

Despite repeated requests for early lodgment of advertising copy, some club officials appear to take little heed and continue to forward copy matter long after "dead-line" date, i.e., the 30th of month preceding issue. This is a most unsatisfactory state of affairs from all viewpoints and is certain to result in some disappointments in the future. It should be clearly understood by all clubs advertis-

ing their shoots that the Association is anxious to assist them at all times and also to ensure that copy, advertising forthcoming shoots, is satisfactorily displayed and also, where possible, has the added benefit of a special paragraph on the particular shoot in another section of the publication. When copy is forwarded right on the "dead-line" there is no hope whatever of securing this additional "puff" paragraph and the club loses this benefit. Several instances come to mind in recent months of advertising copy being despatched to the Association, in some cases hun-dreds of miles from Melbourne, on the actual day of closing, 30th of the month. On arrival, two to three days late, the printers immediately express annoyance—quite rightly— and the job of getting the journal off the press on regulation date is made all the more difficult. Club officials are therefore invited to record the closing date, 30th of month preceding publication, firmly in their minds, and when they have copy available earlier in the month, to forward this without delay, thus ensuring fullest benefit and assisting the printers (a very harassed section of the business world these days) ample time to prepare and publish.

A recent query came to hand from a club far distant from Association headquarters. The query asked if "it was permissible to use plus trap upon failure of automatic in championship shoot." This is rather a "curly one." Firstly, the automatic trap should be in order before the



shoot starts — the query rather suggests that it wasn't. The Association regulations direct that all major championships should be shot over the automatic trap. Of course, if a major breakdown occurs and this cannot be rectified, especially where shooters have travelled long distances to attend, there seems little option but to agree to the completion of the event on the smaller trap. However, it behoves all clubs to ensure that their traps are in perfect order before embarking on a major event, thus eliminating possibility of a breakdown and resultant confusion.

An interesting point raised by a South Queensland Club concerns the ordering of a compulsory division of attached sweepstakes over each round of five birds in long events. The club has adopted the scheme. not in Association championships. but in all other events where there is an attached sweepstake. This would mean, say, over 20 birds, four minor optional sweepstakes and an over-all optional sweepstake. The club points out that its experience has shown this to be a very popular medium. It allows for many shooters getting that "very desirable cut" which many, particularly the moderate shooter, would miss out on in the over-all sweepstake. An interesting point and one that could be tried by many other clubs as a means of keeping the interest of all its shooters-from moderate to top-notcherinterested throughout the competition.

The spectacle of unregistered shooters being permitted to shoot without proper investigation is a matter engaging the observation of Association officials. It should be clearly understood that unregistered shooters are not permitted to compete against registered A.C.P.T.S.A. shooters in any circumstances whatever, other than in the case of new shooters coming into the sport, who may be allowed to attend a club shoot up to three occasions before being requested to register. Should an unregistered shooter succeed in winning a trophy or money award (apart from the new shooter referred to) such shooter has no entitlement and it is within the rights of the management of the club to request a return of the prize. It is also within the rights of registered shooters to claim against or object to an unregistered shooter. It is almost certain that the new shooting year in 1952 will see the issue of a special "Registration Card" which all registered shooters will be required to carry to all shoots and present, on request, to club officials. This method should overcome difficult and unsatisfactory situations.

An item which may assist in maintaining interest whilst club members are not shooting has been gleaned from advices received from England. At the start of the day the club conducts a raffle among members for an agreed entrance fee (probably 1/or 2/-). Those entering are required to assess the number of "kills" that will be recorded in the main event of the day. The winner, or nearest to actual figure, takes all, or failing that, an agreed percentage for the club if considered appropriate. It may be that this could be improved upon by arranging first, second and third awards for the three nearest answers. Worth a trial.

The controversy regarding the merits or otherwise of Single-barrel shooting has brought forth the following letter from the Young (N.S.W.) George Bell. He writes: "Ive read with a good deal of interest the comments re single-barrel shooting and the arguments put forword in its favour. These appear to be, generally speaking, the saving of cartridges. Nothing could be more

foolish if you happen to attend a few shoots. How often do you see shooters in a hopeless position insist on shooting at their full quota of clays. At every shoot I've attended where shooters have been 'down' five or even six, still insist on shooting, even when asked to retire. Does that seem like cartridge saving, and after all, how many cartridges would it save in a 20-bird event? Probably three or four. Regarding another shooter who says it would make better shooters, I fail to see his argument. There are very few good second-barrel shots, and I would say this is the root of the suggestion. The suggestion that clay shooting is the only sport where you get a 'second attempt' is also in error. I've played a good few different kinds of sport, and I don't know of one where you cannot make an error in your judgment and not get another chance. I'll quote four - cricket. tennis, golf and football. Don't try to tell me that there is a perfect player in any of them. No! let the man who can't use his second barrel learn to use it, practice will improve him. To date you've only put one side of the argument, and as our little journal is the 'forum of the shooter,' I would like you to publish this."

Ten Years Ago . . .

The last of the major down-theline championships in the immediate pre-war period (just prior to closing down for the duration) was the Commonwealth Deauville Doubles championship at the old Blackburn grounds in September, 1941. The event went to Dick Wightman, partnered by H. R. Donelly, with a score of 20/20 pairs. A tie shoot for the placings resulted: J. Bryant - A. F. Burns, 28/30; "Duxbac" - Eric Ball, 27/30; L. L. Schilling - W. Bloomfield, 28/25. The best 12/14 yarder was Squad.-Leader T. S. Ingledew, at that time a Hurricane Test Pilot (now Wing. Commander), partnered by Aub. Johnson. They stopped 14/20. E. G. Biggs, the present National champion, was under notice at Coburg during the same month, when he won three events and finished runner-up in another.


1952 CHAMPIONSHIPS







shooters with a sprinkling of veterans, but it already has a membership of over 30, with more on the way.


The week-end shooting in Melbourne of August 4 was resplendent with two outstanding performances. Fred Burns won the Metropolitan double-barrel championship at Coburg with a string of 55 straight, to win from George Biggs, 54/55. These two shooters are top class and their long drawn out tie shoot held the interest of spectators and shoot-ers throughout. Burns returned a break of 64 for the day. The other effort was given by the rising young shooter and Scotch College (Mel-bourne) boy, David Mansell. Young David divided the opening event at Camberwell fixture, then won outright the double-rise event with the only possible, finished runner-up to Hugh Phillips, with 19/20, in the main event of the day. His father, Allan Mansell, then completed the Mansell triumph with a success in the final five birder of the day. Young Mansell uses a 20-gauge gun, which more than ever reveals his ability to pace it with seasoned shooters.

The Myers Flat Gun Club at Bendigo (V.) will shoot the Loddon Valley Skeet Championship on Oct. 13. Geo. Biggs has agreed to referee at the request of club secretary, Bill Santon. In addition to the Loddon Valley title, the management has also decided to shoot the club skeet title on the same day. Bill Santon advises that all visiting shooters will be accepted as honorary members of the club for the day, thus enabling them to take part in the club title as well as the Loddon Valley contest. This should make for a very attractive programme. Special efforts are being made to ensure that every club facility is made available to visitors. Luncheon and light refreshments. He reckons the girls will be a decided attraction to his fixture, as few residents of the Captain's Flat township have seen woman trapshots in action. The girls are likely to accept the invitation.

Hornsby Club will shoot the Sydney Deauville Doubles Championship on October 27, with a £20 handicap to follow. On November 24 Hornsby will again hold an open shoot, with the Sydney Double-barrel championship and a further £20 handicap listed. Events are as advertised. Bathurst Club's mercurial secretary, Vic Howard, has retained a very wide smile since July 28, when he outpointed a good field to win the club's 1951 single-barrel championship, 22/25. Vic did his best to "read the trap" and his win was very popular among club members. Vic mentions in a recent note that local "authority" has permitted "Picnic Shooting" on Sunday around Bathurst area. This means that the Bathurst club must vacate its well-appointed grounds for "Picnic" entertainment. A new rendezvous has been selected about nine miles from Bathurst on the Rockley Road, macadam surface all the way, turning left at Perthville and proceeding a further three miles to a nice location on Tom Ryan's property. So Bathurst marksmen take heed of foregoing direction. Bathurst members enjoyed a social encounter recently against the members of the local rifle club, each 20 shots over 500 yards. The efforts (and wordy descriptions of rifle shooting) are too severe for inclusion and rifle club boys won. The return,



and Vic Howard reckons it's the revenge shoot, the gun club chaps have to beat their opponents by four birds per man—the scores at time of writing were Rifle Club, 994; Gun Club, 795.

A New South Wales club recently queried the reason why no conditions were laid down by the Association for "club championships." The A.C.P.T.S.A. has always considered a club championship to be a domestic affair of the club and has also practised the minimum of direction to clubs in matters which are entirely the concern of clubs. Hence the conditions of a "club championship" should be just what is determined by the management. Usually Victorian clubs shoot their down-the-line championships at 15 birds from 16 to 18 yards.

The Warren Club in New South Wales recently affiliated with the A.C.P.T.S.A. and registered 40 new shooters immediately. Apparently the club is very strong in membership to have so many available for immediate registration. President is L. S. DuVernet, and Hon. Secretary, Y. B. Walker. The club's Hon. Treasurer is well known to many Southern State shooters, in the person of Lindsay F. Single. The latter was for some years secretary at Holbrock, later moving in his bank employment to Warren. Single's experience should be invaluable to the new club.

The Queanbeyan and Lake George (Captain's Flat) clubs (N.S.W.), both of which are situated adjacent to the Federal Capital territory at Canberra, will conduct a first-class series over the week-end, Saturday, September 29 (at Queanbeyan) and Monday, October 1 (Captain's Flat). Shooting will open at 10 a.m. both days. At the first-mentioned club the N.S.W. Southern Districts singlebarrel championship will be decided and this will be followed by a £50 handicap and minor events. Moving on to Lake George Club at Captain's Flat, the similar district doublebarrel title, followed by a £100 handicap, will be decided on Monday, October 1. As this is a holiday weekend in New South Wales, a big muster of shooters is expected to attend, including a few from Melbourne. Visitors will be entertained on Sunday, September 30, either

by sporting activities or specially arranged trips around Canberra both if visitors prefer. Both clubs are anxious to have a bumper meeting and officials are doing their utmost to ensure the comfort of all competitors. The following story comes from Lake George (N.S.W.):


At a recent shoot an argument cropped up as to which brand of rum was the best.





ing are concerned, as the ducks are very plentiful and a good deal of shooting has been going on.
