



The Editor's Notebook

The now much famed International Match, which started off originally between teams representative of England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Australia, and later included New Zealand (which produced the winning team in 1954), is gradually spreading its interest and importance throughout the British Commonwealth countries. Only last year Canada made a tentative application to be

included. The application was not approved by the International Committee, until such time as the Canadians are established on a national basis. Latest information from England is that an application has been received for admittance from India, through the National Rifle Association of India. The Indian Committee will meet early in January, and secretary, K. G. Prabhu, has advised that "he is sure the committee will accept the proposal and we can certainly be with you in 1955". The admittance of an Indian Team in the International series would be indeed welcome. Confirmation has been received from England regarding the 1955 conditions, which are two-barrel shooting, kills to count (both barrels equal value), all scores to count, teams of 15. Australia will field two teams in 1955. Ireland, Scotland and Wales are also expected to place two teams in the field. A report indicates that England will possibly field three teams. Such is the development of the Mackintosh International Trophy Match. So far as the Great Britain teams are concerned, the 1955 series will be the 21st competition, and the Irish Association are hosts. Irish hospitality is famed throughout the world and our Irish friends are particularly anxious to celebrate the "coming of age" of the series in a fitting manner. A special welcome is extended any Australian or New Zealand shooters who may happen to be abroad to attend the fixture, which concludes with an International Banquet on June 24, 1955, when all scores are



announced. The Australian section of the International series will be shot at East Burwood (V.) on Monday, March 14, 1955.

Clubs and registered shooters are reminded again that Association fees (clubs, 21/-; shooters, 20/-) are due and payable to the Secretary, A.C.P.T.S.A., on January 1. All payments should be completed by January 31, in accordance with the Association Constitutional Rules. It is not intended to "carry" unaffiliated units until the middle of the year, as has frequently been done in the past. All those who have not paid required dues by March 1 will be forthwith removed from all official lists and also the mailing list of this publication. The increasing cost of administration has now to be taken seriously into account, particularly in regard to printing, and these features demand that the Association Executive ensure that the rules of the Association are carried out in their entirety.

Several enquiries have lately been received regarding the eligibility of unregistered shooters competing against registered men at an affiliated club. All concerned are reminded that it is a fundamental rule of the Association that "all shooters must be registered". In this regard it is by no means intended that individuals who may possibly attend shoots on odd occasions as social members, or those who have joined the club merely to assist the finances, should

have demands made upon them for registration. However, it is extremely important that all those who take part in competition, whether at club shoots or open shoots, should be registered. Recently three cases have come into the open of unregistered shooters being permitted to take part in competitions. This state of affairs should not be permitted to exist. Registration cards are issued for the express purpose of assisting club officials and cards should be demanded on all occasions where the slightest doubt as to registration exists. On numerous occasions at big shoots competitors have been permitted to shoot without the slightest query. On the three occasions aforementioned all three concerned were winners without entitlement to even compete. It is useless the Association going to the trouble of ensuring that its staff issues registration cards if same are not produced at the appropriate times.

Another matter of interest to all registered shooters is the Association direction that "no registered shooter shall compete at an unregistered or disqualified" ground. Information has been received of this happening in two States recently. Registered shooters leave themselves open for a "please explain" by such action. All clubs should be affiliated for sake of uniformity, if nothing else, and registered shooters should make sure of their own position before competing at unregistered grounds or clubs.



LEADING IN SHOTGUN BARRELS

Sportsmen who take pride in their weapons find difficulty at times in retaining the mirror-like finish of the bore of their barrels, due to streaks of lead being deposited on the surface: these deposits are usually found just ahead of the chamber and again at the constriction near the muzzle. By reason of the relative hardness of the two materials, steel in the gun barrel and lead in the shot pellets, leading to some degree must always occur whenever a shotgun is fired with a shotted cartridge, but sportsmen may be assured that leading is not harmful in any way to a gun barrel, and as it is not cumulative in the normal way, leading will not affect the performance of either the gun or the cartridge.

The severity of the occurrence of leading can be related to two main factors—

- (a) the temperature of the barrel;
- (b) the smoothness or roughness of the barrel surface.

When shooting game or vermin, gun barrels rarely become over-heated because of the time between shots. On the other hand, with all forms of clay bird shooting, particularly during major competitions and especially those which are held over sporting layouts, such a large number of cartridges is fired in a gun in a short time that gun barrels often become so hot that a hand-guard has to be used. Under such conditions a larger deposit of lead than normal will be experienced and the most probable explanation of this is that the lead shot travelling up the barrel will also be extremely hot, possibly near the melting point of the alloy, so that the slightest roughness in the bore will attract particles of lead. It is. therefore, obvious that the greater the roughness of the surface of the bore, the greater will be the amount of lead deposited and this probably is the reason why some weapons appear to be more prone to leading than others. Investigations have shown that, in all cases where an excessive amount of leading is experienced, barrels have been rough and pitted, usually by maltreatment

of the surface of the bore at some time during the life of the gun.

Barrels which have been polished by a gunmaker or have been regularly cleaned by correct methods very rarely give excessive leading. If, however, when cleaning, coarse abrasives or steel implements have been employed to scrape the barrel surface, excessive deposits of lead are likely to be experienced, particularly when a large number of cartridges is used in a short space of time, thereby rapidly raising the temperature of the barrel.

As previously mentioned, leading is not cumulative in the normal way: that is, two rounds will not give twice as much deposit as one round, but after a large number of cartridges is fired the amount of deposit will be no greater than that of the cartridge depositing the greatest amount of lead in the series. The amount of lead which is deposited is in no way affected by the type of propellant loaded into the cartridge; on the other hand, if the main driving wad is made of material which causes it to be a poor obturator and it does not seal the bore sufficiently to have any abrasive effect during the passage up the barrel, an increase in the amount of lead deposit will almost certainly follow. The Eley patent air cushion wad, which is used in considerable numbers in the loading of cartridges, is an excellent obturator, as also, of course, is the wad made from the best quality hair felt.

Obviously, conscientious sportsmen would never knowingly employ any cleaning method which would cause roughness in the barrel, but a surprisingly large number appear not to realise the effect on the surface of the steel barrel when a steel cleaning implement is used. Viewed from the breech or from the muzzle of a barrel, the surface may appear to be quite smooth and polished, especially if any oil is left in the bore. When viewed, however, with an instrument such as the industrial endoscope, the scratches caused by steel cleaning implements are very pronounced.

ASSOCIATION

Clubs and shooters are reminded that Association affiliation and registration fees became due on January 1, for the period ending 31st December, 1955. All payments should be completed not later than January 31st, in accordance with the rules. All who have not paid by March 1st will be removed from the registration list and also from the mailing list of this publication.

Probably the most satisfactory method of removing any deposit, even in a barrel which appears to have an excessive amount of lead, is by the use of a phosphor-bronze brush or similar type of tool - on no account should a steel tool or even wire-wool be used. Under normal conditions a phosphor-bronze brush will satisfactorily remove any deposit, but with rough barrels the addition of a mild abrasive, such as Parker-Hale Motty Paste or B.S.A. "Cunirid" will very quickly remove all traces of lead. The continued use of this method of cleaning will produce, in time, a polished surface to the barrel and a negligible amount of leading will ultimately be experienced, even in a barrel which at one time might have given an excessive amount of deposit.

Some sportsmen claim that although they have successfully removed during cleaning after use any déposit which may have been in the barrels, the barrels appear to be dirty if they are re-examined after being left standing for two or three days. Although the gun originally may have been thoroughly cleaned, it is probable that a slight deposit of lead may not have been removed, but was not noticeable against the back-

ground of the steel bore because it was covered with oil or other lubricant used during cleaning. After some time, however, the oil dries out, the lead deposit becomes oxidised and matt in appearance, making it noticeable against the background of polished steel, in the form of a stain.

To summarise, sportsmen may be assured that with a smooth, polished barrel the amount of lead deposit given by modern shotgun ammunition is very small indeed and easily removed by normal cleaning methods. If, in the course of a day's shooting, the barrels at times become excessively hot, increased leading is probably found in the most well-cared-for gun, but this can be readily removed with a little extra attention. Should there be any roughness in the surface of the barrel, leading will increase and may at times appear to be excessive. Even in such cases, however, the deposit should easily be removed by the use of a phosphor-bronze brush, together with a mild abrasive. In no circumstances whatever should a steel tool be used in cleaning a gun, as this will only aggravate the trouble and probably lead to an increase in leading, due to an increase in the roughness of the surface of the barrel.-J.W.H.

The Editor. A.C.P. Shooting News. Dear Sir.

The letter from Luke Doyle in the December issue of the A.C.P. Shooting News regarding the practice of some clubs giving their members a more favourable handicap than their Association mark for Club shoots and drawing the attention of Club handicappers to the fact that this is contrary to an Association direction on the matter will, on reflection, be supported by many shooters.

The subject of handicapping is a very interesting one and most of us will agree that if we are shooting well and winning events, then we can carry some additional handicap and should not object to doing so. The shooter who is doing well is naturally more conspicuous than the alsorans, and from my observation the Association handicappers may be depended on to catch up with him. However, not many of us maintain constant form and after shooting well we strike a bad patch, and after trying a different brand of cartridges, a new gun, or a higher comb or longer stock on the old one, we finally complain to the Club handicapper, who agrees that we have been off the target and, being a nice sort of fellow, moves us in a couple of yards for Club events in which we have some success.

Just how the Association officials interpret this success, I don't know, but it must be difficult trying to decide whether the 16-yard shooter who is shooting off 14 yards in club events merits being brought back or left where he is.

A further objection to differing Club and Association handicaps is that if a shooter is away from his home Club, he has to shoot from his Association mark, which is generally more unfavourable and unsettles him.

A far better plan is for handicappers to adopt the suggestion of the

JANUARY & FEBRUARY-1955

Editor of the A.C.P. News in the July 1954 issue, when handican recommendations from the Secretary, Handicapper or Club President were asked for, to be sent to the Association at intervals of not less than 8 to 12 weeks, based on a penalty of 1 yard for the outright winner of a ten birder or sharing in three divisions. For the shooter out of form for three or four shoots a forward move should be made.

This suggestion, if adopted generally, should be very satisfactory, the shooter in form comes back, those showing repeated loss of form go forward, and the shooter's mark, whether at his home Club or visiting, would be the same.

Of course, these recommended handicaps may not be adopted by the Association, which may have other information, but the chances of a shooter being on a mark equivalent to his ability from time to time should be much greater than if depending solely on a shooter's per-formances (or lack of them) being noted by Association officials.

GUNS FTTTED

AUSTRALIAN

Amongst the hosts of men who own shotguns, there must be a large proportion who were not "fitted" with a gun, but instead bought one over the counter, choosing the most suitable of those on sale in the shop at the time. Others, no doubt, are guns which they picked up secondhand in all sorts of odd places, chosen, not because they were peculiarly suited to the physique of the purchaser, but because the price was right and the cash available.

In the cheaper range of shotguns, fitting has never been included in the price, but before the war there were more guns to choose from. By this I mean that the same model gun would be on sale in two, or perhaps three, different sizes and fittings; today the gun shops may have the approximate size required, but not in the model the customer wants. Before the war, too, it was a simple matter to have a gun altered quickly, when it was not quite right, or alternatively, another gun, nearer to the customer's specifications, could be delivered in next to no time. Alterations and special orders can take much longer today, and whereas the pre-war gun salesman could meet the customer half-way (or more) on the cost to clinch a sale, now the cost of labour is so high that the customer would certainly have to pay for any alterations to a cheap gun, unless the salesman was qualified to undertake the task. In fact, he might be fitted with a gun at no great extra cost and with no greater delay.

A fitted gun is not an expensive luxury for the few, or a refinement to be derided by the plain man with a plain gun; it should be regarded as a "must" by every shooting man who can possibly afford the extra outlay entailed. Followers of other sports are offered a wonderful range of bats, racquets, and clubs in carefully graded sizes, all perfectly balanced, with as little as half an ounce of weight between them. Great pains are taken to find the exact requirements of each player, for it is realised that only a perfect fit can give him complete confidence in his gear. Why, then, cannot this method be adopted with guns? Obviously

enough, because sales are limited and the price of guns so high. To cover all the various fittings in guns that might be asked for, a shopkeeper would have to lay out a small fortune, even if he could get the guns, and, paradoxically, he would probably have some of them left on his hands for a long time.

Adjustable Gear

Some personal gear, for sport or work, is made adjustable, the bicycle being a good example of this; for after the frame and wheels are chosen, the customer makes the final fitting himself by altering the posi-tion of saddle and handle-bars. We may yet live to see an adjustable gun on the market, if only the price can be brought down, for such guns are made and used regularly, but only by the trade for fitting purposes -

Known as "try-guns," these rather weird-looking weapons have their stocks cut into sections, and all the sections are movable, some swivelling on a ball joint, others just sliding backwards and forwards, or up and down. The try-gun is not by any means a dummy, only to be used in the show room; on the contrary, it is often fired by prospective buyers, who can alter the stock until it does all they could wish for, under actual firing conditions, coming up smoothly and consistently without conscious effort. Measurements are taken from the try-gun and exactly reproduced in the new gun, if subsequently ordered.

All the sliding sections of the stock are made in such a way that it is possible to lock the parts rigidly together after each adjustment is made, usually by tightening sunken square-headed bolts with a suitable hollow key. The ball joints, working on a worm, are also operated by the key, but require no locking, as they stay firmly in any position to which they are turned. When the stock is set at its full limits, it gives the impression that only a contortionist could fire it with any degree of accuracy, but it is rare in practice to have to extend the stock to the limits.

To lengthen the stock, a section, which includes the heel-plate, is pulled out on two steel strips which are let into the wood, and at the

required position the section is locked by two bolts. In addition, when the bottom bolt is loosened, a section of the heel-plate can be raised on a hinge from the centre, to extend the "toe" of the stock (the very bottom edge), so that the correct pitch of the heel-plate can be discovered. Well-padded men will need the toe cut back more than thin men, and this also applies to most women who shoot, so that sometimes the toe is only slightly more prominent than the "heel" of the stock (the top edge of the heel-plate).

When guns are made to be sold over the counter, the stocks are always made off at one of three standard lengths: 14½ in., 14½ in., 15 in., the 15 in. being the safest length, as it is so much easier to shorten a stock than to add a few inches to one. The try-gun extends beyond these limits, either way or in between them, and will find the exact length required for each and every reach.

Comb and Bend

The next adjustment, moving towards the action, is to the "comb", which is the top edge of the stock, where it begins to narrow as it approaches the hand, and where the cheek rests when firing. A hinged piece is again provided to enable the correct height to be found, and here the length of neck is the controlling factor, together with the ability to bend it (or the lack of it). The "comb" is directly linked with both the "bend" of the stock and the "cast", for the man who has a lot of "bend" because he cannot get his head down very easily will also need a high "comb" for the same reason, and a thin "comb" can add "cast-off" to a stock, while a full one, or one with a cheek-piece, can equally reduce it. When the cheek rests snugly against the "comb" each time the gun is brought up, the correct setting has been found.

Next is the first of the ball joints, the one used to alter the bend of the stock, and here the idea is to find the required angle of barrels and stock, so that the eyes find the correct sighting plane automatically when firing. It will be noticed that the joint is forward of the comb of the try-gun, but this is for convenience of operation only, and in practice the bend can start from near the action.

or, if a high "comb" is wanted, it can be comparatively straight to the "comb", and then bend from there to the heel-plate.

Cast-Off and Cast-On

The last adjustment, another ball joint, gives "cast-off" or "cast-on" to the stock when the appropriate bolt is turned. Most shooting men are acquainted with the reason why stocks have to be set outwards or inwards in this way. It is simply an allowance for the distance between the shoulder, where the heel-plate rests, and the eyes, which must take a sight parallel with the rib between the barrels. What everyone does not know is that most people have one eye which is stronger than the other. and this eye, sometimes called the master eye, is the one to which the stock should be set. (This only applies to those who shoot with both eyes open — the man who closes one eye should leave the best one open, and have his stock set to it.)

So it is quite possible for a man who uses both eyes to shoot for years with a gun which has a normal amount of "cast-off", enough to bring it from the right shoulder to the right eye, when he actually needs a cross-stock (or cross-eye stock, as it is sometimes called—nothing to do with being cross-eyed) which has extra "cast-off" to bring it from the right shoulder to the left eye. Not a very handsome gun, unfortunately; one alternative is to learn to shoot from the left shoulder. Left-handed men who shoot from the left shoulder have their stocks "cast-on", of course.

All the adjustments to the try-gun have to be co-ordinated, naturally, and many variations may have to be tried before a satisfactory formula is obtained. In many instances, old, favourite guns could be altered if a belated fitting with a try-gun proved that the owner had been fitting himself to the gun, instead of vice versa. Alterations should be entrusted to the qualified craftsman, however, and not done, as writers in American journals are so fond of advising, by the owner, with the aid of a hacksaw.

Fitting the stock to the customer is only part of the story; chamber length, barrel length, weight, and the bore must all be taken into account, before the gun can be even started on.
