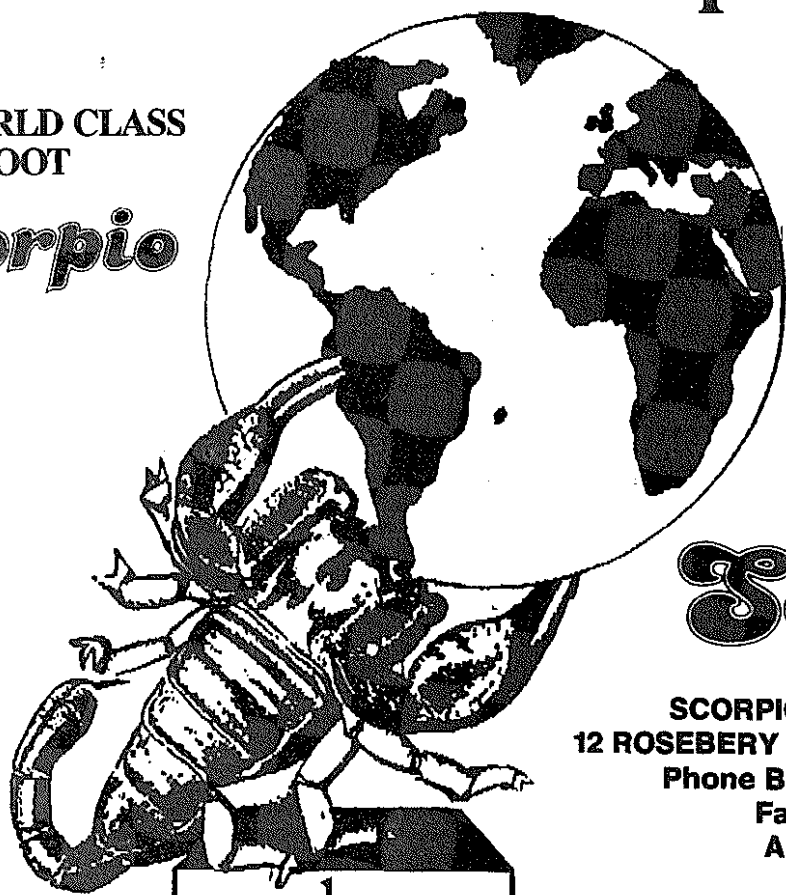

EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS NOTES



A new year to look forward to which is in itself an exciting prospect when the pressures of 1990 are looked back upon. Having said that we, that is all of us who are associated with clay target shooting, have a responsibility to work for the betterment of the sport and the future of this Association which is entering its fifty-seventh year of operations.

During this period the sport has experienced many highs, and unfortunately as well many lows, all of which are part of the Association's proud history. In 1992 we have an opportunity to expand the highs for the betterment of the sport.

ACTA History

Our historian Mr George Biggs has compiled a great deal of information into his soon to be released history book of the Association, which by what I have already been able to view will be full of interest to many of our older members and provide an insight into the Association for many of our newer members. Details on the availability of the history of the ACTA will be published in the CTSN, hopefully in the early part of this year. History is something to look back on certainly, it is also something to be created and as an Association we look forward to creating history in the years ahead which will reflect as well then as our present history does today.

Director of Coaching

When reading this month's CTSN you will notice the appointment of Mr Murray Alexander from Perth, WA, to the position of Director of Coaching, which is purely an administrative non coaching role. Murray who comes to the position with a great deal of experience is one of only six accredited level 3 coaches having attained this degree of excellence during his term as State Coaching Director for Western Australia.

To enable all members to understand and appreciate the role that Murray is occupying within the sport we have published the responsibilities and duties of the position which he will no doubt fulfil with great distinction to the benefit of the Association and all members.

As the position is part time, no restrictions are placed on any activities of a personal or business nature, in particular activities associated with commercial operations from within the firearms and allied industries.

This change of direction has been made possible owing to the restructuring of the grants received from the Australian Sports Commission who previously had funded a full time National Coaching Director. Under the restructure, the Association does still receive the ASC grant, however being applied in other areas, the reporting requirements of the Director of Coaching to the ASC no longer exist which enables the position to be structured in a different manner from the position of National Coaching Director, a position which no longer exists.

Murray will also be providing regular and informative columns for the CTSN which will be of interest to shooters in each of the three disciplines.

Hands on coaching responsibilities within the sport will rest with the respective State Coaching Director who will with the assistance of his zone and club coaches implement the coaching procedure of the National Coaching Council under the chairmanship of Ross Silvester (Management).

If your views receive the support of your State Association then they will be able to be discussed at National level.

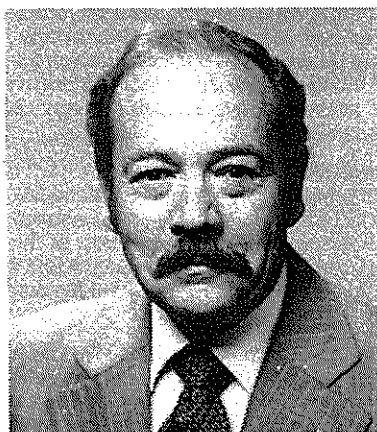

CURRENT FIREARMS OWNERSHIP ISSUES



From Neal Tamblyn, Secretary General, Australian Shooting Association (ASA)

Some months ago the ASA very deliberately decided not to become involved in the highly emotive public debate concerning firearms ownership, and the peripheral issues which went hand in hand with that debate.

ASA comprised the following national shooting organisations:

Australian Clay Target Association
Australian Smallbore & Air Rifle Association
National Rifle Association of Australia
Field & Game Federation of Australia
Pistol Australia
Sporting Shooters Association of Australia

These bodies developed an agreed policy position as follows:

"The Australian Shooting Association deplores the indiscriminate use of firearms in the community, and supports any attempt by Governments to eradicate such incidents.

The Australian Shooting Association however is concerned to protect the interests of its members by resisting any legislation that may discriminate against them.

The Australian Shooting Association is prepared to work with the relevant authorities to ensure that a sensible form of firearms legislation is introduced serving the needs of our members and fulfilling the expectations of the general community."

The recent and current program conducted by the media, both print and visual, is clearly anti-gun ownership. The readiness of a couple of pro-ownership groups, who couldn't resist the challenge to jump into the arena, did little to further our cause, which ASA has continuously espoused as being the preservation of the interest of legitimate firearms owners participating in all forms of shooting from recreational to competitive target shooting at club, state, national and international levels.

ASA represents some 60+ thousand Australian target shooters, whilst the International Shooting Union's (UIT) worldwide membership is 75 million.

Notwithstanding the political turnaround in New South Wales a couple of years back, any thinking person should have been able to predict that this topic was far from a dead issue, and would be reintroduced at an appropriate circumstance in time.

Senator Michael Tate's amendments of the Customs Import Regulations last December, which led to the banning of the importation of semi-automatic military style assault rifles was a preliminary vote, and not unexpected. Most people do not seem to have much of a problem with that decision.

The recent tragic event in Sydney, which involved the use of a semi-automatic military style assault rifle of the manufacture specifically nominated by Senator Tate, and featured many times on TV as an undesirable firearm, provided the catalyst for the reintroduction of the topic of firearms ownership and gun control at the recent Police Ministers Conference.

ASA, as stated, did not get into the public debate, as in its opinion there was nothing to be gained because of the emotion being generated by the media and the anti-gun ownership lobby.

Rather, ASA concentrated its efforts in the areas which are of real influence, and where decisions will ultimately be made. This was in the area of Police and Government at both state and federal levels.

Our experience, over many years, has proved to us that Police Officials and Governments, are prepared to, and do listen to, logical, rational and substantive submissions which are presented in a co-operative rather than a confrontational style.

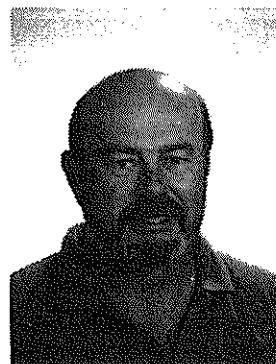
Several State Shooting Organisations, and individual shooting affiliates of those organisations made presentations to their own police departments and local politicians.

The Police Ministers Council, following its meeting on October 23 issued a statement, and a copy of its draft proposals for the forthcoming Premier Conference.

Whilst changes are recommended in certain areas of private gun ownership, as related to recreational and field shooting, changes have not been recommended as being necessary for the organised, legitimate, competitive target shooter.

ASA's concern to protect the privileges of its members in the manner in which it did has proved successful, and vindicates the decision to pursue the low profile, but specifically directed, program that it adopted.

NATIONAL DIRECTOR OF COACHING



It is an honour to have been offered the position of Director of Coaching, a position which I am both pleased and proud to accept.

The way I see the task that lies ahead as your National Director of Coaching, will be one of enjoyment in assisting and good old fashioned work.

I would like to think I take on this job with the shooters, coaches and the ACTA's best interests at heart.

There are many areas that need to be worked on and a considerable amount of listening to be done. Areas such as raising the image and respect of all coaches, then backing them up with a library of data and knowledge. The booklet "Introduction to Clay Target Shooting" is alive and well and should be reintroduced in a new format. The area concerning ladies and juniors will be addressed along with 101 other items concerning the Coaching Council.

To quote an old expression "Rome wasn't built in a day", but with the commitment made to this office, we will eventually see coaches and coaching enjoy renewed usage of the ACTA coaching system.

NATIONAL DIRECTOR OF COACHING

Responsibilities: To act on behalf of the Australian Clay Target Association Inc as,

Director of Coaching
In an administrative, non coaching role

Involvement: (1) (a) Being a part time position occupying whatever amount of time is necessary to fulfil the non coaching role of Director of Coaching, no restrictions are imposed on any activities of a personal or business nature, in particularly activities associated with commercial operations from within the firearms and allied industries.

Proviso: Providing always that such activity or involvement does not interfere or conflict in any manner or form that could be seen to be or recognised by the Management Committee as being detrimental to the specific duties and responsibilities of the administrative position of Director of Coaching.

(b) In the event of any concern arising that the role of Director of Coaching is/may be affected by personal or business interests, the matter shall be determined by the National Executive Committee upon the receipt of a recommendation from the Management Committee.

Reporting: Through the Executive Director to the Chairman of the National Coaching Council (Management Members).

- Duties:**
- (1) To liaise with the Executive Director on the requirements of the Association in relation to all aspects of the position.
 - (2) To be responsible for the implementation of the Coaching Policy of the National Coaching Council, a Body comprising of seven elected/appointed State Coaching Directors.
 - (3) To maintain a comprehensive computerised coaching data base utilising the facilities of the National Office.
 - (4) To be responsible through the National Coaching Council to the Australian Coaching Council for the course content of Coaching Levels 1-3.
 - (5) To be responsible for the working relationship of the Association with the Canberra based Australian Coaching Council.
 - (6) To arrange programs in conjunction with the National Office, for attendance at the Australian Institute of Sport by members of the National Training Squad or similar.
 - (7) To contribute articles to the Clay Target Shooting News as frequently as required.
 - (8) To advise the Association on matters relative to the advancement of coaching in Australia.
 - (9) To maintain frequent and regular contact with State Coaching Directors.
 - (10) To encourage coaching activity in all States under the control of the respective State Coaching Director.
 - (11) To assist State Associations with funding submissions to their respective State Governments.

Tenure: Appointed as at 1st January 1992 for a period of one year

Review: Position reviewed in November 1992, then bi-annually for continuation of two year appointments.

Notice:

Should either party wish to discontinue the position for whatever and any reason, an agreed notice period of three months shall apply.

Travel:

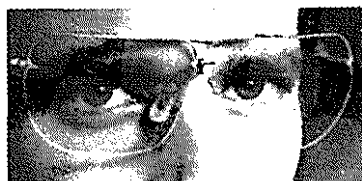
- (1) All costs associated with travel to attend meetings of the National Coaching Council will be met by the Association.
- (2) All costs associated with travel to attend meetings of the Association (where applicable) will be met by the Association.

Conditional:

For matters other than remuneration the duties of the Director of Coaching may be amended by the Association at any time.

In the event of any amendment being considered necessary to the responsibilities and duties of the Director of Coaching, agreement shall be reached prior to the continuity of the position.

5 YEAR RULE REVIEW

The National Shooting Committee is scheduled to review the shooting rules of the Association during 1992 with the view to any changes becoming effective as at 1/1/1993.

If any club/zone has a specific matter relating to the rules which they would like to see amended, they are requested to fully document the matter they wish to have addressed and forward the details to their respective State Association for discussion.

Subject to the receipt of a recommendation from the State Association the suggestion will be addressed by the National Rules Committee.

As a preliminary report on the progress of the Rules Committee is to be presented to the Executive Committee in May, any suggestion which may be forthcoming must be made available to the respective State Association at the earliest opportunity to allow sufficient time for discussion by the State Association and the Rules Committee subject to their receipt of a recommendation to amend the shooting rules.

As State Associations generally will not meet before February it is important that all details relating to proposed rule changes are made available to the State Secretary by no later than 31st January to enable them to receive the fullest consideration.

VALE KAYE WOODS



It is with deep regret that the Tasmanian Clay Target Association advise of the passing of their Life Member, Kaye Woods, on November 9th, 1991.

Kaye had been ill for the last eight years of her life, but her positive attitude kept her going — determined not to let her illness beat her.

Kaye's involvement in the administration of Clay Target Shooting started over 20 years ago when in 1970 she was appointed Secretary/Treasurer of the Rosebery Gun Club. She held this position until 1978. She was also their Delegate to the TCTA from this time until 1986.

In 1980 Kaye took on the position of State Secretary/Treasurer of the TCTA until she resigned due to ill health in 1990. During this 10 years she was also Cressy Gun Club's Secretary/Treasurer for approximately 3 of those years and also Cressy's Delegate to the TCTA from 1987 until 1991. After resigning as Cressy's Secretary, she took on managing their kitchen facilities for the next 12 months single handed.

During her time as State Secretary, she was elected in 1982 as a Tasmanian Delegate to the National Executive Committee, holding this position for 5 years. Whilst on the National Executive Committee, Kaye was Chairperson of the Nationals Sub-Committee and also on the National Executive Management Committee.

Kaye was instrumental in organising the first Australian Masters Games in 1987 and the first Tasmanian Masters Games in 1989. She was also the backbone of organising the 1990 National Trap Championships held in Tasmania, even though at the time of conducting these Championships, Kaye was in hospital undergoing quite a serious operation. She had put in hours and hours of ground work prior to the commencement of these National Championships.

Kaye was also a qualified Trap and Skeet Referee, a Referee Examiner and a State Rules Supervisor — not bad for someone who didn't shoot.

Kaye was awarded Life Membership to the TCTA in 1990, the first person within our State to be given this status.

Kaye was a dedicated and tireless worker, her commitment and love she had for our sport was quite obvious. Kaye you will always be remembered for all your hard work. People with that amount of dedication are hard to find. Thanks for everything. We will certainly miss you.

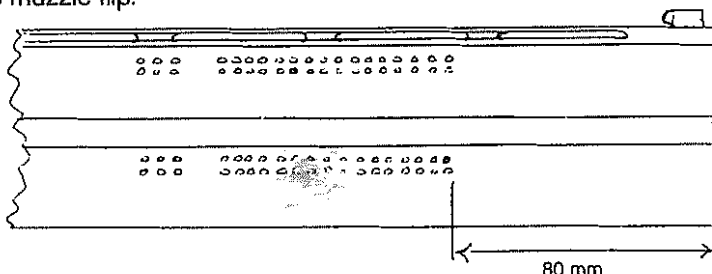

BARREL PORTING

\$75/Barrel

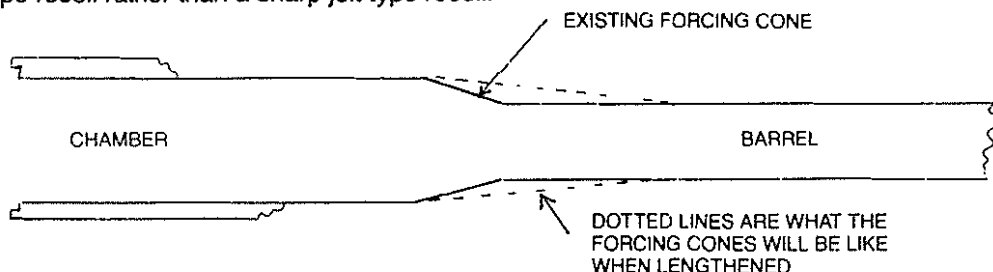
Is a series of holes machined into the barrel 80mm from the muzzle. This 80mm length allows choke tube guns to be ported without interfering with the choke tube area. It is designed to reduce recoil and because it is venting gases upwards it stops muzzle flip.



LENGTHENING FORCING CONES

\$60/Barrel

This is lengthening the existing taper from chamber to barrel from around 15-25mm long to 44-48mm long, depending on the diameter of the barrel. In existing barrels the shot on the outside row races forwards and gets deformed by the sharp angle of the cone, and therefore does not fly truly and gives you the 'fliers' on the outside of the pattern. If you lengthen the taper, then the shot does not get deformed, which gives much more even and denser patterns as the flyers are now being put to use in the pattern proper. WA STATE OLYMPIC TRAP

October 12-13, 1991

The State Trench Titles were this year shifted from the Cunderdin complex to the West Australian Gun Club as the Cunderdin machinery was required for the World Championships being hosted here in November 1991.

The conditions were perfect visually, but the weather tended to be balmy and hot with low cloud cover over the two days, keeping the heat locked in for the duration of the shoot.

A total of twenty-seven (27) shooters attended the shoot, with there being three (3) visitors from the Eastern seaboard. The visitors who arrived on Thursday and Friday were: Mr Michael Diamond — New South Wales; Mr Curtis Wennburg — Canada; Mrs Deserie Huddleston — New South Wales.

All three shooters will be representing their respective countries Australia and Canada, at the World Championships. Deserie will be a representative of the Inaugural Australian Womens Olympic Trap Team.

Throughout the titles some of the shooters, namely Curtis Wennburg, Murray Alexander and Mark Westlake, achieved the magic 25 break but it was Michael Diamond who always started the day and finished the day with a 25 break. In the final shoot off of the top six shooters, both Michael and Murray shot a 25/25, culminating in Michael being the Overall Winner with a score of 214/225 followed closely by Murray Alexander 205/225 and third was Curtis Wennburg from Canada 199/225. Deserie's score at some points were not her best, but over the period of Sunday she managed to channel all her concentration into rectifying the problems she had encountered on the Saturday — namely the heat, humidity, brilliant light conditions and the scoring of a two and a half hour round of Trench due to a trap malfunction.

The 1991 West Australian State Olympic Trap Team will consist of: Murray Alexander 180/200, 205/225; Mr Mark Westlake 174/200, 190/225; Mr Peter Strike 165/200, 184/225; Mr Phil Melvin 165/200; Mr John Fissoli 168/200, 189/225; (Reserve) Joe Dizirno 163/200.

(This is not to be confused with the West Australian State Shoulder to Shoulder Team which is selected over the six qualifying rounds nominated.)

The scores of this compulsory qualifying round are as follows. Scores as listed above plus: John Harris 161/200; Gordon Beard 150/200; Anthony Snook 126/200; Terry Morony 114/200.

In conjunction with the State Olympic Trap Titles, the ISU skeet shooters ran the Metropolitan ISU Skeet Championship. We were pleased with the representation from the Eastern seaboard being: Ian Hale — Victoria, Craig Mueleman — Victoria, David Cunningham — Victoria, Andy Larsen — Queensland, Wendy Adams — Victoria.

Ian showed his inimitable style with winning the Championship with a 218/225 from Craig who narrowly took out second place from David by one point. Wendy, also a member of the Inaugural Australian Womens ISU Skeet Team, won first place in B grade.

During the weekend and with the assistance of Mr Peter Quire, many of the volunteer personnel took the opportunity to polish their refereeing, scoring and flipboarding skills whilst Championship competition was in progress, so that the best results would be achieved for the World Championship. To add to this, our visitors decreed that it was a worthwhile exercise coming over as they were able to shoot under the ever changing light conditions which effectively changed the landscape and colour of the targets drastically. Acclimatisation to the weather conditions is a major factor that will have to be considered when all three Australian Teams come over. This week-ends heat and humidity gave the competitors an insight into what to expect during the World Championships.

 - (c) In the event of a World Cup being programmed prior to the conduct of the qualifying competition, participation shall be at the discretion of the National Shooting Committee, subject to justification.

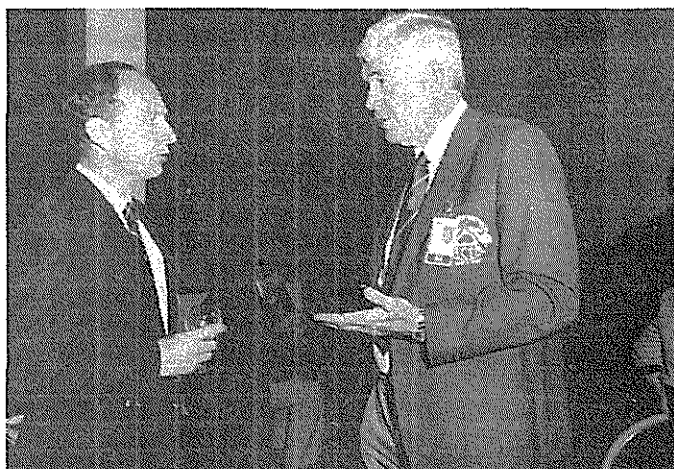

UIT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS — TRAP & SKEET

The International Shooting Union granted the 1991 World Championships to Australia in 1989 when the bid to host the Championships gained the support of voting members at the UIT General Assembly in Spain. Not all countries were supportive of a World Championship being allocated to Australia with many remembering the World Air Weapons Championships which had been granted to Australia for 1987 and subsequently returned to the UIT owing to Australia's inability, for various reasons, to proceed with the Championships which were eventually held in Hungary.

For the 1991 World Trap and Skeet Championships, the UIT entrusted the role of technical delegate to Vice President Gary Anderson from USA who first inspected the facilities at Whiteman Park, WA, in November of 1991. After carrying out a detailed inspection of the ground and meeting with the Organising Committee under the chairmanship of past ACTA President, Mr Roy Holtfreter, Gary in his report to the UIT on the first stage of his technical involvement was most complimentary on Australia's ability to host a successful World Trap and Skeet Championship.

Having proceeded this far the UIT appointed the six members of their shotgun technical committee to the jury to ensure that Australia's ability to manage the competition on behalf of the UIT was not left to chance. The jury under the chairmanship of Mr Hans Lang from Germany was further strengthened by the added appointment of Mr Neville Pryce-Jones from Great Britain with Australia providing an additional two members, Mr Jim Kelly and Mr David Menck, both from Queensland.



L-R: John Primrose Canadian Trap Shooter in discussion with Jury Member Jim Kelly.

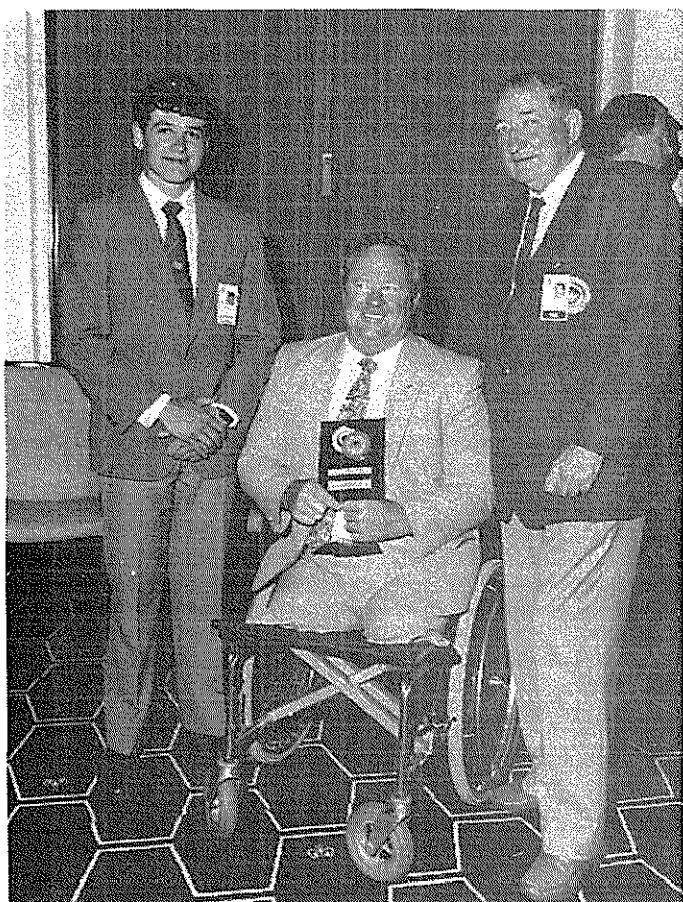
With the UIT appointments firmly in place all was in readiness for what promised to be an exciting seven days of competition. The weather up to the Opening Ceremony day had been a little unseasonal and not quite as warm as had been expected. All who witnessed and participated in the Opening Ceremony will have long and lasting memories of the occasion which certainly did nothing other than enhance Australia's ability to conduct events of importance in the world of sport.

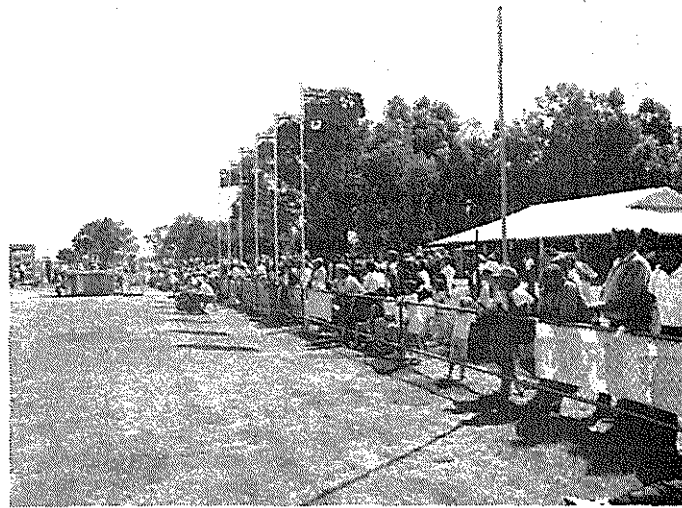

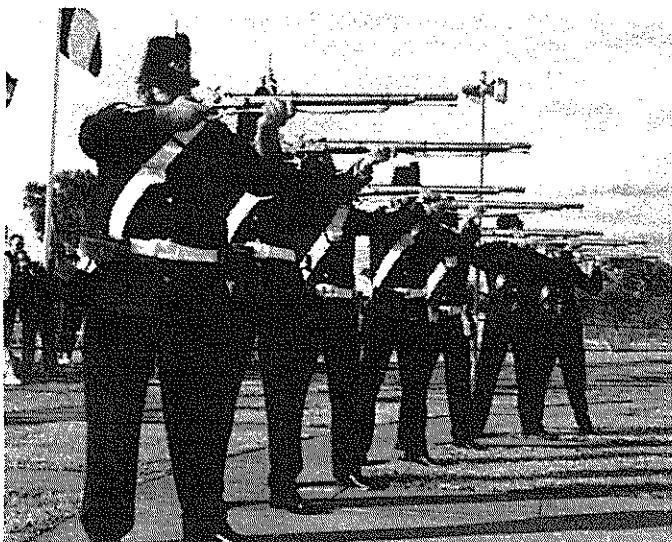

The final round honours were shared by Brett Erickson (USA) and Alexander Asanov (USSR) whose final round 50/50 could not gain for him a position in the final six, which included two shooters from the USA, one from Italy, Germany, Belgium and Australia's own Michael Diamond.

The World Championship final six was lead by: M. Venturini (Ita) 193/200; J. Waldron (USA) 193/200; M. Diamond (Aus) 192/200; J. Damme (Ger) 192/200; F. Peeters (Bel) 192/200; B. Erickson (USA) 191/200.

With two targets between first and sixth the final 25 was a delight to watch. At the completion of 24 targets Michael Diamond and Marco Venturini had shot the 24 with Venturini first to shoot his 25th and final target to win the World Trap Championship. The atmosphere was electric as a miss would have opened the door for Australia and nineteen year old Michael Diamond.

Showing all the characteristics of a true champion Marco Venturini shot the last target to win the title from Michael Diamond who also shot his 25th target to take the silver medal having pushed the World Champion to the limit. The bronze medal was won by Jorge Damme from Germany who won Gold at Moscow in 1990 with a perfect 200/200.

A magnificent end to three exciting days of competition which produced for Australia a silver medal which was widely acclaimed by the pro Michael Diamond crowd which viewed the final. 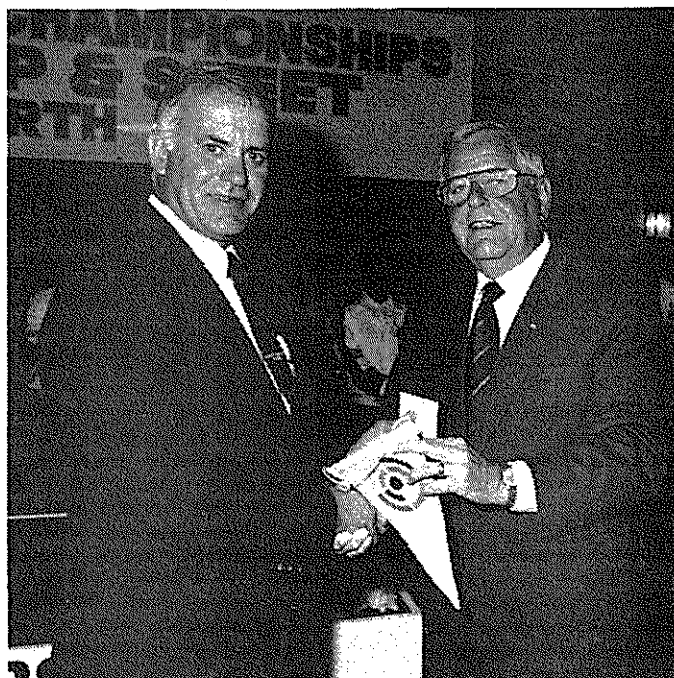

Three exciting prospects for the future shared the lead after the first day of shooting with scores of 71/75, Julian Womble (GB), Robert Garwood (GB) and Curtis Wennberg (Canada) all of whom shot their targets well. Three shooters were on 70/75 which promised well for an exciting and close second days shooting.

With a second day 74/75 Julian Womble lead the field three targets ahead of Lance Bade (USA) and Kirsten Bindrich (Germany) who were both on 142/145, two targets ahead of Manuel Silva (Portugal), Joshua Lakatois (USA) and Rodolfo Vigano (Italy).

On day three with 50 targets to be shot to determine the 1991 World Junior Trap Champion Womble missed two targets in each round for a final score of 191/200 to win the title from Lance Bade (USA), with Kirsten Bindrich (Germany) winning the bronze medal.

Mens Trap Team Match

Fourteen countries participated in the mens team over 150 targets with the USA winning gold with a team score of 423/450. Second place with the silver medal was Great Britain 422/450 with Spain winning the bronze medal with a team score of 422/450. The Australian Team of Russell Mark, Michael Diamond and Greg Newey with 420/450 finished in fourth position ahead of the USSR, Portugal and Italy.

Womens Trap Team Match

Teams from five countries took part in the Womens Team Match with the Australian team of Faye Burton, Desiree Huddleston and Kathy Gault taking fourth position 346/450.

The team from the Peoples Republic of China won the gold medal 387/450 ahead of USSR 387/450 with France finishing third 364/450 to take the bronze team medal.

Junior Trap Team Match

Six countries contested the junior team match of 450 targets. The strong team from the USA certainly showed their overall depth with a well shot team score of 420/450 to take the gold medal. Second place and silver medal was won by Portugal 411/450, one target head of Italy 410/450. Australia's juniors contested the match in true spirit, finding however, the teams from Europe were overall too strong and too experienced.

Double Trap

For the first occasion competitors in the World Double Trap Championship had a day of practice before their event which although proving to be a difficult discipline is growing in stature as the years go by.

Sixty-eight competitors from thirteen countries contested the event including twenty women and fifteen juniors, most of whom found the transition from trap to double trap difficult to adjust to.

With 75 pair shot on the one day plus a 25 pair final for the top six in the mens event, the double trap was full of interest right from the outset. To prove how different the double trap event is from the single trap one only had to consult the scoreboard which showed the Trap World Champion Marco Venturini shooting 123/150 to miss out on a final position. Michael Diamond, silver medalist in the trap event also shot 123/150, however this was sufficient to come into the final in sixth position. Great Britain with Peter Boden 137/150 and Kevin Gill 125/150 both making the final were looking to add to their country's medal total.

At the 150 target mark the field of 31 was reduced to six: P. Boden (GB) 137; B. Erickson (USA) 129; A. Asanov (USSR) 128; S. Sivrikaya (Tur) 127; K. Gill (GB) 125; M. Diamond (Aus) 123.

As was the case with the first round, targets were still proving elusive with Brett Erickson shooting the best final round with a score of 42/50, one ahead of Kevin Gill. Despite these two fine performances Peter Boden maintained his lead which had been reduced from eight to two at the completion of the double trap championship.

First and third to Great Britain with Peter Boden and Kevin Gill both delighted to be among the medals. Silver to the USA with Brett Erickson picking up six targets in the last round to finish behind the winners score of 173/200.

With the UIT scheduled to meet in 1992, one can optimistically look forward to the definite possibility of the double trap becoming an Olympic event for shotgun. With limited opportunities to expand the shotgun disciplines, this elevation of double trap to Olympic status would surely be welcomed by all.

Womens Double Trap Championship

Twenty women contested the event and like the men found the transition to double trap a challenge to be overcome. Deena Julin (USA) maintained her good form shooting 90 in the first round. A big improver over the double trap was Satu Pusila from Finland who having finished thirteenth in the womens trap championship led the double trap field with a well shot 98, seven targets ahead of her nearest rival, Elena Tkach (USSR). In the final round Satu Pusila took the honours winning the Womens Double Trap Championship with a score of 129 with silver medalist Elena Tkach 121 finishing ahead of Deena Julin whose score of 119 won for her the bronze medal.

Junior Double Trap Championship

Great Britain with Julian Womble and Robert Garwood both shooting extremely well dominated the junior event winning gold and bronze respectively with scores of 174/200 and 164/200 which in Julian's instance would have won the mens event. With scores of this kind recorded in world class competition, both juniors will no doubt leave their mark on the sport in the years ahead. We wish them well in this regard.

Mens Double Trap Team Match

Ten countries contested the teams event which was won well by Great Britain with a score of 376, thirteen targets ahead of the USA. Third and the bronze medal went to Italy 359, who like many others found that there is a decided difference in the double trap discipline — a difference which will be less obvious as more and more world class shooters take part in this demanding yet exciting event.

Womens Double Trap Team Match

Five countries entered teams in the womens championships: Australia, Great Britain, France, China and the USSR who were strong favourites for the team gold medal.

This proved to be the case with the USSR women winning gold by a massive thirty-five targets from China with France a further four targets behind for third position and bronze medals. Australia did not fare as well as would have been hoped, however the womens team were a credit to their country and will no doubt be better because of the experience.

Junior Double Trap Team Match

Four countries took part for the medals in the junior event which although small in numbers, nevertheless was always full of interest. The USA 359 and gold, and Great Britain 351 and silver, dominated the junior championships. Like the womens team, the juniors found the competition too strong on the day, although it must be said they appeared a little overawed by the occasion shooting scores well below their best in Australia. Well done to the Aussie juniors who with the benefit of experience in the years ahead will no doubt make their mark in shooting.



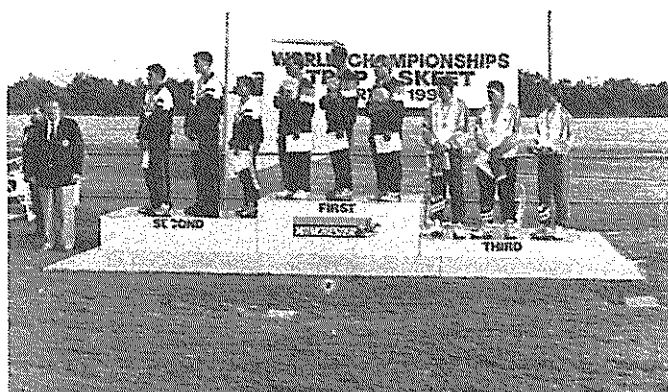

Skeet

With two of the three championships already decided, many of the overseas competitors had left for home, being replaced by an influx of shooters to contest the Skeet World Championships.

From Australia's point of view there was a great deal of interest in the performances of both Ian Hale and Craig Meuleman, for depending upon a finish in the top sixteen, there was a possible position for one of them in the Olympic team for Barcelona. The only possibles on day one, Michael Schmidt (USA), Deal Clark (USA) and Harald Jensen (Norway) led the field of fifty-eight representing twenty-six countries by one target. Australia's World Cup winner John Summers was handily placed on 74 with three others, Jose Colorado

(Spain), Josef Hahnenkamp (Austria) and Hennie Dompeling (Holland). Eight shooters shared third position on 73 which gave every indication of a close second round.

On day two Hennie Dompeling with a second round 73 was the equal leader with Michael Schmidt on 147/150, one target ahead of Dean Clark (USA) who after shooting five rounds of 25 surprisingly dropped 4 targets in his last round. Grouped with Clark on 146/150 was a strong group including Bruno Rosetti (Italy), Alexander Inichin (USSR), Nam Ho Sin (PR Korea), Peter Malek (Czechoslovakia). John Summers was finding the second day a little more difficult shooting 70/75 to be in equal fourth place on scores 144/150 with ten shooters positioned above him.

Sixteen countries were represented in the 24 semi final with only 5 targets separating first and twenty-fourth positions. Five targets was not an impossibility to catch when remembering Dean Clark dropping four in one round on the second day after shooting 125/125.

The final 50 targets produced some excellent shooting performances, notably from B. Rossetti, K. Van Ieperen, A. Wegner, S. Sin, L. Ra and K. Harman all of who shot the 50 targets. Australia's two representatives in the semi final, John Summers 49/50 and Craig Meuleman 48/50, missed out on making the final six, however both John 193/200 for 11th position overall and Craig 191/200, 19th position overall exceeded the minimum Olympic qualifying score of 184/200. Craig's attempt to make the top 16 and obtain the required points to make him eligible for Olympic selection fell short by just the one target much to his disappointment. Nevertheless the experience gained at this level of competition will hold him in good stead in the years ahead during which we will watch his progress with great interest.

John Summers continued his excellent form during 1991 and had established himself in the eyes of all as one of the top skeet shooters in the world. Well done John and Craig, Australia's shooting future is in good hands.

The skeet final was full of interest even though conditions had deteriorated to some degree. Holland with two shooters in the final six were looking for victory and with only two targets separating first and sixth position a keenly fought final appeared evident. H. Dompelling (Hol) 196; S. Sin (PR Korea) 196; B. Rosetti (Ita) 196; A. Inechin (USSR) 195; K. Van Ieperen (Hol) 195; A. Wegner (Ger) 194.

The final 25 with all the pressures that are involved is totally different from the earlier rounds, however in the style of a true World Champion, Italy's Bruno Rosetti shot a clean round to win for himself and his country the 1991 World Skeet Championships with a score of 196+25. The silver medal with a clean round was won by K. Van Ieperen from Holland 195+24. Holland's Hennie Dompelling with a final round 24 won the bronze medal with a competition score of 196+24.

Womens Skeet Championship

Twenty competitors took part in the competition to decide the Womens World Champion for 1991. Hungary's Erzsbet Vasvari 73/75 was the leader after the first days shooting from Erdjanik Avetisiya (USSR) 72 with three shooters sharing equal third place on targets broken being Jong Ran Pak (PR Korea), Svetlana Diomina (USSR) and Diana Igaly (Hungary). Australia's three competitors were finding the competition a little too strong, however with the nerves of the first day out of the way better scores were anticipated.

At the completion of the womens event Jong Ran Pak (PR Korea) had shot an excellent 191/200 to be declared World Champion for 1991. Svetlana Diomina with scores of 71 and 47 on the second and third days won the silver medal with a score of 189, two targets ahead of Erzsbet Vasvari whose score of 187/200 won bronze for Hungary.

Junior Skeet Championship

Sixteen juniors from six countries vied for the honour of winning the title of Junior World Champion. Italy's Pietro Genga 74/75 gave every indication that he was the one to beat and led the field after the first day's shooting by two targets. A similar situation after the second day with P. Genga 144/150 two targets ahead of Shane Schwickerath (USA) followed by Emanuele Saracchi (Italy) and Jason Ward (USA) both on scores of 144/150. Best of the Australian juniors was Clive Barton and Leigh Roberts both on 133/150.

With a final round 50/50 P. Genga blitzed the opposition to shoot a score of 194/200 proving to all who witnessed his performance that a future mens world champion had well and truly arrived on the scene. Silver with again an excellent score, 190/200 was won by Shane Schwickerath (USA), one target ahead of team member Jason Ward who won bronze with his score of 189/200. Australia's juniors will benefit from the experience and their dedication to their chosen discipline will see them improve upon their performances at their first involvement with international shooting at world class level.

Mens Skeet Teams Match

A great deal of interest is always evident in the competition for team medals. With fifteen countries participating including Australia's team of J. Summers, C. Meuleman and I. Hale the event was full of interest from the first day which saw USA on 219 leading from Australia 218 and Spain 218 with Italy holding fourth position on 216. Day two however produced changes to the scoreboard with USSR making a bold move. Czechoslovakia had also improved on their first days shooting and were well in the race for medals.

At the conclusion of the teams match, gold and first place to USA 432/450 by one target from USSR with Czechoslovakia a further one target away for the bronze medal. Australia after starting well finished on 427 for sixth place behind Italy and PR Korea both on 430.

Womens Skeet Teams Match

Six countries including two strong teams from PR Korea and China who were both expected to do well. Hungary however lead the field after the first day with a team score of 213, one target ahead of USSR with PR Korea on 211. China had not shot as well as expected and on 202 appeared to be out of the race for medals.

Day two and the last opportunity to perform in the teams match produced some interesting results. China in particular, improving their position with a second day score of 214. As was expected at the finish of the womens team match both PR Korea and China figured high in the results with PR Korea winning the gold medal with a team score of 418, just two targets ahead of China. Hungary after a bold showing on day one slipped back to 414 and with that score the bronze medal.

Junior Skeet Team

The team from Italy was certainly the favourite for the junior teams match and lead the field on day one by nine targets with a score of 218. The German and US teams were strong contenders with Germany holding second position on 209, a lead of two targets.

Day two produced minor changes to the leaders board and at the conclusion of the event, favourites Italy had won the gold medal with their team score of 424 by four targets from USA 420. Germany despite their second placing on day one had slipped to third position with their bronze medal score of 408.

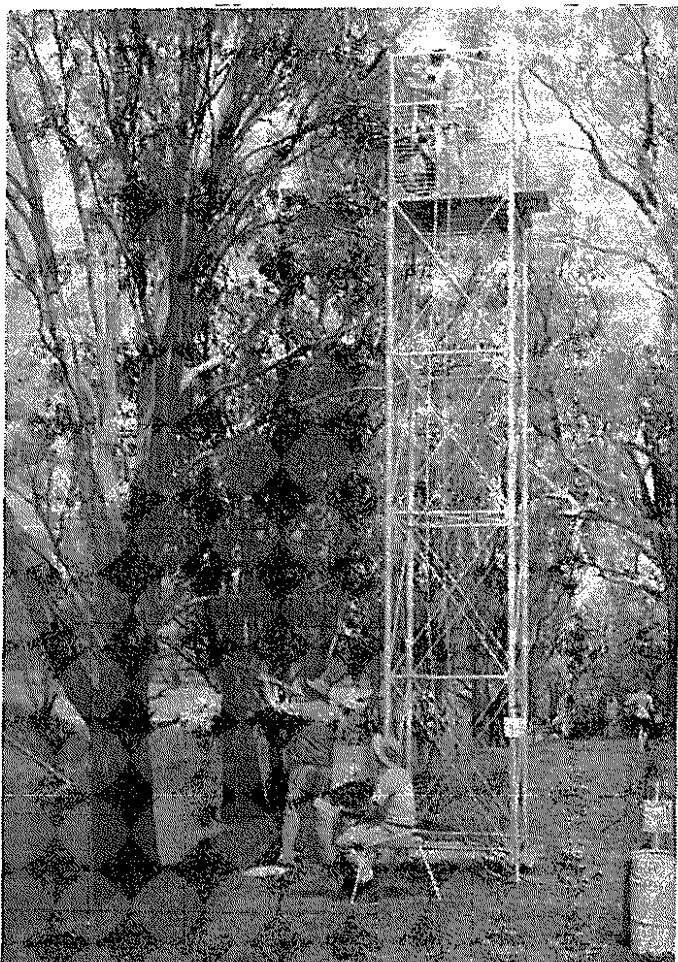

BOGGABRI GUNNEDAH GUN CLUB

1991 was the 25th Anniversary of the Boggabri-Gunnedah Gun Club famed "Gum Tree" simulated field shoot, the brainchild of past President Vic Eather on whose property it was run in 1966. It started out as a one day shoot, despite endless trouble with unsuitable traps and many little hiccups, Vic and his small committee of stalwarts worked tirelessly to iron out the many problems and honed it into a two day shoot. With town water laid on, power and every amenity available to make campers and visitors life enjoyable.

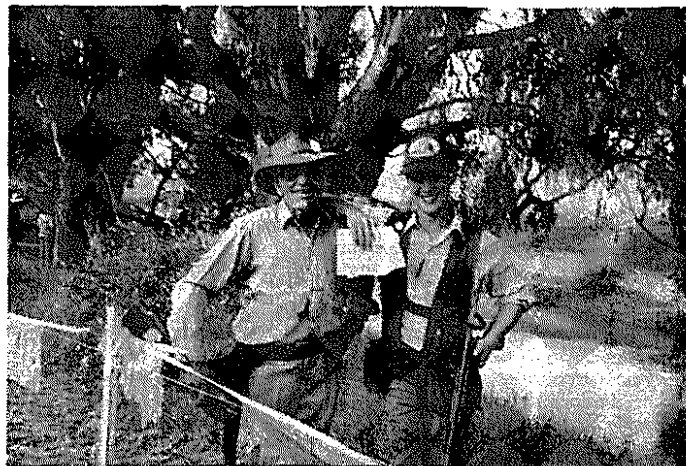


The late Stan McMaster shooting, with Rod Brady scoring.

The original layout was further downstream and opposite a piggery, as some of the traps were over the river it necessitated a boat to go to and fro. On one occasion a pig got its head stuck in a feed bucket, did a somersault over the bank and into the river to the accompanying cry from the trapper, "There she blows", the secty jumped into the boat and to the rescue. He dragged the half drowned pig out and was applying artificial respiration when the irate owner appeared and accused the secty of shooting his pig. The secty was last seen heading upstream with the angry farmer hard on his hammer threatening blue murder. This little incident culminated in a dust up in the local hostelry, I don't think either of them came out a winner.

Thereafter the layout was shifted further upstream to a quieter more picturesque setting where many of the campers take the opportunity of wetting a line.

In the early day \$1000 was offered to anyone who could shoot a possible 50 targets in the main event. It was finally won by Brian Walton in 1976, the offer was discontinued because the committee was accused of making the targets too hard. Despite the effect of the drought and recession, the fact that it always clashed with the NSW Trap Carnival there were 217 nominations, the second highest on

record. It has been well patronised over the years by NSW and Queensland shooters, with the occasional Mexican, including the late Newton Thomas who won it in 1972. Many well known shooters have won it more than once; Brian Walton (four times), Bob Wilson (three times), Gary Redmond (twice), Keith Cameron and Rex Davis.

It was pleasing to see a veteran take out the main event this year in the person of Jim Taylor of Mudgee. Congratulations Jim, you showed us all there is life in the old boys yet. Congratulations also to Max Barton of Toowoomba for winning the high gun.

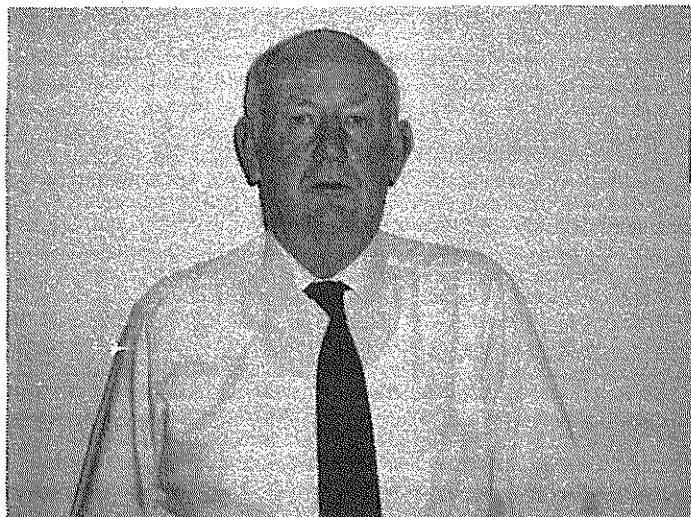

7½ SHOT ON TEST

The rise in popularity of 7½ shot in Australia for target shooting has been very rapid and quite recent.

The major cause for this has almost certainly been the way the UIT rules have abolished the 32 gram load and brought in 28 as a maximum.

Deprived of their longstanding favourites in 32 grams, Trench shooters have had to learn about how to make do with 28; as they did, some of their experience has rubbed off on Down the Line shooters, who have made 7½ in the first barrel not the oddity it once was.

But at the same time there has also been a move to number eight shot, which seems to have begun primarily in simulated field shooting, again more for first barrel work, and as people have begun to see what effectiveness the smaller target sizes may have, it has been no great surprise to find that 7½ has picked up many adherents in a short space of time.

For a long while, number seven was the only shot size that would be considered for targets other than skeet, which of course has always required number nine.

We've been in a bit of a sevens rut, I think. And it hasn't been easy to get out of it for a number of reasons. The most important of them has been the difficulty of supply. A lot of cartridges have been brought into the country over the years wearing a 7½ label, but their actual shot size is a moot point.

American 7½ is closer to our seven than anything else, and European shot sizes vary considerably. Perhaps for these reasons, nobody has even had the chance to get fully acquainted with what 7½ is capable of.

However, when you look at it from another angle, our 7½ shot is American 8, and it is this size that has been used more than any other to break DTL targets — and in 28 gram loads, at that.

Seen from this point of view, it's no wonder that many trap shooters are finding that 7½ offers certain advantages, and are swinging over to it.

As the 32 gram target load of sevens is disappearing into the sunset, people are realising that where 32 grams of seven put about 390 pellets into the cartridge, 28 grams will only muster 340. However, if the shot size is dropped from 7 to 7½, then the count in the 28 gram load goes straight back up towards the 390 that was in the heavier load of seven.

Why was this shot size not used here in Australia earlier?

I don't really know the answer to this, other than to say that the suppliers can only market what there is a public demand for, and the demand for seven shot was so great that 7½ never managed to get a look in. From a manufacturer's point of view it was not an economic proposition.

Given the very limited exposure Australian shooters had to it, they never managed to create enough of a demand to get it into the marketplace in sufficient quantities to convince the average shooter of its worth. Hence, we had a vicious circle.

Now, it seems that the demand is high and rising further.

I was supplied with two quantities of specimen shot for the purposes of this test, one by Winchester and the other by Ballantine Ammunition, in sizes seven and 7½.

In the case of all the shot, it proved identical to what is used in factory loads, and as a result many of these remarks may be of use not only to reloaders but to shooters who always buy their ammunition.

The sevens of both manufacturers were very consistent. Both lots ran out at .093", which is very close to nominal size, and both had only small pellet to pellet variations in sizing.

Similarly, the 7½ ran at just on .091" in both cases, again being regular and well graded, so that there were minimal size variations.

The exact quantity of antimony used in the pellets remains factory business, but the hardness of the pellet is a matter of fact, and is readily tested.

In the case of all four samples, 7 and 7½ from both manufacturers, the crush values as ascertained by the testing machine placed the pellets into the two to three per cent antimony bracket, well up into the twos and giving the three a nudge, in fact.

The best explanation for this is that the manufacturing process may begin with a slightly higher figure, say three per cent, and a small fraction of this is lost in the production run, as a result of the heat. This brings the figure off its absolute high, but it doesn't remove much.

Shot in this range of hardness is used by the best manufacturers all round the world. The foremost of the American makers such as Lawrence offer their best shot in this range, as do Spanish and other European manufacturers.

A lot of nonsense is spoken and written in Australia about antimony content in shot. There is no magic figure, no point at which it is always right and below which it is always wrong. Anybody who says that in order to break clays you have to have X per cent of it is talking through his hat.

What needs to happen for optimal results is that the hardness of the shot needs to be matched to the choke it's fired through and the cartridge it's fired in; this means that the shooter will not be overchoked — by too hard a pellet in too tight a gun — or underchoked, either — by too soft a pellet through insufficient choke to hold the pattern together at the ranges it's required to work at.

These figures of about the two to three per cent range are pretty well the worldwide norm. It is in this bracket that most good quality shot is found for the simple reason that it is at these levels of hardness that it is possible to find a load that will suit most guns.

Both the test lots of seven weighed in at 350 per ounce. The Winchester 7½ was 370 per ounce, and the Tower 7½ was 380. These are completely unimportant differences, easily within the usual manufacturing tolerances.

So much for the specifications. The next question concerns what the target shooter can expect from both these shot sizes in their performances against clays.

Accordingly, I did some experiments with the shot, and also put together some calculations, with a view to finding out if the theory and the practice could be brought together to bring about any kind of conclusions.

First of all, the theoretical background.

Much research has been carried out over the decades on what kind of striking energy is required to kill live game. Unfortunately, not a lot of work has been done along these lines with regard to clays.

Looking at quail and rabbits, you find that they're all pretty much of a muchness. In the case of the clay target, though, while they're built to a size standard, and it should be easy enough to compute on average just how many pellets a shot pattern needs to hit them, they also vary quite a bit in actual hardness, so that the striking force required may also vary.

Any estimation of this has to take such vagaries into account — we've all walked out past the trap and picked up unbroken clays with neat holes drilled through them, and spent a minute dwelling on the way some unhappy competitor deserved a better deal.

So, any figure that is chosen should be understood to be at best a compromise. A great deal depends on the angle of strike, the rate of rotation of the target and the surface texture of it, and all these are probably secondary to the slightly variable hardness.

Just as an aside, I should tell a short story here.

Rather than starting to wonder about whether any cartridge short of two ounces of nickel plated fours will always break clays, it can work the other way, too. I once took a beginner skeet shooting, and when the skeet ground closed down he insisted on trying his hand at trap. We only had a skeet gun and number nine shot between us, and he shot off fifteen metres. He didn't miss many, and the one that sticks in my mind is the target that he was slow on, and which was settling by the time he got round to shooting at it with his second barrel. It was a metre off the ground when the cylinder loads of nines hit it, and it lazily drifted in half. He didn't know why my mouth was open, and that's probably why he managed to break it. So, while it's true they're sometimes harder to crack, sometimes they're easier, too.

Which said, I have selected a striking figure of 0.6 ft/lb of energy as being required to do the job consistently. The usually accepted figure for a lethal strike against small birds, pigeon size, is about 0.9 ft/lb, and for the heavier feathered birds like teal it is about 1.0 ft/lb. The clay is of course easier to bring down than either of these.

The next trick was to nominate two velocities to follow through with calculations. The 28 gram load, as discussed in last month's CTSN, is on the way in, and velocities with this are likely to be a bit faster than those in the 32 gram loadings, so I chose the two muzzle velocities of 1320 for the faster loads and 1240 for the slower.

In order to be on the safe side, a further division was made. It's not usually taken into account, but when the clay is shot while in retreat directly away from the shooter, the pellet has to chase the target. This reduces its effective striking energy. For the purposes of the calculations, the clay was deemed to have an observed velocity of sixty feet a second.

By looking at the table, you can see for yourself where the pellets of 7 and 7½ shot begin to run out of puff. Bear in mind that none of this is intended to be seen as hard and fast. From my point of view, though, the exercise was worthwhile because the table accords closely with practical experience.

Take size 7 shot at 1240 FPS. This is only fractionally below the speed of a Winchester 325; in my experience this is a cartridge that is well capable of breaking retreating targets at fifty yards on the rare occasions when I shoot well enough to hit them. This is stretching any cartridge, and when you stretch it even a bit more, such as in a shoot off for a bit of fun going back a metre at a time past the 25 metre mark — well, then you're likely to be a bit happier with the 350. A look at the table gives some indication of why. The theoretical difference between the two striking energies is quite small, but nevertheless it exists, and when you need all the help you can get, then this could be important.

There are other lessons to learn from looking at the table.

Take the simulated field shooter who doesn't really like eights, but wonders if there is any advantage in using something smaller than seven in order to pick up a bit more pattern density. He debates with himself over whether 7½ can cut the mustard when used against some of these fast and nasty FTASC style targets that are getting more common.

If he shoots a standard load at similar velocity to the 325 or the Universal, then on crossing birds, and not retreaters, sufficient retained energy is there all the way to 45 yards, which is a very long way indeed, Mary-Lou.

Among other things, it says to me that I'd be reaching for a 7½ every time they threw a midi or a mini, or a battue, because for all their trickiness these targets are almost always under forty yards, even though they appear further because of their small size.

The DTL shooter has a different set of problems. If he shoots deliberately and takes his time off fifteen metres, then his first barrel should be digging into the target at something under 35 yards. This leaves the load of 7½ well in the race. Its energy even out of the cartridge at the modest 1240 FPS being round 0.8 ft/lb at this distance, it has the same power as the number seven at forty yards, a range at which there is absolutely no question about whether the seven can do the job.

The faster shooter of course has even less of a problem, coming onto the target at about 32 to 33 yards; eights are certainly an option here, too, for reasons that should become clearer shortly.

When the discussion widens to what happens with second barrel loads, and what happens in handicap distances, it becomes more of a thorny issue.

The theory can certainly help us to get a foothold, though, from which to take a practical stance.

If the 7½ is driven towards retreating targets at 1240 FPS, then its offering .57 ft/lb of energy at 40 yards, and at this range is getting towards the end of its usefulness. This does not mean it will not break targets at this range; remember, this is theoretical calculation only. But it may be worth remembering that we are looking for a blow of .6 ft/lb of energy, and without it some failure is more likely to accrue. In this case, it's likely that more than one pellet will strike the clay, and the energy will be delivered that way. However, the figures speak for themselves — at 45 yards, our 1240 FPS pellet of 7½ is going to strike with .46 ft/lb, and in my opinion that makes it a bit on the light side. I suspect public opinion over the next few years will bear out this theory.

When you take the initiative and try to push the 7½ at the faster speed of 1320 FPS, the difference is very small: we see, still discussing retreating targets, that at 40 yards it gives the pellet .64 ft/lb, and this is a desirable outcome. At 45 yards it's .52 ft/lb, which also seems to me to be a significant improvement on the figure for the slower cartridge.

However, the rush to higher velocity is usually a mistake in shotgunning, and I suspect it will be here, as well.

When the higher speed is attained, it is at the expense of recoil, and this is seldom helpful to good shooting. However, it does not affect some people, and so it's an option. The trouble is that when this extra speed is bought, yes, it does give increased pellet energy. At the

same time, though, it opens patterns. The extra pressure and velocity mean an increased bump in the pants to the shot column, which means greater distortion, and that in turn means the pattern density will drop.

If pellets of 7½ are giving good performance to somebody using them to break clays at distances of more than 40 yards, then let the results speak for themselves. If the shooter has gone to the trouble of patterning and has attained the required number of pellets in the thirty inch circle, then multiple pellet strike should be atoning for lower energy, and everything in the garden should be rosy.

A different outcome is likely if the same shooter using the same load in the same barrel began walking backwards, shooting off successive increases of handicap yardage. At the point where that barrel ceased delivering multiple hits, then the lower pellet energy would be likely to show up markedly as targets escaped when they should be broken.

In the course of this test, I loaded and fired a great deal of 7 and 7½ shot.

In particular, one series of interest was of a popular trap powder, loaded to make a first barrel DTL cartridge at 1200 FPS and 8,800 PSL. This was fired through an improved modified trap barrel which usually gives 65%, three-quarter choke with 32 grams of seven.

The second table refers to this series, and we find that the results of the test show that the two kinds of shot under scrutiny, being smaller in antimony levels, gave similar results. The short shot column and modest velocity made the pattern density with the sevens lift from the usual three-quarter to a nominal full choke. (In case you're wondering, the distribution of the patterns was unchanged throughout, and they were all in the normal range. This efficiency is a factor that often reflects the liking — or the lack of it — of a particular barrel for a particular propellant. Only the shot size was changed in the series, and while the pattern density altered, the pattern quality did not.)

This leaves us free to find that not only were the results of both makers' shot congruent, but there was also a congruent drop of six per cent between the 7 and 7½ shot, where everything else was equal. This is typical of a move to smaller shot. A drop in pattern tightness of a few per cent is what usually happens, because small pellets distort more than large. They then fail to fly true, and as a result the pattern spreads. If we go down the scale, from 7 to 7½ to 8, then we should see patterns open progressively. They may vary a bit from gun to gun in where the big jumps occur, and this reflects how well the barrel likes the shot size.

In this case, we find we've got 70% (full choke) for 7, 64% (three-quarter) for 7½, and 62% (say a tightish half choke) for 8, all shot sizes from both of the manufacturers being of the same hardness.

The reader may have to bear in mind that all these were one ounce loads, and the number of pellets loaded into each cartridge is as described in the specifications of the shot, earlier in the article; just read the figure for the pellets per ounce, and there it is.

In looking at this second table, the characteristics of these target sizes of shot are demonstrated admirably.

Considering the greater number of pellets in the load, the shot of size 7½ might be expected to provide a very much denser pattern. However, it doesn't. The pattern density percentage declines because of the increased pellet distortion factor, and the strike remains not all that much different from what a seven would give, despite the fact that a lot more 7½'s start out towards the target.

Where do the extra pellets all go?

This is where the shooter prepared to experiment picks up the single major advantage offered by stepping outside the use of the traditional seven.

If the pellets are not to be found in the 30" circle, then they have migrated outside the shot mass as it's been in flight. Yes, some pellets are lost by very great distortion, and don't even strike the pattern paper at all. But many others are distorted marginally, and instead of flying obliquely out of the killing pattern to be entirely useless, they drift out of it gradually.

These provide a denser and useful fringe at ranges under the full patterning range of forty yards. This is particularly important in the case of first barrel target work.

In other words, when you want a margin for error because you're a little bit off the target, then 7½ will be more likely to give it to you when a pattern of 7 is too tight to help you much.

Yes, again, 8 is even more likely to give it to you, and is an even better choice as long as the ranges are short, as dictated by the striking energy figures in the first table.

However, the problem here, when you go looking for a pattern fringe for an insurance policy, is that it is provided by low energy pellets, ones that have been knocked out of round and are not carrying the full energy complement.

You might have noticed, particularly if you shoot trap, that eights tend not to grind the target to smoke like sevens do, unless they are fired out of particularly tight chokes. It is all a question of how much energy is delivered to the target. With eights, it is harder to keep the density of pattern up sufficiently high to put as much energy into the target as seven can do with fewer pellets.

A glance at the second table verifies this — the eights might have an inner 20" circle strike in the 180s, while the sevens have one in the 140s. For all practical purposes there's no difference in the number of strikes — probably the same number of pellets of either size would be actually hitting the bird — yet the pellets of seven are carrying about twice the energy of the pellets of eight.

So, in order to have the same destructive effect on the target, many more eights are required, and this you don't get unless you shoot them through a very tight barrel and really do your homework, patterning to see that the strike really is sufficient.

However, the 7½ shot seems to me to represent an excellent compromise, in that its strike is also about the same in the inner circle, but its retained energy is much higher than the eight, and it offers a lower pattern percentage and hence a denser fringe around the pattern than the seven.

This indicates to me that it has a particular niche to fill, mainly as a first barrel proposition, but with a theoretical base suggesting that it will continue to find acceptance on target grounds, both for DTL and simulated field shooting.

I personally prefer it for the first barrel, though I find a use for eights some of the time as well. But insofar as it represents a swing away from absolute adherence to sevens, then 7½ as it comes from both these manufacturers offers the target shooter a bit more room to move, and there is a definite advantage in it for the discriminating.

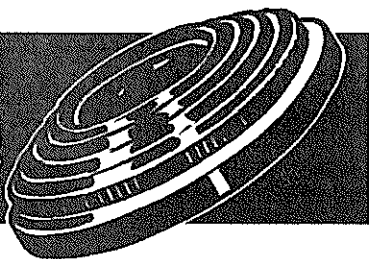

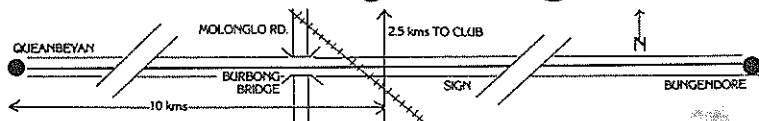
