The Editor's Notebook



SEASONAL GREETINGS. The President and Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. extend Seasonal Greetings to all clubs and shooters. All express the wish that the coming year will be brighter and better than previous years and that shooting will be enjoyed by everyone.

INTERNATIONAL MATCH, 1961. In connection with the shooting of future International Matches, the following confirmation of a private advice has been received from the International Clay Pigeon Shooting Council in London after a meeting of that body held in Chester (England) about mid-June, 1960. The advice reads, "At the meeting of the International Clay Pigeon Shooting Council held in Chester, the conditions for the International Match for the next five years were decided upon, as follows:—

Teams of 30, ALL scores to count. Two barrels allowed, as previously: scoring 3 points for a first barrel kill, and 2 points for a second barrel kill.

The other conditions remain as before, i.e. 100 birds per team member, to be shot in four stages of 25, in squads of five, 16 yards behind the trap. The traps to be automatic angle traps, the extreme angles to be no less than 45° right and left of the centre line, the distance of the target to be 45 to 55 yards (50 yards average). England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales will shoot their match on Friday, 16th June, 1961, at Edinburgh, Scotland."

The foregoing confirms the advice published in the previous issue of this publication. Scores of top ten for all 1960 teams (other than Australia) appear in another section of this issue. It is of interest to note that only one shooter, G. Henderson, of the winning Canadian Team, was equal to scoring 300 points and shooting 100 targets. B. Bailey of the English team paralleled the score of the Australian high-gun, Doug Smith, with 297 points. Bailey, however, shot 100 targets, whereas Smith shot 99/100. Australia had the honour of producing two shooters who broke the full 100, Don Scowcroft and R. Middleton, although their points total did not reach the maximum. With all scores to count in next year's series, the final aggregates of all teams should be very interesting.

1961 CHAMPIONSHIP ALLOCATION. The A.C.T.A. Open Championship Allocation, as officially approved by the Executive Committee of the Association, is published elsewhere in this issue. Clubs and all shooters are advised to accept the printed intimation as official — no additional notice on the allocation will be posted to clubs. Clubs are reminded that the events as printed have been allotted to their clubs for the 1961 season, but before deciding to hold the events it is necessary to apply to the A.C.T.A. for approval, both as to the event and the actual date of holding. Where there is the possibility of two events clashing,

the A.C.T.A. will not approve of both. Club championships may be conducted at any time without A.C.T.A. approval, although it is always wise to ensure that a major event is not being conducted by a nearby club.

1961 AFFILIATION AND REGISTRATIONS. Clubs and shooters are reminded that 1961 club affiliation and registration fees are due as from January 1. Any fees received prior to that date will be credited right through to 31st December, 1961. Club affiliation is \$5 and shooters' individual registration fee is 20/-. All payments should be addressed and made payable to The Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1 (Victoria).

BREAK RECOGNITION. A club recently wrote the Association seeking information as to whether a break by a shooter shooting over a plus trap could be recognised. The answer is in the negative. Breaks are only recognised by the A.C.T.A. if shot under double and single-barrel conditions, providing they are gained shooting over an automatic trap, and in regular competition.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING. The Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A. met over two days and one night late in October. The Committee undertook long and varied discussions on affairs appertaining to the welfare of the shooters and clubs.

Association Shoot, 1961. The A.C.T.A. National Championship series and International Match were fixed for the period March 10 to March 14 inclusive. This period includes the Victorian Labour Day holiday on March 13 and is approximately the same period of the year when previous Internationals were held in Melbourne.

Of considerable interest is the arrangement of the 1961 programme for the National series. On the opening day the National Single-barrel Championship will be held. This event will comprise 40 targets per man from 16 yards, single-barrel.

However, instead of the straight-out optional sweepstakes of 20/- and 10/- as formerly, the 20/- sweepstake will be cut on each 10 targets, whilst the 10/- optional will be over-all. This will allow for many more shooters to share in the proceeds. One of the popular £100 Handicaps will follow the National single-barrel title event and a second £100 event will be staged, time permitting. Conditions of the National Double-barrel Championship on the second day, March 11, will be the same as in former years, i.e. 60 targets from 16 yards, double-barrel. The previous optional sweepstake of 20/- has been raised to 30/- and cut on each 10 birds. The 10/- optional sweepstake will be decided overall. The prize lists for both the National single and double-barrel events will be identical with the distribution of 1960.

The Australian Team of 30 men for the International Match will comprise the 30 highest scorers in the National Double-barrel Championship 1961, who are Australian citizens of at least 12 months standing.

On the third day, March 13, the International Match will be the premier contest — this will be shot at 100 targets per man from 16 yards, double-barrel, points scoring. In 1961 all scores will count and there will be, therefore, no count-out as in past years. The former Grand Australian Handicap has been deleted from the programme and replaced by three £100 Handicaps each under double-barrel conditions and each at 15 targets. The Commonwealth Teams' Match, previously decided over the first 30 targets released in the Grand Australian Handicap, will now be decided over 15 targets in the first £100 Handicap. The Committee considered that by instituting three £100 Handicaps instead of the 45 target G.A. Handicap that more interest in the programme would be maintained.

The final day, March 14, sees the introduction of a completely new event — the National Double-rise Championship at 20 pairs from 16 yards, pairs only to count and count as one (1) point. An optional sweepstake of 20/- will be included and this will be cut on each 5 pairs in the event. A 10/- overall sweepstake

is also included. The prize list will
be the same as for the National
Single-barrel Championship on the
opening day. For this event Mr.
J. M. Tyquin has presented a Per-
petual Silver Cup. The inclusion of
the National double-rise Champion-
ship means the elimination of the
long-standing Champion of Cham-
pions event. However, the title of
Champion of Champions and its
attached, and now historic, Cup will
be retained. Instead of deciding the
Champion of Champions over one
event, the Champion of Champions
will now be assessed over the aggre-
gate scores recorded in the National
Single-barrel Championship, the Na-
tional Double-barrel Championship
and the National Double-rise Cham-
pionship. Should there be a tie
for Champion of Champions honours,
the tie will be decided in the follow-
ing order: 5 pairs double-rise, 5
targets single-barrel and 5 targets
double-barrel, to conclusion. The new
arrangement appears to be an im-
provement on the former system of
deciding the Champion of Champions.

To complete the programme the
usual A.C.T.A. Intermediate Cham-
pionship, 20 targets from 16 yards,
will be held. In this event also the
sweepstakes have been changed.
Under the new arrangement, an
optional sweepstake of 10/-, cut each
10 birds, and an overall 10/- sweep-
stake have been included.

Altogether the programme presents
an almost entirely new appearance
and one which should be acceptable
to the majority of shooters. Interest
has been increased throughout the
entire four days, culminating with
the highest aggregate winner in the
selected events being declared the
Champion of Champions.

Shooting Rules. The Shooting
Rules of the A.C.T.A. have been re-
written and will be published in the
January/February edition of this
publication. In addition the Shooting
Rules will be produced in Brochure
form and will be available on appli-
cation. So that every shooter and
club member may be fully conversant
with the Shooting Rules, it has been
decided to reproduce these in Poster
form. The Rules Poster can then be

affixed to the wall of every clubhouse
for all to read.

Skeet Rules. The A.C.T.A. has
adopted International Shooting Rules
for skeet, with English modifications.
These will be available at a later
date.

New Zealand Visit. Shooters in-
tending to visit New Zealand for the
national championships in that Do-
minion are requested to advise the
Secretary, A.C.T.A., without delay.
Already two Queenslanders, one
South Australian, and two from New
South Wales have announced their
intention of visiting New Zealand.
From those who nominate for the
trip, an Australian Team of six men
will be selected. The cost of the
trip will be borne by the individual
shooter. Enquiries are being made
for the initiation of an Australian
jacket to be worn by the team and
all shooters who make the trip. The
proposal is that the jacket will be
navy-blue, single-breasted Bermuda
type, with "Australia" across the
bottom of the pocket which would
also carry the Association badge. It
is further proposed that a blue tie
be included. Grey trousers will com-
plete the uniform.

Handicapping Formula. The A.C.T.A.
has been slightly amended. Fully
amended version of the Formula is
as published in this issue.

Association Annual Meeting, 1961.
The annual meeting of affiliated club
delegates will be held at Scott's
Hotel, 444 Collins Street, Melbourne,
C.1, on Sunday, March 12, 1961. Only
official delegates for affiliated clubs
are entitled to be present at the
meeting and names of delegates are
required to be in the hands of the
A.C.T.A. Secretary seven clear days
prior to the meeting.

Additional Referee Examiner. Mr.
G. L. Sim of Dookie (V.) was
appointed an additional Referee Ex-
aminer. He will operate chiefly in
the north-eastern portion of Victoria.

**"Tips and Tails"**

John C. Kelman has taken over the secretarial duties of the Emerald Club in Queensland. He succeeds J. A. Milroy, who has been transferred to Rockhampton. Kelman's address is "Bonnie Doon", Yamala, via Emerald, Qld.

Kevin Young is the newly appointed President of the Rum Jungle Gun Club at Bachelor, Northern Territory. He succeeds the inauguration President, P. V. Salter, who has been transferred from the Rum Jungle district.

Speed is essential to good shooting. Observation and recognition of the quarry, the shooter's subsequent reaction and all that it entails, footwork, gun mounting and the speed of his reflexes, linking sight, thought and every movement until the actual firing of the shot, must be quick to get the best results. Good shots are usually quick shots, but speed alone is valueless unless it is controlled. Speed in shooting depends primarily upon the action of the man behind the gun, but there are some mechanical aids on which some set great store. For instance, light guns and short barrels. Unless it is exceedingly well balanced and in sympathetic hands, a short-barrelled light gun can tend to be too light forward, which emphasises poking tendency. A medium weight gun with a barrel length of no less than 28 in., which one has to push on its way to catch up and ahead of a target, seems to be a favourite weapon. Once the swing is under way, it is hard to stop and anything that adds impetus to this forward allowance is usually an advantage, for more targets are missed behind than in front.

With the Christmas and New Year vacation period coming up, it is well to remind all who will be handling

guns of any description during the holiday season that the utmost care should be exercised at all times. Serious gun accidents are so rare that they make news; thus the public may be misled as to their frequency. Many are caused by countrymen who have learnt to use shotguns, but have not been taught proper gun handling. Most accidents are caused by extreme carelessness, such as having a loaded gun where children can get at it, not unloading when crossing a stile or fence or entering a vehicle, or letting a loaded weapon point in the direction of someone within effective range. All these points should be remembered whenever a gun is handled—if proper care is taken and the foregoing hints remembered, there should be no cause for worry concerning the possibility of a gun accident.

Shooters throughout South Australia and Victoria will regret to learn of the passing of Colin M. Barr, which took place at his home at Henley Beach, S.A., on the morning of October 11. He was for a short period on the Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A., although, strangely, he never was able to reach the stage of attending a regularly called official meeting of that body. He attended the A.C.T.A. National Championships at Bankstown, N.S.W., in mid-1959 and soon afterwards suffered a severe illness from which he never fully recovered. Deepest sympathy is extended to his widow.

Another who recently passed on is Sydney Clement Miles, J.P., of Treherbert, Glamorgan (Wales). Miles was a brother of Rex Miles, Secretary of the Washington State Trapshooters' Association and A.C.T.A. Hon. Vice-President. Miles was a Welsh International shot and was also President of the Welsh Clay Pigeon Shooting Association, an office to which he was only elected this year.

A new club is a possible formation at Girgarre in northern Victoria. Organizer of the venture is Maxwell B. Smith of Lymoy, Girgarre.

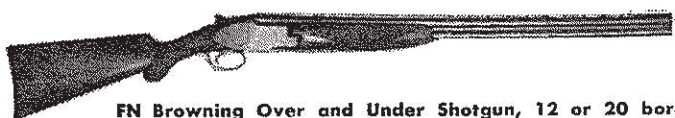

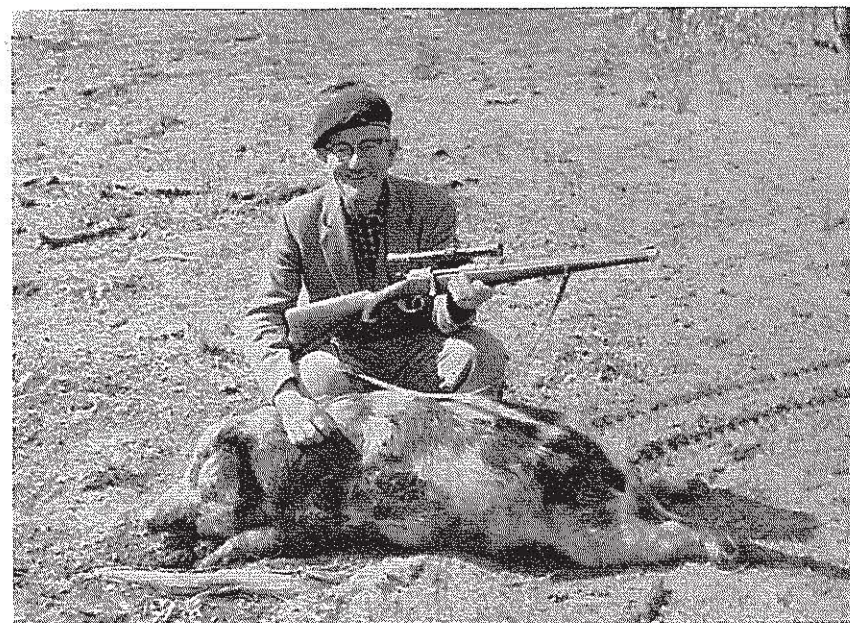

Handicapping Formula

As from January 1st, 1961, the following Handicapping Formula has been approved by the Association Executive.

50 BREAK

If compiled in front of regular handicap no alteration.

If compiled three yards or more behind regular handicap 2 yards back.

If compiled on or one or two yards behind regular handicap, 1 yd. back.

75 or OVER BREAK

If compiled in front of regular handicap no alteration.

If compiled three yards or more behind regular handicap, 3 yds. back.

If compiled on or one or two yards behind regular handicap, 2 yards back.

CASH TROPHY WINS

A cut of £10 to £50 or equivalent trophy value 1 yard back.

A cut of between £51 and £150 or equivalent trophy value 2 yards back.

A cut in a Handicap of £151 or more or equivalent trophy value 3 yards back.

DIVISIONS

A shooter who obtains three cuts (divisions) in sweepstakes or handicaps of ten birds or more on any one programme with a minimum of 10 shooters in each event ... back 1 yard. (Divisions in "attached" sweepstakes not considered.)

INWARD MOVEMENT.

Shooters who compete and shoot right through three full programmes and receive no trophy or cuts may be recommended, by club secretaries only, for inward movement, if proof can be provided that the shooter or shooters are over-handicapped. Recommendations from affiliated club secretaries must be accompanied by fullest details on the official Handicap

Return form. Club secretaries cannot recommend inward movement of more than one (1) yard on each recommendation, unless shooter has suffered some physical disability. Once a shooter has attained the handicap of 14 yards he cannot be moved in front of that mark.

Recommendations from individuals or personal requests will not be entertained — by order of the Executive Committee.

GENERAL.

A shooter winning a Championship from a mark behind his Association Handicap automatically moves back to the mark from which the Championship was won.

Only the Association Handicapper has authority to amend shooters' Handicap Cards. Cards should be posted direct to the Association for handicap amendment immediately such amendment is recommended (or notification appears in "News"), together with Handicap Return form, clearly outlining the reason for the amendment of Handicap.

Club managements have the right to re-handicap any obviously under-handicapped shooter immediately, providing the Association is notified within two days and the reason given on a Handicap Return form. If these details are not completed, such handicap movement cannot be ratified.

Clubs when registering a shooter for the first time must clearly indicate whether the shooter is a complete novice gun handler, or has had field or other experience, before a 12-yard mark can be approved. Failure to provide this information will result in the shooter being placed on 16 yards.

Once a 12-yard shooter secures a trophy or division, he is no longer regarded as a novice gun handler, and is moved to 13 yards forthwith. For a second trophy or division, immediate movement to 14 yards.

When a shooter reaches the 23-yard mark, further movement, forward or back, to be at the discretion of the Handicapper, in alliance with the foregoing Formula.

The weather perfect. The long-awaited opening of the Cobden Gun Club was a great success and we had 40 shooters and about 80 spectators. The clubhouse is not quite completed, but is operational and can be used and locked up with contents. The new ground and concrete tracks were very successful. Shooters were there from Melbourne, Geelong, Colac, Camperdown, Noorat, Framlingham, Panmure and Cobden. Several telegrams of good wishes were received, including one from Ed. Fletcher. (B. King, Sec.)

COBURG (V.).—The 1960 Coburg Grand Prix Carnival is now a matter of history, but it is going to live long in the memory of all those shooters who participated and also the many spectators who witnessed it. The shoot was the most successful ever held by this club and was a fitting reward for the organisation and hard work so unselfishly given by members of the committee.

The only winge we have is the poor support received from the daily press. On Saturday and Tuesday we had reporters and photographers present. They displayed great interest and took copious notes and pictures, so much so that the sales of papers must have taken a sudden jump, but, to the chagrin of all, not one word appeared.

We have often remarked on the very poor coverage by daily newspapers of a sport that is strong and has quite a big following throughout Australia. However, we'll live.

Be that as it may, but let us hasten to extend our gratitude to Channel 9 for their courtesy in putting us on "tele". They gave us nice publicity in the sporting news session on Cup Night. This was favourably commented upon by many viewers. Unfortunately we shooters did not get home in time to see it, but the publicity was there and that's the main thing. Thanks a lot, Channel 9.

Now for the shoot itself. A big crowd arrived early on Saturday, and we were able to start right on time. With such a large muster, the committee early had some misgivings that the programme might have proved a little too lengthy, but Marshall Peter Hanrahan got his staff working efficiently and we were able to get through with plenty of light.

The first event was a 15 birds Points Decision. This meant one visit to each track. The event was quickly finalised. George Biggs was the only clean score with 45/45, and the victory was well received. Second was Clem Mudford, 44/45, and third place was divided by Harry Belmore and Dan Mott with 43/45.

The Victorian Single Barrel Championship was a grand contest. The winner was Keith Patterson (Foster) with a fine score of 38/40. He beat George Gleeson (Broken Hill) by one bird, while third place went to veteran Queensland shooter E. Lesberg, who grassed 31/35.

R. Evans (Geelong) took the 12/16 yds. trophy with 26/30, and Maurie Rushford (Werribee), with 27/30, was the best 17/18 yarder.

The shooters then faced up for the Club Double Barrell Championship, and here again was seen some high-class shooting.

The winner of this event was Jack Blake (Tasmania), who scored a well-executed 55/55. John Platten (54/55) showed out really well to be second, with Warren Charlton (Hawkesbury) third with 44/45. R. Evans again took the 12/16 yds. trophy (29/30), and Jack Morgan's 33/36 earned him the 17/18 yds. prize.

On the second day (Monday) the main event was the £50 Coburg Stakes. When the carnival programmes were drawn up, we imagined the second day, being a working day, would not attract an enormous crowd. We slipped up a bit there, for almost 100 shooters turned up.

As some of the visitors had not shot over the Grand Prix course, it was decided to increase the birds in each event so that all tracks could be used. Also the committee decided to jack up the prize money for the Stakes to £75. We need hardly say that this met with general approval.

The programme commenced with a 15 birds Points Decision, and the prize money was cut by R. Evans, B. Sheppard, V. Coates, H. Moore and I. Porter.

The Coburg Stakes was decided over 30 releases, and at the conclusion there were four possibles—Trevor Ronning (Cootamundra), Roy Trill (Sale), Geoff Kirkham, and Bill Tubb (Tasmania). Geoff was first out. Trevor was next and took third place, while Roy and Bill cut first and second when the score was 34/34.

A 15 birds Double Barrel was the concluding event, and this was divided by the seven possibles, who were Ian Porter, Bill Coulson (Bendigo), Jack Blake (Tasmania), J. Irving (Morwell), Gordon Lear, George Gleeson (Broken Hill), M. Champney (South Burnett).

And now the stage was set for the Great Day—the main attraction, the Coburg Grand Prix, with a beautiful Chrysler Royal Sedan as first prize: had captured the imagination of all shooters, and it was evident right from the start that competition was going to prove very keen.

The advertised time of starting was 8.30 a.m., and precisely at that time the Marshall had the first squad on No. 1 track.

Everything went like clockwork, and all following squads backed up with commendable promptitude.

There was an optional sweep on each 15 birds, and at the end of the first 15 releases 19 shooters divided £60. This will give some idea how difficult it was to score "kills".

In the second 15 birds, also for £60, 16 shooters participated.

At the end of the 30 birds there were only two possibles—Harry Moore and Clarrie Daish. Harry hails from Mildura, whilst Clarrie (formerly of Deniliquin) is now a local.

The crowd was on its toes, awaiting the decision of the two shooters. After a lengthy consultation they decided to cut the car and the second prize of £100, but it was necessary that they shoot it out to decide the outright winner, who was to take the Grand Prix Sash, which in itself is a coveted prize.

The shoot-off did not take long. Another five birds were shot. Harry Moore got the lot and Clarrie Daish dropped one.

There was tumultuous applause for the winner as he came off the track. It was a victory well deserved, and we, with all other

shooters, extend congratulations to Harry on a fine victory, and to Clarrie for a good fight.

Well, there you have the results of a very happy and successful shoot, but it would not be complete if we failed to extend our gratitude to all who helped to make it so. We are greatly indebted to the referees, scorers, trappers, the ladies who looked after the catering arrangements, and to the team of lads who acted as messengers. Again we thank them all.

There was a pair of glasses found on the ground. Although announced over the public address, there has been no claimant. If anyone has missed them, they are in my possession and can be had on application.

Now that our big carnival is over we will settle down to routine shooting, details of which have been published.

On December 10 we will hold, in conjunction with the Keilor Club, the annual Xmas shoot. Particulars of this are published herein. On Xmas Eve, December 24, we will conduct a Christmas championship.

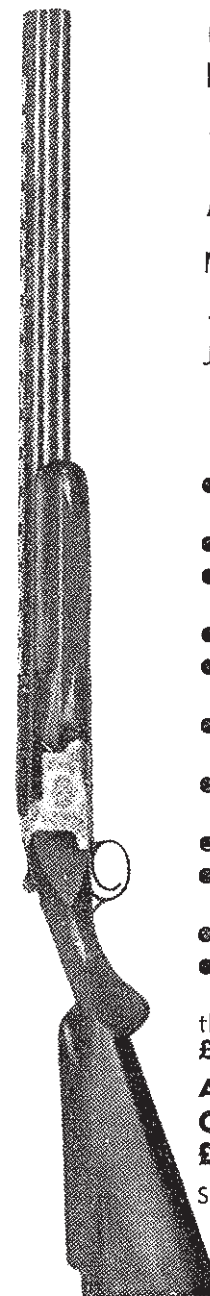
