


## The Editor's Notebook



THE INTERNATIONAL MATCH. Some interesting points have arisen out of the shooting of the 1961 International Match in the various competing countries. The first point is that the International Committee in London has drawn the attention of Australia to the fact that the International Match is required to be shot over four traps. It will be recalled that this year and in previous years Australia has allotted only one trap for the International and the team has continued on the one trap until the conclusion of the event. In future the Australian Team will be required to shoot over four automatic traps, shooting at 100 birds in four 25-bird stages. This will doubtless make for a more interesting event and will also tend to alter the programme layout by the A.C.T.A.

Another interesting happening is also advised from London. It appears that one of the competing countries enclosed a list of "the top thirty scores by our competitors as the country's entry in the competition for the Mackintosh Trophy". Following a meeting of the International Committee, the particular country mentioned above was informed that "each team of 30 members must be nominated before they start to shoot their series. Your letter indicated that your team was selected after they had shot. This method is not acceptable to us". It would seem that the country referred to shot a whole muster of shooters in the International and then picked out the best 30 and submitted their scores to London as the team representing the

The Great Britain Teams, England. Ireland, Scotland and Wales, will shoot their section of the 1962 International Match at Wellesbourne Aerodrome, Stratford-on-Avon, Warwickshire, England, on Friday, June 22, 1962. Match conditions will be unchanged for 1962, teams of 30 men a side, all scores to count, points system of scoring, 3 and 2. The Australian scores will be required to be in London prior to that date, so it is likely that the next Australian International series will take place well before that date. The venue will be decided by the Executive Committee at its October meeting in Adelaide.

AGENDA ITEMS FOR OCTOBER MEETING. Clubs interested are also again reminded that any items for inclusion on the Agenda of the meeting of the Executive Committee should reach the A.C.T.A. Secretary not later than September 25, 1961.

The meeting will be held in Adelaide, and all items are required to be listed prior to the departure of the Secretary from Melbourne.

1962 CHAMPIONSHIP APPLICA-TIONS. Affiliated clubs desirous of being allocated open championships, that is Commonwealth, State and District Championships, for the 1962 calendar year are again reminded

that written application is required to be made to the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, C.1, on or before September 21, 1961. When applying, clubs should write on a separate sheet and not include other matter or queries with the application. All applications are collated and placed before the Executive Committee at its October meeting. The Committee then make the allocation which is later published in this journal. In all open championships, condi-

tions as laid down in the Official Championship Conditions Brochure should be strictly observed - both in regard to number of targets and cost of nomination fees. Copy of the Championship Conditions was pub-lished in the July issue of this publication so that every registered shooter and club official may have a copy on hand. (Clubs not making written applications for 1962 Open Championships will not be considered when official allocation is being made.)

CARTRIDGES IN GUN. Reports are again filtering through to the A.C.T.A. indicating that some shooters are not taking sufficient care by leaving cartridges in the gun, especially when walking behind the shooting squad from No. 5 track to No. 1 track. As has been emphasised previously, no shooter should be allowed to re-load his gun once having fired on No. 5 track. The No. 5 shooter, if he has used both barrels, should immediately open his gun and proceed to No. 1 at the rear of the squad under the referee's instructions.

If the shooter used only one cartridge on No. 5 track he should immediately remove the remaining shell (if shooting in a double-barrel event; if in a single-barrel event, he should not have two shells in the gun) and walk quietly across to No. 1 after having received the referee's permission. Shooters when proceeding across should also ensure that they make the minimum amount of noise in the process. It is most disconcerting to a shooter concentrating on his target to hear the clatter of "ironmongery" at his immediate rear;

this clatter is particularly applicable when an automatic gun is being used. Every shooter should study each movement in order to ensure absolute safety at all times.

# OUT OF THE PAST

## Twenty Years Ago

On a windy day in September 1941 the late Tom Saville, formerly of Mentone and latterly of the Victorian north-eastern districts, won the main event at Blackburn with the only possible. Second placing was taken by the late L. E. Tewksbury, and third placing by J. T. McArthur. The front-marker award went to John Martin, of Albert Park. John Martin later served with the armed forces abroad and dropped out of shooting on his return. (However, in recent weeks the old flame of interest has been re-kindled and Martin has reregistered with the A.C.T.A. and also registered his young son.) Tewksbury was the outstanding shooter of the day and later won a 10 birder outright and cut another with Jack Bryant and the late Fred Gray. The late Harry Ball won a miss-out off the rear mark.

At a Nobel Club shoot about the same period Geoff. Mason and G. C. Rutledge tied and the latter retired in Mason's favour. The late Lew Bertram, on what must have been one of his last appearances on a shooting track, cut a minor event. Frank Unmack, a one-time secretary of the Coburg Club, won a small event at the Coburg shoot about this period. Main winner at the Coburg fixture was Frank Landells, who cut four events.

## Ten Years Ago

Several clubs which were prominent in 1941 are now non-existent or have linked up with other clubs. Cases in point are at Peak Hill, where R. F. Back of Narromine, N.S.W., won the Western Districts of N.S.W. Singlebarrel Championship about this period of that year. At Gladstone in North Queensland, Mal Johnson of Yarwun (who still shoots occasionally) won the Queensland Double-rise title of 1941 outright. At Yallourn - Morwell Club in Victoria a £25 Handicap was cut by R. Jennings, Roy Glover (Sale), J. Hasthorpe, J. Budge, T. Gleson, L. Bourbaud (Sale), and E. Brinsmead (who now resides just outside Echuca).

At a Show Day shoot conducted by the Australian Club at East Burwood the main event over 45 targets was won by A. Hinneberg of Undera, who shot the possible. The Northern N.S.W. District title shot at Coffs Harbour, N.S.W., was won by George Bell of Young, with the only possible. Reg Akers, present Secretary of the Charleville Club in western Queensland, won the Warrego District Single-barrel Championship from Joe Raleigh, with Tom Akers third. From the South Coast Club in Queensland came a report about this time of an effort by Genge Martin, who, with a crew of several others, took delivery of a new 35-footer power boat in Sydney and pushed it through mighty seas to arrive at Southport Bar a few days later. The report, written by the late Ike Sturgess, a former secretary of the club, reads, "Apart from looking like an old 'salt' when he arrived at Southport, G.S. was otherwise fit." (Do not think G.S. would altogether agree with Ike's report.)

#### Shooting in U.S.A.

(Report from Rex Miles, Association Hon. Vice-President)

It has been pleasing to again receive a report from our friends in the U.S.A. through the Association Hon. Vice-President, Rex Miles. Rex, who is now in his 75th year, has developed a heart condition, with accompanying severe chest pains, and these days he has to take things quietly. In a preliminary note he advised that he shot at the Washington State Shoot at Walla Walla, and, to use his own words, "I shot in both handicaps. I managed the first 50, then I had difficulty in finishing. My wife gave me 'H——' but I thought that I would try it, as it may be the last time at Walla Walla. I shot there first in 1912." Continuing, Miles says, "The boys wouldn't let me quit the Secretary-Treasurer job. I have held the position for 20 years." Miles' report follows:

"We had a very nice State Shoot at Walla Walla last month. Scores were good, but the weather was very hot. Our Lady Champion collapsed from the heat — Ruth Ray, one of the top shooters in the U.S.A. She recovered, and although shakey, broke a 99 x 100 the next day. Won her Championship with a 194 x 200. Arnold Riegger was there, but his doctors won't let him shoot. Arnold has had two throat operations, can't talk at all, I spoke to him, and his

answers he would write on a paper pad. It is pathetic to see such a nice guy laid up.

These are the State Champions:

Singles Champion: Stan Brock 199, Bill Inlow 199. Brock 75 straight to Inlow's 74 x 75 to win.

Doubles Champion:

Elmer Morlan 93 x 50 pairs. Two others had higher scores, but were out of State and not eligible for the Championship. Shooters have to be bona-fide residents to win the titles at State Championship shoots. They can win all purses and added money just like the residents.

All-around Champion: Stan Brock 380 x 400.

Preliminary Handicap: Joe Webster 98 from 21 yds.

State Handicap: Bill Reavis 97 from 19 yds.

June 24th, Preliminary Handicap. My scores were: 21, 25, 20, 19 = 85. June 25th, State Handicap: 23, 24, 20, 17 = 86.

Bill, I didn't think that I would ever break a 25 straight again. As you know, I do very little shooting now. I had a hard time trying to keep up in the 3rd and 4th events on both 100's; this 17 is evidence of that. It's no alibi."

## U.S. Team Wins World's Championship

The United States trapshooting team won the World's Championship at Oslo, Norway, June 11, 12, 13. The three-man A.T.A. team, consisting of Francis Eisenlauer, Col. W. C. Everhart and Dr. G. C. McLaughlin, blasted 585 x 600 of the international targets to win. The Italian team was second with 584, the Russians in third place, 582. The East Germans placed fourth.

In the individual championships completed June 13, Eisenlauer did a valiant job of attempting to defend the world's title he won in Moscow in 1958. He tied with E. Mattarelli

of Italy with 296 x 300 for the world crown, but lost the shoot-off, 24 to Mattarelli's 25.

The team championship was shot over two days, 100 targets each, and the individual championship included these 200 targets plus a third and final day. Just before the team championships started, the representative nations participating in the shoot decided that four-man teams would be fielded, with the highest three scores counting. Eisenlauer, Everhart, McLaughlin and Frank Little, all A.T.A. shooters, represented the United States.

In preliminary days of competition, on June 9-10, gold medals were offered for scores of 94 or higher. Each shooter was eligible to win only one medal on these "Gold Medal Days", and every United States shooter shot well enough to bring one back home with him.

One of the interesting sidelights of the competition, according to Dr. McLaughlin, was the fact that the International shooters did not believe the Americans could accomplish much with their light loads in ammunition. Eisenlauer was the only one shooting 3¾'s. The other five used 3¼ with No. 8 shot on the first load and 7½ in the second barrel. Half the team fired Winchester copper-coated shot and

half used Remington nickel-plated shot. The team also split evenly on the use of automatics and Browning over/unders.

Dr. McLaughlin also reports that he set a different kind of world's record. He let his gun go off in the traphouse before the bird appeared on four of the five days of shooting. The last day it rained all day, and at one point a squad member asked to have the traphouse cleaned of the mud which Dr. McLaughlin had splattered on to it. Each of the four times the good doctor recouped and downed the bird with his second barrel. On the second day of the championship races, the only day Dr. McLaughlin's gun didn't go off, the Russian who was leading the competition (Y. Nikandrob) was shooting next to the doctor. His gun went off into the house unexpectedly, but he didn't get the bird. He never recovered and lost his lead rapidly. Nikandrob had fired a 99 the first day, but he couldn't come close to that again.

#### Hand-Made Guns

By CHARLES FAIRLEY

(in "Shooting Times", Eng.)

Hand-made, machine-made, factory-made; so the various types and qualities of English guns are graded. Manufacturers in each class claim the best results for their methods, which they have developed over many years, and which they would not change at pistol point.

In my view any method can be successful if sufficient use is made of skilled English gunsmiths, that is enough to enable them to put the stamp of their individuality on each gun they handle.

This is the point at which controversy is likely to begin. How much work should be done by the machinist, and how much by the gunsmith?

Cut the machining to the bone for the sake of claiming the "hand-made" label, and output falls to a trickle. The man at the bench will be spending too much time removing large chunks of metal from stampings and forgings, when he should be engaged on the finer points of fitting and assembling. Not only does this insistence on hand labour waste a lot of time and skill, it also tires the workers more quickly and slows them down sooner.

At the other extreme guns can be machined to such a pitch that the services of skilled gunsmiths would be quite superfluous. The tendency is to design a gun to fit the available machines, for the traditional, well-balanced and shapely gun is extremely difficult to produce entirely by mechanical means.

As technical snags are encountered, it is more simple to alter the pattern of the gun so that straightforward operations are possible.

All too often the classic smooth lines of a sweet handling gun vanish, to be replaced by a heavy, clumsy and ugly piece of mechanism, which would be more suited to a cannon. Not only the outsides of machinemade guns are designed for ease of machine operation. All of the "in-

sides", including the locking, cocking, ejecting and safety parts are constructed to the same principles, so that the machines can produce components by the thousands, each one ready for assembly without any hand fitting at all.

In many foreign guns no attempt is made to disguise this fact, and almost all the moving parts are left exactly as they come from the machines, with the machining marks still visible. Some gunsmithing is obviously necessary, even in this class, but the amount is reduced to a minimum.

#### A Happy Medium

The majority of English gunmakers strike a happy medium, and only vary in their methods to suit the size of the firm and the output.

For many years the choice could be freely made as to the amount of hand-work put into each gun, for gunsmiths were available in large numbers. Now the position is very different, and it becomes increasingly obvious that much better use of the remaining skilled men will have to be made if the English gun trade is to continue making guns instead of becoming a repair shop for foreign sums.

Not so very long ago, in Birmingham, a young engineer took an interest in gun work, and set about machining components for the trade. In his small machine shop he did some remarkably accurate work, sometimes processing stampings and forgings to size, sometimes making parts from the bar or rod of steel.

The work he did in no way caused the pattern of guns to be altered, but instead enabled the gunsmiths to get right on with the job of building guns from components nearly machined to size.

What he overlooked was that even his modest plant was capable of turning out enough parts in a few weeks

to last the present gun trade for companies capable of machining gun years. When this fact finally soaked in, he regretfully closed his connection with gun work and turned his attention to other fields.

Not for the Small Man

This episode points to the impossibility of any small producer using machines to compensate for the lack of skilled bench hands. Only in a factory can this be done, where the high productivity of the machine shop can be matched by high output in the gun shops, with both backed up by a good sales service.

It seems, then, that genuine handmade guns will continue to arrive slowly-and somewhat expensivelyfrom the small workshops, but not so slowly from the larger workshops and factories. That is unless a large injection of cash is pumped into the trade to finance the introduction of modern methods.

We have numerous engineering

parts and actions to close limits, but I dread to think what the cost would be if they were asked to supply 100 sets - or even 500! It is the same snag all over again; small quantities of anything today simply do not pay; with the exception of gun-making in the £500 class.

So we fall back on the proposition that the only people who can supply the trade with machined parts are the ones who already have the plant and make them for their own use. In other words, many small "hand-made" gunmakers depend on the "factorymade" gunmakers for their supplies. And that, I may add, includes barrel tubes, too.

The man buying a gun should not be too impressed by the label "handmade", as most English guns could be so described. Insist on seeing a number of guns before choosing, talk to other owners about their guns, and soon the finer points of different makes will become more obvious.



#### Skeet Shooting

A Skeet field shall consist of seven shooting stations arranged on a segment of a circle of 21 yards radius, with a base chord 120 feet 9 inches long, drawn 6 yards from the centre of the circle. The centre of the circle is known as the target crossing point and is marked by a stake.

Station 1 is located at the left end of the base chord, and station 7 at the right end when facing the centre while standing on the periphery of the segment. Stations 2 to 6, inclusive, are located on the periphery at points equidistant from each other: the exact distance between station 1 and 2, 2 and 3, etc., being 26 feet 8% inches. The location of each shooting station shall be accurately designated by a suitable marker, not easily removable, not more than 30 inches high, and so constructed as not to interfere with the free swing of a shooter standing on the shooting station. The marker for shooting stations 1 to 7, inclusive, is on the centre of the side nearest the target crossing point.

Shooting stations 1 to 7, inclusive, are a square area, 3 feet on a side, with two sides parallel to a radius of the circle drawn through the station marker.

One target should emerge from a traphouse (called High House) at a point 3 feet beyond station marker 1 (measured along the base chord extended) and 10 feet above the ground level. The other should emerge from

a traphouse (called Low House) at a point 3 feet beyond station marker 7 (measured along the base chord extended) and 2½ feet from the base chord extended (measured on side of the target crossing point), and 3½ feet above the ground.

The traps are so arranged as to allow a target properly released to pass within a maximum distance 3 feet from a point 15 feet above the target crossing point. The flight path of the target, given calm weather, shall be at least 55 yards and not more than 65 yards. The target must thus reach a point 33-43 yards measured horizontally from the target crossing point.

Suitable markers shall be placed at points 44 yards from both the High House and the Low House to indicate the shooting boundary limit (44 yds.). Similar markers shall be placed at a distance of 55 yards to indicate the minimum flight of a regular target.

The traps are worked by an electrical or mechanical device, which is so placed as to allow the operator to see and hear the competitors.
