

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SUNDAY TARGET SHOOTING IN N.S.W. Elsewhere in this issue will be noticed a Press Statement issued to Len Bird, President of the Cowra Gun Club (N.S.W.), wherein it is stated that the N.S.W. Premier has approved a recommendation that legislation will be drafted to amend the Police Offences Act to permit organised target shooting on Sundays. This information emanated from the Member for Young, G. Freudenstein, M.L.A.

It is understood, also, that the penalty for illegal shooting will be increased from £5 to £50 to provide a deterrent against indiscriminate shooting which may cause damage to property or endanger the lives of human beings, livestock and wildlife.

Additional information has since been received that the new legislation is expected to come during the present session of the N.S.W. Parliament, which will conclude at Easter next year.

The information is good news indeed for New South Wales followers of clay target shooting — it is the first major break-through of this type. Now that the possibility of the legislation being passed is a fact, it is hoped that other States in the Commonwealth will later enjoy similar privilege.

CHAMPIONSHIP SASHES. A complaint reached the A.C.T.A. office recently that there had never been published details of the colours of sashes for Commonwealth. State and District Championships, as laid down by the Executive Committee. This information has been published although some time ago — and the information has also been promulgated to clubs in circular instructions from time to time. Another important feature of the issue of sashes which clubs should remember is that orders for sashes should not be made direct to the Association. Messrs. W. D. Flattely & Son Pty. Ltd., 11 Orr Street, Carlton, N.3, are the official sash makers to the Association, and any orders should be directed to that firm. Of course, there is no rigid obligation to purchase a "Flattely" sash, but the fact that the firm is the official sash maker to the A.C.T.A. ensures that only a first-class article will be made and issued to the club ordering the sash.


"NEWS" — 19th YEAR OF PUB-LICATION. With the publication of the present issue of "News" (October 1965) it is noted with interest that "News" has entered into its 19th year of publication. When the proposal to establish a "bulletin" was first mooted, away back in August 1947, those concerned with the establishment of the publication entered into

the problem of its organization with great trepidation. The initial proposal was that an eight-page bulletin of results be issued from the A.C.T.A. office. The support given the publication from the outset ensured its quick establishment. Advertisers responded fairly quickly and those clubs who outlined their programmes for subsequent months soon learned that the old axiom "it pays to advertise" was. in fact, worth while and very true. The position today is that many clubs who shoot regularly are also regular advertisers of their forthcoming programmes, and very many business houses connected with the sport of clay target shooting also take advantage of the columns of "News" to proclaim their wares. It seems a long time ago since the original issue of eight pages was posted to the shooters. There are many who have retained the full complement of issues since 1947 and prize them no end. It is hoped that "News" will continue to promulgate its views to the sporting shooting public in the years to come and retain the same modest success it has attained, whoever happens to be "issuing the words".

"LOST BIRD". An enquiry reached the A.C.T.A. office recently from an interstate source which read, "Could

you please advise correct ruling -Shooter shooting double-barrel event has a mis-fire with first barrel and then shoots the second barrel and does not break the target. Shooter claimed a 'no target'. Referee refused and decision was 'Lost Bird'." The referee was quite correct in his decision - the shooter lost all equity in another target when he fired the second barrel. Shooters should remember that when they experience a mis-fire the shooter concerned should immediately hold up his gun above the shoulder (always pointing towards the trap house) and call for the referee. The referee is then required to test the gun by pulling the trigger, and if the gun fails to fire, he gives his decision.

NO PUBLICATION IN JANUARY. Due to the printing trade being on vacation during the greater part of January, no publication of "News" will take place in that month. Those submitting copy and advertising matter are requested to note this fact and include all matter having reference to January and early February in the December edition, dead-line for which is November 1. This procedure is regular and usual practice, but the reminder is mentioned to assist in ensuring that nothing is overlooked.

Press Statement

24th August, 1965

Target Shooting to be permitted on Sundays in New South Wales

The N.S.W. Premier, Mr. Askin, said today that Cabinet had approved a recommendation made by the Chief Secretary (Mr. Willis) that legislation be drafted to amend the Police Offences Act to permit organised target shooting on Sundays.

"At the present time Section 19 of the Act provides a penalty for shooting or carrying firearms on Sundays and it is proposed to amend the Act to enable exemptions to be made from the provisions of the Section, subject to such conditions as may be prescribed."

Mr. Askin said that the Minister had made the recommendation following his consideration of representations by a number of Clubs which participate in clay target shooting. The proposed amendment will, however, enable exemption to be granted in respect of other forms of organised target shooting.

"It is also intended" Mr. Makin added, "to increase the penalty for illegal Sunday shooting from £5 to £50, which is more in keeping with presentday values and will provide a deterrent against indiscriminate shooting which may cause damage to property or endanger the lives of human beings, livestock and wildlife."

The chief reason for the deterioration of a gun is usually neglect. All should know that the more a shotgun bore is fired and cleaned, the higher its polish will be and the better the pattern from it.



Though crows are birds of high intelligence, little else can be found in their favour. They are savage robbers and expert nest finders, they are a menace to all game birds, duck and many others, and they not only rob nests of eggs, but will kill bird chicks and have been known to attack adult birds. They will gorge on car-rion and attack sick lambs, sheep and any other animals, tearing out the eves or tongues of such living creatures. In the original balance of nature crows had their place and possibly served a purpose, but under the controlled conditions of the present day they are enemies of all poultry breeders and sheep farmers and all who are responsible for the preservation of wild life. Crows are cunning and have exceptionally keen evesight and are not easily out-witted. To shoot them needs time, plus a lot of patience. It is more of a test of wits than marksmanship, but well worth the attempting. During the nesting season it should not prove too difficult to account for both the male and female when the hen bird is sitting, particularly when they are flighting in. Crows seem to know all about the effective killing range of a gun. Crow shooting can be regarded as a minor sport, but with a very desirable quarry.

OUT OF THE PAST

Twenty-five Years Ago

Colac trap shooters dominated a field of 42 at a Blackburn fixture in aid of charity. Eric Ball, who was later President of the Colac Club, ran up a break of 32 straight and won the main event, and is also credited with "winning the £5 Handicap". A shooter named H. Hayes, who had not previously faced an automatic trap, was runner-up. The late Theo Norman won the front-marker award. The late Bert Anquetil won the Coburg Club's single - barrel championship. Anquetil had the unusual habit of standing between the tracks, that is to say not shooting on the concrete

lanes. In fact, it was due to Anquetil's habit of standing off the concrete which brought about the introduction of the A.C.T.A. Rule that no shooter may stand more than 18 inches on either side of the centre of the concrete lane. Runner-up to Anquetil in the title was A. Love, with H. Christian third.

George Copeland, still an occasional shooter over the Melbourne area traps, was prominent on the same day, gaining three divisions, one at single-barrel, a third placing at double-rise and a final division in the concluding event on the programme.

Fifteen Years Ago

At an Australian Gun Club meeting at East Burwood the main event of the day was won by A. Smith with the only possible. Ray Hering (still an active shooter) was second, with "Peters" third. The 13/14 yarder went to Les Murphy, a one-time speed-car driver, 21/23. A £20 Handicap at Footscray went to D. Haddow (1) from T. Spall and the former cycling champion and contemporary of the great Hubert Opperman (now Minister for Migration in the Federal House), R. W. (Fatty) Lamb. The holding of the gun in walk-up shooting was a matter of great discussion about this period. The many and varied interpretations of "holding the gun" rule led to much argument and at times frustration. The present Rule now established is by and large as near satisfaction as can be obtained in a very difficult exercise.

At a shoot at Foster in South Gippsland two shooters named Arnup cleaned up the programme. G. Arnup won two events and C. Arnup won the other two.

Ten Years Ago


Ten years ago there was an agitation to introduce single-barrel shooting for all competitions and eliminate double - barrel events. When it was first proposed there was much opposition and finally the opposition faded out of calculation. Single-barrel shooting has its merits — one important feature is the reduction in costs but from "Letters to the Editor" and general comment the proposal to eliminate the double-barrel from competition shooting was not well received.

Fifty-six shooters entered for the







Confidence and Nerves in Shooting

("Orion" in "Shooting Times", Eng.)

There is no doubt that nerves play a very important part in shooting. whether with guns or rifles. It is a difficult subject to write about, but we can regard nerves as being of two kinds — those which sub-consciously transmit from brain to limbs the actions required which enable us to shoot, and emotional nerves, which result from excitement, anxiety or fear. The former are part of our physical make-up which we have to accept, for there is little, if anything, we can do to control them, though presumably they play an essential part in determining whether we are naturally quick or slow shots. Their constant usage, however, in connec-tion with shooting can be expected to keep them tuned up to the highest degree of individual capability.

We can, however, all do something about controlling feelings of excitement, anxiety or fear, which are common, in some degree, to most of us who shoot, and particularly to beginners. Over-anxiety to succeed is, perhaps, the commonest failing, and the keener a beginner is, the more likely he is to be afflicted, but more experienced shots can suffer in the same way if they happen to be nervous subjects. If such a man is shooting for the first time in new company and is particularly anxious to shoot well, over-anxiety to do so can easily result in a performance well below his best. The mere fact that he thinks he is under observation is enough to put him off his normal form. Others are similarly affected by a bad start to the day and never seem to recover from a succession of early misses. Conversely, if a man starts off well he may quite possibly shoot above his standard of marksm normal form for the rest of the day. ultimately attained.

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
I do not suggest that the foregoing is true of all, but I think it is true of many, and I know that when I started I generally shot too quickly.

I think that a good beginning to a day has a tonic effect on how one continues. It is, of course, all a matter of temperament, but the right attitude of mind undoubtedly helps and a beginner should do his utmost to exercise nerve control. When the actual business of shooting starts, he should banish all thoughts uncon-cerned with his immediate purpose of shooting. His only interest in other people should be limited to their safety and not to what they may be thinking about his skill or the lack of it.

Confidence in yourself and mastery of your nerves are all-important, and perhaps even more so with a rifle than a gun, for with the rifle there is often much more time to get worked up emotionally.

Confidence in your own shooting ability, whether with rifle or gun, will banish nervousness, but this does not mean that a man has to become an exceptionally good shot to have confidence in himself. What it does mean is that he must be able to recognise his own limitations and shoot within them. The two finest gameshots with a rifle that I have ever known had their own limits of range for different kinds of game, beyond which they would not attempt a shot, and that is how it should be. Con-fidence does, I feel sure, play a most important part, not only in learning the elements of shooting, but in the standard of marksmanship that is S 100 2 11







At all gun clubs every shooter tries to shoot a possible. Some try to do this with a gun that does not fit them, wrong stance and gun control. These shooters are keen shots and their sport is clay target shooting. In some cases a lot of money has been spent on the purchase of a gun. Combine this with nominations and cartridges and it adds up to an expensive sport. Naturally, the shooter wants some return, if only satisfaction with an occasional win. Not the price of the trophy, but satisfaction in winning it. This shooter has started on the wrong This shooter has started on the wrong leg. Firstly, an incorrectly fitted gun, he stands wrongly and does not hold the gun correctly. At every shoot you will see this. Not one shooter only, but a number. How easy it would be to correct this and how much easier for the shooter himself to develop into a better shot. This shooter, for his own benefit, should firstly get an event and an event only to check expert, and an expert only, to check his gun measurements. Have the gun correctly fitted and specifications taken and then to a stock-maker for alterations. This done, he should then seek the advice of a coach, and I do not mean anyone. Get a top trap shooter to help with advice, as he has had years of experience in winning championships, and if possible get one of the best. Get on your own - just the two of you — where it is quiet, without interruptions. Use a Plus trap, as these are portable and can be put up in a minute; besides, they can throw any angles easy or tough birds, slow or fast, and even doubles if you want them.

Top coaches overseas use this type of trap for coaching. With an ex-perienced shot behind him to tell him what he is doing, he will gain confidence in the knowledge that he will be told when he makes mistakes and how to rectify them. Plenty of prac-

tice and more private coaching could put him well on the way to getting that trophy or two. From then on it's up to himself. Both in gun-fitting and coaching, get the man with loads of experience. There are not many of these, but they are to be found. Some of our top champions ask at different times for a check-up on their gun-fitting. They know what they want, but they double check just to make sure - a wise procedure.

Some club shooters genuinely try to help the shooter having trouble and should be praised for this, but in most cases they do more harm than good trying to help, as they simply do not know how to properly fit a gun. Guns have different specifications, such as stock cast-off, different grip lengths and thickness, comb heights, heel, different pitch and lengths. All of these, in some cases to suit the in-dividual, would have to be altered to get correct fit. Near enough is not good enough. I cannot emphasise enough just how important a correctly fitted gun is to the shooter. You could be lucky to buy a gun out of the rack that would fit you, but these are few and far between. There is nearly always some alteration to be made. The one way to get exactly what you want is to order this gun through a dealer who will order this to your specifications. Then you can get what borings, weight, balance and stock specifications you want.

When ordering the borings do not just specify half-choke, three-quarter choke, or full choke. Always state the percentages you want. For full choke these range from 70% to 89%, but still are classed as full choke. 72% first barrel and 75% is a good handy choking. Three-quarter choke ranges from as low as 60% to 69%, so a good three-quarter choke is 65%, so for a


good three-quarter and full-choke gun the good borings would be 65% and 75%. This leaves 10% between each barrel, which is ideal for vardages up to 23 yds. Over that it is advisable to go for the full choke of 72%, 75%. Put a three-quarter choke on a pattern plate and you will see the reason for this.

There are a lot of men shooting clay targets that have shooting problems. These problems can undoubtedly in most cases be rectified. This cannot be done on a crowded shooting ground. For one thing there is not the time. Another is, a shooter be-comes embarrassed when someone is trying to tell him his faults, as there are usually other shooters present. There is only one way to iron out these troubles. If you can get an experienced top shot to go with you, get out into the country where it is quiet and where you will not be interrupted. Get a plus or similar trap, plenty of clay targets, and go on from there.

Find your mistakes, have them rectified, and it will become much casier. Make sure trigger pulls are light and crisp. This is most import-

ant: 3 lb. first pull. 31 lb. second pull are good. Make sure these pulls are crisp, without trigger drag. To be a good tradesman you need good tools to do a good job.

In view of the ravages caused by the Australian wild dog, or dingo, the following article referring to the Indian wild dog is of general interest.

It took me many years of experience in the jungles before I learnt to recognise or even to pay any attention to the most intriguing species of vermin to be found in the jungles in this country. I did come across a solitary one and more rarely a couple in the forests of Chickmagalur and Shimoga District. They would stand for a moment eveing me inquisitively and then sheer off and disappear in the scrub. With little more than a glimpse of one in an unexpected encounter, I supposed it to be a jackal. I could not, of course, mistake a jackal for anything else. Once or twice I wondered at the presence and, what I took to be, the shyness of a village dog so far away from human habitation: and once I thought it was an unusual kind of jackal that I saw. A shikari told me it was a chennai (Kannada), but he did not ask me to shoot it.

I heard many stories of the savage nature of this beast, but I took them all with a grain of salt. I heard of wild dogs surrounding and killing a tiger, treeing and eventually killing a panther, of their playing havoc among deer and pig, and even sheep and goats and calves and full-grown cattle. An account that impressed me was of a young couple who got out of their car on the Mysore-Ooty Road to take pictures of a pack of wild dogs and were set upon and killed. This story was not authenticated. (I suspect now that they came between the pack and its quarry - that is, if the story is to be credited.)

The domestic dog goes under the generic name of Canis, together with his cousins the fox, the wolf and the jackal. The Wild Dog is enrolled under the name Cuon, and it is not likely that the cuon was the prehistoric progenitor of the canis. The external features of the cuon by which

it is distinguished from the genus canis are: the more rounded, erect ears, the proportionately shorter muzzle, the line of the face seen sideways being slightly concave, the two pairs of true molars in the lower jaw instead of three in *canis*, the seven pairs of mammae as against five in *canis*. To the Asiatic Wild Dog, whose habitat ranges from Manchuria and Korea through China down to India and South East Asia and the East Indies, excluding, however, Ceylon and Borneo, has been given the name *Cuon javanicus*. The Indian Wild Dog has been divided into three races, one found in Kashmir, another in the Central and Eastern Himalayas through Kumaon, Nepal and Sikkim, and the third found both in Assam and in Peninsular India. To the third race just mentioned is given the name Cuon javanicus dukhunensis. It is with this race that I made acquintance.

In general appearance C. j. dukhuncesis is a handsome fellow. His coat is of a glossy bright rufous colour, lighter on the under parts than the upper, and his tail is a mag-nificent brush with long black hair (crowding at the end and sometimes with white hair) showing through at the very tip. He has conspicuously long hair between his foot-pads.

The wild dog never raises his tail the wild dog never raises his tain higher than the line of his back, unlike the village dog, which often sports a curl. And the wild dog has never been known to bark. Voice noises have been variously described as whining, whimpering, whistling, snarling, growling, yap-yapping and chattering. A wild dog that has crossed your path and gone away can be called up by a sequence of three toots produced by blowing into a medium-bore empty brass shell. He will come back, locate you, and look at you as if enquiring what you want

of him, and then trot away in disgust. It is said that when in full view of their played-out quarry the pack indulges in high-pitched, intermittent whistling or wailing howls. This is not always so; the striking down and finishing up of the victim is often done in solemn silence. I have had no experience of hearing any mating call.

The male stands, on the average, about 20 inches at the shoulder and weighs about forty pounds; the female is about an inch shorter and proportionately lighter. The breeding season is from November to February. The litter is in a hole in the ground or in a sand-bank, and consists of from two to any number up to nine. Pups are uniformly dark brown in colour, slightly yellow about the neck, and similar to pointer pups. They can be tamed. They will eat only fresh raw meat. They become attached to human beings, but are a potential danger to domestic dogs and livestock. They are liable to skin and other ailments, especially mange, distemper and rabies. Domestication has not been successful so far.

Wild dogs have, fortunately, been almost invariably unaggressive to man. Their attitude to human beings has been described variously as indifferent or curious or inquisitive or unafraid or saucy or impudent. When badly wounded and approached, he is likely to be dangerous; so also a mother with pups in the vicinity. Sportsmen are afraid to shoot when they appear in numbers. There is no authentic record, however, of con-certed attack on human beings. There have been cases of great fights having taken place between a tiger and a pack of wild dogs, in which the tiger was killed and several dogs also lost their lives. It is regarded as improbable that the pack put up, follow and run down a tiger; probably the tiger interferes in the hunt in which the pack is engaged, and the attention of the pack is diverted from the intended victim to the tiger, who hopes it would be his. Panther and bear also fall victims to a pack of wild dogs. The former also must have been met with in the course of a hunt after some other prey. If the panther climbs up a tree, the dogs surround it and wait and watch until the feline attempts

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to break out of the cordon. A panther or bear can easily deal with two or three dogs, but not with a large pack. I came across the carcass of a panther torn to pieces by wild dogs, of which he had evidently killed two in the fight.

The wild dog hunts by day after sunrise or before sunset; rarely in the dark, but sometimes by moonlight. When a herd of deer or a sounder of pig has been surprised and scattered, the whole pack con-centrates on the individual which has been chosen by the leader. The hunt is certainly according to a plan; the leader follows the trail and the others spread out in a crescent, the extremes putting on speed in order to out-run and cut off chances of escape. Once started, the fate of the victim is sealed. Tearing bites from the flanks and the rear, with bits of skin and flesh ripped off; and perhaps a firm hold by one or two dogs hanging on with grim tenacity, eventually brings down the victim. Seizure by the ears, nose, lips, even the neck and hind and under parts, soon makes a sorry mess of the victim, whose piteous screams do not alter the issue. The dogs themselves show a marvellous indifference to pain. The fiends do not wait for the victim to die, but start their feast at once, tearing off chunks of flesh, throwing them up in the air, catching them and bolting them down whole. The kill is never dragged.

During the breeding season a single dog or a mated pair will undertake

While driving over a bridge across the Tunga river once I saw two dogs on the bridge. They turned about and ran away. I spotted two or three others on the sand in the bed of the river, which at that time of the year was a narrow stream of water a few feet in depth sweeping near the bank I had left. I stopped the car, took my shotgun out of its case and put in two L.G. cartridges into it. Then I got down and made my way through thorns and boulders down the steep bank of the river. I saw three dogs as soon as I emerged and let the as soon as I emerged and let the nearest one have it at a distance of thirty yards. It collapsed and I turned to get another one, but there was no other to be seen. My bearer, who had followed me, then drew my attention to a sambhur standing in the water under the bridge further up. We went up to a few yards of it. It was blinded and in such a state as I will not attempt to describe; yet it was

on its feet facing its foes. It was a half-grown sambhur stag with small horns. I put it out of its misery with the remaining L.G. I had to leave it where it was. No doubt the pack would devour it, but what else could I do? I then wondered if my intense indignation was justified. I was not sorry, however, for having put an end to the sufferings of the stag.

On another occasion I saw a domestic buffalo pulled down and, moaning, surrounded by a pack of dogs. I got three of them, using the toot-toot to call them up after the first shot. My shikari objected to killing the buffalo, and I desisted; but the sight of the buffalo was such as I can never forget.

A terrific toll of wild life is taken by wild dogs. There seem to be, however, natural causes by which their population is kept within bounds. Of these we know very little. The sportsman is justified in adding to them, at least in areas where wild dogs are in great numbers.
