

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S NOTES

A long standing cry from within the ranks of the shooting sports has been that shooters receive insufficient publicity.

Well, the Queenslanders are really playing their part in reversing that trend.

Prior to Christmas, the Brisbane Gun Club committee successfully negotiated with a television station to have advertisements put to air Friday nights and Saturday mornings. In these commercials, clay target shooting is shown as a challenging recreation, then details of current club programs are put to air.

The project has been sponsored on a monthly basis by a number of commercial organizations. Its progress and results are being closely monitored by the Club committee.

In another successful venture, the Queensland Clay Target Association arranged for clay busting to be listed amonst the sports used for a large public display on the Gold Coast during Australia Day celebrations.

The success of this project can be measured by the fact that club teams competed before a crowd that grew at times to an estimated 7500. WOW! What a result!

Meanwhile, many of the Q.C.T.A. coaching personnel have reached a standard of training where they feel confident to undertake public speaking commitments.

As an example, Stafford Smith (Zone Coach for the South Eastern area of Queensland) recently addressed a meeting of the Hervey Bay Rotary Club, where the level of interest and attention was tremendous.

Then, in New South Wales, the Daily Mirror carried a leading article titled "MARKSMEN WHO AIM NOT TO KILL". It was a good piece of journalism directed at putting the positive side of clay target shooting.

Mr Leni Crema, President of Marconi Gun Club was widely quoted in the article, and is to be commended for the way in which he "led" the journo.

The real point to come out of these examples is that **every** clay buster, in almost every social or business situation, has the opportunity to promote his or her sport.

If only we could discipline ourselves to spend more time on this type of promotion, the less time on pulling the work of others apart, I'm sure that our numbers would swell dramatically.

To completely change the scene, let's talk for a few moments about referees. This person holds one of the highest and most important positions in sport, be it clay target shooting, football or whatever; yet, we frequently see him (or her) being treated like a second rate citizen.

Most (if not all) of the referees who assist in the conduct of shooting competitions are purely honorary and are giving their time and effort to make our sport better.

They have every right to expect a fair go — that is really the only reward they want!

The degree to which referees are becoming "browned-off" is clearly emphasised by the fact that very few have applied to "stand" at the 1981 Australian Trap and Skeet Championships, to be held at Melbourne Gun Club in April.

As a consequence, it appears likely that referees will be drawn from previous squads, to ensure that the tournament continues.

A new inovation is to appear in CTSN. The Association's Management Committee has arranged to contribute a monthly column, to keep readers abreast of the types of decisions that are being made, the reasons why, and the anticipated consequences.

The Committee, which consists of President Ron Porter, Vice President Laurie Connors. Roy Holtfreter and Paul Cains, meets regularly, and the new column should create a great deal of interest.

Meanwhile, the Development Sub-committee has been revamped, and is now headed by Paul Cains of Burnie, Tasmania. Elsewhere in this issue. Paul has extended an invitation to all readers to contribute ideas to his committee. After all, it is in the best interests of all participants that new ideas be drawn from the widest possible range.


This is the club's third successive win, and makes the team seem invincible.

Forty-six clay target shooters representing six clubs attended this carnival to compete in the Australia Day Teams Championship which was organized by the Foundation and the Gold Coast Gun Club.

This gave clay target shooters a golden opportunity to PROMOTE THEIR SPORT to the general public. (7500 people were recorded entering the gate).

Eley & Winchester assisted the Association by giving it pamphlets and books to give away to the public. During the course of the day, we were kept busy answering enquiries and explaining the sport.

The following gun clubs fielded teams for this event: Brisbane (Mens & Ladies team). Ipswich: Toowoomba: Sunshine Coast; Gold Coast (two teams); Terranora Lakes.



 Brisbane Gun Club Ladies' Team on tracks at Gold Coast promotion.


These clubs must also be congratulated for their enthusiasm in promoting their clubs in the sport. Toowoomba team members all wore the same coloured T-shirts with a club badge printed on the front. They looked great, and quite a lot of remarks were made about them. Other clubs wore their club jackets with badges on the back. and all of this promoted the vast areas serviced by gun clubs.

Following a 40 target elimination event in the morning. Toowoomba Gun Club consisting of R. Donovan; D. Wells: M. Hass; M. Manning: and V. Tipman qualified with the highest score for the Grand Shoot-Off: the other team qualifying was Ipswich which consisted of W. Stevens; P. Freeleagus; G. Stevens; P. Stein and K. Stevens.

At 4pm the GRAND SHOOT OFF was commenced and all other functions on the grounds were halted while the match proceeded.

Ipswich was the eventual winner, beating Toowoomba by the narrow margin of 5 points. Ipswich scored a total of 291-300.


The second twenty went to:--D. Wells (Tmba): K. Cameron (Gold Coast): C. Witt (Gold Coast) score 60-60.

"The best laid plans of mice and men..." I am afraid we had a massive boo-boo recently which just goes to prove this old saying.

It was decided last April a responsible approach to the 1981 Duck Season would be to print a coloured brochure identifying the various types of duck most commonly found throughout Australia and to show those which are protected.

This was especially relevant, we thought, because of the tragedy in S.A. when a large number of Freckled Duck were slaughtered, possibly innocently, by inexperienced shooters mistaking them for the most popular species in Australia, the Black Duck.

A great deal of trouble went into the production of, firstly, a 4-page colour brochure; then, as the idea grew, a full coloured poster and a limited set of 12 coloured coasters, all on the same theme of improving the shooters' knowledge of identifying ducks and so, hopefully, protecting the duck population as a whole whilst, simultaneously, perpetuating the sport. But, despite the precautions of recruiting an artist who was also commissioned by the Victorian Fisheries and Wildlife Department, and some great co-operation and expert advice from officers of that Department, we still managed to goof. Some birds which are protected were not indicated. The posters were reprinted but the initial distribution of brochures did go out, some in Clay Target Shooting News, and so these should be altered by also marking the Coot, the Grass Whistle Duck, the Musk Duck and the Bluebilled Duck.

At the same time, we realise these protected species vary from State to State, and season to season, and so shooters should always check with their particular Wildlife Department to ensure they are familiar with the current regulations for each season.

The Coasters were received so well (the limited printing was completely sold within days of their release) it is our intention to continue the series with, for 1982, a set on hunting dogs and, in 1983, one on famous firearms.

A method of reserving sets of these will be announced shortly.

George Biggs, one of the best-known figures in the Clay Target world, has just finished writing and publishing an instructional book on Trap and Skeet Shooting. George, with Newton Thomas, must rank as the most knowledgeable shooter in this country, and he has prepared a fascinating book, not only on technique but on the entire spectrum of trap shooting in Australia, delving back into the history of the sport and uncovering many interesting documents and photographs.

At \$5.95 its value for money is unsurpassed in this day and age; in fact, we think it is too cheap as the production is top class and many prospective buyers may think, at that price, all they may be getting for their money is a home-print job. Nonetheless, George wanted to keep the price down because, as he says, the sport is expensive enough as it is.

As George has always been an enthusiastic user of ELEY, naturally we have supported him by subsidising production costs of the book itself and distributing it through our channels on his behalf.

In fact, it is our intention to donate a book to every school library where there may be possible interest in trap and skeet shooting.





Some time ago when we looked at the Rottweil Model 72 trap and skeet guns we thought they were real good pieces of ordinance. In the intervening period we have not changed our mind but what brings the name Rottweil back to these pages is the introduction of another version of the Model 72, the Model 72 AAT.

The gun has a funny pedigree that perhaps we should look at briefly. Designed by Conrad (Conny) Wirnhier for Dynamit Nobel of West Germany, the gun is made by Gamba of Italy for the American market. Wirnhier incidently is twice World Champion and an Olympic Gold Medal winner in Skeet.

The gun comes to the Australian market through Dieter Schuster of Eurocut in Sydney.

Americans love to hang labels on guns. This model Rottweil is no exception. To give it the full moniker it is a real tongue teaser...Rottweil 72 Adjustable American Trap Gun with IVPI. Now before you run off into the distance screaming, let me explain the IVPI.

It stands for **Infinitely Variable Point of Impact** and is in fact the most remarkable feature of the gun. But more of this later.


Essentially, the gun is a basic 72 with all the features we have discussed before when we summed up the mechanical features thus, "the gun is a box lock and works on the 'bifurcated lump' principle. Anybody who follows gun tests in this magazine would know what this means. The locking wedges are concealed and the final lock-up is very firm."


"Ejectors are selective, automatic and are triggered by the cocking rods. These cocking rods or bars run through the action floor and the gun cocks on opening" — and this has not altered.


What has altered however is the barrels we hang on this action. The full set consists of a set of 81 cm (32") double barrels, a single barrel of the same length and a massive 86


cm (34") single barrel. The double set has a free floating bottom barrel and the single barrel has the IVPI.

What makes the gun stand out however is the treatment given to the single barrel. In simple terms, all that happens is that the top barrel is removed at the forend, plugged and the rib extended down to the bottom barrel. With the long barrel up it looks like something out of 'Star Wars'.

But there are some very important handling characteristics in this form of gun design. First, balance is not altered and second, the moment of inertia is kept low. This reduces muzzle whip to almost zero. higher than the point of aim. When pulled fully back the collar effected a point of impact 44 cm below point of aim.

Now, the ability to be able to alter your point of impact upwards has a lot going for it insofar as the trap shooter is concerned. Back mark handicap shooters find a high shooting gun a distinct advantage, a lot of them do not like so much height at the common mark.

One can argue that the level of trapshooting expertise in this country would not warrant such a device. But as we become more sophisticated in our approach to the game it will become more important. More so now that there is a trend to



Right up front though is the interesting part and it is here that Infinitely Variable Point of Impact feature comes into play. The system is ingenious and relatively simple.

On the bottom of the rib near the muzzle is a slight incline up. This matches, and is in fact dovetailed with the 10 cm long collar which surrounds the barrel. In the front face of the rib is a screw. When removed you find a small hex wrench on the end and this you will find engages with a grub screw in the top of the rib about 5cm back from the muzzle.

Using this wrench, the grub screw can be loosened and the collar freed to slide backward or forward. On the left side of the collar are some graduation marks, in fact six of them either side of the centre mark. By sliding the collar backwards & forwards the point of impact of the barrel can be altered at will. Each graduation represents a movement of about 8 cm at 35 metres.

The most remarkable thing about this is the real movement you can get of your pattern. With the collar set at the centre mark the gun should shoot to point of aim. In patterning tests it did. Racked fully forward the gun shot a whopping 50cm shoot more of the American brand of the single barrel style of game.

We remain a bit puzzled as to the requirement of making a gun shoot lower. If there is an instance whereby any trapshooter had a reason to have his pattern print 40 odd centimetres below his point of aim, his approach to the game leaves a little to be desired.


Far be it for me to give Conny Wirnhier any advice on gun design, but it would be more logical to have the availability for more upward movement and a little less down.

We have overlooked the double barrel set in our enthusiasm for the single barrel mechanics. At the present time this set would be the workhorse for the Australian gunner. They are as well made as the single barrel but have no point of impact adjustment. In our tests they shot just a whisker high, about 10 cm. At 81 cm long most would regard them as not suitable for Australian shooting conditions.


This is just not so. Firing tests on trap and trench with many different users indicated that they did not know that it


 Top barrel cuts off and is covered by the forend.

AUSTRALIAN SKEET RECORD BROKEN TWICE AT VICTORIAN SKEET CARNIVAL

(from Laurie Connors)

Sensational shooting at the Victorian State Skeet Carnival at Mildura Gun Club on October 1980 saw the Australian record broken on consecutive days.

The record of 222 was broken by N.S.W. shooter. Barney Rooke from Wagga, with 230 straight, but this record fell within 24 hours, to Ian Hale from Melbourne Gun Club, Victoria, who shot 258 consecutive targets to again set a new record.

The original Australian Skeet shooting record of 215 straight was set by Victorian George Biggs at Melbourne Gun Club in 1976. This figure remained unaltered until well known all rounder with the shot gun. Jim Ellis (A.C.T.) shot 222 straight at the Southern Zone Skeet Carnival in N.S.W. only two weeks prior to the Victorian Carnival.

As well as setting a new Australian record, Ian Hale was also the winner of the overall high gun trophy over the tournament shooting 247-250.

More than 100 shooters competed at the carnival and came from N.S.W., Victoria and S.A. One competitior a long way from home was Ted McRae from Timaru, New Zealand.

INTERNATIONAL SHOOTING SCENE

The annual invitation to attend the Pesta Sukan Shooting Festival in Singapore has arrived.

The match will be held from August 5 to 12, and will include Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet.

For the first time the organizers are expecting an entry from the People's Republic of China, a country which has made great progress in the Olympic disciplines in recent times.

Mr Stephen Yap, who is Secretary of the Singapore Shooting Association, has advised that, to comply with local regulations, entries will close on May 31, 1981.

Any Australian shotgunner who wishes to compete in this match should contact the National Office as soon as possible. as entry will be restricted to six trench and six skeet shooters. . . .

The local scene insofar as trench and ISU skeet is concerned is quite bouyant.

West Wyalong Gun Club will celebrate the opening of its O.T. facility with a major tournament to be held on March 7 and 8

More exciting news from New South Wales is the creation of a State "International Sub-committee". The committee was formed at a meeting held at Taree-Wingham Gun Club in January, with Bruce Noll as Chairman. The group's secretary is Kevin Loy.

The National Sub-committee of similar name then invited the NSW group to submit the name of a person who could sit on the National Sub-committee. The nominee is Roger Walker and it appears certain that the recommendation will be accepted.

Then. the ACTA International Sub-committee will consist of Mr L. Connors. (Chairman). and Messrs Abbott. Buchan and Walker.

The ACTA International Sub-committee met in Melbourne on January 16, and the following is a summary of its decisions:

AIR NEW ZEALAND ELIMINATION MATCH

Through the generosity of Air New Zealand (The Pacific's Number One) the ACTA has been able to make available a trans-Tasman return air ticket to each State Association.

The tickets are to be used to move seven Australians to compete in the New Zealand South Island Championships. to be conducted later this year.

The selection matches will be known as the AIR NEW ZEALAND ELIMINATION SERIES and will be staged by State Associations, either as part of State Trap Carnivals, or as separate tournaments.

The event will have a maximum nomination of \$20, and will be held over 25 targets single barrel, 25 targets pointscore and 25 targets double barrel.

OLYMPIC TRENCH AND ISU SKEET TEAM SELECTIONS

Because no official invitation has been received from the host Association, the ACTA has had to cancel its plans to field a team in a competition being held at Nagoya, Japan.

However, selection procedures for the 1981 South Pacific Regional Championships, to be held at Brisbane in October. have been decided.

They are:

- 1. A 200 target O.T. and ISU Skeet match to be held in New South Wales during August (venue and dates yet to be advised).
- 2. The O.T. and ISU Skeet National Championships to be held at Melbourne Gun Club, on September 4, 5, 6 and 7.

The teams will be announced immediately after the conclusion of the National titles.

The selection procedure for shotgun representatives for the 1981 Commonwealth Games has also been defined.

The team will consist of two trap (O.T.) and two skeet shooters, with reserves to be named where necessary. Qualifying events will be:

(a) The 1981 National titles in Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet.


(b) The 1982 National titles in Olympic Trench and ISU Skeet (to be held at Brisbane Gun Club during Easter 1982).

(c) A 200 target event to be conducted in each state. preferably using the State Championship as part of the event. However, in cases where it is impossible for State Association to program its State Championships within the time span between the two National events, a specially programmed 200 target event in each discipline will be acceptable.



November saw the Grand Prix of Brazil and some of the results are interesting. Skeet scores were high and Trap scores rather ordinary by world standards.

It was an Argentinian in Robert Firmo who streeted the field by 2 targets with a world class score of 197/200 to take the final in the Skeet event. He won from Alfonso Irurrizaga, a Chilean on 195/200 and two targets further back was American Matt Dryke with 193/200

The interesting part though was the results in the Skeet Teams event where the Englishmen got up to tie with the Americans and win by a countback. Details from Brazil are sketchy but it is known that Wally Sykes, Paul Bentley, Steve Mutton and Roger Ford were all there and all finished in the final 10, Sykes shooting a good 191. Makes the Commonwealth Games look a bit interesting next year!

Trench prospects for the Commonwealth Games seem to be the Canadians, perhaps. Whilst Michael Carrega the famous Frenchman took top honours with 192/200 from American Ernie Neal, three targets behind him on 189, two Canadians figured prominently in the results. Ed Shaske was third, also on 189 and John Primrose came fifth with 186. It will be interesting to see if they compete in Brisbane.

There are a couple of Canadian Skeet shooters that should be kept in mind also from this tournament, Fred Altmann ran a good 188/200. Whilst not showing in the final 10 individuals, a Dan Kwasnycia ran a creditable 143 in the first 150 targets of the match.

* * *

For the first time in many years (or for as long as I can remember) the New Zealand Nationals will be held before ours here in Australia. The 1981 event is at Hamilton and will run from March 14th to 20th. We will have a look at the results in this column next month, maybe it will give us some idea of what sort of talent from across the Tasman will arrive in Melbourne in April.

While on the subject of the Kiwis, they have introduced a couple of administrative changes that have had mixed reactions from the rank and file.

the one we use here in Australia. There are some differences Perth last year.

however that are interesting. Working on the shooters' ability to break targets under MATCH conditions, records will be kept in the five major competition areas.

In NZ these are DTL (our common mark) and cover Single Rise (our DB), single barrel and points score (broken targets only to count), American Skeet, Olympic Skeet (our ISU Skeet), Olympic Trench and Automatic Ball Trap.

One interesting point is that SHOOT-OFF scores no NOT count in the handicapping process nor do novelty shoots it seems to be the intention to enforce the rule of 'no card-no shoot', it will be 'targets only' without a card at club level and no entry at all at provincial and national level.

The comment is made in "Gunshot" the official journal of NZ claybusting that, "once the new system has been in operation for a while and shooters get used to it they will wonder why we didn't adopt it years ago." Well good luck Kiwis, experience in Australia is that no system is perfect but perhaps you are on the right track.

You may remember the furore some years ago when the ACTA introduced a 50c 'Shooter Levy' to boost Association finances and support the ISU disciplines. The measure was shortlived due to adverse reaction and was tossed out only a year later. Well the NZ Association is introducing the same thing over there.

However, the reasons for it differ and are primarily caused by the increasing price of ammunition and the switch to reloading by many association members.

When the majority of Kiwi shooters shot factory loads which were supplied through the Association both the Club and the Association made 20c each commission on each packet sold. With the wholesale shift to reloading this source of revenue has dried up, hence the requirement for the levy.

If my mail is any indication the reaction across the Tasman is likely to be same as it was over here.

One other interesting point is that reloads are now per-missible in all events at New Zealand National Championships. There are plenty in this country who would applaud that move here.

For those interested in the 'facts and figures' department here is one for you. The ATA in the States has just released their official Registered Target Usage table for 1980. They in actual fact add up all the registered targets shot at in the USA and Canada during the year. We should run a competition to see if anybody could get close to the figure but I doubt if anybody would comprehend the massiveness of the usage.

So, without further ado, the total figure of targets shot at, in competition was 68,300,015.

Yes, that is correct, nearly sixty eight and one half MILLION targets.

The breakdown is also revealing, singles accounted for 33,194,250 which is 48% of the total. Handicap targets, at 26.739,675 represents 39% indicating a higher participation rate than Australia. In Doubles, just 8,366,090 targets were shot at which is 12% of the total. Some would say that Joe The first is the new Handicapping formula based broadly on Loitz must have shot at them all to be as good as he was at 0

The program will include:



KEEP IT SIMPLE

Over the years shooting instruction has become so involved that most shooters overlook the beautiful simplicity of the basic concepts.

THE BASICS

Let us start on the right foot together, as unless the basics are mastered, and strictly adhered to, you will have a frustrating time around the skeet field.

To shoot I.S.U. Skeet I can't over emphasise that firm understanding of the basic in skeet be learnt. These can be mastered better on the American skeet ground where the targets (being slower) give the shooter more time to improve his or her skills.

There has been many a championship where the wind is blowing or the rain has been pelting down or both. that by just sticking diligently to the basics has seen me through.

So where do we start? - let's have a look at the gun Perhaps the most misused piece of equipment, it shouldn't be the most important, and in I.S.U. the position of the hands on the gun is most important because the further the gun moves away from the shoulder more emphasis must be placed upon the control of the gun. Let's have a look at correct gun hold. With the gun held by the forend with the left hand, keep your eyes looking in front of you and with your right hand simply slap the pistol grip, at the same time taking a grip, you will notice that your hand is spread naturally around the pistol grip. the trigger finger is in a comfortable position and the remaining fingers are wrapped comfortably around the pistol grip with the thumb around the top pointing down. You will notice this is a comfortable grip. Try it a few times — this is your natural grip. You will also notice how flexible your wrist is, this also will enhance the speed at which your gun will travel towards your shoulder.

The Left Hand — Holding the gun by the pistol grip in your right hand, eyes looking forward, hold out your left hand and simply let the gun fall into your left hand. You will notice that the gun falls with the forend in your hand and your hand is on the middle of the forend. fingers wrapped around the right side of the wood and the thumb of the left comfortably placed on the left hand side of the forend.

Now that we are holding the gun properly, practise both these steps as much as you can, in time you will pick up your gun and unconsciously hold it correctly.

Whilst we are on the subject of practice the old saying is true, practice makes perfect, you cannot do enough of it. If you can handle your skeet gun every day for a few minutes, it would only help to enhance your game.

Bring the gun up smoothly — in I.S.U. Skeet the movement from the gun down position to the gun to head position is critical, it must be fast but at the same time smooth. Practise holding the gun in the correct position. On the hip, arms relaxed, start off slowly at first, two or three minutes a day will do.

Keep your head in a natural relaxed position and bring the gun to your head. **NEVER** take your head to the gun! Taking your gun to your head will ensure that cheek and eyes are naturally aligned with the barrels and the butt of the stock is in the softest part of your shoulder.

If you tighten up and take your head to the gun you will lift your head and the gun will inevitibly never mount in the same spot thus causing a jerky uncontrolled shot.

Practise bringing the gun up to your head. run it along a picture railing in your house somewhere, from left to right. right to left, two or three minutes every day will hold you in good stead, also it will train the exact muscles that you will need to help you control that gun swing and movement all day.


STANCE

The stance is very important in I.S.U. Skeet. it should be natural, comfortable and solid.

Stand and just take a look at people standing around talking, you will notice that their feet are apart approximately the width of the shoulders. in a comfortable relaxed position. Their body is comfortably balanced. they are unconscious of standing naturally. The same should apply on the skeet field. This exact **natural** stance is what you require.

A good rule of thumb is to keep this same natural position. but point your left foot approximately in the vicinity of where you are going to hit your target.

The right foot will be behind and to the right of the left foot but the width apart should still be the same distance as the shoulders. When you are happy and comfortable with your stance slightly bend BOTH knees as this will help to relax you and enhance your swing. ALWAYS ADDRESS YOURSELF TO APPROXIMATELY WHERE YOU ARE GOING TO HIT YOUR TARGET.



TO ENHANCE YOUR STANCE

Footwear that is comfortable, not worn out and with a slightly raised heel will keep you on the balls of your feet. The sole should be of the non slip type. Flat soled shoes do not help the shooting stance nor do high heeled boots or shoes. A nice pair of sox, not too thick, not too thin and preferably made out of wool, these will help to make a long day of training or competing much more comfortable.

was a long barrelled gun they were using. The handling characteristics with all barrels was superb.

At present the big long 86cm barrel is full choke. the 81cm single, improved modified (three quarter) and the 81cm double barrel is choked improved modified/full. All these chokings were verified at the pattern plate using a mixture of Rottweil 'Club 32's' and 'Winchester AA 300's'.


As for the rest of the gun, it is the same good quality that we have discussed before. There is a distinct improvement in the checkering which we applaud.

The triggers are detatchable and are of superb quality. We tested with conventional pull/pull and the very well made release/pull combinations. They are delight to use and go a long way towards making this particular gun one of the most versatile on the Australian market.

To sum up, this is one of the best specialist guns we have looked at. The full combination set is not cheap but then most top products are not. We compared it in 1979 with the Browning, Perazzi and Beretta SO4. We think it has an edge on them in this version and is now on a par with the Browning Supertrap 80.

For anybody interested in specialist trap ordinance it is worth a very close look..

BELMONT BREAKTHROUGH

*\$520,000 JOIN GRANT ANNOUNCEMENT.

One of the big news items to break on Australia Day was the announcement that the deadlock on provision of funds for the upgrade of Belmont shooting complex had been resolved.

A running battle has continued for two years between the Australian Shooting Association and government authorities. At the centre of the feud was the need to upgrade the Belmont complex, which is located a few kilometres south-east of Brisbane. The complex is to be used as the venue for the shooting section of the 1982 Commonwealth Games, and requires improvements estimated to cost \$520,000.

An additional factor involved in the dispute has been the lack of certainty that has surrounded the long term tenure of the site. which is currently administered by the Queensland Rifle Association by agreement with the Federal Department of Administrative Services.

It is believed that a ten year lease is to be offered to ensure continuity of tenure.

The funding problem has been resolved by the Federal and Queensland Governments agreeing to accept equal shares of the upgrade bill. Although no money has yet changed hands sources close to both governments have advised that the decisions are firm.

As a consequence, work will shortly commence on the upgrade project, which will be directed by a Brisbane based sub-committee of the Australian Shooting Association.

The shotgun events connected to the 1982 Games will be held at Brisbane Gun Club, where about \$120,000 of the grant will be spent. The improvements will include the provision of a second Olympic Trench field, and new equipment in the existing trench and I.S.U. skeet fields.

Additionally, the club house will be improved, and a second building to be used as an administrative centre for the skeet events, will be erected.

There is now a great urgency about the project. as the Games organizers have planned a "mini games" for October 1981 to be used as a "dress rehearsal".

The Australian Shooting Association will stage the 1981 South Pacific Regional Championships for all disciplines excluding Running Board. An Open International Championship will be programmed in conjunction and an invitation to compete will be extended to all Commonwealth countries plus other countries in the Pacific Basin.

Already, there are indications that pistol teams from U.S.A., Korea and Sweden will attend.

The "mini games" are only eight months away. so there is an immense challenge in front of the clubs that operate on the Belmont complex.



This soft covered manual of 56 pages contains 18 major articles on the role of the NRA in International Shooting. Although published nearly 20 years ago there are some very

valuable tips for training in the ISU disciplines. Top American competitors of the past give these tips in Free Rifle and Pistol shooting together with Centre Fire and Rapid Fire Pistol. There is also a section on Inernational Clay Pigeon Shooting.

Although dated it is very interesting reading for any shooter with a leaning towards the ISU disciplines.

YOU AND THE FEE INCREASE

A year ago, after the Australian Clay Target Association had adopted its new Articles of Association. a Finance Sub-committee was formed to advise the Executive Committee on financial matters.

The members of this committee are nationally known leaders in the world of finance and business expertise. and they are also registered shooters.

They understand the problems of clay target administration but are INDEPENDENT of the National Executive. As a result of their deliberations, they recommended to the Management Committee that from January 1, 1982 there be a registration fee increase of \$10.

The basis for their recommendation was two-fold. The first, and most obvious, was on the grounds of an inflation rate of 10% per annum. The last increase in fees occurred at the end of 1977 and the following chart will show how the fees should have increased just to maintain the 1978 figures.

1979	\$22.00
1980	\$24.20
1981	\$26.62
1982	\$29.28
1983	\$32.20
1984	\$35.42

For the last three years, it can be seen that the fees have fallen behind that amount needed to maintain our reserves, and indeed the 1980 Financial Report, which club secretaries will soon have, shows that the Association has just about "broken even" despite the short fall in the fees. The budget plan for 1981 shows a similar situation. The reserves have been maintained only due to stringent "house-keeping". For example, salaries for **all** personnel at the National Office will be exactly the same this year. \$77,000 as in 1976, and the cost of publishing this magazine this year will be \$4,000, whilst in 1976 it was \$10,000. In addition, there has been no increase: in advertising rates for clubs since 1977.

At present, the Australian Clay Target Association holds reserves of \$100,000 which is less than the assets of a number of clubs throughout Australia. These funds are earmarked for development projects. It is the intentions of the Executive Committee that the Association become self-supporting through its involvements. This would enable any future fee increases to be kept to a minimum with the objective of keeping our sport within the financial reach of as many as possible.

In addition. a referendum of all member clubs committed the Association to the development of a National Ground and administration centre. Such a project will require much more than the available funds. The proposed fee increase, together with stringent economies could help build out present inadequate reserves.

One State Association has suggested that an independent financial assessment be made to determine that such an increase is justified. The Executive already has the services of financial experts who understand our sport. and their advice is being followed.

At the A.G.M. to be held at the Melbourne Nationals, club delegates will be asked to vote on the proposed fee increase. This article has been prepared by the Management Committee because it is so concerned that our sport continue to develop.

By forward planning, the Association can protect shooters investment in our sport. It must not be allowed to stagnate.

EDITOR'S MAILBOX

Dear Friends from Down Under.

NOVEMBER 1980

We missed you at the Club and at the Grand this year. But we hear rumors that a group may come next year. and we hope that you are among them. If so, the welcome mat is out.

Tommy and I have relatively little to report — at least out of the ordinary. I guess we are in a rut, but a fairly comfortable and lazy one. Both of us are in good health, if we ignore creaking joints.

I made my usual hunting trip to Canada with my buddy. spending almost all of October in Saskatchewan (half way up. and near the Alberta border). Duck hunting was different than usual. It had rained for half of August and most of September, so almost no barley was harvested. It was still in swaths - a cafeteria for ducks. However, the ducks decided to eat their meals at night, after shooting time in the evening and before shooting opened in the morning. That was partly caused by previous shooting by local people who couldn't harvest. As a result we had no shooting over decoys in the fields. But we did get some good pass shooting between some sloughs. That is more fun anyway. Altogether we got 104 ducks. 1 goose. 13 ruffed grouse (very badly down this year). and 16 sharptail grouse (lots of them, but we do not hunt them much). Perfect weather, and thoroughly enjoyable. Visited with a lot of friends up there. Fine people - almost as nice as Aussies and Kiwis!! Most are of German extraction. and some of them are the original settlers in that area of the 1930's. Interesting.

While I was up there, Tommy visited friends and relatives upstate and in Iowa.

The only hunting we did in Wisconsin this year was deer hunting, which opened November 20th. This year neither of us received a Hunters Choice permit, so we were limited to bucks only. The first day I saw and shot at five bucks by 1 pm. at ranges of from 30 to 100 yards. Never have seen more than two in a whole season. We also saw 47 other deer that day. That was in a shotgun-only area, so I used my Rem. 870 skeet gun and rifled slugs. Killed the first and fifth ones. Flinched on one and missed two more, assisted by Tommy's misses on one of them. The one I brought home weighed about 125 pounds and had 3 points on each side. Not big, but a nice one and good eating. Gave the other one (about the same) to the people with whom we stay. Some of you met them here in 1974 — Bill and Norma Johnson. I shot a Canada goose on the way home from there at Horicon Marsh. This makes a lot of dope on hunting, but some of you are hunters and may be interested.

I had a **very bad** year on trap except for two good scores at the Grand, 196 and 199 on Sunday and Monday, which won me the Senior Veteran (over 70) trophies. Broke 99 in the state skeet shoot for a Senior Veteran trophy also.

Our winter season weekly events started at the Club in December and run through April. That will keep me busy on Saturdays and Sundays. Our total targets thrown at the Club this year will be about 1.800,000. which is down 4.4% from 1979. All of the difference is accounted for by two registered shoots practically rained out. The State shoot had 891 shooters in the 16 yard event, down from 918. (We have had 1001 and 1111 in recent past years). The 457,025 state shoot targets represented a 6.6% drop from 1979. Our "depression" has hurt shooting some, but not too bad, especially locally. Milwaukee area industry has helped us better than that in most of the country.

We recovered shot at the Club again. We do that every 6 or 7 years when it accumulates sufficiently. We got 256 tons this time, mostly sold at 31c per pound. That came in handy.

These figures are given, as I know many of you are involved with club management etc. over there. Have any of your clubs recovered shot?

Our winter is just getting a start. We had 4 or 5 inches of snow a couple of weeks ago, but it all melted again. What we get from now on will stay until March. But with snow plowing it doesn't inconvenience us very much. Of course, we have to plow it off several acres at the Club to clear 6 traps and 5 skeet fields, plus the parking lot, for our winter shooting. But that isn't too bad with a six-foot plow on our pickup truck. Once we did have to get in some heavy machinery to move it, as it was too deep.

Winter is our best season at the Club from the standpoint of participation by our own members. We have from 60 to 150 shooters every Sunday morning for our little 50 and 25 target trap and skeet events. We will probably have 150-200 next Sunday for our annual Xmas Basket shoot. Prizes for that are baskets full of everything for a Xmas dinner for a family. Last week we had 125 trap and 49 skeet entries.

I just received my October issue of the Australian Clay Target News. I noted several of your names in it for various achievements.

Our people here, who met you at the Club. wish you the very best for the coming year. We are always glad to see you. and even to just hear from you.

George Breman first became involved in the sport when. after marrying into the Henwood family. he used to be the sole voice talking about football at a time that everybody else was talking about clay busting.




In 1978, George was appointed as Shoot Marshall for the Australian Trap and Skeet Championships. which were held in Adelaide.

NEWSLETTER TO ALL VICTORIAN ACCREDITED ZONE AND CLUB COACHES

During the latter part of 1980. the A.C.T.A.'s National Coaching Council had submitted its coaching scheme for approval, at level one, with the Federal Government sponsored body. This is known as the Australian Coaching Council which has been created to co-ordinate the coaching schemes being implemented by other National Sporting Associations. The direction of this council is being handled by a number of people selected from sport. State Government and Federal Government.

As a direct result of the above action, our National Coaching Council Scheme has been accepted at level one by the Australian National Coaching Accreditated Scheme. In other words, our **accredited** zone and club coaches do now qualify for acceptance into the National Project — all you have to do is

send a cheque for \$6 to me, made out to the A.C.T.A. and I'll complete the necessary forms and paper work for your acceptance. The \$6 is to cover the cost of the "coach" identification parcel, which includes an I.D. card and a cloth badge.

Unfortunately, we still have a number of club coaches who have been trained but have not yet done their accreditation test. To these coaches I'd advise that they contact their zone coach who will help you to complete your accreditation. **Cont'd over page**

"THE FEW" Or "APATHY IS THIRD BARRE

Winston Churchill's famous comments are familiar to most of us. especially the one relating to the British and Allied fighter pilots referred to as the "Few". For those of us who are unable to recount this comment, it goes - "Never in the field of human conflict. have so many. owed so much. to so few"

Churchill's comment can be directly related to our sport. today! How many of us go/to a/our club, put a gun in the rack, nominate. and then wait our turn to shoot? Sound familiar? The "Few" in our case are the administration of a gun club. How many times have you heard comments like. "There are no drinks left". "They (the club) have run out of cartridges" or "Where is the referee for our squad?" You could go on forever! For all these cases the job of procuring refreshment and running a shoot fall to all too few. The people that do the menial tasks are never so much as given a pat on the head for the work they do, but let something go wrong and the line-up for "throwing the stones of citicism" makes the "Great Wall of

China" look like a suburban front fence. The long term effect on any club is that the "Few" become fewer, the small mistakes become more frequent, the grumbles grow louder. and the attendance dwindles. Inevitably the tasks fall to one or two. or. if you're lucky. three people. But they will throw it in, as the ingratitude of the masses continues to grow. and grow it will!

Somehow. sometime. somebody will try to pull it together. He or they, have to engender a sense of club pride and participation and make a team effort. in order that the club may survive.

This situation has existed in the majority of clubs in Australia. but still the "knockers" persist, and the "Few" keep changing.

Every member of a club must accept that he gives to his club as much as he expects to receive.

The many tasks that a club member may undertake to help his club run a shoot include such things as -

1. Ensure target stocks in trap houses are adequate.

2. Assist in squad chasing.

3. Pencilling for a referee etc. etc.

Things like club maintainance on grounds. fences. traps. clubhouses etc. can be made very easy by many hands.


It is your club. your sport, you can only get out of it what you put in.

If the attitude of many was to be copied by all, the only "BOOM" this sport will have will be the club door closing, and that act will be performed by the last of the "Few" ... saying "I have had enough. let somebody else bash their head against the wall!"







The South Pacific Regional Championships for most shooting events will be held at the Belmont Complex. Brisbane during the first week of October.

This match will be a feature of the "Mini Games" being staged by the Commonwealth Games Foundation. as a full dress rehearsal for the 1982 Commonwealth Games.

The ACTA is taking full advantage of the opportunity to stage a large scale international competition, and invitations have been sent to over thirty nations to compete.

INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION OVERSEAS


At a recent meeting of the Association's Management Committee, the problems of funding overseas competition visits by Australian representatives was discussed in detail.


Resulting from that discussion, it was agreed that **under present circumstances**, no funds from Association sources could be made available to assist teams to enter either the 1981 or the 1982 World Championships.

Nevertheless, in recognition of the fact that private funding may be available for individual competitors, provision has been made for shooters who qualify on a performance rating of 94% or better, to make an application to the International Sub Committee for approval to compete.

Management has kept its options open in connection with other international competition and has asked for further recommendations from the International Sub-committee.

These decisions do not affect the Association's commitment to send a five-man team to the 1981 Grand American Tournament, and management is grateful for the assistance promised by the Federal Government in respect to this project.


