckles, all types of brochures, pocket knives, literature and books and samples for users to try out. Lots of collectors only collect Winchester merchandise and they spend years collecting and have no hope of finding one of everything which Winchester produced.

Like Winchester, the Western Cartridge Company also put out a range of pinbacks and gold employee service pins. Western later bought out

Winchester when they were declared bankrupt in the late 1920's. These pins pictured are just a few they produced and are all from the earlier years before the takeover. The Olin group later purchased the Western/Winchester group and still own it today. It was called Western/Winchester until the 1950's until they directors could finally talk Mr. Olin into changing the name around as Winchester was much better known then Western. Peters Ammunition or more recently Remington had a very large range pinbacks, some of which have the most colourful hunting scenes. They also put out a set of Annie Oakley pinbacks which are the most sought after of them all, hence I haven't been able to score any and their prices are prohibitive.

It's always great to pick up any new additions as these were produced in the late 1800's and early

1900's and they don't like damp conditions or bright sunlight either, so they are getting few and far between.

The medallions and stickpins all made of sterling or gold, so they are much more durable then the pinbacks, which are made from tin with a celluloid finish. Naturally, the sterling and gold ones are much more expensive. It has taken me 25 years to collect this full set of stickpins pictured below. The squirrel and the woodcock are the most difficult to find, both pictured in the centre.

Ducks unlimited pinbacks are getting harder to

find, the earlier ones are extremely rare. All those pictured are around the \$100US mark but even the 1945 jumps to hundreds of dollars. The later ones were enamel which is much more durable, so they are more readily found.

The Hercules Powder Company was one of the major powder suppliers in the earlier days and they also produced advertising pinbacks and sponsored club shoots with gold, sterling and bronze fob trophies of which there are still quite a few around if you hunt through the auctions. The fobs will
