The Editor's Notebook



21st ANNUAL MEETING

The 21st Annual Meeting of the Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association was held at Southport (Queensland) on Wednesday, June 19, last. Many items of import-ance were dealt with.

Chief among the business was the election of a new President of the Association, in the person of Mr. John Houston of Hay, N.S.W. Mr. Houston succeeded Mr. J. M. Wilson of Melbourne, who retired after serving in the position since 1941. Mr. Houston's appointment was well received and his elevation to the chair was warmly applauded.

Association Name Change. The meeting decided to approve of the recommendation to change the name of the Association by deleting the word "pigeon" and including the word "target" in its place. This change will operate as from January 1, 1958.

Appointment of Auditor. Mr. K. D. Courtney of Temple Court, Melbourne, was re-appointed auditor to the Association.

Election of Office-bearers. Following the election of Mr. J. Houston to the Presidential Chair, the election for the members of the Executive Committee of the Association took place. No elections were necessary in the States of Western Australia and South Australia, Messrs, C. Ferguson and J. Woodrow respectively were re-elected unopposed in the States mentioned. For the State of Queensland the following were elected: Messrs. A. W. McIntosh, G. S. Martin and D. M. Pack; New

South Wales, F. R. Hudson, S. E. Lamb, R. R. Moore, K. Soames Senr.; Victoria, Messrs. E. G. Biggs, D. Glover, J. Headland and A. Pedersen; Tasmania, Messrs. W. Rainbird and Rex Powell. The following Honorary Vice-Presidents were elected: Messrs. L. P. Hughes, Rex Miles (U.S.A.). H. Rogers (England), J. M. Wilson and W. J. Hanran.

Life Honorary Vice-President. The meeting unanimously appointed the retiring President, Mr. J. M. Wilson, an Honorary Life Vice-President of the Association. It was also decided to present Mr. Wilson with some tangible gift in recognition for his long service as President. This will be considered by the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

Reversion to 12 Yard Minimum. After long discussion the meeting decided to revert to the 12-yard minimum for front-mark shooters. This will operate as from September 1, 1957. In connection with the reversion to 12-yard minimum it was decided that shooters' present handicaps will stand and that the 12-yard minimum will only operate and apply to completely new shooters taking up the sport. Recommendations for any new shooters to which the foregoing ruling will apply should reach the Association secretary not later than August 1.

Break Badges. It was decided that break badges may now be carried on over more than one day (any number of days), providing the shooter does not engage in practice in between shoots or does not take part in double - rise, walk - up, Deauville

doubles or any other novely contest, and shall compile the break under single or double-barrel conditions only and in competition. The breaks may now be compiled from any mark, including championships. The shooter may win one badge only under the categories, 50 straight, 75 straight, 100 straight. Score sheets must be produced.

Handicapping. Club officials are reminded that all events (except novelty events) will be taken into account for future handicapping. One outright win or two divisions the shooter will be handicapped one yard, 50 straight 1 yard handicap, 75 break or over 2 yards handicap. Attendance at at least five fixtures and shooting right through the programme without a cut of any description will entitle the shooter to be considered for review with a view to being brought in. Five and ten-bird contests will now be taken into account for handicapping — previously these were not considered when the 16-yard minimum operated.

New Rule Amendment. The new rule whereby the shooter was compelled to accept every bird released has now been amended and the rule now reads, "The shooter must accept every whole bird that is released from the trap after he has called pull." Official referees and all club officials are particularly requested to take notice of this intimation and ensure that same is applied.

1957 INTERNATIONAL MATCH

New Zealand has again won the 1957 International, according to cabled advice received from London. Scores as cabled were: New Zealand 2951 points, Australia 2935 points, England 2902, Canada 2880, Scotland 2863, Wales 2795, Ireland 2773, South Africa 2608, Central Africa 2277. Australia, as shown, was again runner-up, for the fourth year in succession. As has been mentioned in these columns from time to time. the Australian method of team selection is contrary to arriving at the best team. But experience has shown that the Australian method is by far the fairest way of selecting a team, and it's unlikely to be altered. It is worth remembering here that the Olympic slogan aptly applies to Australia, "the important thing is

not to have won, but to have taken part." So Australia lives on to fight again when the next International Match comes round. It was indeed pleasing to notice that Canada, South Africa and Central Africa were represented with teams in this year's International. It was also noted that Canada performed reasonably well and could be a real danger to the present leaders in the International series in the years to come.

Australian high-gun was Leo Haseler of Clara Creek (Queensland) with 297/300 points, a splendid performance because he has had little shooting practice during the past year. Equal in second high-gun position were: B. W. Hughes (Mingela, Qld.), N. Milliken (Hay, N.S.W.), Don Glover (Keilor, V.), and J. N. Thomas (V.), each with 295/300 points. A. Hamilton (Dandenong, V.) was next with 293, followed by A. Calvert (Dundonnell, V.) 292/300, H. T. Siddons (St. George, Q.) and N. Frith (Launceston, Tas.) 291/300. The foregoing were the first ten top-scorers and comprised the "scores to count" section of the match. A full resume of the International Team for Australia scores appears elsewhere in this issue.

It is desired again to express thanks and appreciation on behalf of the Association to I.C.I:A.N.Z. Limited for that Company's long sustained support and interest in the welfare of the sport and the Association. It is recalled that the Company has donated the clays for the Champion of Champions Cup every year, and also donates the clays and cartridges used by members of the Australian International Team. This generous support is worthily recalled and it is mentioned that in 1957 the Company has continued with the same donation.

Clubs are reminded that it is expected that the next meeting of the Executive Committee of the Association will be held early in October. Clubs desirous of bringing any matter before the Committee are advised to contact the Secretary of the Association, Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, not later than September 25, 1957.

OFFICIAL REFEREE EXAMINATION Examiner's Report

A very interesting fact emerges from the last batch of Referee papers corrected, in that all questions relating to rules definitely låid down such as measurement between tracks, height of birds, etc., were all correct in every instance. However, when it came to give answers to questions regarding thought and correct procedure, quite a number fell down badly, due, I think, to the fact that insufficient thought had been given to the question. In all probability, had the occasion arisen during competition, most people would have given the correct decision and procedure.

As an example quite a number of people gave completely incorrect answers to questions 8, 9, 12 and 14, simply because they did not study the question thoroughly.

Take, for instance, question No. 8. A number of candidates gave the answer to this question as lost bird.

answer to this question as lost bird.
A Competitor shooting 2 barrels to kill fires with the first barrel and misses. He was standing behind the mark allocated to him, but unintentionally put his foot over the mark and breaks it with the second barrel. Let us take this question in sections.

If this question is studied, you will note that the emphasis are placed on 2 barrels to kill, and in this instance he has fired from his correct mark with the first barrel and misses. However, he still has the second barrel to use, and by unintentionally putting his foot across the mark, it becomes a no bird on the second barrel, regardless of whether he kills or misses. He must therefore be given another bird, and the procedure would be to miss with his first because he has already previously missed the bird with his first shot and must be given the opportunity of scoring with the second barrel, of course with his feet behind his mark.

Question No. 9 says a Competitor must stand within the prescribed limits of his shooting mark. He prefers to stand off the concrete track. How far away from the concrete must his nearest foot be to be within the

prescribed limits? Most people answered this question by simply writing 18". This, of course, is far too vague. The correct answer is that he must stand within 18" of the centre of a 20" concrete track. In other words, he must not be further away than 8" from the edge of the concrete.

Space will not permit me to explain in full detail further the other questions on which the candidates were incorrect. Might I also add that a great deal of concentration and attention to the job in hand is required by a Referee in order that he give the fairest and most clear-cut decisions, particularly now, as the new rule states that Competitors must accept all whole birds released from the trap, and it becomes very necessary for the Referee to be very alert and watchful for fast and slow releases, in order to maintain the equity of competition.

SHOOT and be MERRY

By COOMBE RICHARDS

(in "Shooting Times")

a long shooting career, three con-nected with the Festive Season come readily to mind. The first, ages ago now, was when I was perhaps more susceptible to criticism, or legpulling-albeit richly deserved-than I am today!

Home on leave at the time, I was the youngest (a guest) present at a large house-party shoot where, with a pair of inexpensive, popular - make guns, I succeeded in not altogether disgracing myself in the presence of my elders and betters over two days of covert shooting, and was probably a bit cock-ahoop about it into the bargain.

On Christmas morning my host (one of the old school who would not for a moment tolerate any mistake or indiscipline in the field) sent for me to the gunroom, and frantically I racked my brains in search of any crime I might have committed. I could think of none.

"My boy," said he, as rather ner-vously I entered the presence, "I've had my eye on you; you've shot well."
(I breathed again). "Take this"—
handing me a beautiful, handsomely engraved double - barrelled, hammerless ejector — "and see if you can do better still. Tomorrow I'll give you the chance!"

The Boxing Day shoot was always a tremendous if somewhat less regimental affair than usual. There were about a dozen guns. Places were not drawn for, but our host individually posted each one, ensuring that all had their fair share of sport—a matter he himself paid particular attention to. Determined to do justice to my new weapon—and to its donor—I set out feeling confident of being able to deal with all comers. Alas! youth is ever impulsive and over-confident. Before the day was ended I would have welcomed being engulfed by an earthquake.

The Big Occasion

The first two drives brought little opportunity of shining or otherwise, for not a great deal came my way,

From many amusing incidents in and what did was mostly easy. It was the third drive that was to be the big occasion of the morning. Here I found myself placed in the centre of the line in a declivity below the point of a hanging wood and realised this was it. My host, away on the left flank, was considerably higher up and in a position to see all that transpired.

> Pheasants poured over me in ones and twos, in little flushes, in bouquets. They were high in the air and providing magnificent shooting—for providing magnificent shooting—for anyone who could hit them, but not for me! My loader (I had one, although using but the one gun) rammed cartridges into the chambers I so frequently emptied for him, but they might have been charged only with sand, for all the result I could produce. I do not believe that I blew so much as a feather out of a cock's tail, whilst the ground around me

> became littered with empty cases.
>
> At last it was "all out", and the drive was over; and then I heard my host's voice. "Oh you ruddy washerwoman!" was all it said - but for me the day was ruined. Nothing went right, I scarcely killed a bird, anywhere, and felt that not only had I disgraced myself, but let down badly my host, too. And so was a pheasant stand re-named, for to this day it is known as "Washerwoman's Corner".

> I am not altogether sure I did not that night contemplate giving up shooting, but people were very tactful with me, and I thought better of it. I have never forgotten the occasion at all events, and I still have the gun. It is one of my most treasured possessions and now a trusted old friend.

The Second Incident

The second incident concerns a certain sporting innkeeper who was a member of our syndicate shoot. One afternoon shortly before Christmas I called in at his hostelry to see if he would care to join me in a tramp after snipe. He was dressed in his best "business" striped suit and said he was too busy to leave the office.

Telephones: UY 2540 UY 2927 At that moment, there was a clatter of hooves in the yard outside, and a minute later in came a local farmer, having ridden poste haste across country to inform Mine Host that there were some duck down on his "newtake", and that he had a plan whereby these might be bagged for the Yuletide "pot". The temptation proved too great for the management, who within a few minutes had dragged on gum boots, grabbed a gun, and was ready for anything.

The plan was simple. He and I were to make our way along the river bank whilst farmer rode back, collected his gun and approached from an opposite direction. We should then surround the newtake and when in position were to rise simultaneously—I stress that this was for the pot.

All went well until we drew near to the rendezvous and could hear the quacking and dibbling of the duck, whereupon Mine Host threw discretion to the winds and crawled, best-suit-be-damned, through the bog and damp undergrowth the better to efface himself. At last the stage was set and as luck had it, the duck seemed totally unaware of the fate inexorably descending upon them. Three figures rose from cover, six shots crashed out—and one or two duck fluttered frantically away, while seven or eight lay dead on the water. They were the hotel's own domesticated birds; plumaged like wild ones it is true!

It served us right, of course, and their owner was sportsman enough to see the joke as soon or sooner than any. I do not think we ever worked out what those duck actually cost—but it was (or had been) a very smart suit; I do know that.

The third incident comes from a rather crazy "wager" shoot held one Christmas not long after the war. Briefly the terms were these: For 7s. 6d. per cartridge fired, our party of seven guns should take all the game killed during a day on the shoot owned by the challenger, the point being that at the price game was fetching at that time, were we to average anything better than one bird gathered for every three shots fired, we would be (theoretically) in pocket. Anything over that we should be definitely out.

Birds to Defeat Us

The owner of the shoot contended that he could show us birds which would entirely defeat us; we thought we could manage these easily. He proved right; we wrong. To cut a long story short, we were all of us so demoralised. by midday that several of the party—although only pheasants and partridges really counted, or a hare if one felt one was sufficiently "in hand"—were shooting at all ground game out of sheer desperation. Seldom in my life have I seen such wonderfully high pheasants, or, for that matter, partridges either, or occupied such thoroughly testing stands.

The last drive before lunch was one across a valley with our backs to the farm buildings wherein refreshment awaited us. In front of the line, or rather part of it, ran a low, wire-mesh fence and behind this particular section were stationed B and myself — Nos. 1 and 2 respectively. We were out of the main line of flight and were perhaps relieved at this respite from responsibility, for we could stand and watch others expending 15s. for every double fired.

And then came a hare—straight and true towards B, who could not, of course, deliberately ignore it. His first 7/6 was discharged at it far out in front—a clean miss; 15s. was rung up a second later—another miss. By this time the hare had reached the wire and was for a moment non-plussed and more or less stationary, but 22s. 6d. gave no better results than had the cheaper rates. The hare turned to its left (thank heavens I was out of all this), whereupon 30s. slowed it up slightly and then at last, when almost out of range, 37s. 6d. finally killed it.

By that time at least three other guns had given up shooting and were watching B with awe and wonder—whilst he, poor chap, had removed his hat and was wiping his brow. Luckily hares at that price come rarely—even at Christmas.

As a matter of interest the result of that day's shooting was as follows: Pheasants, 100; partridges, 55; hares, 17; rabbits, 1—equals 173 head. Cartridges fired, 528. Work it out for yourself—although I have not forgotten the answer!




