The Editor's Notebook

With the passing of the big March Association shooting series and settling down to the clearing up process, is it possible to obtain some estimate of the magnitude of the fixture and the importance and bigness of the occasion, compared with the early days of the sport of clay pigeon shooting in Australia.

In the mid-1930's, when 50 shooters attended the fixture for the first time,

the pioneers of the sport felt they had reached a pinnacle in attendance figures which would hold for many years. Similarly about the same period when the late Lew. Bertram of Bentleigh (V.) returned a break of 77 straight during the meeting, his figures appeared, at that time, to be of such gigantic proportions that these, too, would hold for a long time. Looking back on the recent fixture, when 245 shooters took part and breaks of 50 and 100 and more were common-place, it will be observed how both the attendance figures and the standard of shooting has improved over the past decade or two.

The figure of 245 is only six off the record attendance of 1950, when 251 faced the traps. Had it not been for the disastrous floods in New South Wales, the 1950 record would have been easily exceeded. Many regular competitors at the series were facing much greater hazards during the period of the matches than was normal procedure.

Whilst on the point of the N.S.W. poin flood disaster, it is pleasing to report that the Association was to the fore in providing donations to the Flood Relief Fund. The Association itself donated $\pounds 50$ when the first call for assistance came. Later, during the carnival at East Burwood, by providing a miniature shooting series, plus proceeds from the donation of a gun, another $\pounds 161$ was raised — a total of $\pounds 211$. A noteworthy achievement. One for which thanks are



extended to all who contributed or assisted in any way.

Congratulations are expressed to winners of all events during the big fixture.

The thanks of the Association is also extended to all those who assisted in the running of the fixture. Organization of the series is much more important than is generally realised. With so many shooters present, everything must run according to schedule and, except for one or two minor setbacks, it can be said that the programme ran as anticipated. The staff is extended special thanks for co-operation and efficiency and, similarly, are thanks expressed to those who "took over" for varying periods during the progress of the fixture.

The annual meeting, the 19th, of affiliated club delegates intervening, held on the Sunday of the shooting series, was the largest attended in the history of the Association. Over 60 clubs were represented by ap-pointed delegates, and there were also present a number of interested shooters as spectators. A full report of this meeting will appear in the next issue of "News". One important decision reached was that club affiliation fee from January 1, 1956; was fixed at £5, instead of the figure of £1/1/- as at present. The latter fee was fixed more than 25 years ago, when money values were very different from those prevailing toto be attach that is a statement

In recent weeks several instances have come forward of clubs holding open shoots; in one or two instances open championships were concerned. when clubs allotted these events had conducted same, or intended to do so, without first obtaining Association approval. It is pointed out that all open shoots must have the approval of the Association, and this also means the dates on which same are held. Another point, all "holidays" are in charge of the Association, and a club may not conduct even a club shoot on a public holiday without first securing Association approval. This information should be noted by all clubs for future guidance. Whilst discussing this point, clubs are again reminded that a shoot becomes an "open shoot"

when more than $\pounds 50$ is allocated in prize money for one event. In such cases Association handicaps must be used.

During the recent annual meeting it was decided to appoint one representative to the Executive Committee from each of the States of South and Western Australia. Accordingly the newly appointed Executive Committee members are: South Australia, Mr. J. Woodrow, Milang, S.A.; Western Australia, Mr. C. Ferguson, Minora, W.A.

Mr. Roy Alexander, of 256 Wellington Street, Perth, W.A., has been appointed official referee examiner for the State of Western Australia.

The Editor,

A.C.P.S. News.

Dear Sir,

I feel that the remarks made of Mr. C. J. Colledge in A.C.P.S. News, March, 1955, should not go unchallenged. Of course, I don't know what qualifications Mr. Colledge has to challenge single-handed the administration of the A.C.P.T.S.A., but I do know that quite a lot of eminent people see no harm to the sport in having those various Championships allotted.

It would appear that Mr. Colledge would run the sport to suit himself, that is, of course, given the opportunity.

Most districts have a lot of clubs, so I would say that district championships would be a natural sequence to club championships.

Clubs advertise championships as an added attraction to a programme. In one instance at least it would appear that the fact that a man has appear that the fact that a man has won considerably more than 100 championships has enhanced his prestige in the eyes of the firm that employs him. The young shooters of today are the champions of to-morrow, so let them have all the championship shooting they can get. Everyone knows that the Champion of Champions Cup is the most important event in Clay Pigeon shoot-ing, so I don't know why Mr. Colledge should suddenly suggest it should be so. He is very worried about clubs allowing shooters to join on the day of a Championship, and compete. I don't think it need vitally concern anyone outside the club if that shooter was not a member for three months prior, providing all club members were agreeable. I fail to see how it would affect the sport in Perth if I joined the Townsville Club on the day of a Championship, and competed.

He complains, "Even now some clubs are shooting two championships on one programme." Again, what concern is it of anyone outside the clubs concerned? The fact that,

as he says, "New Clubs are being formed" would hardly bear out his contention that "the holding of ever increasing numbers of Championships" is detrimental to the sport. I have never won a Championship, and don't expect I ever will, but I do know that it is highly gratifying to the chap who has the District, Club, Sparrow or Night Championship Sash put on him at the end of a shoot, and why not? He's won that Championship, and good luck to him. Of course, you could have something like this: "A shoot will be held at the end of the year to see who can hit the most clays," or alternatively, "to see who is the best shot in the district!"

As for night shooting, which is airily dismissed as "at best no more than a novelty event", let me say that in the hotter months in parts of Queensland, anyhow, night time is the only time that the sport can be indulged in in any degree of comfort, so why not night Championships, Club's 1st best man in each club, then best in District Championship? Anything detrimental to the prestige of the sport in that?

Clay sparrow shooting is similarly dismissed. Maybe Mr. Colledge is such a good shot that they can only be treated as novelties by him. I once attended a State Clay Sparrow Championship at which some of the best shots in Australia competed, and I can assure Mr. Colledge that a glance at the scoreboard at the conclusion of the event did not give me the impression that it was a sport to be dismissed so airily. Also he states, "The District Championship set up would be laughable if it were not so serious." I think that the only laughable part would be if his remarks were taken seriously and it could only be serious for the same reason.

No, Mr. Colledge, the sport of clay pigeon shooting is in no danger so far nor is it faced with any loss of prestige. The only danger I can see to the sport is that it may be subject to too much of the "strict supervision" which you advocate, then

quite a few would drop out — that, of course, would be detrimental to the sport.

Undoubtedly the title of "Walk-up Championship of Bandy Wallop" (your words) would not have any prestige or standing with you, but equally so the same title "of Coburg" could scarcely be expected to have any prestige or standing with anyone in "Bandy Wallop", yet both could mean quite a lot to the respective winners and club members.

Most sports can only be played one way. The fascination of clay pigeon shooting lies in the fact that it can be played with so many variations, so why not have Championships for all of them?

Mr. Colledge also says, "To my mind no Champion of Champions has ever been specifically invited to defend his title the following year against all-comers." Why should he have to be specifically invited? The contest for the Cup is set down for a certain date and if he wants to defend his title, he takes part. If not, he stays at home. If a couple of hundred shooters competing for that Cup are not indirectly (not specifically) challenging the holder, then all I can say is "they're going mighty close to doing so." Having it that way gives everyone a chance without having to footle round with elimination shoots under, I suppose, "strict supervision".

He says, "Other sports lionise their top men and, what is more, insist that they lose their titles either in competition or by default." Well, there's nothing new about that. If you don't compete, how can you win or lose? If you are beaten, how can you hold the title? In what manner other than those two have any of our Champion of Champions Cup holders ever been deprived of their title? Incidentally, I have never heard of a tennis or golf champion being specifically chal-lenged to defend his title. And I don't think the sports mentioned lose any prestige thereby. They enter for the championships and if beaten, someone also takes their place until in turn beaten. Pugilists, of course, issue challenges.

So much for the Champion of Champions. As regards our own

Walk-up, Sparrow, Night, Club and District Championships, let us keep them, Mr. Colledge. I declare they are for the betterment of the sport, they keep the game interesting. I know how eagerly clubs try to get Championships allotted to them. They keep things lively out in "Bandy Wallop" and if you would read through the lists of registered shooters and see the number of "Bandy Wallopers", you would agree that they contribute in no mean manner to the solvency of headquarters. Remember, thousands of "Bandy Wallopers" have no chance of getting down for the big time, for after all, the country must be kept in a state of solvency.

We have enough restrictions, rules, taboos and what not to cope with in our every-day life, so let us enjoy the sport we love the most, unfettered by a host of unnecessary can's and can'ts, even if "strictly supervised".

International Shooting Carnival

The annual National and International series, conducted by the A.C.P.T.S.A., were decided on the East Burwood grounds of the Australian Gun Club, over the period March 11 to March 15, 1955.

Attendance figures were excellent. A total of 245 shooters took part in the Saturday series — only six off the record figure of a few years ago. The actual total of shooters who took part in the meeting would reach approximately 300. Of the 245 who took part in the National Doublebarrel title 143 were Victorians, 65 from New South Wales, 14 from Queensland, 13 from Tasmania, 8 from South Australia, and 2 from Western Australia. Also one New Zealander was a competitor on the final day.

Weather conditions generally were good, although the Monday (March 14) came in somewhat cold and rather restricted movement for some shooters who were taking part in the International Match.

Proceedings opened on Friday, March 11, with the National Singlebarrel championship, an event staged for the first time. The scheduled conditions of the contest were 40 targets from 16 yards, single-barrel. Many possibles were recorded in the good calm conditions. In the tie shoot the winner was returned in J. Blake of Cressy, Tasmania, who grassed 50 straight to win from C. Campbell of Bathurst, N.S.W. and Don Scowcroft (Newcastle, N.S.W.), each 49/50. Then followed another Newcastle entrant in R. Melville, 48/50. Others close up each with 39/40 were: Doug. Osborne (Sydney), R. Glover (Sale, V.), B. Addison (Moulamein, N.S.W.), a newcomer to major competition shooting; J. Smith (Caloundra, Q.), S. E. Lamb (Box Hill, V.), and Leo Haseler (Clara Creek, Q.); following were W. Cross (Tullibigeal, N.S.W.), J. Bryant (Blackburn, V.) and W. A. Commons (Broken Hill, N.S.W.), each 57/59. The sectional awards

went to: 12 yarder, C. Spence (Tathra, N.S.W.), 31/40; 13 yarder, N. Betts (Goulburn, N.S.W.), 34/40; 14 yarder, J. Walker (Longreach, Q.); 15 yarder, G. Akers (Charleville, Q.), 37/40; 16 yard, A. Coward (Congupna, V.), 37/40. Best woman competitor was Miss Nyla Fankhauser of East Burwood (V.), with 34/40. State awards went to Queensland, J. L. Nunn (Boonah, Q.), 47/ 50; New South Wales, F. Singleton (Cobar, N.S.W.), 54/57; Tasmania, S. Marshall (Bridgewater, Tas.), 43/ 46; South Australia, J. Woodrow (Milang, S.A.), 36/40, and Western Australia, F. N. Bailey (Perth, W.A.), 34/40. A £100 Handicap which followed resulted in no less than 57 possibles. The Association "jacked-up" the prize money by another £70 and all possibles gained a division. A night shoot followed in which a £50 Handicap was cut by C. Campbell (Bathurst), J. Bourke (Mentone, V.), A. McDonald (Nhill, V.), M. Smith (Sydney), D. Scowcroft (Newcastle), "Tambo" (R. J. O'Day) (Swift's Creek, V.), G. Williams (Echuca, V.) and W. Bray (Hughesdale, V.), all of whom returned possibles of 20 straight. On Saturday, March 12, the line-

On Saturday, March 12, the line-up for the National Double-barrel title was probably equal to the best, both in numbers and quality, ever arrayed for the event. The 1955 International Teams were selected from the top 30 scorers in this event. The contest, staged at 60 targets from 16 yards, double-barrel, both barrels equal value, "kills" only to count, got under way to a good start. It was observed early that, in view of the number of contestants, difficulty would be experienced in completing the series that day. Ultimately it was decided to complete the final six squads on the Monday morning, March 14. When final figures were consulted, it was noted that no less than 38 had returned possible totals. This is by far the greatest number of possible scores ever produced in the event. The tie shoot produced great excitement and interest from the competitors and hundreds of

spectators. Excitement continued to mount; the tieists gradually dropped out until only J. O'Donnell of Cam-perdown (V.), W. Schooley (Morven, Q.) and Newton Thomas (Sydney) were left. O'Donnell missed his 120th release and retired. Schooley and Thomas fought out another 20 rounds before the Queenslander got behind a right quartering target and pulled too late with both barrels, leaving Newton Thomas the winner with the grand total of 140 straight. with the grand total of 140 straight. Schooley was next with 139/140; O'Donnell, 119/120; J. Smith (Q.), 99/100; E. Evans (Griffith, N.S.W.), 94/95; E. G. Biggs (Burwood, V.), 79/80; J. Blake (Cressy, Tas.), 78/ 80; D. Osborne (Sydney), 75/76; J. Headon (Hay, N.S.W.), 74/76; D. Scowcroft (Newcastle), 68/70; R. Krentzlin (Geelong, V.), 72/74; L. Baker (Tyabb, V.), 67/69; S. Bres-sington (Bathurst, N.S.W.), 71/74; John Bryant Junr. (Blackburn. V.). John Bryant Junr. (Blackburn, V.), 64/66, and H. L. McMasters (Burrumbuttock, N.S.W.), 69/70. The women's trophy went to Mrs. Gary Daly of Deniliquin (N.S.W.), 53/60. State awards were: Queensland, Leo Haseler (Clara Creek, Q.), 73/75; New South Wales, L. A. Martin (Barham, N.S.W.), 69/ 70; Tasmania, P. Marshall (Bridgewater, Tas.), 89/90, and South Australia, A. W. Forbes (Aldgate, S.A.), 75/77.

On Monday, March 14, after completion of tie shoots for the National double-barrel contest, the two teams representative of Australia, faced up to do honours for the Nation in the Ninth International Match. A spirited contest resulted for highgun. Fred Burns (Footscray, V.) and Newton Thomas tied for the honour of high-gun, each with 99/ 100. In the tie shoot to decide the honour, Burns stopped 20 straight and Thomas 19. C. Mudford was third high-gun, also after a tie shoot.

All scores are sealed in this match until figures for all contesting countries are released when the International series is completed in Dublin (Ireland) late in June. The 7th Grand Australian Handicap, shot on March 14, again attracted a good entry. The number of targets was reduced to 30 in order to ensure equity of competition for all competitors. Twenty-two returned possibles and decided to shoot on for the honour of collecting the much coveted sash for the event. Ultimate success went to Norman Milliken of Hay (N.S.W.), who registered 74/74 to win from J. L. Nunn (Boonah, Q.), 73/74. The Commonwealth Teams' Match (teams of any four men for any affiliated club in the Commonwealth) was won by Cam-berwell Club (V.), 114/120.

Interest was well maintained on the final day of the series, March 15. In fact, attendance figures surprised officials. The popular Intermediate Championship, shot at 20 targets from 16 yards, provided 19 possibles. The tie shoot went another 40 rounds before the winner emerged in F. J. Ezard of Swift's Creek (V.), who grassed 60 straight to win from B. Addison (Moulamein, N.S.W.), 59/ 60, then R. Young (Newcastle, N.S.W.), 54/55, with N. Mitchell, also of Newcastle, and Bruce Mackey of Brisbane (Q.), each 39/40.

The Champion of Champions Cup, the premier contest of the series, was the final match. Again the entry was excellent, quality and quantity were present in abundance. The match is staged at 40 targets from 20 yards, double-barrel. Ten returned possibles; these were: Sperry Marshall (Bridgewater, Tas.), R. Heinemann (Qld.), A. W. Catt (Sydney), J. R. Bushby (Narrandera, N.S.W.), E. G. Biggs (East Burwood, V.), F. Hudson (Sydney), C. Mudford (Preston, V.), E. Hodge (South Coast, Q.) and J. Blake (Cressy, Tas.). Another 35 rounds were necessary before Sperry Marshall gained the verdict with 75/75 from Eric Hodge (Q.), 74/75; C. Mudford, 69/70; J. R. Bushby, 64/65, and P. Marshall (brother of the winner), 63/65. The winner's victory was very popular and completed a good double for Tasmanian shooters, J. Blake having previously won the National S.B. title on the opening day. It is only the second occasion on which the title has gone from Victoria.

The principal teams' match of the meeting, the Club Teams' Championship, shot at the first 30 targets released in the National D.B. title on March 12 (in conjunction) was won after a tie and shoot-off by Colac (V.) (G. Crosse, R. Krentzlin, R. Jorgenson, and R. Boyd), with a total of 157/160, from Newcastle (N.S.W.), 137/141, and Hobart (Tas.), 136/140. Hobart had twice previously won the event.

The fixture concluded in a generally convivial atmosphere after one of the most successful and enjoyable National series yet staged by the A.C.P.T.S.A.
