The Editor's Notebook



THANKS TO I.C.I.A.N.Z. LIMITED. With the conclusion of the competition at Bankstown, N.S.W., where the A.C.T.A. concluded its annual National Championships series and 16th International Match. it would appear to be fitting that thanks should be publicly expressed to the great assistance and co-operation given the A.C.T.A. and shooters generally by Imperial Chemical In-dustries Australia and New Zealand, Limited. The Company's support to the A.C.T.A. is not only confined to the National Championships, but is continued both to the A.C.T.A. and individual clubs throughout the shooting year. As an instance is the generous support given to the annual Interstate Teams' Match in each State of the Commonwealth. To aid this match the Company each year donates £150 to the A.C.T.A., which is then disbursed to each of the various States after the Interstate Match in the State concerned has been completed. The Company annually donates all the cartridges and clay targets used by the Australian International Team in the International Match, as well as donating the clay targets used by competitors in the annual Champion of Champions Cup. But for these worthy donations, the cost of entries in the A.C.T.A. Annual Championships fixture would necessarily have to be increased. In addition to this great support to the A.C.T.A., the Company is also a regular trophy donor to A.C.T.A. affiliated clubs. For all this cooperation the warmest thanks are extended to I.C.I.A.N.Z. Ltd. and its officers.

26th ANNUAL MEETING OF A.C.T.A. The 26th Annual Meeting of affiliated club delegates of the A.C.T.A. was held in the Club Rooms, Royal Aero Club of New South Wales at Bankstown Aerodrome, on Sunday, March 11, 1962. An attendance of 48, including the President and Secretary, was present. The President, Mr. J. M. Tyquin, was in the Chair.

Those present stood in silence for a period of two minutes in memory of the late Mr. J. Woodrow, who was the South Australian representative on the Executive Committee, and who passed away in mid-February.

Registration Fee. The recommendation of the Executive Committee that its action in raising the registration fee of shooters to 30/- each, as from 1/1/1962, be confirmed, was discussed at length. Ultimately the recommendation was carried by a large majority. The fee for registration of all shooters is now fixed and confirmed at 30/- each per annum club officials are requested to note this point.

Election of Office-bearers. There was only one nomination for the office of President, the retiring official, Mr. J. M. Tyquin. Mr. Tyquin vacated the Chair and the senior Executive Committee member, Mr. W. Rainbird (Launceston) took over.

Mr. Rainbird duly declared Mr. Evans Tyquin elected as President for the ensuing period until the next elections in 1963. Was si

Executive Committee. The election of the remaining members of the Executive Committee then took place. The Queensland members are Messrs. L. S. R. Stewart, R. H. Moyse, and W. A. Gordon; New South Wales, Messrs. D. B. Mott, R. R. Moore, F. R. Hudson and K. Soames; South Australia, Mr. R. Mules; Western Australia, Mr. N. Wells; Tasmania, Messrs. W. E. H. Rainbird and Sperry Marshall. An election was required in Victoria to appoint two members of the Executive Committee. Messrs. W. Rainbird and S. Marshall were appointed scrutineers. After the Victorian delegates had recorded their votes the Chairman announced that Messrs, A. Pedersen and E. G. Biggs had been elected.

The President in his address to delegates stressed his thanks to the Royal Aero Gun Club for the splendid co-operation received throughout the Association shoot. He especially named Messrs. Doug. Kennedy, Mick Smith, Alan Hicks and Phil. Arantz.

1963 NATIONAL CHAMPION-SHIPS AND INTERNATIONAL MATCH. At the Executive Committee meeting which followed the 26th Annual Meeting it was decided that the venue of the 1963 National Championships and 17th International Match would be the South Coast Club's grounds at Southport, Queensland, extending over the period which includes the Queen's Birthday holiday. The exact dates will be announced when the Queen's Birthday holiday is known for 1963. There have been strong representations made to increase the number of shooting days of the fixture in order to cope with the extended programme as submitted to shooters at Bankstown. This factor will be considered by the Executive Committee at its next meeting, set down for Thursday and Friday, October 4 and 5, 1962, in Sydney.

Additional Referee Examiners. The following additional Referee Examiners were appointed: Messrs. J. A.

Evans (N.S.W.G.C., Terry Hills), R. R. Moore (Tamworth), R. G. Morton (Newcastle). Mr. R. Mules was similarly appointed to replace the late Mr. J. Woodrow.

CHANGE IN SKEET RULES. Following many requests from clubs throughout Australia, the Executive Committee has decided to change to the Skeet Rules and Skeet Championship conditions as from June 1, 1962. In future all Skeet Championships will be shot over one round of 25 instead of the previous condition of 50 rounds. In addition it has been decided to adopt the eight-station system. Full details of new Rules and Conditions will appear in the June issue of this publication. Meanwhile clubs conducting Skeet Championships are advised to wait until the changes are formally announced.

CARTRIDGE LOADS. Recently it was brought to the notice of the Association that some shooters were infringing the Association regulations in regard to cartridge loads. It has been advised to the Association that some shooters have been using 12 oz. load of shot. This contravenes Rule 53 of the Association Shooting Rules, which reads, "A competitor shall not use a load of shot greater than one and one-quarter ounce weight, struck measure, nor may a larger size of shot than No. 6 be used." Club officials are requested to ensure that the foregoing Rule is not being broken. With the many makes of cartridges now available on the market, it is quite simple for a shooter to be unaware that his cartridge load is excessive. The International cartridge load is only 13 oz.

SHOOTERS' REGISTRATION. Shooters whose annual Association registration subscription (30/-) remains unpaid will be written off the records as from May 31. It is pointed out to all concerned that registration fees, according to the rules, are required to be paid to the Secretary, A.C.T.A., not later than January 31

in each year. It is acknowledged that not wish to write off any shooter or some clubs which shoot infrequently occasionally find keeping up to this date for payment as a little incon-venient. The Association is always ready to meet any such club, providing the club contacts the Association and advises of its difficulties in this regard. The Association does

shooters, but it is quite unfair to those who obey the rules and pay their fees to find themselves shooting alongside unregistered competitors. Clubs and shooters concerned are requested to give this matter urgent attention in instances where the fees remain unpaid.

A.C.T.A. National **Championships**

AT BANKSTOWN

The A.C.T.A. National Championships and International of 1962 are now history. This year the series was shot on the grounds of the Royal Aero Gun Club at Bankstown Aerodrome (Sydney).

Weather conditions throughout the series could be reasonably described as good shooting weather—light rain fell on one or two occasions, but taken by and large, conditions were not difficult. A slight scare prevailed on the morning of the International Match when light rain and fog were apparent early in the day; however. this later cleared into very easy and splendid conditions.

Proceedings opened on Friday. March 9, at 9.30 a.m., and a start was made with the National Singlebarrel Championship, shot at 50 targets from 16 yards, one cartridge only in the gun. The field was of record proportions. Well over 200 nominated — about 40 over the usual number of competitors for a Friday opening. Some first-class scores were returned, including four possibles of 50 straight (single-barrel) by John Raleigh (Charleville, Q.), Paul Marshall (Hobart, Tas.), John Siede (Cheltenham, V.), and Jack Blake (Cressy, Tas.). The tie shoot went a further ten rounds, with only Raleigh standing up to the strain 'with an unbroken string of 60/60; 'the others finished in the order hamed. The remaining place-getters down to 15th position were: Harry

Immediately the National Singlebarrel title was concluded, a start was made with the shooting of a new event, known as the "Australia-New Zealand Trophy Match". This event was shot at 50 targets, points scoring 3 and 2. Three possibles were carded and, appropriately enough, two of them came from the guns of New Zealand competitors.

The tie shoot, being under points conditions, did not take long to complete, and sure enough one of the outstanding New Zealand shots, Jim McKenzie of Seaward Downs, was returned the winner, 165/165 points. McKenzie is not only a brilliant shot, but he is most talented when it comes to straight gun pointing — he won the Champion of Champions Cup at the National meeting at Southport (Q.) in 1959. Sperry Marshall, the (c) in Tasmanian trapshoter, was runner-up, 164/165 points, with G. Shaw (New Zealand) third, 163/165. Then followed down the prize list to 15th place: Gary Daly (Deniliquin, N.S.W.) 164/165, W. Abbott (Werribee, V.) 163/165, H. Double-barrel Championship, 60 targets, double-barrel (both barrels equal value) from 16 yards. No fewer than 17 competitors gained the possible in a field of 222. This field total was expected to be exceeded after the bright opening on the first day, and it was confidently expected that the long - standing record of 253 at East Burwood (V.) in 1952 would be exceeded. However, this expectation did not eventuate. A slight hold-up with one of the traps slowed down the finalising of

this event, and after several rounds. of the shoot-off had been fired, it was decided, in view of the gathering darkness, that in fairness to all finalists left in, it would be better to seek permission to complete the event on the following day after the completion of the 26th Annual Meet-; ing of the A.C.T.A. Hurried con-ferences were held and ultimately: permission was granted for the re-! sumption of the shoot on Sunday, March 11. It was also decided to stage the Australia-New Zealandⁱ Teams' Match for the Tom Glenn. Cup following the completion of the National Double-barrel event. These two events, plus a £100 Handicap, made for an interesting Sunday shoot. Another important fact concerning the Sunday shoot was that it is reported to be the first occasion, within the city of Sydney area, that Sunday shooting has been, arranged and permitted. The National Double-barrel title eventually went to Ray Hogarth of Southport (Q.), who is captain of the South Coast Club. Hogarth totalled a splendid 145/145 to be a clear winner. Newton Thomas defeated Paul Marshall for second placing, 174/175 to 173/175. The latter's brother. Sperry Marshall, was fourth, 134/ 135, then followed Vic. Eather (Boggabri, N.S.W.) 104/105, F. R. Hudson (St. Ives, N.S.W.) 99/100, K. Robertson (Newcastle, N.S.W.) 99/ 100, J. Headon (Hay, N.S.W.) 94/95, J. W. Raleigh (Korora, N.S.W.) 94/ 95, W. Birkin (Wagga, N.S.W.) 84/85, J. Match conditions for this contest were teams of six men a side, shooting at 20 targets per man from 16 yards. The New Zealand Team was selected before it left New Zealand. The Australian Team was obtained from the six highest scorers in the Australia-New Zealand trophy event on the opening day. After a spirited contest Australia won 117/120 to New Zealand 115/120. The Australian New Zealand 115/120. The Australian Team comprised: S. Marshall 20/20, H. McDiarmid 20/20, Don Scowcroft 20/20, Newton Thomas 20/20, Gary Daly 19/20, and W. Abbott 18/20. The New Zealand team scores were: H. C. Walker 20/20, R. Brown 20/20, G. Shaw 19/20, R. James 19/20, Alan Brown 19/20 and J. McKenzie 18/20. The A.C.T.A. awarded special tra-The A.C.T.A. awarded special tro-phies to the high-gun in each team, and these awards were taken over the first 40 targets in the Champion of Champions Cup on the third day of the series, Monday, March 12, and resulted: Australia, Newton Thomas 60/60; New Zealand, H. C. Walker 58/60. Members of both teams were presented with pocket badges depicting the Kangaroo and Kiwi motif. A £100 Handicop off Association marks concluded proceedings on Sunmarks concluded proceedings on Sun-day, March 11, and this was cut by J. A. Ferguson (Aramac, Q.), A. W. Barnes (Mildura, V.), H. However, on the 66th round Thomas, shooting with great confidence, stopped his target cleanly; Lupp got behind his release with both barrels and recorded the loss which meant that, providing Thomas could maintain his clean score over the remaining five rounds to the 70th round. he was the winner — Thomas duly acclaimed. Lupp was runner-up, 69/70. Third placing went to R. James, a New Zealand visitor, 83/85, whilst fourth and fifth placings were divided by Don Glover (Essendon, V.) and Warren Charlton (Wentworthville, N.S.W.), 82/85.

If You Like Them Fancy

(Report by COLIN SHADBOLT)

For a shooter looking for a slideaction gun, there is nothing on the Australian market comparable with the La Salle. It's cheap, handsome.

The first impressions left by this La Salle gun are pleasure at the handsome stocking and high-grade blueing, and surprise at its light weight.

It is made by Manufrance, or to give them their full title, Manufacture Francaise d'Armes et Cycles de Saint-Etienne. They are a French equivalent of BSA, who also make guns, rifles, motor cycles and pushbikes.

The similarity does not stop there, for BSA also produced something of an innovation in shotguns with their short, racy, wildfowling model, which featured 26-inch barrels and threeinch chambers if so desired.

The La Salle also is produced with 28 and 26-inch barrels, but the shorter barrels are not generally ordered in Australia. The demand here appears to be for 30-inch barrels. The preference for the longer barrels interested me, for it is inconceivable that anyone in this day and age would think that the longer barrel gives more power.

In fact, there is no apparent effects on the performance of the gun until we get under 25 inches. At this point the gun becomes unpleasant to shoot due to the effects of muzzle blast.

In looking over the specifications for single and double guns, and for repeaters of this type, there is a very well-defined pattern through the whole problem of length of barrel. It is not length of barrel which is primarily considered - but the overall length of the gun.

Double guns are three to four inches shorter in the locks than a repeating gun, and some of this length tends to come off in the barrel length of the repeating gun. This gives a gun the advantage of the single sighting plane, but does not sacrifice handling ability because of an over-long weapon, and when being fired, as I don't grip the

To demand long barrels on a slide action gun is completely crazy, as this destroys the one big advantage of the slide action, and that is its speed of fire.

The slide-action gun ranks next to the double gun for speed in delivering that second shot, ahead of the self-loaded at that.

If you are waving 30 inches of barrel around ahead of the much longer action of the slide loader, then it is akin to using a gun with 34 to 36 inches of barrel for ordinary shooting, and will completely destroy the good handling qualities of this very neat outfit.

Extra barrels are available, if desired, to give differing degrees of choke, and the gun has a very simple take-down, by simply unscrewing the magazine tube cap, and sliding off the barrel. Barrels as mentioned come 26, 28, and 284 and are chromelined bores, 36-inch tubes are supplied as cylinder, or modified cylinder, while 28-inch tubes are full or modified choke.

The gun functions well, and is loaded by pressing shells into the magazine, but it is preferable to drop a shell straight into the open breech, close it, and then load a further three shells into the magazine. Although there is no magazine release, the gun can be emptied by pressing up the chromed shell lifter, and pressing on a small spring stud at the mouth of the magazine tube, in which case the cartridges will slip out into the hand, one by one.

Alternately, the action release button can be pressed and the cartridges run through the magazine. For my part, I would prefer to run them out of the magazine, instead of through the action, as it is a lot quieter and certainly less sticky if something did go wrong.

The action is a fast one to operate even among guns of this type.

The action tended to open itself

fore-end tightly, and as the gun re-coiled, I came with it.

In the N.R.A. report where the gun is being fired by a shotgun expert, he noted that "if fired with the hand OFF the fore-end the gun partly opens itself after the shot, especially if pointed upward. This is not observed when gun is fired normally with one hand on the fore-end."

However, I can add this — if the butt of the gun is braced against the shoulder, the slide will tend to open after the gun is fired, purely due to the recoil. If the gun is swung by the barrel and action and fired without any resistance being offered to its free recoil, it stays shut.

The gun has one further feature which will add to its speed of fire in untrained hand, as, unlike the Savage, Stevens and Beretta, pressing the trigger as the action slides shut has no effect on the state of the action, as it still stays cocked, and once the action is locked up, a touch of the trigger and away she goes. This follows the best American pattern, as exemplified in the Remington and Winchester.

There were a couple of points on the debit side, but only by my standards. The trigger, although wide, ran a full $6\frac{1}{2}$ lb., which is a triffe heavy. The gun, weighing about the same as the trigger pull, is a triffe light for some of the heavy $2\frac{3}{4}$ -inch

cartridges, or at least that's what my shoulder told me after about 20 rounds.

However, the number of times anyone will fire 20 to 40 rounds in cold blood at sheets of paper to establish patterns will be few. I would suggest the fitting of a good grade recoil pad if the gun is to be used continually with the heaviest of the 23-inch shot cartridges.

Patterns were quite satisfactory, and when the barrel was labelled full choke, it duly gave a good high percentage, slightly above what I would have normally expected. It appears that this is a consequence of the chrome-lined bore, which deforms shot less than usual because of its high polish.

The gun is a pleasure to shoot, as the stock dimensions are sensibly chosen, but even more so is the attention paid the gun when brought out of its case.

The grain of the wood is most attractive, and the background to the reddish brown grain patterns is so light in colour that it would be as pale as boxwood.

If you like them fancy, well this is it! For the man looking for a slide-action gun, there is no comparable gun with the same features on our market, within striking distance of the price.
