





## THE EDITOR'S NOTEBOOK

The A.C.P.T.S.A. Clay Pigeon Shooting National Championships meeting has frequently been referred to as "The Melbourne Cup of Trapshooting" and this would appear to be a very apt title. The 1953 National Championships meeting has now passed into history and another successful fixture can be recorded. Favoured, generally, by good weather, the meeting was resplendent with some first-class indi-

vidual performances and few surprises. Congratulations are extended to the winners of the major events, National Open Championship, E. G. Biggs; Champion of Champions Cup, Newton Thomas; Intermediate Cham-pionship, Eric Bruce, and Grand Australian Handicap, J. Blake. The opposition was in the top flight and those who succeeded in winning put together really outstanding performances. Newton Thomas also gained High-gun in the Australian section of the International Match. For the first time on record, New Zealand competitors took part in individual matches, as well as representatives from every State in the Commonwealth. In 1952 the Open Championship was shot concurrently with the Champion of Champions Cup. This year the events were separated. In both years 221 shooters faced up for the Open title - something of a coincidence.

The Association is desirous of taking this opportunity of extending appreciative thanks to all staff and those who assisted so diligently to ensure the success of the series. With so many assisting to bring about efficient administration of what is now a really big undertaking, it is impossible to individualise in recording thanks. To all, the Association says "Very many thanks".

It is not usual for this publication to include unsigned letters in its



pages. A departure has been undertaken on this occasion, chiefly because the writer has seen fit to congratulate a new club in its administration of a recent Western Victorian shoot. The only fault with the letter is that it is unsigned—why the writer should leave the important fact of his name off the screed is hard to understand. It is published as received.

A recent query is recorded for the information of any shooter who may be interested. The enquiry asks for an Association ruling on the following, "The event is a double-barrel. point scoring (2 and 1). A competitor hits the clay with his first barrel, but also fires his second barrel. The referee calls a first barrel kill and awards the shooter two (2) points. Is this correct?" The referee was undoubtedly correct. the competitor fired and broke the target with his first barrel, the referee duly called correctly after seeing the break on the first barrel. If the competitor then fired his second barrel, he was merely wasting the second shell or, perhaps, did not clearly interpret the referee's decision and call.

A 1952 Registration and Handicap Card was recently forwarded to the Association office. Actually it came along with a 1953 renewal fee. It was noted that the handicap of the shooter to whom the card belonged had had his handicap varied twice during the year. This was shown on the card, but the official's signature who recorded the variation had merely written initials instead of his full name. Club secretaries are requested to ensure that any variation bears the full signature of the official responsible. Initials are not acceptable and shooters' holding cards showing initials only should hasten to have full signature included.

Quite a number of shooters have not yet paid their 1953 registration fee of 20/- to the Association. Those concerned are reminded that the fee is due and payable on January 1 and should be paid not later than final day of January in each year. Those unfinancial after end of this month will be removed from the official registration list. Club officials are advised to ensure that all competitors hold 1953 registration cards.

### ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING

The 18th Annual Meeting of the A.C.P.T.S.A. was held in Scotts Hotel, 444 Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1, on Sunday, March 8, 1953.

It was the first occasion on which this important fixture was arranged for a Sunday afternoon. The attendance proved that the new procedure was a complete success. Many visiting delegates claimed that the Sunday meeting provided an opportunity to discuss Association affairs in a quieter atmosphere than has previously been the case. In previous years the meeting usually followed an all-day shoot which also meant a late start and considerable rush to get business through. Sunday for the annual meeting is likely to be a permanent arrangement.

Increase in Affiliation Subscription. The Notice of Motion on increased club affiliation subscription from £1/1/- to £5/5/- was defeated.

Life Registration Fee. The meeting approved of the motion to increase the fee for Life Registration from £12/12/- to 20 guineas.

Change of Association Name. The motion to change name of Association from its present title to that of "The Australian Clay Target Shooting Association" was not agreed to.

Interstate Teams' Match. The meeting decided to recommend to the Executive Committee that the Interstate Teams' Match conditions be changed and so arranged to ensure the contest being held under similar conditions to the International Match. This means that all team members will be required to shoot their way into each State side.

Appointment of Association Referees. A discussion ensued on this point and it was generally considered that many of the referees previously appointed under the written system of examination had not fully understood the rules when carrying out referee duties. It was agreed that

Candidates would be required to pass the preliminary section and then be prepared to undergo a thorough oral test by approved State

supervisors before being issued with official referee badges. Those already holding certificates and badges will later be required to undergo oral tests.

### SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

The 17th Annual Report of the Exec. Committee of the A.C.P.T.S.A., covering the period 1st January to 31st December, 1952, is submitted for consideration and approval by the 18th Annual Meeting of the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association at Scott's Hotel, 444 Collins Street, Melbourne, C.1, on March 8th, 1953.

International Match. The sixth International Match between England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Australia, was won by the English Team with a score (to count) of 2193/2500. Scotland was second with 2129/2500; Australia third, 2028/2500; Wales, 1972/2500 and Ireland, 1937/2500. Australia won in 1951. The 1952 series was shot for the first time under single-barrel conditions at the usual 100 targets per man from 16 yards. Australian High-gun was J. Bryant Junr. (V.) with the good score of 97/100. Bryant's score was a clear second to the high-gun for the entire match, that of 100/100 by the English team member, J. Wheater (Yorkshire). Congratulations are extended to the winning combination, and also to those who returned highgun figures for all teams.

New Zealand was expected to enter in the series in 1952, but our sister Dominion found it impossible to assemble its team in time prior to the date when all results were required in England. New Zealand is reported to be certain to enter the competition in 1953 and arrangements have been completed for its team to shoot at Hamilton (N.Z.) about mid-March.

Interstate Match. The inaugural Interstate Teams' Match was held during 1952. The contest was an immediate success. Match conditions

were 20 targets per man from 16 yards, using International load shells. New South Wales won the match and will hold the "Great Britain and Ireland" Trophy until the next competition. New South Wales returned the good score of 478/500, with Tasmania second, 473/500; Victoria, third, 463/500; Queensland, 461/500; Western Australia, 452/500, and Sth. Australia, 444/500. The handsome trophy for this event was presented by the shooters of Great Britain to Australia in appreciation for the many food parcels forwarded during the period of acute food stringency in the Hone Countries.

Champion of Champions Cup. The 1952 Champion of Champions Cup was again won by A. F. Burns. It was his fourth win and easily a record in total of wins.

Entries received for this interesting contest totalled 221, only a few under the record total of 252 two years earlier.

Congratulations. Congratulations are extended to all winners of Commonwealth, State and District Championships shot under A.C.P.T.S.A. rules and conditions.

Affiliated Clubs. The total of affiliated clubs continues to expand and at time of printing this report the figure stood at 152. This aggregate number of clubs is made up in States as follows: Queensland, 30; New South Wales, 54; Victoria, 55; Tasmania, 7; South Australia, 3; Western Australia, 3.

on the Sale club grounds (V.) is a pleasing feature in the development of the sport of clay pigeon shooting. Congratulations are extended to Guyatt on his splendid win. Often it has been stated that championships are very much in favour of the backmarker. To a point this is correct, but it does not necessarily follow that the back-mark handicap shooter is "past-the-post" in contests of the type and Guyatt is an outstanding example. He was opposed to a firstclass field, including the previous title-holder and the present National champion, as well as a number of others handicapped behind him. In addition, Guyatt had an exasperating run of barred birds during his third visit to the track (strangely the only really indifferent patch of targets in the whole shoot), yet he overcame this hazard and won well. Another pleasing aspect was the fact that another country shooter from the same club, Roy Glover, was runner-up to Guyatt. Both stopped 39/40 over the main course of the match. Guyatt broke all five in tie round, whilst Glover missed one. Third placing was taken by John Bryant Junr. (Blackburn), who won the 1952 title at Roma (Q.). Guyatt is a brother of the famed Billy Guyatt, the Australian track and road cycling champion. Herb. Guyatt is always a capable racing cyclist with many successes to his credit.

The Sale Club comes in for worthy congratulation on its handling of the Commonwealth title. Club President, Lou Bourbaud, and secretary, Len Robinson, assisted by a first-class committee, put a great deal of effort into ensuring the success of the meeting, and they were not disappointed. Organization was well-nigh perfect and the fixture went through without a hitch. President Lou Bourbaud arranged for a "wild duck supper" for competitors and visitors at his home. Proceedings commenced around 8 p.m. and continued until what might be termed "late or early" whichever way one cared to accept the position. Every target thrown during the day was referred to during the evening proceedings!

Carelessness and stupidity appear to be leading causes of the shooting accidents in the State of Maine. U.S.A., where 70 mishaps occurred last season - a record. According to statistics compiled by the chief investigator for the Inland Fisheries and Game Department, 50 of the 70 accidents, including 15 of the 19 fatalities, occurred in parties of two or more persons. Accidental discharges accounted for two deaths and 16 woundings; two persons were hit by ricochets, and four others were struck by stray bullets. Three people were killed and eight were wounded because they were in the line of fire. Loaded guns in boats caused one death and two woundings. A loaded gun in a car accounted for one non-fatal shooting, and a loaded gun in a camp another. Two were killed and five wounded when they slipped and fell while carrying loaded guns, and ten died and 12 were wounded when they were mistaken for game. One shooter told the warden, after he had shot a companion, "I thought it was a bobcat." "Have you ever seen a bobcat?" the warden asked him. "No!" replied the shooter.

The Coburg Club (V.) will not shoot on April 25 owing to the Anzac Day commemoration. The club will stage the Victorian single-barrel championship on May 9, a 30 birder for cash awards, and the Metropolitan Mixed Birds Championship on June 6, as main events on those days. Other events as per advertised programme will also be decided.

The Footscray Club (V.) will shoot on May 2, when the Club Intermediate title will be the chief interest. The Victorian Double-Rise Championship is listed for May 16 and a 15 birder, points scoring, for May 30. The full programmes for each day are as advertised.

## Association Shooting Carnival

The Association's annual competition carnival commenced at East Burwood (Victoria) shooting grounds at 8.0 a.m. on Saturday, March 8, 1953. Ideal weather conditions prevailed from the outset; although variable conditions were met with on Monday, March 9.

The fixture opened with the First Australian Open Championship at 60 targets from 16 yards, using International load shells, points scoring three and two. This contest was shot as a separate match for the first time — previously the Open National title and Champion of Champions Cup were combined as one event.

A field of 221 faced up to the four shooting tracks for the Open title. A point of interest here is that the field total was exactly identical with the number which took part in the similar contest in 1952. Many more would have been entrants but for the fact that district flood conditions in several parts of the Commonwealth prevented intending contestants from leaving their properties.

Half-way through the Open Championship there were many with chances, but as the event progressed, it became more and more apparent that the shooters experienced to long drawn events would be among the leaders at the finish.

The winner proved to be a previous title holder in E. G. Biggs of Burwood (Victoria) with 176/180 points. Biggs won the contest two years ago after a tie shoot with Queenslander, Nev. Nassett. This year he was a clear winner by one point from H. Anderson (Grenfell, N.S.W.) and G. Nash (Gollan, via Wellington, N.S.W.) each 175/180. Next followed John Bryant Junr., A. F. Burns (1952 winner) and N. P. North of Wellington, New Zealand), each 174/180. North and L. C. Horne (Hamilton, N.Z.), who also competed, were the first New Zealanders ever to take part in the series. North's form was particularly brilliant — with a little more practice under Australian conditions he could easily have won. In

the tie shoots for the main placings, Nash defeated Anderson, 24/30 to 23/30 points. In the first round of five targets in the shoot-off, Nash clean missed his 4th release and Anderson looked "past the post" as runner-up. Anderson, however, failed to cover his final bird of the first five in the tie shoot and another round was called. Both again missed, but Nash had first barrel "kills" with the remainder, Anderson used his second barrel once. The winner, E. G. Biggs, missed only his 46th release and used two second barrels on the remainder - an outstanding performance. John Bryant Junr. gained third placing with five first barrels against a second each by Burns and North. The two last-named returned all first barrels in the next five and then, as often happens in a tie shoot, both missed in the next five; Burns stopped his remaining four with first barrels, whereas North had recourse to one second.
