The Editor's Notebook

Her Majesty The Queen has graciously advised The Governor-General of Australia, Sir William Slim, that she has consented to become Patron-in-Chief of the 1956 Olympic Games, to be held in Melbourne.

During her recent visit to Australia The Queen displayed considerable interest in the preparations for the Games. It seems highly probable that The Duke of Edinburgh will re-visit Aus-

tralia for the Games. In fact, it is understood that there is some possibility of him performing the official opening ceremony.

An interesting comment was received from England recently when it was advised that The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh spent the last week-end in June at the country home of Lord and Lady Rupert Neville. Lord Rupert Neville, it will be remembered, recently accepted the Presidential chair of the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association. The Queen and the Neville family are all about the same age, and The Queen is godmother to one of the Neville children.

Congratulations are extended to our New Zealand kinsmen on their brilliant success in the 1954 International series, between England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, New Zealand and Australia. New Zealand won the series, defeating Australia by four points. The scores being: New Zealand, 1725; Australia, 1721; England, 1676; Scotland, 1657; Wales, 1597; Ireland, 1595. It is understood that the New Zealand high-gun produced a run of 100 straight, and second high-gun was 99. The actual scores of the New Zealand Team are not yet to hand, but their high-gun was certainly a splendid effort and one which equals the performance of Newton Thomas for Australia a couple of years ago. Newton Thomas was the first shooter ever to register



a sequence of 100 straight in the International.

Australia can be considered to be somewhat unlucky in the International series. In the past two years an aggregate of only 9 points has stood between Australia and success for the two years. In 1953 England won, when points scoring was in vogue, defeating Australia by 5 points. Now in 1954 an almost similar happening has taken place, with honours going to New Zealand by 4 points.

The England score was down on usual performance. But we have learnt from London that the English teams struck appalling weather on International Day. The report states that "International Day weather was unkind, very much so, but on the Saturday, the next day, a storm lasted all day. In the British Open event the best score was a 91."

Full text of all scores will be published when received. The Australian Team scores were published last month.

A tendency has arisen in recent months for club secretaries to make money orders and other remittances payable to the Association or the secretary, at Post Offices other than "G.P.O., Melbourne." that a journey has to be made to some suburban Post Office to collect; this results in much avoidable waste of time.

The annual Interstate contest for the "Great Britain and Ireland" Trophy, the seal of State supremacy in teams' competition, is gradually developing for 1954 and dates have, in most States, already been approved. The Queensland section will be shot at Roma (Queensland is holder of the Trophy) on September 18. New South Wales has selected the Hay Club grounds for that State's contest, which will be staged on Saturday, September 25. The Victorian section is listed for shooting at Coburg Club grounds on September 11. Tasmania was recently granted permission by the State Attorney-General to shoot on Sunday and the Hobart Club (which will stage the shoot) will now conduct the Commonwealth D.B. title on Saturday, September 25, followed by the Interstate Match on the following day, September, 26. South Australia shoots at Mt. Barker on September 25. Western Australian date will shortly be available.

The "Great Britain and Ireland Trophy" is a handsome Presentation Cup, of a type seldom seen in Australia. The Trophy was presented by the shooters of Great Britain and Ireland in appreciation of the good fellowship which exists between the Home Countries and Australia.

AMERICAN STANDARDISED SHOTGUN STOCKS

Sir,

I read, along with many other shooters no doubt, with interest, the shooters no doubt, with interest, the article "Repeaters and Self Loaders" by G. W. Spearing, which appeared in the July issue of the Clay Pigeon journal, in particular the part deal-ing with American Standard shotgun stocks. The fact that leading American slide-action repeater gun makers such as Remington, Winchester and Ithaca, etc., each have their own dimensions for standard stocks indicates permissible variations. However it would seem even the most versatile standard stock is a con-tentious subject. This would make Mr. Spearing's advice for a custombuilt stock sound, if price is forgotten. However, Mr. Spearing's claim of the suitability of the English style of stock over the American Standard ones could be misleading to the disinterested and almost unfamiliar enthusiast. As well as the American Standard stocked guns, most different makes, English or foreign, offer little variety on their individual models when sold across the counter. Often weapons costing hundreds of pounds are offered and sold which do not give alternatives in stock design such as straight-topped comb or ordinary, a check-piece or otherwise, a full pistol grip or a straight, etc.

It seems unfortunate that Mr. Spearing mentions the Model 12 standard Winchester as an example for replacing the stock with one that will be more suitable for the user. It is certain most shotgun shooters lack something or much in their stocks, but the Winchester Model 12 standard stock, with its all-purpose pistol grip, overall wide comb, etc., fits or can easily be made to fit more individuals than any other mentionable gun stock found in the retailer's hands in Australia. Mr. Spearing says often the slide-action repeater stocks are rather bulky in shape. This would apply to the Model 12 standard stock, but here again it will so often fit the thin-faced man excellently, while any decent gunsmith can easily narrow down its over-all broadness to obtain something near a fit for the wide-shouldered, short, thick-necked individual. It is also true that the makers of this American gun with its standard stock give cast at extra cost when desired. The drop of the stock can be altered from Standard $\frac{1}{2}$ in. down or $\frac{1}{4}$ in. up. In conclusion, I would like to quote from a notable and open-minded American shotgun authority and shooter: "I believe the standard American shotgun stock will come nearer fitting the greater percentage of shooters than any other stock design in the world."






'Tips" and "Tails"
