

ACTA CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

A REVIEW OF 2024

With the end of 2024 upon us, we can now look back over our year's National events. The ISSF, Trap, Skeet and Sporting Championships were all, once again, well supported and very successful.

One of the year's memorable highlights was Colac member Penny Smith, winning a Bronze Medal at the Paris Olympic Games.

Membership for the 2024 year was 13,736

A reminder to Club Secretaries, you have until the 31st of December to pay your Club's affiliation fees and vote for the 2 positions on the ACTA Board. Voting is compulsory.

With 13,000-plus members it is disappointing that we only had 4 nominations for the 2 vacant positions on the board. One might presume that more members would be interested in offering their time and energy to assist in the running of the Association. Interesting and alternatively we have numerous members willing to voice their opinions on social media, and in carparks but never availing themselves to nominate for a position on the Board.

JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT

George Papachristoforos, a Junior Skeet Shooter just over 12 years of age, has achieved a remarkable feat by winning a National Title. At this young age George has won the coveted New Zealand 12g Overall National Skeet Championship, scoring 100/100. I cannot recall anyone of his age ever attaining the recognition of Overall National Title holder. Earlier to this George had wins in 2 State Titles, winning the Tasmanian 20g State Skeet Championship and the Tasmania Overall Open State Skeet High Gun. Congratulations to George on these great performances. In this edition you will see and read more of George's achievements.

ACTA BOARD/STATE PRESIDENTS MEETING

On the evening of the 28th of November, we again held our ACTA Board Members and State and Territory Presidents' quarterly meeting. During this meeting, those State members attending were brought up to date with all ACTA activities relevant for discussion since the last meeting. The meeting was without question worthwhile, with questions and general discussions covering an array of pertinent topics. The next meeting is scheduled to be held in February 2025.

PERTH NATIONALS

A reminder that interstate members need to have a permit to take their Firearms into WA completed by no later than the end of February 2025. You can discuss applying for your permit with your State Secretary or the ACTA Office. I have been informed that there will be on-site firearm storage available at the grounds.

WAGC have purchased BRB Voice Release sets for all Skeet layouts, and DTL layouts will have hard wired Canterbury voice release. With reference to sub gauge ammunition, Anna (Bronze Wing) will be taking orders in early New Year, and John Dyas in WA, mobile 0419 954 357, will take orders for B&P and Falcon sub gauge.

FITASC COMPAK

As most of you are aware the ACTA has recently entered negotiations into acquiring the licence for Compak from FITASC.

Several factors were considered, not the least being competitor numbers at the recent National Sporting Championships, which confirmed that our member participation for sporting disciplines within the ACTA are reducing. Over the past 3 years, numbers at this event have continued to decline, this year we had less than 100 shooters participate, albeit that the ACTA are sponsoring 5 representative Sporting Teams to compete in Canada in 2025.

This is at odds with the feedback we are receiving that sporting is becoming much more popular amongst clubs outside the ACTA.

The granting of a FITASC Compak licence was an opportunity to take on a sporting discipline that is widely accepted within Australia, could grow the participation rate of present members and prompt more shooters into joining ACTA clubs.

At this point in time, we are waiting for confirmation from FITASC that we have been awarded this discipline. I am hopeful of a positive outcome, but until this has been approved by their Board, we will wait for their decision.

I would like to address some concerns that have been raised by several people.

Firstly, if Compak is approved our intention is for this discipline to replace our current ACTA 5 Stand Sporting competition. For those who are unaware, Compak and 5 Stand are very similar. The same equipment and same targets can be used, particularly at club level. On a State and National level there are only a few differences, but we would be shooting Compak under FITASC rules.

Some members have raised the question of why we can't retain both disciplines. As these disciplines are very similar to each other and attract the same shooters, it is difficult to see how two disciplines could be supported. It would be both prudent and expeditious to put resources and costs into supporting one discipline and promoting it, hopefully ensuring its success.

Another concern expressed is that the acquisition of this licence should have been more widely consulted with shooters before proceeding. The issue here is that initial discussions had to be confidential, or this opportunity would not have emerged. Shooters should also understand that the ACTA Board is elected on behalf of the shooters to act in the best interests of the sport and to its future. This unfortunately means that at times consultation becomes difficult. You can rest assured, that the Board's intention on all decisions made are based on what is best for our sport. We, as a Board must look beyond the here and now, envisage where the sport is going, mitigate risks and take up opportunities to ensure its survival and growth. It made sense to take on a discipline that would attract more shooters from other organisations to join the ACTA and improve participation rates for clubs, States and National events.

It is disappointing to see some comments made by some Facebook warriors criticising the ACTA simply because we have differing opinions to their personal views. Everyone is entitled to their opinion. Just consider that the Board must act in the best interests of all members.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank Brett, Judy, Jenny, Nathan and Blue for all their work and support throughout the year and wish them all a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

To all our ACTA members across our country can I also wish you a safe and merry Christmas and a happy and healthy New Year. Last, but not least, to Board members Ian, Les, Glenn, Michael and Malcolm C., thank you for your time and effort throughout the year in the organising and running the ACTA affairs.

Helen and I wish you well for the festive season and for 2025.

From the Rule Book

For the benefit of all shooters, but especially for those who referee when called on.

1.11 BAULK

- (a) Any extraneous occurrence, which in the opinion of the Referee materially interferes with the equity of the competitor after they call for their target constitutes a baulk.
- (b) The sun shall not be considered as interference. It must be considered as a normal hazard.
- (c) If a shooter fires a shot and the appearance of a target or piece of target from an adjoining field appears, it shall not be ruled as a BAULK unless the target or piece of target strikes or threatens to strike the shooter or the shooters gun. The referee is the sole judge as to whether a baulk has occurred or not.
- (d) Under no circumstances will a baulk be granted unless claimed by the competitor immediately it occurs. If in the opinion of the Referee, a baulk has occurred, they may restore the competitor's target.

1.25 DUTIES OF REFEREES

(e) The Referee has power to alter their decision. If altering their decision on "lost target" or "baulk" etc., during the competition, this must be done before the shooter in question shoots their next target or the shooter leaves the tracks should this be their last target.

**NOTE the 2 sections highlighted in Yellow

- 1. The referee can only grant a baulk when claimed by the shooter.
- 2. It must be done immediately before the shooter's next shot.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY 2025 ACTA ISSF CHAMPIONSHIPS

- 1 All competitors must present their current shooting licence/permit to the events office before competition. Failure to do so will incur a penalty of one (1) target.
- 2 The National ISSF Championships will be conducted under the ISSF rules governing International Competitions. ACTA dress rules to apply.
- 3 Any shooter wanting to compete in the "2025 ISSF Nationals" must be a registered competitor member of the ACTA for the financial year 2025, hold a current shooting licence/permit (all Junior Shooters must hold a valid Junior permit), or be a bonified International competitor holding Australian documents that allow the use of firearms for target shooting.
- 4 Entry and pre-squadding is by pre-nomination only through MCMS (MyClubsMyScores). Closing date for nominations is 5.00pm Monday the 13th January 2025. Squadding will be published on MCMS Tuesday the 14th January 2025.
- 5 Competitors who advise their withdrawal from an event prior to it commencing will be eligible for a refund less a \$10 administration fee. Competitors who withdraw after the commencement of an event will not be entitled to any refund for that event.
- 6 MCMS will automatically grade all entrants, in the case of insufficient data for a competitor, they will be graded after their first four (4) rounds.
- 7 Squads of up to 6 competitors will shoot a total of 125 targets per event, in brackets of 25 targets, shot one visit to a trap each 25.
- 8 Each shooter is to take enough cartridges to shoot at 25 targets.
- 9 If a shooter misses their squad they may be re-squadded, however that is not guaranteed and will incur a three (3) target penalty if they are re-squadded.
- 10 All competitors are to check and sign the score sheet after each bracket. Any score sheet not signed by the shooter will be credited with the score as recorded.
- 11 All competitors will be required to referee/score during the period of competition. The persons designated to referee/score must fulfill their obligation to do so. While replacement referees and scorers are permissible, if the replacement does not fulfil the obligation, the penalty of a loss of one (1) target for failing to officiate will be made against the officially designated person. Failure to either referee or score will incur a penalty of the loss of one (1) target in the next event. Should a competitor not be shooting a following event then the penalty will apply in the event concerned.
- 12 No competitor may interfere with or attempt to interfere with the traps, any competitor doing so will be automatically disqualified.
- 13 All appeals must be lodged in writing with the Technical Delegate, together with the \$80 appeal fee. The Technical Delegate shall arrange a jury hearing and should the appeal be upheld, the fee will be returned. If the appeal is not upheld the ACTA will retain the fee.
- 14 Entrants in the Mens and Womens Championships are entitled to receive awards in Junior and Veteran sections as well as grades if applicable.
- 15 There must be a minimum of three competitors in sections or grades, for any prizes to be awarded, and a minimum of 5 entrants to constitute a sectional National Championship.
- 16 Sectional & grade prizes will be awarded for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd, with 2nd & 3rd place decided by count back, provided they meet clause 15.
- 17 Payment of the nomination only entitles the shooter to enter the event. Changes to the program including the number of targets shot will not entitle competitors to a refund.
- 18 Squadding details will be available on MCMS. It is the shooters responsibility to monitor for changes.
- 19 The setting of targets will be under the direction of the Technical Director prior to the start of the events each day. No further adjustment will be made without the authorization of the Technical Director.
- 20 A junior who has not previously competed at a National Championship in any discipline shall be entitled to shoot for the cost of the administration fee of \$10 per event. Claim for this concession can be made at the event or within 14 days of the completion of the event, ie; by Friday 31st January 2025.
- 21 The ACTA reserves the right to alter any conditions of the competition should it become necessary. Any interpretation of the program and conditions of entry will be the responsibility of attending members of the ACTA Board, their decision shall be final.



2024 SA State ISSF Titles

Well, here we all are again to compete at the 2024 South Australian State ISSF titles with many of our friends and few of our interstate counterparts who have made the pilgrimage over to join us. Being a quieter year for ISSF meant that there weren't too many travellers, but we were glad to see a few competitors come through to still make the event a success.

On the official practice day (Friday), we saw a decent contingent of competitors come through to shoot at our host Club, International CTC, prep their skills and get used to the different backgrounds for the 2 days of competition. At 3pm, the end of official practice, while the competitors had gone, all the officials were hustling over the trap layouts with their protractors, height sticks, angle and distance markers etc. to get everything right for the morning.

Leading up to our Carnival dates of September 28 and 29, we saw unseasonal weather conditions. Some rather cold and wet/rainy days mixed in with some pleasant, almost Spring days. And the next 3 days were going to be no exception with nice conditions expected over the Saturday but a possible shower or two on Sunday.

The first day started at around 12 degrees for the morning with breezy conditions.

At the Skeet end, the officials were out there early in the morning to make sure everything was fine for the beginning of the competition. As everyone wandered around the grounds seeing who they were up against, there was the usual atmosphere of anticipation. Office staff was well catered for with lollies in the bowls for keeping the energy levels up. At 9am announcements were made, and Tournament Director Tania Evans called everyone out to the layout to see the targets. Everything looked fine, and the games got under way.

So today is the commencement of the qualifying 125 targets of which the first 75 would be shot today, and would also determine our SA Postal team. Four squads came in this year for Trap and three squads for Skeet.

Back at the Trench, a challenging first set of 75 with lots of low, fast and wide targets. The weather gods were not going to be kind to us this morning with that light breeze becoming a howling gale during the mid morning and leading up to the close of the day. It was no different at the Skeet end with some competitors needing tie-downs to stop them being blown over.



George Papachristoforos 12 year old Champion at New Zealand Skeet Nationals

George Papachristoforos, a Grade 6 student and member of the Metropolitan Clay Target Club in Melbourne, started his competitive shooting career in June 2024 when he turned 12. Since then, George, who is also a Junior School Sports Captain, has enjoyed competing in the Sporting, Trap and Skeet disciplines. He also loves to shoot in the field.

Coached by his father, George decided to focus on the American Skeet discipline and mostly trains at his home ground of Werribee Clay Target Club, who have been very supportive.

His first Skeet event was 9th June at Echuca where he won C grade in both the Singles and Doubles events. Receiving the sashes at the presentation was a turning point as the fire for competing was lit.

First Career 100 target at Cecil Park, Sydney

On August 11th, as a B grader, George competed at the Cecil Park Clay Target Club in Sydney, winning his first Handicap event against Australia's top shooters. At this event, he earned his first 100 target break badge and set a modern record for the youngest person to shoot 100 straight in open competition: 12 years and 2 months old.

From that time on, George has been training almost every weekend to improve his shooting. On 19th October George competed at Lake Macquarie Gun Club in Newcastle NSW where he won the Overall A grade and moved up into AA0 grade for Skeet Singles. He was so happy



when he told a skeet stalwart, Wayne Petersen, that he made AA0 and Wayne responded by saying: "Welcome to the club, George" and gave him big hug. This was another memorable moment.

On the weekend of October 26, George competed at the Tasmanian State Skeet Carnival, winning the 20g State Skeet Championship with a score of 50/50. He followed up with a strong performance in windy conditions winning the Overall Open State High Gun and the Junior High Gun. George's mother was present, and he was so happy for making her proud.

At just 12 years old, and with two State titles under his belt, George began to see firsthand his hard work paying off.

The following weekend George competed at the South Australia State Skeet titles. At this event, he earned himself two 75 break badges shooting off for the Handicap and the Skeet Doubles titles. Unfortunately, the hot and windy conditions caused havoc, but George managed to shoot a

98/100 in the Singles, 50/50 in the Handicap and a 47/50 in the Doubles. Winning the A grade Doubles after a shoot-off, George was happy with his performance and had a chance to become friends with two other very talented juniors: Jack Bateman and Austin Gibbes.

His father promised George that if he put as much effort into his schooling as he did into his shooting, he would take him to New Zealand for the National Skeet Carnival that was being held at Waikato Clay Target Club in Hamilton. The hard work continued both on the scholastic and shooting front as George prepared for the New Zealand Nationals in late November. Prior to leaving for New Zealand, George attended Grade 6 Camp for a week.

Upon arrival at Waikato GC, George was a little overwhelmed by the entire experience and it took some time to find his form. On Friday 22nd November, George competed in the coveted 100 Target National 12g Championship. Being in the third wave, he carefully studied the field he was rostered to shoot and got a good read on the targets, finally deciding on his shooting lense colour. George started in a strong position posting a straight 25 after his first round. He was ecstatic to shoot his first 25 in New Zealand. Continuing with a maniacal focus, he then shot 50 straight. George was absolutely delighted to be shooting so well, which certainly relieved some pressure.

The last 50 targets were going to be tough for squads shooting late in the day. The weather had turned for the worse with strong winds, a light drizzle, and overcast conditions coming and going. George was not deterred as he had trained in horrible conditions at his home club and learned how to handle wind-affected targets, (as in one training session, his coach had him shoot in strong winds while standing on one leg). After shooting a 25 straight in these conditions, George proved to himself that he could handle the wind if he took that extra millisecond to read the target, and the time to work the target properly.

With a 75 straight and a quick 2–3 minute break to replenish cartridges, George was back into it. He was moving well through the pads until he got to station 4, where on his call the machine malfunctioned. The referee called for a trapper who worked on the high house. Within 10 minutes, which seemed like an eternity, the machine was ready, and George was back on the pad. After seeing a proof target, George broke the high 4 and then the low. He was relieved that he could get back into the zone so quickly. As most skeet shooters know, station 5 can be insidious. Spending a lot of time and running training drills on this pad paid off as stand 5 was shot clean. Moving to stand 6 George continued to stay focused and cleaned this stand too.

At this point George become aware that he had a great chance to shoot the 100 if he could remain focused and not to get to sticky under the pressure. There is no such thing as an easy target. At this point a crowd gathered around the skeet field where the spectators were watching history unfold. Maintaining his hard focus, George shot his last target for the 100 straight, with the gallery erupting in cheers. George was elated to shoot another career 100, but did not know at the time that the highest score with all shooting concluded was 99. Andy Peter, a Legendary New Zealand Skeet shooter, told George while congratulating him that not only did he shoot the 100 straight, but also won the National title. The news could not have come from a better person as Andy spent some time talking to George in the carpark on the first day and they struck up a good rapport.

George was completely shocked and in disbelief. He asked Andy 3 to 4 times if he had won the National title as it had not sunk in. In that moment, a 12 year old boy, still in primary school, became the youngest Australian to win a National title, setting an unbelievable record that will stand for a long time.

In the clubroom Andy Peter showed him the past luminaries and legends who had their name on the perpetual cup. Andy told George that his name will be engraved on this cup, and he had now joined a group of the most elite shooters going back to 1937.

In under six months of competing, George has earned himself two State titles and one National title, consequently earning 40 Championship Hall of Fame points. Truly an astonishing achievement for any competitor let alone one so young.

When not shooting, George enjoys being your average 12-year-old kid, training in karate twice a week at orange belt grade, riding his bike, playing soccer and tinkering with radio-controlled cars. George is banned from using technology. This is a strict rule that his parents enforce without remorse.

George shoots a 28" Beretta 682 silver action skeet gun that was manufactured in 1985. The gun weighs 4.5kg (or 9.9Ibs) in total and he cleans it meticulously after every shoot or practice session. His father who is a part-time gunsmith keeps the gun in service.

He has personalised his firearm with the words "Molon labe" (come and take [them]) across the barrels, a Greek phrase credited to Leonidas I of Sparta on the eve of the Battle of Thermopylae in 480 BC.

George is very proud of what he has achieved thus far and would personally like to thank Mr Gary Jones and Mr Antonio Carta for all their help along his journey. He continues to work towards building his skills and competing with the skeet community he has grown to admire and respect.

LOVE YOUR HEART Understanding Atrial Fibrillation: Causes, Symptoms and Treatment Options

Atrial fibrillation (AFib) is the most common type of irregular heartbeat or arrhythmia, affecting millions of people worldwide. It occurs when the heart's electrical signals become disorganized, leading to rapid and irregular contractions in the heart's upper chambers, called the atria. This condition can increase the risk of stroke, heart failure, and other heart-related complications. Despite its prevalence, AFib often goes undiagnosed, and its symptoms can be subtle or mistaken for other conditions.

This article will explore the causes, symptoms, risk factors, diagnosis, and treatment options for atrial fibrillation, offering a comprehensive guide to understanding the condition and its impact on health.

What Is Atrial Fibrillation?

Atrial fibrillation is a condition where the electrical activity in the atria, the heart's two upper chambers, becomes chaotic and disorganized. Normally, the electrical signals that regulate the heart's rhythm begin in the sinoatrial (SA) node, a specialized area of the right atrium. These signals prompt the atria to contract in a coordinated manner, pushing blood into the ventricles (the heart's lower chambers).

In AFib, however, the electrical signals in the atria fire at an extremely fast and erratic rate, causing the atria to quiver instead of contracting normally. This results in inefficient blood flow into the ventricles, which may cause a range of symptoms, including dizziness, shortness of breath, and palpitations.

Types of Atrial Fibrillation

There are several types of atrial fibrillation, classified based on their duration and frequency:

- 1. **Paroxysmal AFib:** This type of AFib comes and goes. Episodes may last for a few minutes to a few hours but typically stop on their own without treatment.
- 2. **Persistent AFib:** In persistent AFib, the irregular heartbeat lasts for more than seven days and does not stop on its own. It may require medical intervention to restore normal rhythm.
- 3. **Permanent AFib:** In this case, the irregular heartbeat is constant, and attempts to restore normal rhythm may no longer be effective. Treatment focuses on managing symptoms and reducing the risk of complications.

Causes and Risk Factors

Atrial fibrillation can be caused by various factors, including underlying heart disease, high blood pressure, and other medical conditions. Some of the most common causes and risk factors for AFib include:

- Heart Disease: Conditions such as coronary artery disease, heart valve disorders, heart failure, and congenital heart defects can increase the risk of AFib. These conditions may alter the structure or function of the heart, making it more susceptible to arrhythmias. Mitral and tricuspid valve disease in particular are very commonly associated with AFib.
- **High Blood Pressure:** Chronic high blood pressure puts strain on the heart, particularly the atria, increasing the likelihood of AFib.
- **Age:** The risk of AFib increases with age, particularly after the age of 60. Age-related changes to the heart's electrical system may contribute to the development of AFib.
- Other Medical Conditions: Diabetes, obesity, sleep apnea, hyperthyroidism, and lung disease are also linked to an increased risk of AFib.

- Alcohol Consumption: Excessive drinking, especially binge drinking, can trigger episodes of AFib. This is sometimes referred to as "holiday heart syndrome."
- **Genetic Factors:** A family history of AFib may increase the likelihood of developing the condition.

Symptoms of Atrial Fibrillation

Not everyone with atrial fibrillation experiences noticeable symptoms. However, when symptoms do occur, they can vary in severity and may include:

- **Palpitations:** A sensation of a fast or irregular heartbeat, often described as fluttering or pounding.
- **Shortness of Breath:** Difficulty breathing, especially with physical exertion or when lying down.
- **Fatigue:** A general feeling of tiredness or lack of energy, even with adequate rest.
- **Dizziness or Lightheadedness:** A feeling of being faint or unsteady, which can be caused by inadequate blood flow to the brain.


- **Chest Pain:** In some cases, AFib can lead to chest discomfort or pain, particularly if associated with heart disease.
- Weakness: A decrease in physical strength and stamina.

In some cases, AFib may be asymptomatic, meaning a person may not experience any noticeable symptoms but could still be at risk for serious complications like stroke or heart failure. Tragically, a life changing stroke can be the initial symptom.

Diagnosing Atrial Fibrillation

Diagnosing AFib typically begins with a thorough medical history and physical examination. If a doctor suspects AFib, the following tests may be ordered:

- Electrocardiogram (ECG): This is the most common test for diagnosing AFib. It records the electrical activity of the heart and can reveal the characteristic irregular rhythm of AFib.
- Holter Monitor: A portable ECG device worn for 24 to 48 hours to detect intermittent episodes of AFib.
- Echocardiogram: This ultrasound test provides images of the heart's structure and can help

identify underlying structural heart conditions that may be contributing to AFib. Often the atria become enlarged with AFib – a sign of mechanical and electrical remodelling which predicts recurrence of the rhythm.

- **Blood Tests:** Blood tests can help rule out conditions such as thyroid problems or electrolyte imbalances that may trigger AFib. An overactive thyroid is a common cause of AFib.
- Implantable Loop Recorder: a USB sized device is inserted under the skin and can monitor the heart's rhythm for a few years – it is often used following a stroke, to help determine if AFib was the cause of the stroke thereby necessitating anticoagulation (blood thinners).
- **Sleep Studies:** sleep disordered breathing is a common trigger for AFib, especially for episodes that occur at night. Sleep Apnoea is treatable with weight loss and nasal CPAP masks.

Treatment Options

The treatment of atrial fibrillation focuses on managing symptoms, restoring normal heart rhythm, and reducing the risk of complications like stroke. The approach to treatment varies depending on the type of AFib, the underlying cause, and the overall health of the patient.

1. Medications

- **Rate-Control Medications:** These drugs, such as beta-blockers (e.g., metoprolol, atenolol) or calcium channel blockers (e.g., diltiazem), help control the heart rate and alleviate symptoms like palpitations and shortness of breath.
- Rhythm-Control Medications: Also known as antiarrhythmic drugs (e.g., sotalol, flecainide or amiodarone), these medications aim to restore a normal heart rhythm and prevent recurrent episodes of AFib.
- Anticoagulants: Since AFib increases the risk of blood clots forming in the atria, anticoagulants (blood thinners) like warfarin, apixaban, dabigatran, or rivaroxaban are often prescribed to reduce the risk of stroke. Warfarin is used less commonly these days with the advent of the newer novel anticoagulants that don't require INR testing. These newer agents are more convenient and have a lower bleeding risk. The novel anticoagulants are inappropriate in the setting of mechanical valves and rheumatic

mitral stenosis which still mandates warfarin therapy.

2. Cardioversion

Cardioversion is a procedure in which a controlled electrical shock is delivered to the heart to restore a normal rhythm. It may be done either through medication (pharmacologic cardioversion e.g. with amiodarone or flecainide) or through an electrical shock (electrical cardioversion). Electrical cardioversion is performed under a quick general anaesthetic.

3. Catheter Ablation

For individuals with persistent or recurrent AFib, catheter ablation may be recommended. This procedure involves inserting a catheter into the heart and using heat or freezing techniques to destroy the areas of heart tissue that are causing the irregular electrical signals. A new technology, Pulse Field Ablation, may provide a safer means of delivering ablative therapy. Ablation is not curative but simply serves to reduce the burden of AFib episodes which can be quite debilitating.

4. Lifestyle Modifications

In addition to medical treatments, making certain lifestyle changes can help manage AFib and reduce its impact on health:


- Managing underlying conditions: Keeping blood pressure, diabetes, thyroid problems, sleep apnoea and other conditions well-controlled can reduce the risk of AFib.
- **Diet and Exercise:** A healthy diet, regular exercise, and weight management can help improve overall cardiovascular health.
- Limiting Alcohol and Caffeine: Reducing alcohol intake and avoiding excessive caffeine can help prevent AFib episodes.

5. Surgical Ablation:

In rare cases, surgery may be required. A surgical procedure known as the MAZE procedure involves creating scar tissue in the heart to disrupt the erratic electrical signals that cause AFib. It is most often combined with other open cardiac surgical procedures such as mitral valve repair. Clipping of the left atrial appendage is usually also performed to further reduce the risk of stroke.

6. Left Atrial Appendage Occlusion (LAAO): In some cases, patients have a high stroke risk

from AFib yet have uncontrolled bleeding on the required blood thinners thus necessitating cessation of the anticoagulant. Most of the clot in AFib forms in a pocket called the left atrial appendage. This pocket can be plugged with a mechanical device via the femoral vein. Amulet and Watchman are two such devices that a safe and reliable. Patients can then remain on simple low dose aspirin rather than powerful anticoagulant after a successful LAAO.

Complications of Atrial Fibrillation

If left untreated, atrial fibrillation can lead to serious complications, including:

- **Stroke:** AFib increases the risk of blood clots forming in the heart, which can travel to the brain and cause a stroke. Blood thinners are often prescribed to reduce this risk.
- **Heart Failure:** Over time, the irregular heart rhythm and inefficient pumping can weaken the heart, leading to heart failure.
- + Blood Clots: In addition to stroke, AFib can

cause blood clots to travel to other areas of the body, leading to potential complications like pulmonary embolism, and emboli to the arms/ legs/eyes/gut/spleen/kidneys.

Conclusion

Atrial fibrillation is a serious yet manageable condition. While it can significantly impact a person's quality of life, early diagnosis and effective treatment options can help reduce symptoms and prevent complications. If you experience symptoms of AFib, such as palpitations, dizziness, or shortness of breath, it is important to seek medical attention promptly to ensure proper evaluation and management.

With advancements in treatment, many people with AFib can lead active, healthy lives while minimizing their risk of complications. If you or someone you know is living with atrial fibrillation, working closely with a cardiologist can make a significant difference in managing the condition and improving overall heart health.



Psychological Skills for Shooting

Motivation for Shooters

At the recent New Zealand Hall of Fame Induction for Dean Everett, Dean commented that when he started shooting his goal was not to get into the Hall of Fame. His goal was to shoot well, and by focusing on the process of shooting well, he has now ended up being inducted into the Hall of Fame. At the same ceremony, Andy Peter, who won the NZ Skeet Shooter of the Year, said that to win any award you have to focus on the **process** of shooting: executing every shot with purpose and precision, and by not worrying about the **product** (score, trophy, Hall of Fame, etc), the goals you want to achieve will happen.

Motivation is what drives people to do things and the satisfaction they feel as a result. Biochemically, motivation stems from chemical reactions in response to a stimulus that drives us to resolve the stimulus, e.g hunger, thirst, and fear. "Almost everything we do is defined by motivation and dopamine (a neurotransmitter made by your body to send messages to nerve cells). Dopamine gives off a pleasure response in order to reinforce behaviour," according to the Head of Performance and Medical at Sydney Kings Basketball, Tom Banfield. Motivation can also be perceived as drive, determination, effort, dedication, resilience, focus, persistence, ambition, and eagerness.

Theories of motivation

Banfield explained there are three theories of motivation all coaches should know when aiming to create a motivating training environment:

 Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs – Motivation is the result of our desire to fulfil five basic needs, in this order: physiological (water, food, shelter), safety (employment and health), social (team, goals, purpose), esteem (respect and recognition), and self-actualisation (reaching potential, fulfilment, greater good).

- Self-Determination Theory Motives are intrinsic, extrinsic, or emotive. Motivation levels to act, perform or learn are highly dependent on autonomy, competence, and relatedness. "The more free an athlete is to do a task, the more motivated they are," said Banfield.
- 3. Achievement Goal Theory Motives can be a task (learning, mastery, process, growth) or ego (competence related to the performance of others) orientated. Often athletes compare themselves to others' motives and outcomes.

Role of motivation in athlete development

Motivation needs to be managed and channelled in the right direction to elicit the best performance outcomes.

"Motivating training environments get the most out of their athletes, maximise professionalism and long-term athlete growth, channel a team and/or individual's motivations towards a common goal (unity), and maximise organisational connection," outlined Banfield.

"Intrinsic motivation [doing an activity for its inherent satisfaction] is highly correlated with performance, but extrinsic motivation [rewarddriven behaviour] becomes more effective at higher levels of competency. Where and how motivation is channelled will affect performance. This is particularly true regarding risky or destructive behaviours e.g. overtraining, obsession, addiction, fear of failure etc."

Key factors of athlete motivation

Goal setting – Goal setting is an important factor when channelling athlete motivation in the desired direction. It is important to set personal aims but before setting goals coaches must understand what motivates the athlete. Shooter education – "Athletes are more likely to be motivated to do things if they understand the why." For the sporting or skeet shooter understanding lead and follow through are essential for good shooting.

Expectations and values – Expectations and values channel athlete motivation. It improves accountability, sets clear standards to aim for, rewards positive behaviour and reduces negative ones. Expectations can come from within, personal expectations, and from outside, expectation of others.

Legacy – Being part of something bigger than yourself is vital for athletes. Often, athletes want to contribute to the sport's legacy, making history in order to be remembered, and this serves to motivate and maximise performance."

Fun – It is essential that you enjoy doing your sport to shoot well. Training, practise and competition must also be enjoyable.

Investment – We invest a lot in our shooting. These investments can be financial, the money we spend on our shotgun, ammunition, nominations, travel, accommodation, quality glasses, hearing protection. We also invest a great deal of time. Practising, training, and shooting competitions take up a lot of time. As with money there is also an opportunity cost with time. We could be doing something else. Finally, we also invest a lot of emotional energy and reputation when we compete a high level.

Basically, motivation for why we shoot is very complex. It doesn't matter what theoretical approach we take to understand our motivation, there is always a common thread. If we are taskorientated we will focus on the process of what we are doing when we shoot. If we are ego-orientated, we are more likely to focus on the outcomes or the products.
