





Tasmanian Northern Districts Championship Goes Overseas

In March Cressy Gun Club staged Northern Districts Double Barrel Championship, calling for 20 birds from 16 yards, centre track. Seventy-seven-years-old 12-yarder Bill Bennett headed the list of 35 shooters who sidled successively to the 16-yard mark, and 17-years-old 12-yarder Jim Bibby brought up the rear. Strong variable wind from the North made clays behave in exasperating fashion and caused shooter to murmur—sotto voce—words that would have been quite out of place at a Sunday-school pienic. One moment it was necessary to hold three feet under a wind-depressed ground-scraper and the next bird would climb into the sky like a jet-propelled fighter. Left quarters whizzed Westward so fast that when shooters had completed their swing, Rex Powell and his good lady in the club house were able to look straight down the barrels of their guns.

Two distinguished visitors from overseas were present: Me and W. J. McMiken, member of Hamilton Gun Club, North Island, New Zealand. Mr. McMiken was visiting Tasmania as a member of one of the many conferences that had booked out all the best hotel accommodation in the Island. It appears he just wandered out—without a gun—for a whiff of smokeless powder and a peep at how they shot 'em in Tasmania. Typical Tasmanian hospitality soon put a fowling piece into his hands and he lined up with the rest.

Shot off in batches of five birds, at the end of the first round only eighteen shooters had five white rings after their names.

At the conclusion of the second round only six shooters qualified for a further five: Alf Poxon, S. Marshall, John Tyquin, Cyril Poxon, W. J. McMiken, Jim Bibby.

When the smoke cleared sufficiently to see the score board after the third salvo, it was noticed that popular young Perry Marshall had added a spot of colour to his score, thus leaving the Poxon brothers,

John Tyquin, the Pig-islander and my pup with an unbroken string of fifteen straight.

The strain was now fully on and the remaining "all-whites" took the field alone, the Poxon brothers, Tyquin and McMiken taking their scores to 20 straight. My boy had broken two birds of his fourth string when the following conversation took place—in the mental telepathy common between father and son:

common between father and son:

"Pop, we've got a pressure cooker at home; do we want another?"

"No, son, we can't use two." "What about the dough?" "No, we don't want that, either; Slazengers pay us enough." "Be sporting if I missed a couple?" "Sure would, son; you're only a kid, and they are nice blokes down here." "Then I'd better let a couple go?" "Sure." "Okay."

And just to make a bird of it he missed his last three in a row!!!

McMiken, using John Tyquin's over and under Browning, finally finished with 40 straight and won the Championship sash, shekels and Steam Queen cooker. Cyril Poxon, losing by a short nose (39 x 40), collected a handsome silver-mounted Pyrex casserole and cash, and his brother Alf's 38 x 40 entitled him to an alarm clock and reimbursement of his entry money. John Tyquin's 37 x 40 was a highly meritorious score, but on the day McMiken was an unbeatable proposition. In a subsequent 10-birder he went on to break another ten straight, thus qualifying for the Hartley "50 Straight" badge.

Afternoon tea served in a marquee on the ground was one of those delectable feasts for which Tasmanian hostesses are famous. One immediately forgets any necessity for preservation of the waistline and goes to town on the sandwiches, cream cakes, scones and pikelets, and then slams in the full choke barrel on a repeat order.

Skut Shooting . . .

By MAJOR NORTHOVER

(In the "British Shooting Times")

Recently members of the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association, together with delegates from the Scottish, Irish and Welsh associations, witnessed and took part in the first demonstration and trials of a new form of shooting called SKUT. The participants were intrigued, interested and delighted, and the general expressed opinion was that British skut should soon take the lead from American skeet, and the many other forms of sporting shooting as now practised in this country and in other parts of the world.

What is skut? It is a new form of sporting shooting practice which gives (what has hitherto been unobtainable) the opportunity to practise that double which to all game shooters is the acme of shooting pleasure and perfection—the hare or rabbit on the ground, followed by the bird in the air, or vice versa. These results are obtained by the introduction of a new invention, the skut target, together with the skut trap, which throws the target either

as a rabbit along the ground, or as a bird in the air. The skut trap will also throw standard clay birds in the air up to a distance of 70 yards, accurately and steadily.

What does a skut target look like? It can easily be seen, the skut is a perfect shot trap. Hit a skut and it never fails to break. How is it best used? Put down two skut traps 60 yards apart. Mark out five firing points, then throw a skut as a rabbit

from the right, and then from the left. After shooting the skut as a rabbit, elevate the trap and throw it as a bird, both from right and left. Now you may set one trap as for bird throwing and one as a rabbit, and practise that delightful double that gladdens the heart.

For competitions and international matches a schedule is being worked out, to take five guns at a time as in down-the-line matches, shooting at the rabbit in front; it will then run behind a blind. Kills short of the blind score two; beyond the blind, second barrel, scores one.

One great point in favour of skut is that an outfit can be put down at about one-fourth the cost of skeet equipment. It can be set down in 30 minutes and removed in less time, and it wil not offend the landowner, who either detests, or will not permit unsightly skeet houses to be erected on his land. There is little doubt that skut will sweep the shooting world and become very popular. Will skut scuttle skeet?
