

Full details of the scores of the Australian team are published in another section of this issue. Absolute high-gun figures went to R. Redpath, of Hobart (Tasmania), who registered the brilliant total of

registered the brilliant total of 97/100. J. A. McCraith (Essendon, V.), 96/100, was next, and A. E. Poxon, of Launceston (Tas.), third high-gun, with 95/100. Match conditions were 100 birds per man from 16 yards, 2½ in. shells, loaded to International match standards. The Great Britain teams shot their section of the match at Dundee (Scotland), on July 2. Results were not to hand when this edition went to press—should these arrive before publication the winning team and its aggregate




score will be announced in "Stop-Press."

It is with profound regret that we have to announce the passing of three sportsmen, who have been supporters of the Association for many years. Mr. Ted. Cross, of Gilgandra (N.S.W), who used the shooting name of "Ted," was the victim of an unfortunate shooting tragedy at his home property recently, when it is understood that a dog stood on the trigger of a loaded rifle, which happened to be pointed in Ted's direction. "Ted" was a great supporter of the Association's bigger meetings, and as recently as March last he competed in the Champion of Champions fixture, just missing International selection. "Ted" was such an enthusiast that his registration fee was paid up to the end of 1950. He was 33.

All referees I come in contact with allow both barrels to be used on the next bird, I consider the shooter should use only the one barrel (the one that misfired) as I think he had the other barrel but did not use it." The query sender is not correct—the referee must allow the shooter the use of two barrels.
