



# The Editor's Notebook



Now that the "shooting and the tumult" of the big Association National and International Championships have been decided at Bankstown, it would seem that the time is fitting to extend sincere thanks and appreciation to Imperial Chemical Industries Australia and New Zealand, Limited, for the Company's long and sustained support to the sport and to the Association. Many are not aware of the great amount of money spent by the Company in furthering the sport and supporting the Association. As an instance, although frequently publicised, many are not aware that all the clay targets used by competitors in the Association Champion of Champions Cup each year are donated by the Company. This factor enables the Association to put on the big shoot at the most conservative cost to shooters. Also the Company each year donates all the targets and shells used by the 30-men team who represent Australia in the annual International Match-this factor also enables the Association to grant free shooting to team members - quite a big consideration. Prior to the Company's donation in this regard members of the team had to provide their own ammunition, or at least pay for the shells used in the International Match. Also the Company donates silver commemoration badges to the winners of each of the National events, double-barrel, single-barrel, International high-gun and the Grand Australian Handicap. In addition the

Company, each year, donates the sum of £150 towards the cost of conducting the annual Interstate Teams' Match for "The Great Britain & Ireland" Trophy as well as providing free air-travel to the winner in each State who wins the "Air-Fare" Handicap, to attend the National Championships each year. These donations mean a great deal to the sport and the Association and do much to reduce costs to shooters taking part in the events mentioned. The warmest thanks to I.C.I.A.N.Z. Limited.

The recent 23rd Annual Meeting of the A.C.T.A. took place on Sunday, May 3, at the clubrooms of the Royal Aero Club of New South Wales at Bankstown. The meeting was well attended and delegates' representative of every State were present.

Several matters of considerable importance to clubs and shooters were discussed both at the annual meeting of affiliated club delegates and also at the Executive Committee meeting which followed. Changes in rules, etc., as outlined were approved.

CHANGE IN REFEREEING RULE. The rule, which has been in existence for some years, whereby "the shooter was compelled to accept every whole bird released after he had called pull", has now been rescinded and the former rule reinstated. The complete rules covering this section are as appended:

Rule 10.—NO BIRD. It is a "no bird," and the Referee shall allow another target, respectively:

(a) When a competitor shoots out of turn, from his wrong handicap mark or from the wrong track.

(b) When two competitors, or when a competitor and a non-competitor, shoot at the same target.

(c) When there is a misfire, in either barrel, caused by the competitor's gun, or a misfire of the cartridge, except as provided in Rule 9 (b), and Rule 12 (c).

In the event of a misfire with the second barrel, the competitor must fire a live cartridge in the general direction of the target, and is permitted to score with the second barrel only.

(A competitor will not be allowed the full use of two barrels at a new target given following a missire in his second barrel.)

(d) When (whether shot at or not) a broken target is thrown.

(e) When a competitor is balked.

(See definition.)

(f) When there is any other reason not provided for in these rules, if, in the opinion of the Referee, it materially affects the equity of the competition.

Rule 11.—NO BIRD, IF REFUSED.

In any of the instances herewith specified, the Referee shall declare a "no bird":—

(a) When a trap is sprung at a material interval of time before or after the call of "Pull."

(b) When the trap is sprung without any call of "Pull."

(c) When, in single target shooting, two pigeons are thrown at the same time.

(d) When the target is thrown at a widely different angle (see definition), whether wide or high, provided that where the flight of the target is affected by wind or weather conditions, the Referee may, in his discretion, declare a "no bird."

#### DEFINITION OF BALK.

In view of the rules as defined, it has been considered advisable to outline Rule 2, which refers exclusively to the Referee. It is as follows:

Rule 2.—THE REFEREE.

The Referee's Decision is Final

Section 1.—Besides attending to the special duties as set forth hereinafter, the Referee shall adjudicate the competition. He shall DIS-TINCTLY and LOUDLY announce the result of each shot by calling out "Kill" when the target is broken, and "Lost" when the target is unbroken. He shall decide all other issues which arise in relation to the direct competition.

Section 2.—It shall be particularly the duty of the Referee to see that the competitor, when firing at a target, is standing within the limits prescribed in Rule 5, Section 4.

Section 3.—The Referee's decision in all cases coming under his jurisdiction as set forth in these rules, shall be final.

Section 4.—If the Referee is negligent or inefficient, impairing thereby the equity of the competition, the management may forthwith remove him. This rule applies also to scorers, pullers, trappers and any other of the staff.

Section 5.— The Referee is empowered to challenge the ammunition used by any competitor.

Section 6.—The Referee shall insist that no competitor is permitted to shoot from other than his allotted handicap.

Section 7.—The Referee has power to alter his decision.

Section 8.—To preserve the equity of the competition, and to avoid, as far as possible, the balking of any competitor, no member of a squad shall move to his next firing point until the whole squad moves.

Section 9.—The members of any squad shall remain at the firing point until the last shot of the squad is fired.

Rule 16. Sections 4 to 8 read:—Double Targets, Misfire, Magazine, Gun.

Section 4.—The Referee shall declare "no birds" respectively:—

- (a) When only one target is thrown.
- (b) When both targets are broken by one shot.
- (c) When one target is a broken target or both targets are broken targets when thrown from the trap or traps.
- (d) When both barrels of the competitor's gun are discharged simultaneously.

Section 5.—In case the competitor does not shoot, the Referee shall declare "no birds":—

- (a) When one target follows the other after a material interval of time, instead of the two targets taking flight simultaneously.
- (b) When one target or both targets are thrown at a wider or narrower angle or angles or higher or lower than is set forth in Section 2 of this Rule.

Section 6.—In case of a magazine gun (see Definition), it is "no birds," and the Referee (except as provided in Rule 9 (b) and (c)), shall allow another pair, respectively:—

- (a) When, in ejection, the head of the empty shell is pulled off, if it thereby prevents re-loading for the second shot. (This also applies to single rise shooting when two barrels are allowed.)
- (b) When, if the gun is opened properly, the extractor fails to extract the empty shell of the first shot.
- (c) When the empty shell, although it be extracted from the chamber after the first shot, is not ejected, thereby preventing the reloading of the gun for the second shot. (A competitor must abide by the results of such failures thereafter.)

Section 7.—In the case of a magazine gun, it is "no birds" and the Referee shall allow another pair where there is any failure to shoot caused by a cartridge which is too thick or too long, or any failure whatsoever caused by a reloaded cartridge or a second failure to eject.

Section 8.—When the Referee declares "no birds," the competitor shall have a new inning with the use of two shots.

SERGEANT SYSTEM. The Sergeant System of clay target shooting, as outlined in the A.C.T.A. Rules (Rule 13), has been investigated by a number of clubs, particularly in Victoria, in recent months. Clubs are informed that the A.C.T.A. has no objection whatever to any affiliated club or clubs shooting clay targets

under the Sergeant System, and the A.C.T.A. would favourably consider any applications for Commonwealth, State or District championships under the Sergeant System.

The Sergeant System, whilst not acceptable to many, has, it has been pointed out, the background feature of providing somewhat cheaper shooting, although the shooter does not have as many shots per day as under ordinary "down-the-line" shooting.

Briefly the Sergeant System is as stated in Shooting Rule 13, Section 4, "Three single traps, four feet apart, constitute the Sergeant System. The targets are thrown from unknown traps, at unknown angles". Section 2 of the same rule reads, "An automatic trap, or three traps, Sergeant System, may be used". In regard to the last-mentioned section of the rule governing Sergeant System, the A.C.T.A. has decreed that a club may use "up to five traps". The A.C.T.A. advises that those

The A.C.T.A. advises that those clubs wishing to shoot Sergeant System and already having an automatic trap installed, may use the automatic trap as the central trap, with one, or if preferred, two single traps, on either side of the automatic installation.

Finally, in regard to the Sergeant System, it is mentioned that the system has been tried in many countries, but has not proved very successful or very popular over the years.

CAMBERWELL C.T.C. The Camberwell Clay Target Club submitted three Notices of Motion for consideration: (1) "That all doublebarrel and single-barrel State Championships be shot from 19 yards instead of 18 yards." This motion was not carried. (2) "That all double-barrel and single-barrel District Championships be shot from 18 yards instead of 16 yards." This motion was also not approved. (3) "That the mark for Interstate Teams' Match be 18 yards instead of 16 yards." Much discussion took place on the last-mentioned motion. Finally it was decided to accept the motion and same was carried to apply as from 1st January, 1960. This will mean that the current year's series (1959) will still be shot from 16

1960 ASSOCIATION SHOOT. It was agreed that the 1960 Association National Championships series be held in the State of Queensland over the Queen's Birthday week-end. Actual dates will be announced later. It was instructed that no other major shooting series would be approved in Queensland over the period of the Association National series.

"NEWS". It was agreed that every club secretary should receive a gratis copy of "News" each month. In many cases this is already operating. Where it is known that club secretaries are not receiving a copy of "News" each month, the matter should be advised to the Association secretary without delay.

HANDICAPPING. It was agreed that the management committee of a club was empowered to move a shooter back when he wins in accordance with the handicapping formula. The Association to be notified of any such move within the customary three days of such action taking place.

REFEREE EXAMINATIONS. The next "series" of Official Referee Examinations will be held almost immediately. Candidates are requested to lodge their full name and address with the Secretary, A.C.T.A., not later than August 1, 1959. No late lodgments will be accepted.

REGISTRATION CARDS. An important decision was reached regarding the issue of registration and handicap cards. It was stated to the meeting that the combination of a "registration and handicap" card had led to some confusion in the minds of club officials and shooters. Accordingly it was decided to cease forthwith the issue of "handicap" cards. In future "News" will be the official organ from which club officials and shooters will take the handicap mark of all shooters. However, in order to provide the shooter with some form of certificate of registration, each registered shooter will in future be issued with a "registration" card bearing the year of registration and the shooter's name and address—no handicap mark will be shown on the card. Therefore, all should note that henceforth only a "registration" card will be issued. Current cards will be cut in half and only the "registration" section will in future be posted to shooters registering. As from

# Letters to the Editor . . .

#### SHOOTING UP

Shooting up, with rare exceptions, is an act by an inconsiderate shooter, permitted by a weak executive who is equally inconsiderate to the vast body of punctual shooters who form the backbone of the sport.

Cannot the A.C.T.A. introduce a rule to make these dregs of the game reform or stay out? I know of one club where shooting up is forbidden as a club rule; the commencement of the second round by No. 1 squad automatically closing the nominations. This club is particularly well patronised, although fifty miles from the metropolis.

Recently at a different club where an elimination shoot of fifty clays was being contested, one shooter arrived one hour and twenty minutes after the starting time, but did not make the team; another shooter arriving twenty minutes later did get in. At this time seven squads had completed their second round of ten clays each round. Both these shooters missed the wind, which was gusty at the start.

Your early attention to this matter, A.C.T.A. Executive Committee, please.

# OUT OF THE PAST

## Twenty Years Ago

A notable performance was that of speed that in most cases they eluded E. H. Coates of South Yarra (V.), who at his first essay over the traps was placed in every event on the programme at a Blackburn Club fixture.

The North-Eastern Double - barrel Championship (V.) was won at Benalla by J. Bryant Senr. 20/20 from Vic. Fankhauser 19/20 and Jack Cooper 18/20. Pat Reid of Seymour won the similar single-barrel title on the same programme.

About this period in 1939 a report from the Yass district provided information on an unusual shoot conducted by the Yass Club of that time. It appears the club earned considerable prominence when it arranged what was termed a "beetle" shoot. It appears the officials of the club spent considerable time securing the necessary quarry. When released from the traps the fiery specimens with polished black backs performed unexpected loops in flight, with the result that very small scores were recorded on the day. Only those with the keenest eyesight were able to pick up the targets, and even when the shooters were able to sight them the beetles dived with such unusual

the guns.

Looking back over the pre-war records, it is surprising the number of clubs who were in existence prior to the "burst" in 1939 and do not now function. Several which come under this category were Lilydale in Tasmania, Toowoomba in Queensland, and Merriwa in New South Wales.

Also at this period in 1939 two prominent Adelaide clubs merged. They were the Metropolitan (S.A.) and the Adelaide (S.A.). Their amalgamation took place as from June 3. 1939. The clubs become the nucleus of the present South Australian Gun Club, and shooting moved to the Gillies Plains site. P. H. Lawson, who only recently retired from active secretarial duty, became secretary of the new formation.

Luke Hughes, still an Hon. Association Vice-President (and shooting well enough to make the 1959 Australian International Team), dropped into Townsville (Q.) about this period in 1939 and won the North Queensland Mixed Birds title. His score was a moderate one for the class of event, but was still high enough to win,


# Ten Years Ago

Mangoplah shooter Lox Creasy, who still shoots over the traps and who is, unknown to many, an American by birth, won the Holbrook Club's mixed birds title and became the permanent holder of the McLaurin Trophy. Creasy shot 14/20 to win from Stan Finemore (Mangoplah) and Ray Hall (Wagga), who tied in the placings each with 12/20.

The Tumut Club (N.S.W.) held its propring shoot on July 22, 1940.

# SHOTGUN CHAMPION SETS RECORD

Australian shotgun champion Newton Thomas has set an Australian record for the number of consecutive hits on clay targets.

Thomas broke his previous record by making 454 consecutive kills without missing a clay target.

He set his previous record of 321 at Cootamundra in 1953.

Thomas made the record in two days' shooting at the International clay target events which the Australian Clay Target Association held at the Royal Aero Club, at Bankstown.

One other competitor at the shoot also broke Thomas' old record. He is Don Scowcroft, from New South Wales, who hit 324 clays without a miss. Newton Thomas also created another record during the events by becoming the first Australian to win three major Commonwealth titles at one meeting.

He won the Single and Double-barrel Championships and also top scored for Australia in the International Teams Match to become the High Gun of the International Team, shooting 100 targets straight for the second time. This year he scored the possible 300 points out of 300, which means that he shot all his targets with the first barrel.

He was also third in the Champion of Champions Cup. Winner was Paul Marshall (Tasmania) and Don Scowcroft was second.

The only clay target Thomas missed during the five days' shooting was his 545th.
