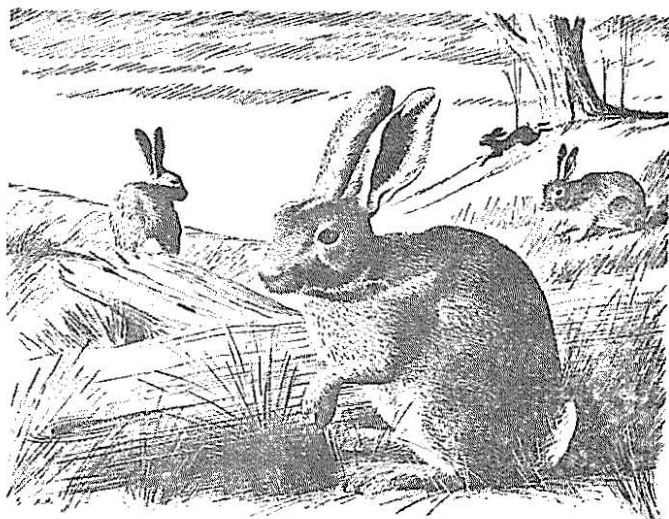

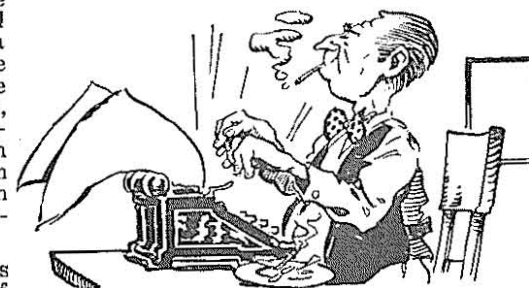

THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

Since the publication of the previous issue of this journal several matters—or, to use a more positive term, we use the word incidents—have arisen and perhaps passed, which call for subjective review and singular ventilation in this the clay pigeon shooting sportsmen's forum of free expression and discussion.

The opening stanza has reference to the question of the supply of alcoholic liquor at shooting grounds. This is a matter which periodically raises its ungenerous head and has therefore been before the shooting public on previous occasions—but, it should not be regarded as a hardy annual. At a recent shoot in the metropolitan area in Victoria authentic information has been passed along to the Association that the supply of barrelled beverage was so greatly in excess of what might be termed reasonable demand that it took all and sundry (and we place some emphasis on the sundry section)



far into the night to dispose of the excess. In disposing of this exaggerated supply it was not so much the shooting men as it was those who could be merely termed "blow ins" for the occasion who were so much in evidence with unedifying behaviour. That this should have been permitted can only be attributable to indifferent management. The Association's governing committee is adamant that this type of gross behaviour will not be permitted in future. Certain internal action has already been taken,

and clubs allowing excessive freedom on the subject point will make themselves liable to severe censure. If considered merited the club or clubs so offending will render themselves liable to withdrawal of open dates and, further, the extreme penalty of disaffiliation. The sport and how the individual behaviour of sportsmen is going to affect it should be the first consideration of all its adherents. The weak artificial glorification of a few who should know better cannot be tolerated. (Letters from "Clear Sight" and others, and those who have communicated with the Association headquarters by other means on the matter are commended and thanked officially for their action.—Ed.)

The annual meeting of the Association (details of the meeting appear in another section of this issue) was disposed of early in November. The meeting was resplendent with several unusual features. Firstly, the meeting was one of the largest in attendance figures since pre-war. This feature is highly desirable and Association officials hope for all affiliated clubs to be represented on future occasions. Leading up to this matter of representation, however, is a second feature, which does not present such a sparkling spectacle. It will be recalled that, according to the Association's Constitutional Rules, every affiliated club, provided it has complied with other Association rules, notably in regard to the registration of its shooters, is entitled to a delegate to represent its interests and enter into discussions raised at any Annual or General Meeting of delegates. Many clubs followed the Association's advice and arranged for their own delegates. Others instructed the Association to arrange an appointee — as should be done when a particular club or clubs are not fully "au fait" with administration matters. When so instructed the Association has always endeavoured to arrange appointees who represent a normal cross-section of shooting opinion as well as the best administrators from those available. It, therefore, comes as something of a surprise to learn, indirectly, that a Victorian metropolitan club had set itself out to canvas clubs, particularly newly-affiliated clubs, with the set idea of gaining appointees as delegates to the Association.

tion from its own members, and thereby ultimately bringing about a state of affairs whereby a majority from one city club would have a ruling majority in control of every matter raised at Association meetings as well as a similar controlling effect in the governing Committee. A newly-affiliated club, we have been informed, unwittingly agreed to such an appointment, yet the appointee was so out of touch with his duties that he signed the Attendance Register at the annual meeting of the Association as representing another club altogether. So that those shooting sportsmen who have the welfare of the sport of clay pigeon shooting and its governing Association at heart, and also in order to effectively back up the statement made in the preceding paragraph, we reprint the following copy of a letter returned to the Association office from a club outside Victoria. Names, for obvious reasons, have not been included. This letter is signed by the secretary of a Victorian metropolitan club and is typed on the club's official letterhead under a September date. The letter reads:—

"At the request of my President (Mr. ———), I would like to ascertain whether your Club will have representation at the annual meeting of the A.C.P.T.S.A. If not, my Club would be pleased to supply a proxy to act on your behalf.

"If this arrangement suits you, I would forward the name of a competent representative, and you could then, in accordance with the rules, notify the Association that he will be your official proxy delegate.

"You will agree that full representation is in the best interests of clay bird shooting in general, and my Club is 100 per cent. behind any move for much-needed improvements.

"As the time is short, I suggest your club treat this matter as urgent."

Yet another club outside the metropolitan area (in Victorian country) wrote under an October date to the Association as follows:—

"The name of our proxy delegate will be forwarded to you within the next week. Arrangements have been made with the ——— Gun Club to supply a proxy delegate for us, and his name will be sent you as soon as

we know who it is." (The same city club's name appears on this letter.)

Another club (Victorian country), after realising its position, and, as a well-known radio comedian frequently says, "became a wake-up," advised the Association that its "members did not care a d——" and certainly did not desire to lend themselves to "the building up of the strength of a voting group." (This again concerned the previously mentioned city club.)

These matters are ventilated for the information of all shooters in the spirit of ensuring a properly balanced governing body. Clubs who find themselves in receipt of letters from a pressure group, or the like, are advised to act through the proper channels, that is, the governing Association. The sport is always bigger than the individual, and there is no place in the A.C.P.T.S.A. for parochialism or "Auntie's tooth" type politics.

Clubs and shooters should note that affiliation fee for clubs (£1/1/-) and registration fee for shooters (10/-) is due on 1st January next. Co-operation in forwarding these amounts, without additional reminders, greatly facilitates the administration of the Association.

Forty delegates and members of the Association Executive attended the 13th Annual Meeting, held at the usual venue, Scott's Hotel, Collins Street, Melbourne, on November 2.

The election of office-bearers for the ensuing year resulted: President, Mr. John M. Wilson; Vice-Presidents, Messrs. V. L. Fankhauser, A. F. Johnson, A. E. Poxon (Launceston, Tas.), W. E. H. Rainbird (Launceston, Tas.), and John M. Tyquin (Hobart, Tas.); Hon. Vice-Presidents, Messrs. F. C. Abell (Hobart, Tas.), F. Brook (Gillandra, N.S.W.), W. J. Hanran (Townsville, Q.), L. P. Hughes (Sydney, N.S.W.), R. A. Miles (Spokane, Washington, U.S.A.), and H. Rogers (London, England); Executive Committee, Messrs. J. W. Bienvenu (Doncaster), E. G. Biggs, J. O. Cox (N.S.W.), V. Dudley, and C. H. Ingbritsen.

The meeting agreed to publish the full list of affiliated clubs together with names of club secretaries in the Associations "News." This will appear in the first issue in the New Year.

Mr. K. D. Courtney was re-appointed Association auditor.

The question of open handicapping was given considerable discussion, and delegates stressed how difficult it was to maintain and assess satisfactory handicaps without the fullest co-operation of all clubs.

A suggestion that the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) be held in some other State on occasions was given consideration. However, delegates felt that, for the present, there were no other sufficiently equipped grounds to handle such a big contest as the present East Burwood set-up. It was pointed out that in America all the major championship events were held at the same ground at Vandalia, Ohio, it being the home ground of the American Association, and also the best equipped with some 36 automatic in line and space available for the setting up of another 12.

The newly appointed Executive Committee held its inaugural meeting

for the new season the following night, November 3. The Committee discussed the suggested alteration to Deauville Double conditions, as suggested by Mr. J. M. Scott, of Wodonga (V.). It was decided not to change the conditions, at least for the present. The Australian Club intends trying out Mr. Scott's suggestion at one of its forthcoming shoots. (The suggestion by Mr. Scott for change was published in a recent issue of Association "News."—Ed.) The Committee decided that from January 1, 1950, Commonwealth championships entry fees will be 25/-, whilst State and District titles will be 20/-. It was also directed by the Committee that Commonwealth titles be shot from 20 yards (25 birds), State from 18 yards (20 birds) and District from 16 yards (20 birds) (down-the-line). The 1950 Championship allocation was completed at this meeting. The two major titles, Commonwealth double-barrel going to Hobart Club (Tas.), and the Commonwealth single-barrel title to Griffith (N.S.W.). The full allocation is published in this issue.

The Association annual dinner will be held as usual, following the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship), on March 11 next. This will be free to competi-

tors, and a limited number of visitors will be admitted to this function at 20/- each. The dinner on the next occasion will take the form of a sit-down banquet up to 9 p.m., when a change will be made to buffet and musical items. This will enable shooters to mingle more freely than on past occasions. The dinner will be at the usual venue, Vic. Fankhauser's "packing shed"—the one and only rendezvous for this type of entertainment.



Ten Years Ago..

Several break sequences were recorded in December, 1939. For some reason one Melbourne newspaper (probably getting gradually used to describing military happenings) described all the shooters as "riflemen." Geoff. Bragg (Holbrook, N.S.W.), on a visit to Blackburn Club, ran up 38 straight and won the main 15-birder. Harry Burrows (Glen Iris) and Des. O'Callaghan each returned breaks of 49 straight at Bentleigh grounds on December 9, 1939.

One important development advised from the English Association is that there is a possibility of the International contest for 1950 reverting to the pre-war conditions of 25 a side instead of the present 20. The International Committee will meet in London early in January, when the matter will be fully discussed. If the 25 men team is reverted to, the first 20 scores will count. The International Committee has been advised that Australia strongly favours the pre-war team strength. It is understood that two of the Great Britain countries prefer the present team number of 20.

The English Association writes to all Australian shooting sportsmen, "Our very best wishes to you and to all your members and friends for a Happy Christmas and a Prosperous New Year." (Many thanks, England—your greetings heartily reciprocated.—Ed.)

We note from the English Association "News" in "Random Notes" of its latest issue mentions that 83-year-old W. G. Crumpler won an open event recently. It appears strange, but the contest was staged at the "Merstham Youth Centre" meeting, and it was mentioned he had "given his opponents yards for years." Mr. Crumpler has received a couple of parcels under the A.C.P.T.S.A. Parcels Fund, and he has always replied in appreciative terms, expressing his grateful thanks. (He has another on the way to him for Christmas Day, 1949.)

The English "News" hands out "Bouquets" for the high-gun scorers

at the recent International at Dundee (Scotland). Dick Redpath, of Hobart, receives his share of mention, as well as a picture of A.C.P.T.S.A. President, "Jock" Wilson congratulating him. Five shooters in each squad, positions by ballot. Competitors shoot at 20 clay pigeons from each trap. In the event of ties to be shot off in batches of five clay pigeons until finality.

The event is open to any shooter registered with the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association who is a member of an affiliated club in any part of the Commonwealth of Australia. No championship qualification is necessary.

PRIZE LIST — CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS CUP (AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP)

The winner of the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) event will hold the Donald Mackintosh Perpetual Silver Cup (valued at 75 guineas) for 12 months and will also receive the following awards—

Replica of Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship)

A.C.P.T.S.A. Champion of Champions (Australian National Championship Sash)

Special Winner's Trophy, valued 35 guineas, presented by Messrs. G. Brammall and Co. Pty. Ltd.

Trophies will be awarded to the next highest scorers, down to tenth position. Four special trophies will be awarded to competitors registering the best performance whose Association handicaps come under the following categories: 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 yards and over (a competitor finishing anywhere in the first ten will not be eligible for the sectional trophies).

Three Interstate competitors (resident outside Victoria), (one to each State of Queensland, New South Wales and Tasmania) registering the best performance in the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) and not winning any other award, will be allotted special trophies.

A special trophy will also be awarded to the best Victorian Country performer (resident over 50 miles from Melbourne) not winning any other trophy.

A special trophy will be presented to the lady drawing the winning shooter.

ENTRANCE FEE.—Entrance fee for the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) will be 60/- (birds free). Optional sweepstakes of 20/- and 10/- will be conducted in conjunction with the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship). In addition an optional 5/- sweepstake, restricted to shooters whose Association handicap does not exceed 15 yards, will also be available. All sweepstakes above will be divided (without deductions), First 60 per cent., Second 30 per cent., Third 10 per cent.

Australian Teams' Championship

(To be shot concurrently with the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship))

Teams of four men. The first thirty birds released to each competitor in the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) will be counted as scores for the Australian Teams' Championship. The winning team will hold the Hartley Perpetual Australian Teams' Championship Shield for 12 months (or until the next competition) and will also receive a special Hartley Pennant for Team Club House and each member of the winning team will receive a Trophy valued at not less than £5/5/-, donated by Messrs. Competing Teams — England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Australia, for the DONALD MACKINTOSH INTERNATIONAL TROPHY, Valued at 100 Guineas. (Results by cable).

The Australian Team of 20 men for the International Match will comprise the 20 highest scorers in the Champion of Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) event, 1950, plus 5 others to be chosen by the A.C.P.T.S.A. Executive Committee as emergencies. In the event of any selected shooter being unable to take his place in the team his place will be filled by another shooter agreed upon by the Executive Committee.

CONDITIONS:

100 birds per member from 16 yards, five track shooting system, in four stages of 25 each. Automatic angle trap, double-barrel, "kills" only to count. 2½ inch cartridges loaded with not more than 1½ oz. of shot, No. 6 English size.

Best 15 scores will count in the competition. Five lowest scores will be counted out.

PRIZE LIST — INTERNATIONAL MATCH

Highest scorer in the Australian Team will hold the special Hartley International High-Gun Cup (presented by Hartleys Ltd., Melbourne), valued at £20, for 12 months (or until the next International Match) and will be awarded a special replica trophy valued at £5/5/- (also presented by Hartleys Ltd.) and the International High-Gun sash. Second and third trophies will be awarded to members of the team registering the next scores to high-gun. In the event of ties, to be shot off in batches of ten clay pigeons until finality.

Every member of the Australian Team will receive the special "International 1950" Badge.

ENTRANCE FEES.—There will be no entrance fee for members of the team. Birds will be free. Optional sweepstake of 10/- will be conducted in conjunction. Sweepstake money divided 60, 30, and 10 per cent. without deductions.

PRACTICE BIRDS.—Members of the International Team will be permitted ten practice birds before the competition, in accordance with the International conditions. Practice birds, 2/-.

For those shooters not engaged in the International Match, the following programme has been arranged:

1st Event.—10 Bird Handicap—Three Trophies. Nomination, 10/-.

2nd Event.—THE A.C.P.T.S.A. CONSOLATION CHAMPIONSHIP. For shooters not shooting in the International Match (members of the Australian International Team are not permitted to compete in this event). The winner will receive a Special Trophy and Sash and four additional trophies will be awarded down to fifth position. Match conditions: 20 clay pigeons from 16 yards. Nomination 20/- with 10/- and 5/- optional sweepstakes.

Other events time permitting. (Both days.)

CARTRIDGES.—Special cartridges will be available to competitors only, at current rates. Only these cartridges may be used. This rule will apply throughout both days. All competitors' cartridges will be subject to examination by Association officials at any time.

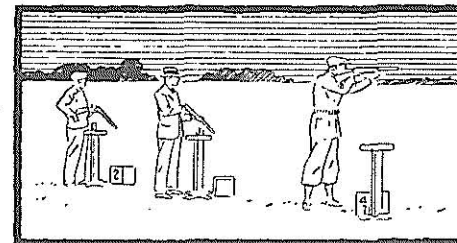

AUSTRALIAN (V.)

The great attraction on November — was the premier blue riband title for the Commonwealth for 1949. 82 shooters competed. Shot at 25 birds from 20 yards, the shoot was remarkable for poor scoring on what was not a really difficult day. Four singled out from the field and finished 24/25 — they were "Duxbac," E. G. Jack, who is a regular Melbourne visitor round about Cup week, won the Commonwealth championship at Townsville in 1948.

Mention of Bill Rainbird recalls that this great Tasmanian sporting identity was again at Association headquarters during the period of Cup week, and also acted as Chairman for the first hour and a half of the 1949 Annual Meeting of the Association—Bill being the senior Vice-President, automatically took over the job when the President was, through a brief illness in his family, unable to attend for the opening. Bill did not make a feature of it, but quietly slipped the Association Secretary a "redback" (£10), just "my usual at this time of the year." Seldom do followers of trapshooting in the clay pigeon shooting sphere have the pleasure of seeing four of Australia's back-markers together in a tie shoot to decide the Commonwealth blue riband title. Such was the good fortune of those present at the Australian Club's fixture on November 5, when the title for 1949 was decided. But, alas, much was the disappointment. Rarely has such an indifferent tie shoot exhibition been provided. As will be noticed in the "Around the Clubs and Meetings" section of this issue, all failed to live up to expectations. Whether it was the "weight" or just a bad run, or bad light, is hard to fathom—at least, however, the tie shoot produced no "fireworks," and was conspicuous for misses in the scores. Fred Burns, who won the title again, now has 92 titles to his credit.

Mangoplah (N.S.W.), the home district of Ollie Cox, will soon sport an up-to-date clay pigeon shooting club. As might well be imagined, Ollie himself is close behind the sponsors, with his advice and co-operation. Lox. Creasy, who created such a splendid impression as a shooter of class when taking part in the big Association events, is another likely to play a prominent part in the proposed formation. Incidentally, Lox's brother, Lynch Creasy, has at last been converted to the fact that he is nearly as good as Lox, and has taken to the sport of clay pigeon shooting with animated vigor. U.S.A. Shooting

(From Rex Miles, Spokane, Washington.)

Our new grounds of the Spokane Club are getting into shape — there will be 16 traps and three skeet fields. It will be the largest gun club in U.S.A.—the A.T.A. Grounds, at Vandalia, Ohio, are, of course, the largest grounds, but those are the Association grounds and owned by the Life Members (my son, Keith, and myself are Life Members), and cannot be classed as a gun club. The rule about "Automatics Jamming" is the same as for any other gun: "If a gun is faulty and you continue to use it, you abide by the results. If a gun breaks down, you are allowed another target on the first bird ONLY." (My son had his Double Smith go bad on him in a doubles event; kept doubling; he had eight targets scored lost, that he never shot at—but that is the rule.) As

for automatics, personally I think that they should not be allowed at the traps, and I don't know of a single trapshooter who is a top-notch who uses one. I can name a shooter for every other type of arm. Frank Troeh uses a Double Smith, and, to my mind, he is the greatest shooter of all time (over 30 years, on over 100,000 targets his average is close to 98 per cent). Many of our shooters will not shoot in the same squad as a shooter who uses an automatic. The most popular gun in the U.S.A. is the "pump" or repeater; quite a few use "over and unders," and a lot use (my favourite) the old side by side double. Our doubles have the ventilated rib, selective triggers and ejectors, with Beaver tail fore-ends. By the way, Bill, I noticed an ad. in your "News" about a Boswell double. My old gun was a special Boswell that I shot with in England. Wish it were possible to look at this gun in the ad.; I would certainly like to. (Ed. Brenk takes notice.—Ed.)

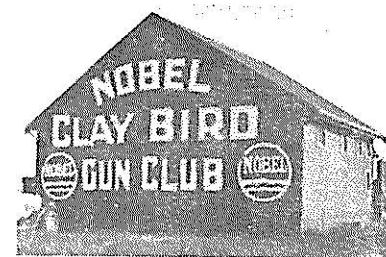

winning it three times, not necessarily in succession. Another similar Shield will then be made available. In addition, Messrs. Hartleys Ltd. have generously agreed to further donate a large pennant for the winning team club house each year, plus a 5 guinea trophy to each member of the winning team each year. It has been decided that the first competition for the shield will take place at Yarram, second at Sale, and third year at Yallourn. Teams to comprise ten men to shoot at 20 clay pigeons from A.C.P.T.S.A. handicaps, that is, handicaps ruling on the day of the competition. The Council has already arranged its preliminary itinerary, which is as follows: Yarram, December 3; Sale, December 10; Morwell, December 17. Administrative expenses of the Council will be borne by each of the clubs equally which

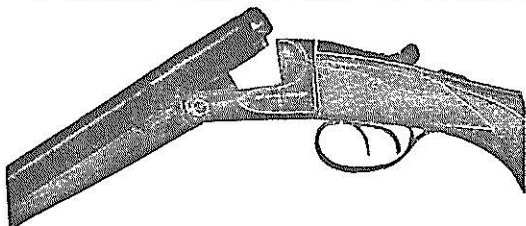

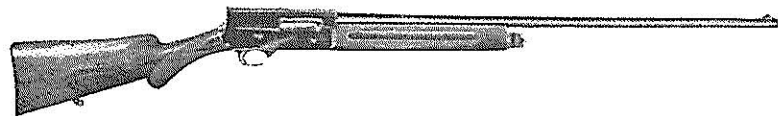
