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



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
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#### THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

The Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association heralds the passing of another milestone in the development of its influence and activities with the announcement that its official publication, "News", commences this month, with its third year of publication. With a rapidly expanding group of readers and increasing coverage, the publication has found a recognised position in the sport-



As a means of limited celebration, the Association presents "News" this month in a "new uniform"—a colour cover—for the first time. It is hoped to retain this feature and also in future maintain a black and white production. Notwithstanding pleasure at the firm establishment of "News" shooters and all interested, should remember that printing costs have almost doubled since the publication started, and this is a factor which will need some careful thought in the immediate future.

Due to "printer's worries," readers of this publication are informed that each edition will, in future, be published on or about 16th to 18th of



each month. The 30th of preceding month will remain as the absolute "dead-line" for copy of all description, including advertising. Advertisers and contributors with copy matter available earlier in the month are requested to assist the management by forwarding this immediately it becomes available and not wait until the final day. Forwarding on the last day makes it impossible to ensure full attention and possible commentary. Clubs advertising programmes ahead are particularly requested to observe the foregoing information and frame their future advertising to fit in with publication dates.

Clubs desirous of shooting 1951 open championships under A.C.P.T.S.A. jurisdiction are required to lodge applications with the A.C.P.T.S.A. secretary not later than November I. When making application, clubs should specify the events preferred and not merely make application for "title events". Definitely outlining requirements is of material assistance to the Executive Committee when annual allocations are being arranged later in November.

The question of open handicaps, as issued by the Association, does not appear to be fully understood by all clubs. Association handicaps are published by the Association as the mark to be used on all "open"

days, meaning days on which open championships are decided or at fixtures at which over £25 in prize money is allowed for one event and which has been approved by the Association. Every eight to ten weeks a handicap return should be submitted to the Association by the club official responsible. Handicap returns forms are available from the Association secretary, and these should be used at all times. It is not necessary for clubs to enumerate every shooter on a return. All that is required is the listing of shooters which the club concerned "recommends" should be handicapped, either in or out. Any such recommendations should be backed up by the completion of the appropriate columns on the return, showing the reasons for the recommendation. Of late, a number of complaints have come to hand from individual shooters advising that no handicap appears opposite their respective names in the Association and therefore, when visiting other clubs, they have been placed on 16 vards. The fault is entirely that of the home club of the shooter involved. If proper returns are forwarded, every shooter referred to in the returns will have the attention of the Association handicappers.

Results of the 1950 Association Referee Examination are not yet available from the examiners. It was hoped to be able to publish information regarding the results of the test for this issue, but due to the stupendous task involved, the examiners found it impossible to get the information through in time. Successful applicants' names will be published in the November issue of "News".

The Association Executive has already given consideration to the question of its shooting programme for 1951. Having the light of past experience to guide decisions of the future, the Executive at present propose to hold the Champion of

Champions Cup (Australian National Championship) and International fixtures and full shooting series over four days, commencing on March 9 and extending to March 13. In this period the proposal is to start off on the Friday (March 9) commencing the Champion of Champions Cup about noon, with possibly a round or two of practice up to that stage. Competitors would shoot 20 birds during Friday afternoon and would follow up with 40 birds per man on the Saturday (March 10) to conclude the Cup title event. Minor events would be included on both days if it was found that the match rounds were completed with time to spare. The usual dinner would be held on Saturday night. On Monday (March 12) the International Team would have a clear day to shoot out the 100-bird match on No. 1 trap. The other two traps would be required for the A.C.P.T.S.A. Intermediate Championship and Consolation Cup events. On the final day (Tuesday, March 13) the Third Grand Australian Handicap would be decided, with a possible additional minor match to round off the programme. It was felt that such a programme would meet with the ideas of the majority of shooters and also would allow visitors, who had travelled long distances, a wide range of shooting. If the foregoing scheme is adopted, the Association would conclude its competitive programme for the year over the one week-end.

Affiliated clubs are reminded that the 14th Annual Meeting of the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association will be held at Scott's Hotel, 444 Collins Street, Melbourne, C.I., commencing at 8.0 p.m. on Wednesday, November 8. The annual election of office-bearers will take place at this meeting and nominations will close with the Secretary, A.C.P.T.S.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, at 5.0 p.m. on Tuesday, October 31st, 1950. All affiliated clubs will have due notice regarding the meeting, closing of nominations, and delegate entitlement





#### TEN YEARS AGO

In September, 1940, J. M. Tyquin, who is now President of the Hobart Club and a Vice-President of the A.C.P.T.S.A., won the Commonwealth Single-barrel championship on the club's Derwent Park grounds. Tyquin's winning score was 33/40 from Geo. Purcell (Launceston), 32/ 40: A. Nelson (Collinsvale), 28/35; A. Poxon, 27/35; H. Munnings. 22/30, and G. Richardson, 21/30. The best of a number of Melbourne visitors was J. Bryant, with 18/25; Kim Sans registered 17/25. The Hobart Club staged the Commonwealth Double-barrel championship on its newer grounds at Brighton (Tas.) on October 7 this year. (This paragraph was over-looked for the September issue.)

During October, 1940, several good performances are shown in the back records. Under the heading of is noted that J. R. (Bob) Meehan,

"Boy Trapshot beats Champions," it then a 16-year-old tyro, upset all calculations by winning the Nobel Single-barrel championship on the Blackburn grounds. He registered the only possible of 15 straight from 18 yards. Bob afterwards served with the Forces in the Northern areas. He seldom shoots these days. Also on the Blackburn grounds during the same month Eric Ball, of Colac, won the Commonwealth walk-up championship, losing only one release in 25. It was Ball's first major title at clays. Bill Bloomfield, 23/25, was second. Athol Love won the Coburg Tower Championship.

The Colac Club, during October, 1940, held a clay pigeon shoot on the Geelong club's grounds at East Geelong, when two Western District of Victoria titles were won by Geo. Crosse and Jack Bryant, at single and double-barrel.



#### SHORE DUCK SHOOTER

Where ducks spend the day on the sea or on the tidal muds and sands, the shore shooter can only get at them when they are flighting to or from their feeding grounds, or when a high tide moves them within range of some point of the shore. Nearly all successful plans for circumventing these ducks depend not on getting near to the ducks, but on getting into some position within range of which the duck will come. The novice is often tempted to try and walk up birds on the saltings, because he gets tired of sitting and waiting. If he is content with shooting anything, he may get a few shoots, but he will get near little that is more worthy on an open expanse of flat country.

For a successful plan, all factors which affect the duck must be con-

sidered. The expert should be capable of thinking like a duck thinks: in fact, he should almost be a duck. A knowledge of the times of rising and setting of sun and moon, of times and heights of tides, of directions and strengths of winds, are all essential. Then it is an enormous help to be able to visualise a map of the land and sea with the different feeding grounds and resting places marked on it. The flight lines of duck change as the feeding grounds change: the duck may go to the barley stubbles, to the potato fields, and in hard frosts to anywhere where there is water. The position which is best for getting the duck at opening may be quite hopeless later on in the season.

The 18th Sporting Championship of Great Britain was held at the West London shooting grounds, Northolt on July 28 and 29. More than 80 guns, including 16 internationals, took part. T. E. Furman, of Oxhill, Warwickshire, won the championship, and "The Daily Telegraph" challenge trophy, presented with it. His score of 95 "kills" out of 100 equalled last year's record by L. S. Boyland, of Bournemouth. The championship was shot over five stands, made up by 10 birds walked up, 25 driven grouse, 20 pheasants released from a 70-ft. tower, 20 rocketing pheasants from a 90-ft. tower, and 25 driven partridges. We have just got back from the Grand American, all tired out. It was a grand shoot, weather perfect throughout. There is no place in the whole world where they could put on a Shoot the size of the Grand but at the permanent home of the A.T.A. at Vandalia, Ohio. We have everything there for the comfort of the shooters and their families.

With the exception of the Doubles, every Event was won with possibles after shoots-off. The outstanding performance was in the Class AA Championship. Vic Reinders and Joe Heistand tied with three others with scores of 200 straight; they shot off; Vic broke 150 straight to win, Joe Heistand missed his 338th target; Vic Reinders, 350 straight—this was a 16-yard Event on Wed.

A young girl from Florida, Joan Pfleuger, was runner-up in her State Championship. The Florida Champion was not present at the Grand, so Joan shot in the Champion of Champions Race; she broke the 100 straight and tied with three of the Top Shots in the Nation. In the shoot-off Joan broke 25, 24, 25 to win this great honour. Mercer Tenille, Ned Lille and the Texas Champ were the ones that she beat. Arnold Riegger broke the 200 straight in the North American Championship; he won this Title last year, but lost out this year to a young shooter, Joe Devers, of Ohio. Riegger has a very High Average; though to date 99 per cent. or over 6,000 targets, he is going to be hard to catch.

My boy, as you know, he is not in the best of condition, but he shot the programme as follows: 92-98—190 x 200 Monday; 92-90—182 Tuesday; 97-89 Wednesday, 186 x 200—this 600 targets from 16 yards in the Preliminary Handicap, 83 (very poor); the Grand American Handicap, 23, 22, 25-92 x 100 from 20 yards; Vandalia Open Handicap, 24, 23, 23, 23—93 x 100 from 20 yards. He did not take his double gun back with him, but borrowed a gun and shot the doubles, broke 78 out of the

50 pairs—very poor score for him, as he can really break them with his own double.

The Washington State Team and scores: Arnold Riegger, 200; Mike Thornton, 195; Roy Geil, 194; Keith Miles, 186; W. B. Kautz, 184—957 x 1000.

Ruth Ray, our very close friend, won the Women's Championship with 199 x 200; this is the record score made by a woman in this race. Ruth broke the world's record at the Montana State Shoot when she broke the 200 straight. She is a sweet girl, and a real shooter; of course, she shoots a lot, goes all over the country. Her husband is also a top-flight shooter and a real "dinkum bloke"—how is that for an explanation, Australian style?

I did not shoot, not feeling too good, but I enjoyed every minute of it; I have a lot of friends that I only get to see at the Grand, as this is a vast country similar to yours.

#### Your Gun Must Fit . .

By GEO. BIGGS.

In this article the writer has endeavoured to point out to the new shooter and also to the not so successful shooter that gun fit is perhaps the most important detail if one has hopes of becoming a good shot.

This applies to field shooting more so than trap, as in trap shooting the gun is held at the shoulder in the ready position and the shooter has time to adjust the gun stock to his shoulder and face before calling for his target. In field shooting he carries the gun in his hand and thus has not the time to adjust gun and face after the game is plushed.

By studying the diagram on stock measurement the shooter will quickly gain a knowledge of stock dimensions. We also see how simple it is to alter these measurements to suit ourselves according to particular build. As an example, the gun with an excessive drop at comb would shoot considerably lower than one which has a comparatively straight stock.

My personal experience is that a comb drop of 1½ ins. to 1½ ins. is about correct for the average man. Pitch is also an important factor. By pitch we mean the angle at which the butt is cut in relation to the line of sight. This is measured by placing the butt on a flat surface with the barrel upright against a wall, the distance between the wall and the muzzle is the degree of pitch. The gun with too little pitch will not fit snugly to the shoulder. The writer's best advice on pitch is thus: If the gun fits snugly to the shoulder without the tendency to slip up or down, then the shooter may forget about pitch, as it is obviously okay.

As a test in proving that stock fit is all important, we suggest the reader carry out the following test:

Take the gun in your hands, close both eyes and put the gun to the shoulder in the usual shooting position. Now with both eyes still closed place your cheek firmly down on the comb in the position you normally have to. Now for the test that will

tell whether the gun fits as it should. With the cheek firmly on the comb, open the right eye. If you can just plainly see down the rib and your line of sight is plumb down the centre of that rib or barrel, without being to one side or the other, then we can safely say that the gun stock is very close to being a good fit. If, on the other hand, you find on opening your eye you cannot see any of the barrel or rib, but are looking below this line and at the breech itself, then the stock has too much drop at the comb and should be built up to fit the shooter concerned.

In dealing with stock length or "length of pull," and the correct method of measurement, there is a mistaken idea among quite a numher of people that the correct way to measure is by placing the finger on the trigger the butt should fit nicely into the crook of the elbow. This method is a very rough way indeed and does not often apply, as there are other factors that come into it as well as length of forearm. The neck, for instance, has a great deal to do with stock length, as we will see later. A far more reliable and correct method of measurement is to place the gun to the shoulder with the cheek on the comb in the usual position with the trigger hand holding the grip and finger on the trigger. The middle finger of that hand should now be 1½ ins. to 2 ins. from the shooter's lips.

If after having carried out the foregoing tests the shooter finds that his gun does not fit as it should, he should set about getting this state of affairs put right. Supposing the stock is too short, we can get around this quite easily by adding a recoil pad which will add at least another in. This pad will also take a great deal of recoil—something that all trap shooters try to cut down as much as possible. Recoil is something that will cause a person to flinch badly as well as a bruised and painful shoulder. This will, in turn, cause bad shooting.







its shooting rules at a recent meeting. One item of considerable interest to Australian shooters is one having reference to "Competitor Absent." This by-law reads, "That if a competitor is absent when it is his turn to shoot, and is still absent when that round is completed, he shall be debarred from taking any further part in that competition." This is a rule which could be seriously considered on this side of the Tasman.

Another important departure from what has been a serious loss of interest in New Zealand Championships — that is, from outside that Dominion—was the fact that only New Zealanders resident in the Dominion for the previous six months could hold N.Z. titles. The rule has now been altered to "That New Zealand Championships are now open to shooters from any affi-liated club in the British Commonwealth." To this ruling we say to our kinsmen in the "Shaky Isles"-Hear-hear. Next year, all being well, we may see some top-class Australian shooters crossing over to take part in New Zealand's very interesting championship series which take place usually during July.

In all clay pigeon shooting matches in New Zealand the latest direction from the Association is "That in shoots-off in all five track clay matches are now first miss-out."





The letter follows:

"Recently the wife of a trapshooting friend of mine visited Australia and returned with a copy of your Official Journal (July, 1950). I have read this with interest and am writing to you with the idea of getting information on your activities.

We held, in conjunction with other matches, a Southern Hemisphere Championship, 50 birds off 18 yards, and was won outright by one of our best shots (Mr. D. P. North) with 50 straight. Now I was hoping to see, say, 10 of your boys over. As an old trap shooter of 30 years' active shooting, I can honestly say we would have given them a good time, and they would have been more than welcome. We realize the Association is not in a position to pay expenses for a team, but I'm sure there must be a few good shots who would make it a holiday.

"The old world at present is not very settled, and I'm afraid we don't know what will happen next, but say you were holding something like a week's shooting in a good centre—that is, open shooting where we could compete about 1952—I'm sure I could get a few of our lads over. By this I mean to meet some of your sportsmen would be a thrill

to me, and perhaps at a later date they could pay us a return visit.

"Looking at your journal, I see 'Walk-up Championship.' I imagine this would mean: Gun down and approach the trap; we would call this Quail Drive, also Double Barrel and Single Barrel, and do you use the 5 Track system? Perhaps you could let me have one of your Rule Books, and if you would care, I could get you one of ours in return. I see you have one brand of cartridges listed at 22/6 for 25; we are squealing because ours cost 14/6.

"To get our two Dominions together on this 'Clay Bird question,' I was wondering if an Australasian Cup or Bronz would help, to be shot for, say, in Melbourne one year and N.Z. the following; this would mean a team travelling every other year. (Just a thought.)

"By this time you will probably be wondering who I am; well, I'm just one of our average shots, seen better days. Managed to win N.Z. title in 1939, Canterbury champ. twice and the South Island this year. Mostly just luck, but I am very fond of it, and travel over 100 miles each Saturday to compete.

"Hoping to hear from you some time. Best wishes to your Assn." (The veteran N.Z. sportsman has

been provided with all the information requested. We hope to see him in Melbourne later.—Ed.)

Heywood Clay Bird Gun Club, in one of the latest clubs to affiliate the Western District of Victoria, is with the A.C.P.T.S.A. 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# The Sporting Gun in England Its History and Development

There can be no better example of English conservatism, of her love of sport and of her admiration for skill, than the manner in which she threw aside the initial advantage she had gained by the discovery of a lethal weapon, because by its development, she would, no doubt, have undermined her skill in archery in which she predominated the world.

The use of gunpowder and its adaptation for employment in the field of battle was first developed by the English, who put it to such good effect that the great army of France was routed at the Battle of Crecy in 1346 by the much smaller English army, mainly on account of the use of cannon fired by gunpowder.

Although the possibility of adopting this great discovery to a hand-gun was quickly appreciated by other European States and must have been realised by the English, deliberate steps were taken to prevent the success of the venture by prohibiting the introduction of hand-guns into England.

The reason is well known. The outstanding skill of the British archer and long-bow-man was considered a military advantage far exceeding any that could be gained by use of a mechanical contraption, and it was for this reason that all other forms of sport or games were rigorously suppressed by Act of Parliament. Even 300 years after Crecy, youths were prosecuted at Quarter Sessions for indulging in football—not because of the risk of absenteeism from industry, but because such games attracted the youth of this country away from regular attendance at the village butts. Every village had to maintain

its butts in good repair and every male between the age of 17 and 60 was compelled to spend his spare time and holidays in practising the art.

Those who controlled our destinies were, with some justification, persuaded that a well-trained bowman, prepared as he was for action the moment he got to grips with his enemy, must have advantages over a soldier armed with what was, in any case, a most inaccurate weapon with a range little, if any, greater than that of a skilled archer. One can well imagine the confusion caused by a flight of arrows homing neatly in a nest of soldiers busying themselves with powder, ramrods and matches.

At this period of time it is not easy to decide as to which policy was the correct one, but English gunmakers, then nothing more than ironfounders, must have had an uphill struggle to perfect the handgun, the production of which was against the laws of England. A great tribute is therefore due to English gunmakers that in a remarkably short time after the manufacture of guns became legal in this country, they were able to produce a weapon to overcome all foreign competition.

To trace out the background of the modern sporting gun from the 14th Century, one has to grope one's way through the fog of political restrictions and intrigues which prevented the production in this country of anything worthy of the name of a hand gun, until the days of Queen Elizabeth.
