A.C.T.A. NATIONAL CHAMPION-SHIPS and INTERNATIONAL, 1964. Shooters and all interested are reminded that the A.C.T.A. National Championship series and International Match will take place on the Bolivar Grounds of the South Australian Gun Club (Adelaide) from March 5 to March 10. Those requiring accommodation, and who have not already booked, may have some difficulty, at this late stage, in securing the type of suitable accommodation required. However, by contacting the T.A.A. Travel Adviser, Miss Dorothy Dowl-ing, in Adelaide, it seems almost certain that those in difficulty in this regard will be assisted. The shoot will start on Thursday, March 5, when the National Double-barrel Championship will be decided. The reason for the shooting of the doublebarrel event first is to enable shooters who may not have had a great deal of practice over recent months to become acclimatised to big matches so that they can follow up with more assured confidence in the National single - barrel contest the following day. The Australia - New Zealand Trophy match will be shot under points scoring, 3 and 2, on the following day, together with the National Double-rise title. The Australian section of the International Match will be shot on Monday, March 9, and the Australian complement will comprise the 30 highest aggregate scorers in the National double-barrel, singlebarrel titles and the Australia - New Zealand Trophy points scoring event. Every member of the Australian Team will receive the much coveted "International 1964" Badge. Also the

three high-guns (first, second and third) will receive trophies in commemoration of their effort. The 15th Grand Australian Handicap will follow the International Match. This match has been allotted a total of £550 cash. The popular Champion of Champions Cup will conclude official proceedings on the fifth day, Tuesday, March 10. The Champion of Champions Cup was the original contest of the tournament when the Association first staged a shoot more than 25 years ago. The inaugural winner was H. G. ("Duxbac") James. Shooters are reminded that £100 handicaps will be interspersed throughout the programme, whenever a convenient opportunity arises.

The annual meeting of the A.C.T.A. will be held on Sunday, March 8, at Tower House, Beaumont, just three miles from the centre of Adelaide city.

SHOOTING POSITION. Many enquiries have been received at the A.C.T.A. headquarters regarding the shooting position or standing position of a shooter when on the mark. It appears that many referees have only a very hazy knowledge of requirements in this connection. Rule No. 7 reads, "When firing, the competitor's feet must be behind the firing mark assigned to him, and he must stand with both feet within eighteen (18) inches on either side of the centre of this mark. Should the competitor fail to observe the above Rule a 'lost' target will be declared." From the Rule as printed it should be understood that a shooter when standing up to his mark to shoot must observe

that his front foot toes, but does not go over, the line representing his shooting mark. His rear foot may be placed in any position desired by the competitor, providing, of course, that he does not place it in such a position as to gain yardage advantage. From reports received, it seems that some referees have been objecting to a shooter having his "rear" foot too far back; in fact, back over the yardage line of the yard at his rear. There is nothing in the Rules to say that a shooter cannot have his foot back as far as he prefers, and referees have not the power to order a shooter to bring his "rear" foot forward. Some shooters find it more comfortable to stand with their legs positioned with the rear leg well back - they are quite within their rights in so shooting if they desire it, and a referee is exceeding his duty in insisting otherwise.

SLOW PULL. The referee is the arbitrator of a "slow" or "fast" pull. Some shooters seem to think that they can decide such a situation on their own individual initiative. Such is not the case. The referee must be alert at all times, particularly to "fast" and "slow" pulls and it is his duty to decide on these points. Rule No. 31 instructs that "'No target" shall be declared when a trap is sprung at a material interval of time before or after the call of 'Pull'." However, the shooter does not decide this point—the referee, as already stated, is the arbitrator and is the responsible official to decide whether a slow or fast pull has occurred.

BREAK BADGES. Some club secretaries are continuing to send in requests for break badges on behalf of shooters without submitting the necessary score sheets in confirmation of the break. All are reminded that break badge claims cannot be accepted unless such claims are substantiated by accompanying score sheets. It has been long-established practice that score sheets must accompany any break claim and it seems surprising that many still do not seem to appreciate the correct "drill" in this regard. Another important point concerning the submission of score sheets to the A.C.T.A. is the

fact that some clubs simply bundle up the score sheets, without showing any identification marks and then expect the Association office to unravel where the break took place. It takes very little time on the spot to underline the actual section of the break, and clubs are requested to carry this out in future. Carelessly submitted sheets will in future be returned to the clubs for proper break identification. All clubs are also again reminded that a shooter's break ends immediately he shoots in other than double or single-barrel down-the-line events.

HANDICAP RETURNS. In many recent handicap return forms for-warded to the A.C.T.A., club officials submitting the returns have failed to complete the column in the return which is headed "Amount won-Cash or Trophy Value". Clubs are reminded that it is absolutely essential that this column should be completed. As the present Handicapping Formula is now based on "amount won. or equivalent trophy value won", a handicap return forwarded which fails to have the particular column referred to fully completed is, more or less, useless. Clubs are informed that as from February 1, returns submitted which do not have this column completed will be returned for further attention.

1964 REGISTRATION FEES. Some shooters have apparently overlooked the fact that registration fees for the 1964 year are due immediately after January 1 and should be paid, in accordance with the regulations, not later than January 31. Those who have failed to comply with these conditions are reminded that those who remain unpaid as from March 1 will be struck off the list of registered shooters and will also have their names removed from the mailing list of this publication. Outstanding fees (30/-) should be remitted to the Secretary, A.C.T.A., Box 2038 S, G.P.O., Melbourne, with-out further delay. Clubs which have not yet remitted the club affiliation fee (£5) are also reminded that this became due on January 1.

FORWARD MOVEMENT. As is now generally known, every shooter. on payment of his 1964 registration fee (30/-), comes forward 1 yard on handicap as at December 31. This concession, however, does not become available until the shooter's 1964 registration has been paid and he is issued with his 1964 registration and handicap card. Some appear to think that the forward movement is available regardless of whether 1964 registration has been paid. Such assumption is incorrect. In fact, the adjustment in handicap does not apply until the fee is at the A.C.T.A. office and a 1964 card issued to the shooter.

Meeting of club delegates and representatives will be held at Tower House, Beaumont Common, Beaumont, South Australia, on Sunday, March 8, 1964, commencing at 9.30 a.m. sharp. Only accredited delegates of unincorporated clubs and representatives of incorporated clubs are entitled to attend, take part in the meeting and vote on appropriate questions as same arise. Regulation forms for delegate appointment of unincorporated clubs may be obtained from the A.C.T.A. Secretary, All interested are advised that the caterers at the shooting grounds will have location maps which will be made available for all those attending the meeting and who may not be conversant with the Beaumont district of Adelaide. Actually the meeting centre is only three miles from the centre of the city.

and accurately as a prime qualification for using a gun; but, in fact, these things are undoubtedly not so.

The beginner can build up his distance-judging ability in two ways. He should find out by measurement what is the length of his average pace. He should then, on his walks, frequently estimate, and then proceed to check, the distance of various objects that lie in his path. This is amusing as well as good practice. Heights are more difficult. A well-

Heights are more difficult. A wellgrown hedge of fair height may be 25 yards; a church spire may be 30; a local factory chimney may be 35. These things can usually be checked and advantageously studied. Again, the width of the muzzle-end of the barrels of a 12-bore gun at 40 inches from the eye covers about 30 inches at 20 yards. With this knowledge, and a little rule-of-three figuring, some useful range-finding can be done. PARKES GUN CLUB

In the past, frequent references have been made to shooters incorrectly addressing mail matter to the A.C.T.A. A northern New South Wales shooter has submitted a few details of the informal type of mail matter he has received over the years. The shooter, apparently one engaged in the hairdressing business, mentions: The writers usually show the name on the mail matter and then follow with the varied assortments and adornments of "Hair-dresser and Pigeon Shooter", "Hair Messer", "Shearing Contractor and Pest Exterminator". These have caused many laughs at the shooter's club.

Most readers will recall the disastrous earthquake which almost destroyed the city of Skopje in Yugo-Slavia last year. An interesting comment has come from London concerning the behaviour of birds directly before the Skopje disaster. It is understood that just before the earthquake all the birds in the area vanished, including pigeons from the streets. Mass bird migration just before some previous big earthquakes has been noticed. The question seems to be whether the build-up of small tremors is detected by the sensitive senses of the birds and acts as a warning of something serious at hand, or whether a build - up in electrical pressure acts as a similar warning. Birds are known to react to the heavy atmosphere of an approaching thunderstorm as do cattle. sheep and horses.

So successful has night shooting proved to be at Townsville in North Queensland that the Townsville Gun Club has decided to light up another one of its traps to cater for the increased night patronage. The wet season is now on in the Townsville area, and one of the greatest hazards to night shooters there is the alarming myriads of mosquitoes and other hazardous tropical insects which infest the area. Townsville is now a green pasture area - in marked contrast to many areas in the southern States. The recent rains at Townsville have attracted a fair number of ducks, blackies and whistlers and magpie geese. These birds frequent the swamp in front of the club's shooting grounds and, strange as it may seem, appear to take very little notice of the clay target shooting.

EXTRACTS FROM THE WRITINGS OF THE LATE W. P. GROSVENOR

(To A.C.T.A. Secretary in mid-1940's)

What modern men can do, I do not know, but I had the luck to see those three great professors, Arie, Troeh and Wright, all shooting together, and, believe me, it was something to see.

It was they and Forest McNair that my wife had to thank for the improvement she made during their visit to England in 1920. They took her in hand, put her in all their practice squads with them and taught her the great fundamental of "TIME". In those far-off days we did a lot of practising on the private shooting ground we had down here. My wife was never able to get her 100 straight but did several 98/100's when practising and would often get a 95 or 96, but not being in actual competition, such scores do not have much value.

When a trap is throwing a bit flatter than usual or the wind from behind is putting the targets down quickly it is a good tip to set the gun butt an inch higher on the shoulder to prevent over-shooting. This is a good tip which might be helpful to your Australian shooters when this particular condition obtains.

Your magazine is a very ambitious effort and much in advance of anything over here in England (referring to the October 1947 issue). When our postman arrived it caused a regular upheaval in our home. I got beaten by my wife by about a foot, and she steadfastly refused to hand over. From her "Ahs" and "Ohs" and chuckles, it appeared to be of the greatest interest. When at long last I was able to cast my eyes on it I read and re-read it from cover to cover.

I have had some weird guns at different times. One was a lever "Winchester" 10 bore repeater gun that I used for wildfowling as a young man. It has not been manufactured these many years and there are now few in existence, in England at any rate.

OUT OF THE PAST Twenty Five Years Ago

Towards the end of 1938 the late world champion trapshot, Donald Mackintosh, presented the now famed Mackintosh Trophy for International competition. The trophy, valued at that time at 100 guineas, was donated with the request that it be offered for competition between teams representative of England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales and Australia. The Trophy has had a distinguished history. It was one of the original collection of magnificent trophies won by the late sportsman in his many years of trapshooting abroad. In fact, it can be stated that the presentation of the trophy for International competition was one of the basic reasons for Australia being included in International events.

At the A.C.P.T.S.A. (now A.C.T.A.) general meeting of the period H. G. James, now proprietor of Donald Mackintosh Pty. Ltd. in Melbourne, was re-elected unopposed as President. The Executive Committee of the day comprised the late A. P. Cooke, J. Sans, R. W. Delaney, G. C. Rutledge (now of Brisbane) and the late G. H. Watts. An interesting comment is made in the press of the period under review, and this refers to the visit of "16-year-old R. Mules, a member of the Metropolitan Gun Club in Adelaide, to the Murray Bridge Club for the club's main championship, in which he ran out winner". (Mules is now the S.A. member of the Executive Committee of the A.C.T.A.)

Fifteen Years Ago

Fred Burns was very much in the limelight in March 1949 when he won the Champion of Champions Cup (regarded as the Australian National Championship of the day) at East Burwood. The event was then shot at 60 targets and Burns grassed 59/60 (heavily dusting his 57th release) to win from Jack McCraith (whose son Don is now a regular shooter), 58/60. H. R. Donelly, then of Wangaratta, W. Arnold (Colac) and E. G. Biggs tied for third place, each 57/60. Arnold missed his second release in the tie shoot and took fifth placing. Donelly and Biggs shot on to the 69th round and then decided to toss for third placing. Donelly called correctly. Each had carded 66/69.

Dick Redpath of the Hobart Club gained the Australian high-gun honours in the Australian section of the International Match. Redpath recorded the excellent score of 98/100, defeating the unlucky Jack McCraith for the honour. McCraith carded 96/100. An interesting sidelight to Redpath's success is the fact that he had to rush out to East Burwood (V.) without any breakfast, to take part in a tie shoot to decide the final three places in the Australian Team. He not only gained his position in the team, but continued on to gain the much coveted high-gun honours.

Ten Years Ago

The National Championships series was held at East Burwood grounds of the Australian Gun Club in March 1954. Of interest at the time was an expedition of Western Australian shooters who journeyed across the Nullabor Plain by car in order to take part. The party was reported to have left Perth in mid-February 1954 in order to reach Melbourne in time.

The South Burnett Club at Kingaroy was formed early in 1954. However, it was not then known as the South Burnett Club, but came into official being on amalgamation with the Nanango Club. THE PREMIER CLAY SHOOTS OF THE YEAR

Clay Target Shooting Rules

Effective from 1st January, 1964

COMPETITION.

Rule No. 1.—Wheresoever the word "competition" may be used in the following rules, it is to be understood to refer to each particular event, and must at all times be so construed by the management, in whose charge the carrying out of such "competition" has been entrusted.

THE MANAGEMENT.

Rule No. 2. — The management of any club holding a tournament, or other competition, under these rules has the authority to reject any entry in the said tournament, or other competition, without giving any reason therefore, and to disqualify in whole or in part, any competitor who acts in an ungentlemanly or disorderly manner, or who handles his gun dangerously.

COMPETITOR.

Rule No. 3. — A competitor is one who has nominated for the particular competition and whose name appears on the official score sheet or score board.

Rule No. 4.—A competitor must be at the firing point within two minutes after having been called by the official referee, scorer or a member of the club management. Failing therein, he may be disqualified or be penalised with loss of targets.

Rule No. 5. — A competitor shall hold his gun in a position of safety, with breech open at all times.

Rule No. 6. — When at the firing point ready for competition, the competitor shall distinctly give the command, "Pull", to the puller, and thereafter the competitor is in the competition.

Rule No. 7. — When firing, the competitor's feet must be behind the firing mark assigned to him, and he must stand with both feet within eighteen (18) inches on either side of the centre of this mark. Should

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the competitor fail to observe the above rule, a "lost target" will be declared.

Rule No. 8. — Shooting on the grounds at any place other than the firing point at legitimate targets only is prohibited except where a pattern plate is installed.

Rule No. 9. — No competitor shall make, negotiate or discuss any bet (either on his own shooting or that of any other competitor) while he is at the firing point or shooting tracks, nor shall he leave the firing point or shooting tracks for the purpose of making, negotiating or discussing any bet. If any competitor infringes this rule, he may be disqualified by the referee.

Rule No. 10. — A competitor shall close his gun only when at the firing point and facing the traps. He must remove the cartridge or cartridges from his gun before turning from the firing point on No. 5 track and proceeding to No. 1 track. The cartridge or cartridges must be removed from any magazine gun between each track.

Rule No. 11. — It shall be the responsibility of the competitor to check his score with the score sheet before leaving the shooting track. Any protest on his score must be lodged with the referee immediately, i.e. before leaving the shooting track. Such protest can only be made against incorrect score.

Rule No. 12. — All such protests must be confirmed in writing within 15 minutes, accompanied by £1 forfeit.

Rule No. 13. — A competitor is duly notified to compete when his name is called out by a referee, scorer or other person authorised to do so by the management, or when his name appears on the score board. If a "squad hustler" is furnished, it is a matter of courtesy only, and does not in the least relieve the competitor from responsibility. It is the duty of each and every competitor to be promptly on hand to compete when called upon to do so.

THE REFEREE.

Rule No. 14. — The Referee's decisicn in all cases coming under his jurisdiction as set forth in these rules, shall be final.

Rule No. 15. — Besides attending to the special duties as set forth in these rules, the Referee shall adjudicate the competition. He shall DIS-TINCTLY and LOUDLY announce the result of each shot by calling out "Kill" when the target is broken and "Lost" when the target is unbroken. He shall decide all other issues which arise in relation to the direct competition.

Rule No. 16. — If the Referee is negligent or inefficient, impairing thereby the equity of the competition, the management may forthwith remove him. This rule applies also to scorers, pullers, trappers and any other of the staff.

Rule No. 17. — The Referee is empowered to challenge the ammunition used by any competitor.

Rule No. 18. — The Referee shall insist that no competitor is permitted to shoot from other than his allotted handicap.

Rule No. 19. — The Referee has power to alter his decision.

Rule No. 20. — All members of a squad shall automatically change lanes as soon as the next shooter has shot and not wait until all shooters have shot. The members of any squad shall remain at the firing point until the last shot of the squad is fired.

THE SCORER.

Rule No. 21. — The Scorer shall keep an accurate record of each shot. Accordingly, the Referee call "Kill", or "Lost". He shall mark the figure 1 for "Kill" and 0 for "Lost".

Rule No. 22. — The Puller shall pull the trap, or traps, instantly in response to the competitor's call of "Pull".

Rule No. 23.. — The Puller shall have an unobstructed view of the competitors at the firing points.

BROKEN TARGET.

Rule No. 24. — A "broken target" (kill) is one which has at least a visible piece or pieces, or the centre section, broken from it, or which is completely reduced to dust, or which has a visible section broken from it, even though such section is broken into dust by the competitor's shot while in the air.

Rule No. 25.—A "dusted target" is one from which more or less dust is detached by the competitor's shot, but which shows no visible diminution in size therefrom. A dusted target is not a broken target, and is a "Lost" target.

Rule No. 26. — A competitor in double target shooting must break both targets to score and the score shall be shown as 1 point.

BAULK.

Rule No. 27. — Any extraneous occurrence which, in the opinion of the Referee, materially interferes with the equity of the competitor after he calls, "Pull", constitutes a baulk. Only the competitor directly interested can claim a baulk, which, if allowed by the referee, restores him another target.

Rule No. 28. — In double-barrel shooting, jarring back denotes that from the concussion of the first shot the safety has been slipped back to "safe". Whatever may be the cause of slipping the safety back to "safe", the competitor must abide by the result.

Rule No. 29. — Simultaneous discharge is one wherein, from any cause, both barrels are discharged together or nearly together, and shall be declared "No target".

NO TARGET.

Rule No. 30. — After a referee declares a "no target" it is thereafter no part of the competition, and is irrelevant to it.

Rule No. 31. — "No target" shall be declared when a trap is sprung at a material interval of time before or after the call of "Pull".

Rule No. 32. — "No target" shall be declared when the trap is sprung without the call of "Pull". Rule No. 33. — "No target" shall be declared when, in single-target shooting, two targets are thrown at the same time.

Rule No. 34. — "No target" shall be declared when the target is thrown at a widely different angle (see diagram).

Rule No. 35. — "No target" shall be declared when a competitor shoots out of turn, or from the wrong track.

Rule No. 36. — "No target" shall be declared when two competitors, or when a competitor and a noncompetitor, shoot at the same target.

Rule No. 37.—"No target" shall be declared when there is a misfire, in either barrel, caused by the competitor's gun, or a misfire of the cartridge, due to no neglect on the shooter's part.

Rule No. 38. — In the event of a misfire with the second barrel, the competitor must fire a live cartridge in the general direction of the target, and is permitted to score with the second barrel only.

Rule No. 39. — "No target" shall be declared (whether shot at or not) a broken target is thrown.

LOST TARGET.

Rule No. 40.—"Lost target" shall be declared when the competitor fails to break the target.

Rule No. 41. — "Lost target" shall be declared when the competitor fails to shoot because his gun was unloaded or uncocked, or because the safety was faultily adjusted or jarred back, whether from his own oversight or not, or because of any other cause chargeable to his own oversight or neglect.

Rule No. 42.—A competitor having a misfire or apparent misfire, will, forthwith call the referee for his decision, otherwise the referee shall declare it a "lost" target. The competitor must not turn around, must not open his gun, and must keep his gun pointing in the direction of the traps.

Rule No. 43. — "Lost target" shall be declared if a cartridge after it has once misfired in the competition, or a gun after it has twice misfired in the competition, is used by the competitor.

Rule No. 44. — "Lost target" shall be declared if in single-barrel shoot-

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ing the competitor loads two cartridges. (A competitor is only allowed to load one cartridge and is not permitted to load an empty shell or dummy cartridge.)

Rule No. 45. — "Lost target" shall be declared if a competitor shoots from his wrong handicap mark.

CHALLENGE AND PROTEST.

Rule No. 46. - A competitor may challenge the load of any other competitor, such load shall not be greater than one and one-ouarter ounce weight of shot struck measures nor larger in size than No. 6 (English). On receipt of a written challenge. with £1 forfeit, the management shall obtain a cartridge from the challengee, and if, after public examination of it, the management finds the challengee has violated the above requirements, he may be disqualified or not, accordingly as the offence was wilfully committed or otherwise. In case the challengee is wholly innocent, the forfeit shall be paid to him, otherwise it shall be returned to the challenger. The management of any club, or of any tournament, has the power to examine any competitor's cartridges at their discretion, without involving themselves in any penalty.

OFFICIAL SCORE.

Rule No. 47.— The official score must be kept on a score sheet and be available for inspection by the competitor.

Rule No. 48. — Every competitor in a squad shall be permitted to examine his score sheet before the score sheet is sent to the Secretary's Office. The individual scores shall be totalled before being placed on the score boards.

WIDELY DIFFERENT ANGLE.

Rule No. 49. — When a target is thrown either way outside the prescribed limit of the angles, height and distance in single target shooting, it shall be deemed to be thrown at a widely different angle and "No target" shall be declared.

MAGAZINE GUN.

Rule No. 50. — The term "magazine gun" applies alike to automatic guns, pump guns (so called) and other guns not directly dependent on hand loading and are permissible for clay target shooting.

SHOOTING FOR TARGETS ONLY.

Rule No. 51.-Shooting for targets only, is a term which shall be held to define the status of a competitor in any given event, or events, or in an entire tournament programme, and shall signify that a competitor who is "shooting for targets only" has no interest in any trophy, or trophies (unless he is entitled to do so by a specific announcement in the programme), nor any interest in any money, or moneys, the division of which depends on the scores made in said event, or events, or in the entire programme. "Shooting for targets only" shall not be allowed at open shoots or by any shooter who has attained the mark of 14 yards.

GUNS AND LOADS.

Rule No. 52. — A competitor shall not use a gun whose bore is LARGER than a twelve gauge.

Rule No. 53. — A competitor shall not use a load of shot greater than one and one-quarter ounce weight, struck measure, nor may a larger size of shot than No. 6 be used.

TARGETS, TRAPS, FLIGHTS, AND ANGLES, PITS AND SCREENS, FIRING POINTS.

Rule No. 54. — No target shall measure more than four and fivesixteenths $(4\frac{4}{16})$ inches in diameter, nor more than one and one-eighth $(1\frac{1}{2})$ inches in height.

Rule No. 55. — An automatic trap must be used at all open shoots.

SERGEANT SYSTEM.

Rule No. 56. — Five single traps, four feet apart, constitute the Sergeant System. The targets are thrown from unknown traps, at unknown angles. Maximum throw of traps to be 55 yards, minimum 30 yards. Limit mark to be 16 yards. Shoot from centre track.

FLIGHTS AND ANGLES.

Rule No. 57. — Targets, whether singles or doubles, shall be thrown not less than 45 yards nor more than 55 yards, with a flight of 9 feet high at a point 10 yards from the trap, with a margin of tolerance of not more than 18 inches, above or below. Except in double target shooting, the flight of targets shall be at unknown angles, thrown within an area of 45 degrees right and left of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of number three firing point and prolonged through the centre of the central trap, or through the centre of the single trap when only one trap is used.

Rule No. 58. — To arrive at the proper height at which targets should be thrown as set forth in Rule 58, due allowance should be made according as the ground in front of the trap rises or falls away, and the flight of the targets 9 feet high at a point 10 yards from the trap is judged to be from an imaginary horizontal straight line drawn through No. 3 firing point through the single trap, or through the centre trap if the Sergeant System be used, and prolonged indefinitely.

Rule No. 59. — In single target shooting, to aid in distinguishing between target within and without bounds, two stakes (see Diagram II) not less than 3 feet in height shall be placed in the arc of a circle whose radii are 50 yards and whose centre is the centre of the single trap, or the centre of the central trap when three are used. Respectively, right and left at 45 degrees of the aforementioned imaginary straight line, two stakes shall be placed upright (see Diagram II).

PITS AND SCREENS.

Rule No. 60. — Trap houses shall be used to give full protection to the trappers. These houses shall be 3'3" high in front, tapering or sloping to 2'9" at the back, and shall be 6'0" from front to back, 8'0" wide. A tolerance of 3" either way is permissible on these dimensions. All height measurements shall be taken from the level of the centre lane. The trap shall be mounted in a manner which will bring the top centre oscillation of the throwing arm 14" above the level of the centre lane. A tolerance of 1" either side of this dimension is permissible.

FIRING POINTS.

Rule No. 61. — Firing points shall be three yards apart in the circumference of a circle whose radii are 16 yards (see Diagram I).

DISTANCE HANDICAPS.

Rule No. 62. — The distance handicaps, when used, shall be on prolongations of the lines given in Diagram I, commonly known as "fanshaped". The distance between the firing points, 16 yards, shall then be three yards (see Diagram III).

SQUADS.

Rule No. 63. — Competitors shall shoot in squads of five, except when there are less than five competitors available for the last squad of any programme event, or when there are withdrawals from a squad or squads after the competition has begun.

DOUBLE TARGETS.

Rule No. 64. — In double target shooting there shall be squads of five at 16 yards. Double-rise shooting may be off handicap marks or such marks as the club management may decide, except in the case of Championships.

Rule No. 65. — Each double shall be thrown as a right and left quarterer, whose flights shall be limited to DDB (Diagram IV) right and left

of an imaginary straight line drawn through the centre of No. 3 firing point and prolonged through the centre of the central trap, or through the centre of the single trap when only one trap is used. To aid in distinguishing between targets within and without bounds, four stakes not less than 3 feet in height shall be placed in the arc of a circle whose radii are 50 yards, and whose centre is the centre of the central trap, or the centre of the single trap, when only one trap is used. Respectively, right and left of the aforementioned imaginary straight line, two of the stakes shall be placed upright, one at 20 degrees and one at 45 degrees in said arc. Rule No. 66. — "No target" shall be declared when only one target is thrown.

Rule No. 67. — "No target" shall be declared when both targets are broken by one shot.

Rule No. 68.—"No target" shall be declared when one target is a broken target or both targets are broken targets when thrown from the trap or traps.

Rule No. 69.— "No target" shall be declared when both barrels of the competitor's gun are discharged simultaneously, or near simultaneously.

Rule No. 70. — "No target" shall be declared when one target follows

the other after a material interval of time, instead of the two targets taking flight simultaneously.

Rule No. 71. — "No target" shall be declared when one target or both targets are thrown at a wider or narrower angle or angles or higher or lower than is set forth in Rule No. 65.

Rule No. 72. — "Lost target" shall be declared when a competitor fails to break one of the targets with his first shot.

Rule No. 73. — Wherever squad system shooting shall apply, squads of 5 or 6 shooters, No. 1 shooter in each squad shall always start the shooting. The club, at its discretion, may require shooters to change starting lanes on each trap as follows: No. 1 shooter shall commence shooting from Lane No. 1 on Trap No. 1, Lane No. 2 on Trap No. 2, Lane No. 3 on Trap No. 3, and so forth over all the traps. Preserving the continuity of lane changing on each visit to the traps. This Rule shall also apply to double-rise.

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- DDB. Shaded sections within which the targets shall be thrown.
- F. Arrows showing the most desirable lines of flight for the targets.

TIES.

Rule No. 74. — All ties shall be shot off squad system, first miss-out. The club at its discretion may require the shoot-off to be run over the same number of traps and in the same manner in which the event was shot. Shooters shall be squadded in the same order of priority in which they qualified. Shooters are to be resquadded at the start of each run over the traps. This Rule shall apply to double-rise also.

Rule No. 75. — Ties in double target events are best shot off at either five (5) pairs per man, one pair from each firing point, or at ten (10) pairs per man, two pairs from each firing point. If, however, it is decided to shoot off the tie "Miss and Out", the procedure is the same as in Rule No. 74, with the exception that a pair of targets will be shot at from the several firing points instead of single targets, the competition being continued until a decision is arrived at.

UNFINISHED COMPETITION.

Rule No. 76. - Should darkness,

bad weather, or other cause, interfere with the competition, the management shall have the right to decide how and when the competition shall be continued, provided that it is not postponed longer than 14 days. Any competitor who defaults in respect of such postponed competition forfeits all his rights and standing therein.

OFFICIAL DECISIONS.

Rule No. 77. — Every person entering competitions agrees to accept all official decisions, and to abide by the rules controlling the competition.

ALTERATION TO TRAP.

Rule No. 78. — Any member of the Executive Committee of the Association or official referee attending any shoot under A.C.T.A. Rules shat have authority to adjust any trap immediately should it not be throwing regulation targets. Immediately any such alteration has been made, a target to be thrown and the competition to continue.

STANDARD EQUIPMENT.

Rule No. 79. — Concrete blocks and measuring sticks for measuring height of targets are required to be standard equipment for all clubs. A peg at least 2 feet high is required to be placed, dead centre in front of trap at 50 yards, as an aid to determining distance targets are being thrown.

HANDICAPS.

Rule No. 80.—Club handicaps must be not less than Association Handicaps.

SWEEPSTAKE DEDUCTIONS.

Rule No. 81. — Permissible deduction from sweepstakes by clubs, in club contests, shall be not more than 50 per cent. (inclusive of targets).

Rule No. 82. — No deduction is permitted by clubs in optional sweep-stakes.

OWNERSHIP OF UNBROKEN CLAY TARGETS.

Rule No. 83. — All clay targets broken or otherwise — at all times remain the property of the club and not the shooter. The shooter only pays for the privilege of shooting.

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SHOOTING AT PIECES.

Rule No. 84. — Unless, in the opinion of the referee, it is contrary to the equity of the competition, a competitor taking part in a com-HIS OWN TARGET, if he so wishes. petition may shoot at the pieces of

SHOOTER'S ENTITLEMENT.

Rule No. 85. — If a shooter withdraws or is disqualified from a competition, he forfeits all rights to resume. When a competitor has withdrawn, during any part of a competition, the tracks to be at once closed up.

SHOOTING UP.

Rule No. 86. — "Shooting up" after the first round of a competition is not permitted in any circumstances, except in the instance of shooters taking part in the annual International Match.

REGISTRATION OF SHOOTERS.

Rule No. 87. — All shooters must be registered by the A.C.T.A. before taking part in competition. Unregistered shooters are not permitted to compete at any time. Registered shooters who shoot at an unregistered or unaffliated club render themselves liable to disgualification.

SHOOTING IN FRONT OF HANDICAP.

Rule No. 88. — No shooting is permitted in front of Association handicap in any handicap events.

HEIGHT OF TARGETS.

Rule No. 89. — Targets in all competitions to be thrown at a height of 9 feet 10 yards from the trap, with a margin tolerance of not more than 18 inches, either way.

TIE SHOOTS IN OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Rule No. 90. — All tie shoots in Commonwealth, State and District Championships must begin on the centre track (No. 3) and then proceed to shoot across the tracks, single file, at best of five targets.

SHOOTING NAMES.

Rule No. 91. — Competitors must at all times use their correct names when entering a competition. Shooting non-de-plumes are not permitted.

"PISTOL GRIP" STYLE SHOOTING.

Rule No. 92. — Holding the gun "pistol" fashion, using one hand only, is barred. Any shooter acting in this way is to be warned against continuance — if continued, the shooter to be disqualified from competition forthwith and the matter reported to the Executive Committee. (Penalty, fine £5).

BREAK RECOGNITION.

Rule No. 93. - The A.C.T.A. will recognise breaks in sequences of 50, 75, 100, 150, 200 and 250, providing same are shot over an automatic trap under double or single-barrel conditions and in regular competition on one day only, excepting the case where a club is conducting a programme extending over two or more successive days. No practice between events is permitted and breaks must be continuous. To shoot in other than double or single-barrel events immediately concludes the break. Actual score sheets, clearly marked, showing where break occurred, must be produced to the A.C.T.A. before recognition can be granted. Break badges, once they have been obtained. will not be repeated.

ASSOCIATE REFEREE.

Rule No. 94.—An assistant referee, for Deauville Doubles and doublerise competition, is permitted. The Chief Referee to give his decision following the call of the assistant referee.

CASH DISTRIBUTION.

Rule No. 95. — In all cash distribution, handicaps or sweepstakes, the distribution shall be on the basis of 60% (1st), 30% (2nd) and 10% (3rd). A competitor scoring the only possible in an event wins only 60%, first place.

DEAUVILLE DOUBLES.

Rule No. 96. — Deauville Doubles shall be shot with four shooters on the ground at one time, first pair using tracks 1 and 5 and the second pair using tracks 2 and 4, after shooting first round of 5 pairs, shooters then change tracks, first pair taking tracks 2 and 4, and second pair taking tracks 1 and 5. Tie shoots shall be conducted from tracks 2 and 4, one team at a time. Rule No. 97. — Any misfire or mechanical failure does not entitle the shooters to another pair of targets and they must abide by the result.

WALK-UP.

Rule No. 98.—Walk-up events shall be shot double-barrel from No. 3 track. The competitor shall load his gun at the 22 yard mark. When ready in this position he commences and continues to walk at a normal walking pace, holding his gun in any position of safety. The puller will release the target between the 20 yard and 15 yard marks, the mark being unknown to the competitor, having been previously determined by an indicator or dice.

OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS AND OPEN COMPETITIONS.

Rule No. 99. — Open Championships, that is Commonwealth, State and District Championships, and open competitions (cases where more than 50 is allotted for distribution in any one event), must have the approval of the A.C.T.A. before being advertised or conducted. (This Rule applies both to the actual event and the proposed date of holding.)

CARTRIDGES.

Rule No. 100. — Standard Shell for Championships. Shells used in all open championships (Commonwealth, State and District) are required to be restricted to 1[‡] oz. of shot, struck measure, or its equivalent. Shells marked by the manufacturer as complying with this regulation are approved.

Rule No. 101. — Clubs running an event have the right to divide the number of targets by the number of traps available, shooting 6, 7 or 8 targets per visit per trap. The club, at its discretion, may require lane changing as per Rule No. 73. Illustration: 15 targets, two traps, one visit. No. 1 shooter shoots 8 targets on Trap No. 1, finishing on Lane No. 3. No. 1 shooter now starts on Lane No. 4 on Trap No. 2, and shoots 7 targets, finishing on Lane No. 5. Illustration No. 2: 30 targets, 5 traps, 6 targets per trap, one visit. Clubs must preserve equality by lane changing between traps as per Rule No. 74.

GUN GOSSIP

(By GOUGH THOMAS in "Shooting Times", Eng.)

Range is a matter of vital concern to the user of the shotgun - not so much because of its relatively low muzzle velocity, but rather because of the extremely rapid falling-off in the effectiveness of the charge of shot, partly by loss of velocity and partly by the scattering and stringing of the pellets. From one point of view, this rapid loss of effectiveness is a merit: without it, shooting as a social amusement would hardly be feasible in a densely populated country. As it is, no matter how many shots are fired from a particular location, or in what direction, nobody beyond a couple of hundred yards, say, can possibly get hurt.

But as between the shooter and his quarry, this characteristic imposes severe limitations. A particular gun and charge of powder and shot that may be effective at 40 yards, may well be highly inefficient at 50 and totally useless at 60; for even if the individual pellets retain sufficient velocity, and therefore energy and penetrating power, at this last range, they are likely to have lost the coherence necessary for a killing pattern.

In these circumstances, one would expect that shotgun users as a body would have developed a highly realistic attitude towards the matter of range, as determining the kind of gun, the weight of charge and the degree of choke necessary for the effective pursuit of a given kind of game in given circumstances. One would also expect them to regard an ability to judge distances instantly

RESEARCH INTO COCCIDIOSIS IN GAME BIRDS

(By P. I. TRIGG)

(Imperial College, Ashurst Lodge, Sunninghill, Ascot, Berks.)

Coccidiosis is a disease primarily of vertebrates, resulting from the invasion and destruction of the cells of the intestine by protozoan parasites. The infection is acquired by the ingestion of cysts from contaminated ground. Following the penetration of the cells of the intestinal wall, multiplication of the parasite takes place, and with the increase in numbers and subsequent invasion of further cells, tissue damage results, often accompanied by haemorrhage. Sexual reproduction leads to the formation of resistant cysts which pass out with the faeces to contaminate the ground.

The severity of the disease depends largely on the age of the bird and the number of cysts ingested. Thus, in chicks the disease is acute, the birds passing pale, diarrhoeic faeces and becoming emaciated and anaemic. The feathering is poor and ragged, and leg weakness is common. Mortality is high at this stage, but those birds surviving grow to the adult stage with a chronic form of the disease and act as carriers, their weight, condition and appearance comparing equally with non-infected birds.

The incidence of coccidiosis is high especially under conditions of crowding, figures ranging from 50-80 per cent. in chicks and 40-80 per cent. in adults.

Some eight species of coccidia infect different parts of the gut of domestic fowl, at least two of which are a severe threat to poultry farming under the present-day conditions of crowded battery and deep litter husbandry. These parasites have been the subject of extensive investigation in contrast to the game-bird parasites whose effects are not so far reaching. Since the report of the Committee of Enquiry on Grouse Disease in 1911 they have been described from time to time by their infective cysts mostly unrelated to the internal stages. Little is known about their ability to infect other hosts.

The present investigation extending over the next three years will cover the determination of species based on the relationship of the cystic and internal stages. After which it will be possible to explore the questions of pathogenicity and cross-infectivity, i.e. the ability of a species from one host to infect another, the latter being of great importance where equipment and ground has to be used for the rearing of different game birds.

In this connection, material is constantly required.
