

# The Editor's Notebook



1963 OFFICIAL REFEREE EX-AMINATIONS. Intending candidates for inclusion in the 1963 Official Referee Examination series are reminded that applications for inclusion must be lodged with the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Mel-bourne, C.1, between July 1 and July 31. Late applications, or applications received after Juy 31, will not be accepted or included in the 1963 series.

Intending candidates are requested to lodge name, full initials, plus full postal address, and also indicate the club of which they are a member. Shooters not belonging to an affiliated club, or those who are unregistered for 1963, will not be accepted for inclusion in the examination series.

Candidates are reminded that their names and addresses will be listed on receipt at the A.C.T.A. office. On August 1 candidates will be issued with a free Brochure of A.C.T.A. Shooting Rules. These Rules are required to be given careful study for a period of two weeks. At the expiration of two weeks an examination paper will be issued. The examination paper is required to be completed in front of the shooter's club President without the aid of reference to the Rules Brochure.
Both the candidate and the club
President will be required to sign certificates indicating that no reference to the Rules Brochure or other papers was engaged in during the completion of the paper, and also that the time limit set by the

Executive Committee was adhered to. The time limit set for the completion of the paper is two hours.

NEW ZEALAND DEFEATS AUS-TRALIA. The bi-annual inter-Dominion contest for the Tom Glen Cupthe teams match inaugurated a few years back - between teams of six men representing Australia and New Zealand was shot during the recent New Zealand National Champion-ships programme at Hamilton in the North Island of New Zealand, New Zealand won the 1963 contest by Zealand won the 1963 contest by three targets, 118/120 to 115/120. The Australian Team comprised Messrs. D. B. Mott (Newcastle), Captain; W. Abbott (Werribee, V.), J. McLean (Moree, N.S.W.), I. Willoughby (Kogarah, N.S.W.), L. S. R. Stewart (Cunnamulla, Q.), and F. R. Hudson (St. Ives, N.S.W.). The Australian Team, shooting first, aggregated a total of 115/120. Mott dropped two targets McLean two dropped two targets, McLean two, and Stewart one. The New Zealanders faced up to the trap immediately after the Australians had completed their task, and totalled 118/120. The team scores were:

The New Zealand Gun Clubs' Association kindly donated a trophy for the Australian High-gun. As F. R. Hudson, W. Abbott and I. Willoughby had tied, it was decided to shoot on, miss-out. Willoughby was soon off the track, missing his first target. Hudson and Abbott then shot bird for bird for a further 33 rounds before Abbott got behind his release and missed. It is of interest to note that Willoughby is actually a New Zealander, who has been residing in Australia for over 12 months and shot his way into the Australian Team. The Australian Team was self-selected, in that the six highest Australian scorers in the New Zealand National Double - barrel Championship became the Australian Team. The New Zealand National doublebarrel title is shot over 50 targets, and 13 Australians entered. The Australian scores over the 50 rounds were: Willoughby 48/50, Sep. Stewart 48, W. Abbott 47, J. McLean 46, F. R. Hudson 46, D. B. Mott 45, R. Hogarth 45, W. J. Rutty 44, W. Bligh 44, Fred Lang 43, J. R. Morrison 41, A. Campbell 37, R. G. Bryant did not find The Transport of the Tra finish. The presentation of the Tom Glenn Cup and the high-gun trophy provided a spirited and happy conclusion to a very interesting and now permanent inter-Dominion competition.

The Australians who were fortunate enough to be able to make the trip to New Zealand for the series would like, through these columns, to extend warmest thanks and appreciation for the very cordial reception given to them, plus the unbounded hospitality provided. It is a trip few Australians in the party are likely to ever forget.

1963 AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS. All intending

competitors and referees are informed that the new "Damo" electric traps will be in use throughout the forthcoming National series from June 6 to June 11, and, of particular interest, it should be noted that no pullers will be employed during the shoot. The referees will handle the release of the targets by the use of the instant release button. The Executive Committee has decided on this course of action. The Executive Committee has also decreed that all championships during the series, when tie shoots are required, will be shot "squad system and miss-out" instead of best of five.

HANDICAPPING. In recent months it has been frequently observed that some clubs are merely writing to the Association and stating that such and such a shooter has "shot at three meetings wthout a cut" and requesting that the said shooter be brought forward. This practice is irregular. In future, before any shooter can be brought forward, fullest information must be provided before any notice will be taken of the request, namely the shooter's performances must be stated over the three fixtures concerned. It has come to the Association's notice that some shooters have merely appeared at a shoot and claimed a "performance", others have shot in one event and again claimed a "performance". These are not acceptable and the Handicapping Formula is required to be strictly obeyed, in that a shooter can only be brought forward "providing it can be proved that he is over-handicapped".

OLYMPIC GAMES REPRESEN-TATION IN JAPAN. The question of Australian representation in the 1964 Olympic Games clay pigeon shooting in Japan has been raised by an Executive Committee member. The matter will be discussed by the Executive Committee at its next meeting. It would seem paramount that Australia and Australian shooters have first to be recognised by the Olympic authorities before any suggestion of an Australian Team can be considered.

# "Tips and Tails"

Clayton shooter, J. Glover, is an ardent supporter of the sport of clay target shooting and is always to the fore with suggestions and ideas. Writing recently, he mentioned, "Let me say how much real satisfaction I get

from your very excellent magazine. The various articles, from time to time, are most interesting, especially 'Tips and Tails'. Good luck, carry on the good work."

Gunnedah Club in northern New South Wales, after a long period of recess, has again formed up and recess, has again formed up and has become again affiliated with the A.C.T.A. At the recent election of office-bearers the following were appointed: President, S. Staughton; Secretary, R. Brady, 109 Marquis Street, Gunnedah, N.S.W.; Treasurer, Mrs. R. Brady; Committee, Messrs. L. Smiles, C. Tindal and M. Goodwin.

In an enquiry received by the A.C.T.A. recently a shooter asked what would be the referee's decision in the case of a double discharge, also adding "when the target is missed". The decision is, of course, "No bird". A double discharge is a foul shot and no score can be obtained from such a shot even if the target happened to receive enough shot to break it.

Roz. Lemura has taken over the secretarial duties of the Mossman Gun Club in North Queensland. Lemura's address is Front Street, Mossman, N.Q. He succeeds T. H. Baird in the office of Secretary. Mossman Club is at present in recess, but will shortly be installing an automatic trap.

Clubs and individual shooters are continually applying for break recognition, plus appropriate badge, without submitting the actual score sheets indicating where the break was compiled. All are reminded that no break

badge will be issued unless the necessary score sheets are submitted to the A.C.T.A. to substantiate the break claim. It is also requested that when sheets are submitted that same be clearly marked so that the minimum of checking is necessary. On several occasions recently score sheets have been received without any indicating marks showing. This involves much waste time and delay in posting of the badge.

A further report has been received on the robot pigeon, invented by a Belgian sportsman, for the purpose of endeavouring to bring back to Monte Carlo shooting grounds some of the glamour of the big events which were characteristic of that centre prior to the banning of livebird shooting. It appears the robot pigeon has now been under test and has proved a worthy substitute for those who prefer the live target. The robots are placed in front of huge steel shields. The trapper stands immediately behind the gun, who calls "ready" then "pull". The trapper then presses the button of his hand control, which activates one of the motors indiscriminately. A gentle hum is observed as the motor gathers speed, and this is a reminder to the gun, for the target then leaves the shield in about a second. Overseas opinion is that the robot is the most ingenious mixture of ball trap and live target. The robot actually leaves the trap faster than a live pigeon and generally does about 15 yards in a rising, straight or confusingly undulating flight and then mounts fast into wind with a wide curve. This curve may be lateral or nearly vertical and flight is unpredictable. Opinion, generally, is somewhat reserved, but it has been stated that the robot target is the more difficult target. Many leading English clay pigeon shots are expected to try their hand at the new robot. The prizes offered by the International Sporting Club of Monte Carlo are reported to be quite lavish.

Duelling is unknown in Australia, or is, at least, officially unknown, despite rumours of such actions in the early settlement years of Australia. On this point it is of interest to record that, according to a report

of a writer, David Stone, in "Shooting Times" (England), the last recorded duel in England took place on Wimbledon Common in September 1840. A Lord Cardigan and a Captain Tuckett, a retired officer, faced each other at five a.m. on September 12, 1840. The first shots missed their marks. Fresh pistols were procured, and Captain Tuckett was reported to fall, seriously wounded in the chest. Duelling was a capital offence, and Lord Cardigan was duly tried by his peers, but was acquitted after what was termed a "farcical trial". It is reported that evidence during the trial suggested very strongly that Lord Cardigan had been guilty of the most infamous conduct by using rifled pistols against Tuckett's regulation smooth bore variety.

Many will regret to learn of the passing of Brigadier A. C. Critchley, who died at his Wentworth (England) home a month or so ago. Brigadier Critchley was President of the English Clay Pigeon Shooting Association from 1935 to 1950. He is well remembered for his enthusiasm and interest in introducing clay pigeon shooting as part of the training of air crews during the last World War. Many will recall how clay pigeon shooting training stood many rear gunners in good stead in the hard fighting in the early 1940's.

The Victorian Gun Club, which shoots at Brooklyn, just beyond Footscray on the Geelong Road, advertises details of its forthcoming programmes. # **OUT OF THE PAST**

## Twenty Five Years Ago

L. L. Tibb, shooting under the shooting name of "Drongo" (incidentally the name came from a racehorse who, at one period, was always running second and, as far as is known, never won a race), won the infrequently shot Southern Hemisphere Single - barrel Championship. The occasion was the first time the event had ever been shot, and Victorian shooters of the day were anxious to have their names recorded in the winner's brackets. Jack Bryant was runner-up. (The Southern Hemisphere Double-barrel Championship was revived on the occasion of the trapshooting events conducted by the Perth Gun Club at the Commonwealth Games late in 1962.)

The late Tom Connor completed an unusual double. He was official "puller" for the Nobel Club, but took time off to shoot occasionally. He won the George Taylor Cup, and a week or two previously had won the George Whitworth Cup. Neither cup appears in competition today.

The Tasmanian Gun Club, then using the King's Meadows Shooting Grounds, conducted the 1938 Commonwealth Walk - up Championship.
The event went to veteran "Calrossie" (J. W. Sutherland). "Calrossie", according to the reports of the day, "was undisturbed by the experience of flying Bass Strait for the first time". The contest was the first Commonwealth Championship first Commonwealth Championship ever staged in Tasmania.

# Fifteen Years Ago

The 1948 Club Intermediate Doublebarrel Championship of the Black-burn Club was won by "Apex". This shooter was later Police Inspector Harry Mills. He gained the only possible in the match, 20/20. Bob Meehan was runner-up, 24/25, and Roy Longmore third, 23/25. The club Single-barrel Championship of the Footscray Club was won by A. F.

Burns from Norman Guy and John Bryant Junr. Burns shot 37/40 to win.

The Victorian Single-barrel Championship of 1948 was shot at the Coburg Club. The winner was John Bryant Junr. It was his first championship. Bryant stopped 22/25 to defeat S. McIntyre and Harry Par-sons, who tied with E. G. Biggs and tossed for third place.

# Ten Years Ago

Ian Twyerould won the Singlebarrel Championship of the Frank-ston & Peninsula Gun Club in 1953.

At Tullibigeal (N.S.W.) G. L. Sim won the N.S.W. South Western District Single-barrel title. Sim shot 19/20 to win from W. Cross, 18/20.

At Mangoplah (N.S.W.) the Wag-ga District Double-barrel Championship resulted in a win for the Broken Hill trapshot, W. A. Commons, who had to go to the 60th round, with an unbroken score, to stave off J.

McMaster, 56/60, and W. Ballard (Tumut), 51/55. Fred Hudson, then a front-marker, won the 12/13 yarder trophy at this fixture, 29/30.

The club Double-barrel Championship of the Croydon Club went to Martin Brown, 25/25, from Dave Watson (Doch-en-Doris), 23/25, and W. Bray, 19/20. Frank Emslie won the front-marker award, 18/20.

The Club Cup of the Rockhampton Club in Queensland was won by Doug. Russell, the only competitor to shoot the full complement of 20 straight.

# LIFTING HEAD MEANS MISSED TARGETS

By CLARRIE WILSON

There are many ways of missing a bird, but the one that accounts for the greatest percentage of failures is lifting the head. Unfortunately, it is the most difficult to spot. Ask anyone to break his gun to show you that there is no cartridge in it, and then point it at your eye. You can spot the novice immediately. His eye is away above the barrel. The more experienced gun will make a fair showing, with eye just visible over the rib and looking straight down it. This is a deliberate point which he can repeat accurately over and over again. . . The speed of the gun jerking into the shoulder makes for hit or miss mounting. In some instances the gun is not brought high enough into the shoulder and exaggerated by an involuntary lifting of the head to see the bird more clearly. These two faults produce more missed birds than from any other cause.

Missing a bird in front or behind is common enough, but head lifting is very difficult to detect. I will make



The expert shooter who has learned how to mount his gun correctly will repeatedly bring the gun up to his face at the proper place each time, assuring himself that he will be sighting properly. Result — more dead birds.



One of the most common errors novices make is demonstrated here—that of not getting the head down on the gun. The shooter who places his gun like this has small chance of hitting his bird, and if he does, that's just what it is — chance.

a shrewd guess that the good shot who misses a bird, and does not know why, has lifted his head.

There are three ways in which I can detect this head lifting, though it is by no means easy, and you have to be looking for that particular fault. First, by seeing the shot stream pass over the bird. For this you have to be standing in a certain position relative to the gun and with a dull day for preference. In high sun it is almost impossible to see the shot.

Secondly, by standing behind the gun with my eye level with his gun barrels and following the inclination relative to the target.

Lastly, by taking notice of the position of the butt and the face in dry mounting practice.

It is quite easy to calculate how much killing power is lost by displacing the shot pattern through head lifting. If you assume that there is an effective pattern of 30", then, if the pattern is moved upwards by 15", it will miss the target altogether. As the pattern moves upward, the width of the pattern relative to the target is shortened.



This table shows the amount of pattern displacement relative to the amount that the head is lifted. In fact, if the pattern is displaced by 12", the effective width is reduced to 16" or very nearly half.


The following table shows how much you will be out by lifting the head.

It has been assumed, for ease of calculation, that 30" barrels are being used. Obviously, if anything shorter is used, the error will be greater.

Proper placing of the gun to the face will show the eye just visible over the rib and looking straight down it.



Getting the gun too low on the shoulder and the head not down on the gun will produce this view from the end of the barrel. The result—the pattern will be thrown 24 inches high at 40 yards.

If we accept a 30" pattern, i.e. a radius of 15" and with the head lifted 1", then the shot pattern has missed the target by 33".

Too often we hear how the gun should be brought to the shoulder. This is putting the cart before the horse. What should happen is that the gun should be brought up to the face. It is the face that determines where the shot is going to go. If the stock is correctly positioned in relation to the cheek — the eye is looking straight down the barrel — the shoulder should then come to the butt, and it will do so every time if the cheek-stock relationship is maintained.

Keep your head down, is good advice, but it would be better to say bring your gun up to your head.

As a sequel to Roy Fallshaw's notes concerning the flying cleaning-rod in the "News" for May, I am sending a couple of photographs of yet another scary, one-in-a-million incident. Roy mentioned that he had no wish to be in the vicinity of any further such incidents, so, naturally, the fates took a hand. This time Roy wasn't a by-stander, but the chief participant; he had a cartridge explode in his pocket!

I might have had to send Bozo to retrieve Roy this time. However, I wasn't there, and the first and happiest report is that Roy was not even

slightly damaged.

The exploded shell was one of a pocketful, so this impromptu "experiment" was all set to put on quite a display. Roy had been adjusting a "plus" trap used for skeet and was standing not quite out of range of the throwing arm. When this was released, the tip of the arm just reached his pocket and, by a rare coincidence, contacted a primer, right in the middle.

The result showed pretty conclusively how safe loose ammunition actually is. Under the light restraint of the shell's paper tube, the slowburning, smokeless powder never gets up any head of steam. In this case the crimp did not even fully open; the gas pressure ruptured the paper walls before overcoming the inertia of the shot load. The wads remained in place. The rest of the shells in the pocket were not affected and the only damage was a small hole burnt in the jacket pocket by a lick of flame.

It was probably quite a startling moment for Roy just then, but his nerves are evidently still O.K. He went on to shoot 50 straight skeet, and followed this at our next shoot with an additional 86 straight, unfinished—the finest performance the

club members have seen and a total at this writing of 136 in competition. In fact, one wonders whether . . .? But I don't think I'll try it, just the same. I'm typing this with two fingers, cross-hand!

Dear Bill,

Just a line from "up in the Gulf" area. I arrived here a couple of days before Easter. Had a wonderful plane trip from Brisbane, and the journey out here from Cairns showed that when it rains up in these parts, it sure rains. There were many square miles of water on the properties, and even at the moment many roads are still impassable.

It's wonderful how people manage in the outback, but air transport has helped considerably. Nearly all the stations have air strips, and these

are serviced by T.A.A., A.N.A., and bush pilots. The cost of living, as you might guess, terrific, air freight is pretty expensive, and, for example, bread 3/-, beer 7/6 bottle (mostly Melbourne, too), eggs, fresh fruit and vegetables practically non-existent, and most commodities very dear.

The town is on the Norman River about 40 miles from the mouth and is a rather scattered, outback town surrounded by many thousands of square miles of cattle country. The whole area is, with its great cattle population, in great condition, and just now there are movements of cattle toward rail heads, for market.

A motor vessel brings goods here each month and a rail service comes each week. Most of the lighter goods come by plane. The rail comes from Cairns to Forsagh, then there's a break of 120 miles, on which goods are transported by truck to Croydon and re-loaded there for the 90-mile trip to Normanton. However, everyone seems happy, and at the Anzac Day barbecue the scene was great. The site was by a big lagoon covered with water lilies and the picnic was held under two big tamarind trees, which formed a canopy to shelter 50 or 60 folk from the sun. It was a great day. A couple of 18's helped.

Because of the flooded road position, I have not been very far out of town, but am looking forward to partaking of some of the sport offering up here. Fishing is very good, with Barramundi, jewies, bream, parrot fish, sawfish, stingrays and sharks. For shooting, there's ducks, geese, turkeys, quail, pigeons, as well as pigs, donkeys and, of course, crocodiles. So there's variety.

The weather is marvellous. You could hardly credit the fact that the nights are a "one blanket" job. The days are just warm.

The population, about 800, with three hotels, is about half-coloured, and these are the blackest aborigines I've ever seen. No hope of seeing them on a dark night. They are all under the control of a moderator and are not allowed to drink. Only about half a dozen have a "ticket", which gives them "citizenship". The Aborigines Board arranges for their food and clothing at the store my son manages. The orders he receives

run into hundreds of pounds. He also has charge of the bond stores here, and all, or most, of the liquor for the hotels and stations comes through him.

Well, Bill, this is just a sketch of "way up north" and it's a mighty change from just 12 months ago, when I was, for a week or two of my stay in Melbourne, at Anglesea. There was an oil rig there at the time, and only yesterday, Sunday, the punt here worked all day ferrying about 30 men with trucks and gear, and these are on a boring for oil expedition around here. They expect to be here for about seven months, so with those and some road and bridge building gangs due here soon, the place will be busy.

the place will be busy.

I think I saw where you and your wife were to go on holidays. If so, I hope you had a very happy and restful time. In letters from Melbourne my granddaughter Beverley, Alan Dower's and Jean's daughter, got an American Field Scholarship and goes to U.S.A. in August. She said that her mother is very slowly making the grade after some weeks in hospital last year. A grandson in Sydney graduated with honours in Civil Engineering, so I've had quite a thrill with the young ones doing so well.

I expect you are "up to your eyes" getting ready for Southport. I'd love to be there for just the social side of it, but I think I'll be up here for the winter. I do hope you and, of course, the Association have a really big and successful International and that you and your team receive the kudos due to you for the work you put into it.

# Stirling 12 G AUTOMATIC

(By COLIN SHADBOLT)

The lightweight and excellent handling qualities of the Stirling gas-operated shotgun make it a splendid weapon for use in the field - and it has an extremely fast action.

The first gas-operated machine gun, a colt made under the Browning patents, appeared in 1889. True, the Maxim gun patents were taken out in 1883, but this was to cover the recoil-operated machine gun known to the

recoil-operated machine gun known to the British as the Vickers.

Modern weapons like the Brench machine gun and gas-operated shotguns like the one under review are based, however, on the invention of an Austrian, Baron Von Odkolek His ideas and Browning's appeared almost simultaneously. This Austrian invention grew that the Matabilian later developed by the into the Hotchkiss, later developed by the Japanese into a gun called the "wood-

The introduction of a gas-operated shotgun indicates that the weapon has now come of age. Due to a tremendous variety of cartridges being made, the blow-back system is beginning to be deserted, as its successful operation depends on a balance between the power of the cartridge and the breech block and springs controlling its backward move-

With very heavily loaded cartridges like the new 24 inch Magnums, guns adapted to the standard 24 inch had to have some additional breaking system achieved by turning the "recoil ring". Otherwise they tended to slowly batter themselves to bits. Alternatively, if the cartridge did not develop its full ballistics the gun would only partially open and then thrust the fired shell back into the chamber. This could be embarrassing.

The value of the gas-operated gun is that The value of the gas-operated gun is that it will handle virtually anything you care to put into it. Furthermore, it is "soft" on the shoulder, and remarkably fast; a spot of fiddling with the trigger mechanism — by removal of a couple of essential bits to the operation of the interruptor mechanism—will give two shots so close on one another that they sound like a continued long report. Indeed, one of the problems of rifles using this system has been that rifle gases are under high pressure and so it tends to operate too fast.

The Stirling uses a modified and refined system first invented in the 30's by an American called White. In the Stirling adaption the gas passes down through a hole in the barrel into the gas chamber and then drives a hollow cylinder backwards towards the chamber. As soon as the piston moves, it shuts off the barrel port and then moves a little further to open the barrel port again, and in the next instant of travel, the face of the piston moves back and opens the exhaust port.

Since shotguns use a very quick burning since snoughts use a very quite statum, powder compared to rifles, and further chamber pressures are only a fraction of comparable rifles, the gas port can be placed much closer to the chamber than in a rifle. It gives a very neat appearance without the long cylinder projecting out in front of the sporting length fore-end,

The Stirling has one refinement not found on rifles, a two-position adjustable gas port, which reduces the amount of gas able to vent itself, reducing the thrust on the piston. This

is of special interest to the citizen who does not wish to burn "hot" cartridges for all his shooting and is satisfied with the lower ballistics of some of the cheaper grades of cartridges on the market.

I checked the gun with some 2½ inch shells

and it functioned as readily with these as with the hotter Super Speed loads in 24 inch. I did not fire the 21 inch Magnum cartridge, but I would expect it to function as readily with the 1½ ounce load as with the 1½ ounce load of the 2½ inch standard velocity cart-

ridge.

To my way of thinking after shooting it, and taking it to bits to see what makes it tick, the gas piston acts exactly as would a pull on a slide action fore-end. There are all sorts of little games that I could play with this weapon, but the basic story is simple. This is a slide action La Salle, with the gas of the charge providing the initial thrust back against the action to open it. Once the case starts to come away, the block continues the movement exactly in the same way that the slide action La Salle appears to unlock

the slide action La Salle appears to unlock itself, once it has fired.

The cartridge fires with the gun locked up like a bank vault. After the shot charge is well down the barrel, the gas vents against the cylinder, just enough to actuate the unlocking mechanism. As soon as the gun starts to unlock, the gas flow is cut off. Pressure drops in the harrel as the charge gets close to the muzzle, the pressure against the side to the muzzle, the pressure against the side walls of the case drops, the case is free to move back and does. The gun flips out the empty, and as the action is pushed forward again under the springs that drive the block forward, it re-loads and re-cocks ready for the next shot. A very prettily balanced operation.

Now to get back to the weapon itself. Checked on the pattern board, with the star crimp cases, the chrome-lined bore gave very even patterns. The full choke model appears to give a very even centre, throwing a solid cluster of shot which should leave anything squarely hit little chance of escape. Some squarely hit little chance of escape. Some of the shot in a couple of number twos which were fired out of curiosity appeared badly deformed and did not get into the main pattern at all. The balance of the shot just ripped the centre out of the white paper used, and made a count of the percentage a futile business. With sixes, it was a lot easier, but it would appear that when these boys call a it would appear that when these boys call a gun a full choke, it delivers just about the full charge inside the full choke circle at 30 yards with the exception of a few deformed

Some idea of what the gun will do in expert hands comes with Mal Fuller using it himself and putting up a couple of 100 first barrels. At Skeet with the full choke model he put up a break of 49 straight, and this is as good as even the most critical person might ask. It pays tribute to the balance and pointing ability of the gun, as well as the competency of the firer.

The gun is particularly versatile for either competition or field use because of the ease

with which barrels may be changed from the long full choke barrel of 28 inches, back to the quarter and half choke barrels of 26

The model tested had a chrome-lined barrel and a superbly ventilated rib. The agents sell this model in Autralia at £68/10/0 and a plain model at £56/10/0. Due to the use of an anodised receiver in lightweight alloy, the whole gun weight under 7 lb. In the model tested, the weight was 6 lb. 10 ozs., but I would expect a slight variation from gun of a couple of ounces.

Trigger pull was reasonably short after a short initial take-up. Although crisp enough, it came out at a full eight pounds.

I was partcularly interested in the strength of these guns, as the French Proof laws have certain oddities about them, but it would appear both this gas-operated weapon and the slide-operated La Salle undergo the same proof charges.

The final proofing is set at 1200 kgs. per sq. cm., and this indicates a proofing a little better than 17,000 psi. It is somewhat foolhardy to try and equate pressures, but setting this about the 7½ ton mark, then when we come back and consider the maximum pressure set up by a cartridge at its maximum figure—usually about an inch to an inch and a half from the breech — then cartridges a hair from the preech — then cartridges which put up 3½ tons are regarded as being excessive and those at 4 tons as dangerous. It will be appreciated from the foregoing that these guns have an adequate safety

margin.

The take-down is delightfully simple and the gun can be field-stripped in a few moments without the need for tools. The cap at the end of the fore-end unscrews, and with the action open, the barrel pulls straight forward and then the fore-end, leaving all the work-ing bits exposed for cleaning.

The stocking, as is common to all these guns, is good. A reasonable grade of French walnut is used, with a simple but interesting enough figure to life it out of the plank class. The pistol grip is suitable for both trap and field work, being reasonably sharply curved heid work, being reasonably shatply curven as demanded by so many shooters who use the one gun for trap and field work. The chequering at both fore-end and pistol grip is fancy enough and fine enough to provide the dual functions of usefulness and ornament, while the butt plate is grooved to give a non-slip surface on the shooting coat or

The safety is a large cross-bolt behind the The safety is a large cross-boil behind the trigger with a deep ring of red exposed when pushed across to the left. This means the gun is in the firing position. Loading is simple. The usual stud on the right side of the action body or receiver is pressed in and then two shells pressed home. To load three, one in the action, pressed nome, 10 load three, pull back on the cocking handle and drop one in the action, press the stud and it slams shut, chambering the round without any fuss whatever. Then press in the stud again and feed the other two rounds into the magazine,

This would be one of the most convenient guns I have encountered to use as a single guins I have encountered to use as a single loader. By and large, it appears to me as simple and as foolproof as can be hoped for. Anyone possessed of the most rudimentary knowledge can operate and look after this gun—and it is strongly made to give years of trouble-free service, even without considering the year's guarantee that comes with it.

Ing the years guarantee that comes with it.

In conclusion, this gun would appear to come close to the perfect field gun, being of light weight, of excellent handling characteristics. Although the action is extremely fast,

it does not appear to have the same recoil on firing as the normal gun. It is a handsome outfit with its well-shaped fore-end and pistol grip stock, and the light French walnut shows to advantage against the deep lustrous blue of the metal work.


