

Many of the recommendations are simply wording changes, however, two very important recommendations relate to the proposed introduction of a new Handicap and Grading system. State Associations will be making the information available to Clubs in their respective States, from which will arrive a consolidated State opinion to the recommendations which will then be considered by the Executive for introduction as from 1-1-1993.

#### 28g/loz LOADS

The Executive confirmed its previous decision to introduce 28g loads, effective 1-1-1993, with advice to members that 24g loads are not under consideration for DTL/Skeet despite the decision taken by the UIT to introduce 24g loads at 1-1-1993.

## NATIONAL SHOOTING GROUND

The Development and Promotions Committee are to consider all known National Ground proposals during the next twelve months, taking into account a decision scheduled for July 1993 in relation to the success or otherwise of the Sydney 2000 Olympic Bid Committee - a separate report on a random sampling of 500 members is contained in this month's CTSN.

Shooter registrations will remain unaltered for 1993.

Club and commercial advertising rates will remain unaltered for the period ending June 1993.

#### OLYMPIC RESULTS TRAP/SKEET

At the time of writing, the Trap event has just been completed with Russell Mark and Michael Diamond both finishing on 193/200 for equal 9th and 11th place respectively.

The Trap scores recorded by Russell and Michael are the best ever by an Australian at an Olympic Games, and both have many years of top level competition ahead of them.

#### ACTA/NZCTA

On Saturday, 13th June, the Executive met with representatives of the New Zealand Clay Target Association, namely: George Ellis (President), Graeme Webber (P/President), Adrienne Sears (National Secretary). The purpose of the meeting was to continue bi-annual discussions on matters relative to the well being of clay target shooting in both countries, with the intention to continue such meetings for so long as they are considered to be meaningful and worthwhile.

An invitation was accepted by New Zealand for a representative of the NZCTA to attend the ACTA Rules Seminar. In addition, Paul Black - NZ National Coaching Director, is to attend the ACTA State Coaching Directors' Meeting in August.

It was noted that New Zealand had taken the decision to introduce the recent UIT rule changes, which are due to come into effect as from 1-1-1993, for their 1992 National ISU Championships in November.

With a number of matters being of an ongoing nature, New Zealand President - George Ellis, issued an invitation for the ACTA to meet once again with New Zealand in 1993 to continue with the exchange of ideas, which could only improve on shooting standards in both countries.

Non notification of shooter suspensions can cause embarrassment to club managements who unknowingly accept noms from a suspended shooter, only to be told by another shooter of the suspension. It's happened.

One would hope that our members are more honest than this, but nonetheless it occurs.

In an effort to abate the rumours before they get out of hand, and save embarrassment to club managements, could the ACTA publish shooter suspensions as they occur (hopefully they will not occur) and the duration of the suspension.

## ACTA Insurance — Who Needs It?

One of the main complaints heard around the traps is about ACTA annual fees. Whether we get value for our money is not for me to judge but I can certainly vouch for the \$3.50 insurance content after experiencing a claim on behalf of the late Cliff Fergusson, a member of our club.

Cliff was fatally injured when hit by a car while erecting a sign for our opening shoot in March. Shortly after his death Alan Maher, the ACTA Executive Director, contacted me and suggested that a claim should be made. I subsequently sent Cliff's birth and death certificates and a one paragraph report of the accident to the ACTA. The claim was processed immediately without further questions or procrastination, and a few weeks later Alan Maher phoned me to say he had a cheque for \$40,000 for Cliff's wife and asked where to send it. That's not bad for \$3.50 annual premium.

## A Registered Shooters' View

I have been given an indication of some proposed action to be taken at a forthcoming meeting of the ACTA Executive, which if passed will have a greater detrimental effect on the efficiency of our Association than any other action of which I am aware over the last couple of years or so. I may well be criticised by some members of the Executive for letting the cat out of the bag early. So be it! The members most likely to complain will probably be those shouting loudest at the June Executive meeting for 'open policy' and 'full disclosure.' If the changes are passed they will be known to the membership, if not I will be happy to print a retraction to this letter at a later date?

What's the problem this time? Please read on and let me explain.

Members of the elected Executive are allocated positions within various sub-committees charged with the responsibility of looking after that area of the ACTA's operation. It's important to note that the members of a sub-committee are appointed relative to their knowledge, expertise and experience. That committee then makes decisions in its own right up to the degree of authority which the Executive have given them, or recommends a course of action to the full committee.

I believe it is the intention of the Executive to alter things so that no sub-committee can make a decision in its own right on any matter, but can only make recommendations which must be voted on by the full Executive, every time. As a result, your appointed group of 'specialists' or 'experts' will be overruled by the full Executive, who may have little or no knowledge of the specific subject at hand. In effect, sub-committees will be unable to make or implement decisions and will have limited ability to make recommendations quickly to the Management Committee. Another result is that the current Management Committee, given the job of making quick day to day decisions, must now refer every item of business to the full Executive, and that involves 14

The result of this arrangement will produce a laborious and long-winded decision making process and take away from members of all sub-committees the responsibility to make decisions on the sub-committee to which they were appointed for their knowledge, expertise and experience.

This I put to you may suit some because of their attitude, but I don't believe it will suit the majority who wish to see this sport progress. I believe that sub-committee members must be able to shoulder their responsibility as members of sub-committees to which they were elected for their knowledge, expertise and experience rather than be able to say that "it was a decision of the full Executive, so don't blame me.

If you like the idea that every decision made for you can only be made by the Executive Committee rather than by sub-committees whose very existence has been brought about to get this sport going, then tell your State so. If however you are like me, and I believe the majority of shooters, who believe that we are going backwards fast, then also tell your State, only tell them louder and more often to make sure they hear.

## STEEL SHOT

## **Some Facts**

(Continued from August Issue).

Yet this oversized chambering has recently come under attack in the American marketplace for being too small. The three and a half inch magnum in 12 gauge has now been released. The gun that shoots it is a small cannon, weighing in somewhere over nine pounds.

The reason for this is that the pass shooter in America has discovered pretty much the same as I did when beginning to test steel for duck shooting. He's found that at about forty yards, the average load of steel just plain runs out of puff, and so more of it, and bigger, has to be launched in the first place.

In talking to experienced shooters who have used steel within Australia, you will find few -I am yet to find my first - who approve of the ballistics of the new material. They all complain about ranging problems.

This is why the American's have gone to such a chambering in the 12 gauge. It would seem to me the obvious conclusion is that they don't approve of it much, either, I can't see why anyone by choice would want to carry a nine-pound gun. I also can't see that people would want to buy a new gun specifically for steel shot if they didn't have to.

Further to that, there has been a widespread reawakening of the 10 gauge in the United States. This was a bore size that fell into major disrepair when the 12 gauge three inch magnum became more accessible to handloaders. Up till twenty years ago, the three inch was not easy to handload for because powders were not slow enough burning for safe use. About then the 10 gauge still had some acceptance in America.

When more flexible powders became steadily more available, then the public reassessed them, began to use them in the three inch 12 gauge for geese and pass shooting larger ducks like mallards, and gradually let the 10 gauge go by the board.

However, now it is coming back, and is being offered by several companies as a recent arrival – yes, in a three and a half inch version even in this huge gauge . . . and, just in case you get ideas, it is a gauge that is illegal in most of Australia. If we are forced to go to steel, then this gauge for pass shooting, the traditional Australian method, is legally closed off to us.

Why would anyone want to shift loads of two ounces of shot? The answer is simple; the lower weights are not perceived as being able to do the job properly.

As a further comment on steel shot, for most of this century the Americans got along quite nicely with sizes US#9 to US#BB, pretty much the same as we did.

In this last decade, though, the entire range of buckshot sizes, dead for I don't know how long, has been revived - and why?

Unfortunately, the reason is that the shooting public has found it necessary to call for them in order to make suitable waterfowling loads out of steel shot. And, as always, the manufacturers have just followed public demands.

Today, if you're an American who can't kill his ducks and geese with the traditional fours, twos or even BBs in steel, then you can just keep on going up the size scale, and order BBB, T, TT or TTT – and by that time your pellets are a whopping .22" in diameter – and still you can keep going, past the Ts, and on up through F, FF and FFF. It is at this end of the scale that goose shot is found. But more authorities today are recommending lettershot in steel just for pass shooting ducks.

While this has been going on in America, the SSAA has not been asleep. I have been shooting my share of steel, to try to get together some information about its characteristics.

Most of it has been fired through a standard Remington 1100 modified barrel, carrying .018" of choke. Some was used in a quarter choke tube of .010", also in an 1100.

A standard Remington half choke barrel of this type can be expected to want to throw 60% with most lead factory loads.

## KEEPING YOUR SHOTGUN CLEAN

There at two stages to this:-

#### A. Everyday Use

For Barrels chrome lined or not. They should be cleaned thoroughly using a bronze or brass brush (not steel as it can scratch the bore) with a good solvent or petrol. The mono bloc or rear of the barrels should be washed clean with kerosene, especially around the ejectors, to get rid of any lubricant and fouling, then wiped off with a clean cloth or better still, blown off using compressed air.

The action is 'washed' with kerosene and a 25mm paintbrush holding the stock up and action pointing downwards so all the muck will wash away and not back into the workings of the action.

The action is then wiped off or blown off with compressed air. Hold something against the firing pins (snap cap or similar) and fire off both hammers to let the hammer springs fully extend. This will give them a much longer useful life rather than leaving them fully compressed or cocked all the time.

Find the button or release so as to allow the opening or top lever to come back to centre – this takes the pressure off the top lever spring. Then wipe over all the metal surfaces with an oily cloth or better still, a silicon gun mitt. Take care not to get oil on the wood as it will eventually stain and soften the wood.

Wash the back of the forend iron and blow off, keeping the kerosene away from the wood as much as possible.

After the above cleaning apply fresh lubrication (oil, grease or vaseline) to the front of the action, hinge pin etc before assembly of the gun and later use.

#### B. Yearly Clean

Done by a gunsmith or owner if you have the knowledge. Strip ejectors from the barrels and wash all parts with a paintbrush and kerosene, then blow off. Lubricate lightly and assemble. Remove the stock from the action and wash the action thoroughly in clean 2 stroke fuel. When the petrol evaporates it leaves a thin film of oil on all parts. Blow off with compressed air and assemble.

It amazes me how shooters either don't lubricate the action or just add more lubrication to the existing muck. It then becomes like valve grinding paste, a mixture of unburnt powder, dust, and brass from case heads etc.

Guns are more expensive each year and if looked after and kept relatively clean will need tightening far less often and misfires will be almost non-existent.

A big plus for the serious shooter of a clean barrel is it throws a much more even pattern. A build up of plastic distorts the shot and also makes the gun recoil more as it reduces the size of the bore by up to .5mm. Contrary to popular belief, 'The Next Shot' does not remove the old plastic and clean out the barrel!!!

A clean gun that works all the time is a joy to use and something that can be handed on to future generations.




Is a series of holes machined into the barrel 80mm from the muzzle. This 80mm length allows choke tube guns to be ported without interfering with the choke tube area. It is designed to reduce recoil and because it is venting gases upwards it stops muzzle flip.



## LENGTHENING FORCING CONES

This is lengthening the existing taper from chamber to barrel from around 15-25mm long to 44-48mm long, depending on the diameter of the barrel. If you lengthen the taper, then the shot does not get deformed, which gives much more even and denser patterns as the fliers are now being put to use in the pattern proper. It also reduces recoil by allowing a longer time for the shot to get into the smaller diameter of the barrel over a longer time which has the effect of a push type recoil rather than a sharp jolt type recoil.

However, using steel  $1\frac{1}{6}$ oz US#4 and  $1\frac{1}{4}$ oz US#2, full choke patterns resulted.

When tested for distribution by the usual Oberfell and Thompson method, they consistently produced results a few points lower in quality than what is to be expected in tests of lead-shotted cartridges.

The same applied in the case of the quarter choke barrel. When used with steel it produced three-quarter choke patterns, 65% instead of the 55% I would expect. The larger shot size produced slightly tighter patterns, but there wasn't a lot in it, and it was quite obvious that the most important factor in the shrinking patterns was clearly the hardness of the pellets and not their size, as it would be with lead.

The patterns showed clear evidence of different style of formation altogether from lead, and this was borne out in field testing.

The killing circle in most cases was much smaller in diameter than would be the case in good lead patterns. As a corollary of that fringes were ragged and thin.

When a pattern of the usual kind opens out it does so by the means of the distorted pellets migrating to the outside of the shotstorm. As they move outwards, they test the slipstream set up by the leading pellets, and then they break through it to become fliers quickly falling aside from the main body of the pattern.

This means the pattern opens gradually with the fringe being the shooters friend. It is always there, composed of these pellets just beginning their tangential movement and the better in quality it is, the easier it is for the pattern to strike the target and give a clean kill, even when it is held a little off centre, as it so often is.

The steel gave the impression of keeping density right up to high levels at longer ranges, but at the same time lacking the necessary power to inflict instantly fatal wounds on game.

In particular, use against ducks very quickly brought out the characteristics that other shooters have reported in steel.

Using the modified barrel giving full choke patterns, I can report from personal experience what others have told me anecdotally. I am sorry to say that using it I have wounded birds which I am sure I would have recovered had I been using lead.

To refine the observations I made to the simplest form possible, the stuff just runs out of puff at forty yards. It is difficult to ensure range estimation is fully accurate when shooting over water, and I have to say that the only birds I have personally killed outright were at less than forty yards. Any shot at two or three yards more were sometimes gathered and sometimes not, but never brought in dead

#### I found this deplorable.

It is not common to see feathers fly off passing ducks, when shooting lead, but in the case of steel it's a different matter. At first I thought I was seeing things, but I came to expect it after a while. On one occasion, I am sorry to have to report, my shooting mate ended up asking me to put the steel away, because it was feathering more birds than it brought down.

The steel was also used extensively against feral pigeons in a pest destruction exercise; these birds are very similar to teal in speed of flight and body size. Because they shed feathers so freely, they confirmed my experience against ducks, and they bore out very clearly the phenomenon that has come to be known in the States as 'slicing.'

This is where the angles of the target's shape are sufficient to cause an inefficient projectile to glance off them and cut a more superficial then lethal wound channel across the more outer surface of the body.

I derived some cold comfort from the knowledge that such wounds are said by some American writers to be non-fatal. It didn't help a lot, though. It was just a further indication that this stuff was never designed to make projectiles. I saw too many centred birds at about forty yards which shed feathers from all sides and still managed to fly on.

## HERE AND THERE

## by George Biggs, ACTA Historian

## Life and Times of Annie Oakley, the girl who outshot the men.

The lifelong career of Annie Oakley whose marksmanship feats remain almost unbelievable to this day, as they were to her own generation.

In Buffalo Bill's Wild West show which thrilled thousands of Americans and Europeans in the late 19th century, Annie won the undying affection of the famous Indian warrior, Sitting Bull, when in one performance she broke six glass balls in mid air with six shots of her rifle.

Though the show billed Annie as the 'Girl of the Western Plains,' she had never seen the western plains until she crossed the Missisippi with the show. Her childhood in the woods of Ohio had demanded the hardihood of a pioneer –her father died while she was a child and at 11 years she was bringing down wild game with a 40 inch cap and ball rifle.

When she was 15 she was introduced to Frank Butler, an Irishman who, with his partner, did a trick shooting vaudeville act. Annie outshot him in a clay target shooting contest, and married him a year later. When his partner was ill, she slipped into the act herself, with the papers applauding her more than her husband.

In 1884 came stardom, with her husband, in Buffalo Bill's Wild West show. Part of Annie's act was to shoot while on horseback, targets thrown into the air by a galloping cowboy riding ahead of her. Next her husband would hold up a card, the five of hearts, and Annie would shoot through each heart at fifty feet.

She became world famous, in Europe she performed before Queen Victoria, Mark Twain and Crown Prince Welhelm of Germany where at his request she shot the lit end off his cigarette from fifty feet away.

Although badly injured in a train accident, she toured American training camps in World War One to give rifle demonstrations to the troops. When she died in 1926, Will Rogers, himself originally a Wild West performer with his lariat tricks, wrote in his column: "Her loving traits, her thoughtful consideration of others will live as a mark for any woman to shoot at."

## 15 YEARS AGO

Extracts from 'Trap and Field' the official publication of the American Amateur Trapshooting Association, with acknowledgments to the Editor-Publisher Betty Ann Foxworthy, Indiana, U.S.A.

New world trapshooting record for the most targets shot in one day -15,000 registered targets in  $14\frac{1}{2}$  hours by five shotgun shooters.

William T. Lafferty, O. N. Hamilton, Gary R. Montelam, George L. Perry and Jerry C. Vernon each shot 3,000 'Federal' shells for a squad total of 15,000 A.T.A. registered single targets and Vernon only missed 80 targets out of his entire 3,000.

The shooting began shortly after sunrise on October 26, 1974, at Oakgrove Gun Club in Oakgrove, Louisiana. When the last shot was fired at 9.45pm, the five man squad had averaged .9280% accuracy over the entire 15,000 targets.

At the end of the first 1,000, the squad was averaging .9532% and amazingly at the end of the 2nd 1,000, the average had jumped to .9602%. Even under failing light through to the end 2,400 targets the squad average was .9567% for the last 600 of those targets, however darkness dropped the squad average for the third 1,000 to .8706%. Through the entire day there was not one single missire or gun malfunction.


## **45 YEARS AGO**

An item of news from the Clay Target Shooting News 1948.

April 1939 recalls details of the final shoot of the Nobel club on its old West Footscray grounds. The actual date of the last shoot was April 29, 1939. The fixture was attended by over sixty shooters, many appearing for a farewell 'crack' over the layout which introduced so many sportsmen to clay target shooting.

High gunners for the day were the late Charlie Corbett, whose break for the day was 36 straight. He won the first event on the 12th round, was runner up in the second event 24/25 to Athol Love and again runner up to Herb McIntosh of Seymour in the third event.

The club was later domiciled at Bentleigh and later amalgamated with former Blackburn club – the combination became known as the Australian Clay Target Club with newly developed grounds at Burwood in 1948. The Australian club at Burwood became the venue for the National Championships for the next eight years, then in 1958 and again for the final time in 1965.



Australian Gun Club 1950s. The Australian Gun Club came into being in 1948 incorporating both Nobel Club and Blackburn Gun Club. The Australian National Championships were staged there for many years, then they were rotated around the states as suitable grounds became available.

## AUSTRALIAN GUN EXPO

On the dates October 24th and 25th the Seventh Australian Gun Expo will be staged at the Royal Exhibition Building in Melbourne.

Being the largest event of it's type in the Southern Hemisphere everything to do with firearms and allied fields will be for sale and exhibited with people travelling from every part of Australia (and various overseas countries) to sell, trade and buy at the Expo.

Amongst the many aspects of the Expo is the Safari outfitters area where a person can discuss all aspects of a hunting (fishing) etc, trip face to face with the individual(s) that is involved in the organising of the various trip or trips offered.

Along these same lines a great many items and services that are often advertised but not often observed first hand, will be at the Expo.

Whether you spend any money or not – many interesting and informative hours can be spent at an event such as this.



In some shooting, the move to a more open choke brought about more consistent kills, but it did so at the expense of causing further limitation of range, because where the patterns were open enough to give a diameter corresponding to what I was used to with lead, the density of the large pellets failed, the number of strikes at the target declined, and once again I was back to a wounding load. I am not proud of this.

To put it in other terms, I found that when used out of my usual gear, the 11/80z of US#4 steel (Australian #3) could not be relied on against teal sized birds to kill with the same ranging power as one ounce of number six lead.

This might sound drastic, but that's the way it is. An ounce of six shot will kill teal all day over decoys to thirty five yards, and no further; so will US#4 steel out of a quarter choke barrel.

An ounce of six will also kill teal stone dead at forty five yards out of a three quarter choke. Unfortunately, I had difficulty making the US#4 steel do that at all.

Part of this is due to the reduced effectiveness of the pellet as a missile. Part of it may also be the result of a sudden switch to steel from lead. All the sighting pictures in the brain are different; a new scale of forward allowance has to be developed, and that doesn't come about in a short while.

Among the difficulties with steel shot, first and above all is the problem of its lethality. When you begin to shoot it you get into trouble and it seems to me that this is inevitable. I've said enough about that already.

Second is the availability of it. What we've seen in Australia so far has been pretty well straight off the floor of an American warehouse. But is this appropriate for Australian conditions? More than that, is it even safe with Australian guns?

The onus of safety and the proof of guns lies differently in America from the way it lies in countries where there are proof houses. In the absence of a proof house anywhere on the continent, American guns have to be safe when they leave the factory and the manufacturer accordingly makes them heavy in metal thickness. Consequently, American guns tend to be able to handle whatever ammunition is meted out to them.

But we in Australia don't shoot predominantly American guns. There are lots of thin barrel walls used here in hunting. I worry about what will happen when they fire their first steel shot.

The pressures that American cartridges operate at tend to be considerably higher than British or European ones. But steel is higher in pressure again.

There are American companies that specialise in reloading components for steel shot cartridges. Looking at some of their data shows that routine pressures run to 12,500psi. (And, believe it or not, some loads are recommended at 1700 fps. That is not a misprint). Given the fact that in all cartridge performance there are movements of up to 2,000 psi in either direction from the mean, you can be sure that individual steel shot loads are turning in 14,000 psi and quite possibly more. This is not far short of a proof load pressure for many guns proved outside the USA and it is way above what I would ever shoot. As regular readers will know, I prefer to stay under 8,000 psi.

We would be hard pressed to find suitable cases to reload into. Seeing an ounce of steel occupies the same space as 1% oz of lead, cases need to be voluminous and our AA won't do. However, it is not possible even to begin reloading steel here, The wads are not available. They are quite unlike ordinary shot wads for lead, and so substitution is possible.

One well known American steel reloading company, marketing its own wad, is called Reloading Specialties. It offers some thirty five loads, and assuming the steel shot and the wads were made available by being brought in especially, not one of the recommendations could be readily assembled in Australia with components off dealers' shelves. They rely heavily on 800X and 4756.

Out of the 150 12 gauge steel loads listed by MEC. I can find three, using Blue Dot and 571, which could be loaded here with our components, assuming the steel shot and wads were brought in. Pressures for the loads still run at over 12,000 psi.

Further to that, standard reloading presses will not do the job. Modification is required. Kits are available to make the appropriate adjustments for common makes, but of course at this point you can't get them here. Companies like MEC are doing big business in selling them in the US.

There is a need to keep charge weights very regular indeed, because steel loads are highly pressure sensitive, and without great care of assembly can become dangerous. Using the pellets so much larger in size than what we are used to also means that there is often a problem with bridging, where the shot load jams as it comes down from the hopper.

Another issue of major importance is that of the hardness of the barrel in relation to the hardness of steel shot.

The suggestion is that after all this time wads have been developed that protect barrel steel. But the Brno side-by-side that floated past over my way a few weeks ago was suffering from scoring in the bores. So was the Diamond Grade Winchester, though its choke tubes were not marked. Stories of the bulging of chokes are not hard to come by, though, and it is evident that widely varying metal hardnesses are routinely involved in the manufacturer of shotgun barrel componentry.

So, I took some barrel steel to Amdel for testing, to see if anything emerged from the exercise.

I selected a Browning Invector choke, marked as being suitable for steel, a Beretta choke tube a few years old and not marked as being suitable for steel, and a barrel from a Browning A5 made some time in the fifties. These were picked on the grounds that they represented a reasonable cross section of the kinds of firearms which would be called upon by the average duck shooter, bearing in mind that it is already well accepted that thin barrel walls of side by sides and older guns are not suitable for use with steel.

These were all tested, and so was the steel shot itself. Not all were done on the Rockwell scale because of the difficulty of finding commonality in a test that would suit the shapes of the four samples, that is, choke, tubes, barrel and shot pellets. However, for purposes of this article and for rough reference only they were placed on a common scale: the higher the figure, the harder the steel.

The steel shot gave a hardness figure of 3; the Browning steel-approved choke was 38, the slightly earlier but still modern Beretta one was 29, and the Browning A5 barrel was 9.

Now, you don't have to be Sherlock Holmes to see that we have here a very wide discrepancy in barrel steel hardness. Obviously, the steel with the highest rating above, the Browning tube at 38, is steel shot proof, then the one that is really not all that much tougher than the steel shot is hardly going to be a good risk – the user of this Browning A5 barrel is very likely to end up with damage. In my opinion, it is much harder to make an educated guess about the intermediate one, the Beretta tube not marked as being safe for the job.

The information commonly circulating is that modern steel barrels are safe against steel shot, but who defines modern, and does safety include the acceptance of choke bulges?

As steel shot reaches forcing cones in the chamber and the choke, it does not compress the way lead does. This means that there must be the possibility of easier damage.

If you want to ask what is going to happen to your gun when you fire your first steel cartridges through it, the sad fact is that nobody in Australia can tell you. I certainly can't. I can only say that some barrel damage is likely to occur in some guns, and after that it's up to you.

I can foresee a good deal of damage to screw-in chokes taking place here, as people put them to the test. They seem to me to be particularly vulnerable, and the likely outcome is that the threads of some will be rammed into the threads of the barrels that house them, and there they are going to stay, cold welded. Not much of a prospect.

The expense of steel shotted cartridges is a major problem which is going to affect the way people use them. They run, as well as I've been able to ascertain, from in the region of \$17.50 to just on \$24 per packet of twenty-five.

# NATIONAL SHOOTING GROUND

## Here's what you said

Earlier this year a poll was conducted of general members by the former Promotions and Development Sub-Committee in an attempt to gauge feelings regarding the possible establishment of a National Shooting Ground. Advice was sought from professional pollsters, but as they wanted to charge an arm and a leg to conduct a poll for us it was conducted 'in-house,' and so, I suppose, some criticism could be levelled at the design, as professional pollsters we certainly ain't. Nevertheless it was a genuine attempt to provide objective feedback to the National Executive in their consideration of this important issue.

Many of the returns had some illuminating comments, some of which could not be repeated here. One common statement was that we should have surveyed all members, not just the 500 sampled. One good reason was simply the amount of work –I calculated that just to record the 241 returns on a database took almost 5,000 key strokes, and that was after I had designed the database. That represented about 8 hours work. If we had sampled the whole membership, and assuming a similar return rate (48%), it would have taken probably 150 hours just to record the data let alone analyse it. Remember that this is all volunteered time! The professional pollsters advised that a sample of 200 would be adequate, as they work on very much smaller samples. We sampled 500 and got 241 returns, and so I am confident that we obtained a reasonably representative sample.

Shooters names were randomly sampled from the **total** national membership, and one criticism was that it may have been better to stratify the sampling on a State basis. This is a fair criticism, and if a similar poll is conducted again I would suggest that the samples be selected on both a State stratified and on a proportional (to numbers of members in each State) basis. We were a bit lucky, as our random sampling gave numbers which more or less reflected the proportions of State membership numbers.

Except for the returns in Question 1 and Question 7 (A), figures are shown as rounded off percentages and, for better or worse, here is what you said.

STEEL SHOT - Some Facts

This ensures one thing; nobody is going to gain familiarity with them by using them for practice. At a dollar a cartridge, they are going to be used very sparingly.

The response I would make to this is to point out that if the governmental bodies which are pushing for introduction of this shot are serious about its introduction as a bona fide conservation measure, then they surely should have organised some kind of reduction of the massive tax that is placed on imported ammunition. I don't see it happening, though.

#### SOME CONCLUSIONS

This new direction in shotgunning is not one that I can endorse.

Shotguns, their technology and materials, weight, ranging power, balance, design and everything else, including the way people perceive targets when looking along them, have all been developed around lead shot, or, rather, around shot which has the characteristics of lead.

I do not know whether it will be possible to build guns and loads less prone to wounding using steel shot, but I do know that if it is, the process has not been perfected overseas and here it is just nonexistent. No data exists in this country – no components are here, and we don't even know which guns are going to be able to handle it without damage, let alone without making poor quality wounding patterns.

Whatever the case, this technology is not going to come easily. There is a huge amount of work involved in boring chokes to new diameters and dimensions, of balancing longer shot columns holding different sized pellets, of dealing with shorter shot strings and different forward allowances. It just seems to me a simple fact that steel will not be successfully shot out of guns built for lead. The guns will at least have to be organised for it, and quite likely bought for the purpose.

I very much doubt that shooters will do it. As a result they will end up grossly disillusioned with their performance in the field. Uneducated and taken by surprise by new legislation, they may be forced to select from a tiny range of factory loads and a total of two shot sizes, in a medium which by its nature is extremely finicky and requires extra care and variety in working up loads, not less care than lead.

Even if they intended to use it, there is little published information around the world on the nuts and bolts of steel performance, and it seems likely to be infinitely less forgiving and less flexible than lead. To gain half satisfactory results with it I suspect it's going to take twice the work.

And, in case you haven't heard, in some parts of the world where shooters are poorly organised and have little political representation steel shot is being forced into use not only over wetlands, but in upland conditions and even in clay target shooting.

# FROM THE DIRECTOR OF COACHING

## **Sports Travel**

The following article is taken from a paper delivered by Dr Peter Harcourt, member of the 1992 Australian Olympic Medical Section.

The sport that we shooters all like and participate in, is very much like travelling. No matter where, within our own country or outside of Australia, we are very much isolated.

Our major sporting venues are as diverse as countries in the Northern Hemisphere or our own distant states, such as Western Australia, Northern Territory or South Australia.

We are lucky enough that the travel within Australia is a maximum of five hours (dependant of course on connecting flights). But once we decide to compete or even just trip overseas, all of a sudden the rules of time change. We could suddenly embark on twenty hour (20) or more journeys. It is at this point that we do not consider the ramifications and effects that this travel will have on our mental and physical well being.

Dr Peter Harcourt has recently undertaken a study of elite athletes of all sports and considers that there are common factors that will arise causing problems for the athlete in his/her performance at their destination. The common factors that even our own International athletes have acknowledged as being major areas of concern are in availability of the right nutrition (food), adapting to the different weather, local customs and medical orientated questions, such as what if I become sick?

Dr Harcourts study involved noted figures, being, Dr Adrian Hurley, Ray Borner – Australian Mens Basketball, Paul Reidy – Olympic Rower and Dr Frank Pyke – Executive Director of the Victorian Institute of Sport.

From research information received from the above people, Dr Harcourt began to input some broad strategies for both the sportsperson and the tourist alike. The areas that he defined more succinctly are as follows:

- Preparation for Departure
- Inflight Strategies
- Destination Guidelines

The first of the heading, Preparation for Departure, covered subjects such as thinking and planning your trip, thereby being organised and ready to embark on the trip.

Key areas of preparing for departure are relaxation, diet and making psychological adjustment to the destination situation. Ensure that you don't rush, allowing adequate time and leave with everything under control. When Ray Borner was asked how he prepared, he replied by saying that he ensured that he packed some snackbars, breakfast cereal, energy food and something 'Aussic' like Vegemite.

Ray also made sure that he made a list of appropriate clothing and personal items for the trip, two days before, then gradually putting these things together. In his mind, it is essential that he takes at least one day off before departure so as to start the journey relaxed.

Caffeine intake should be reduced 48 hours prior to takeoff, avoiding alcohol and get to sleep early. The naps should correspond as closely to the destinations time frame. These strategies are designed to start the readjustment of the bodies biological time clock that determines sleep, arousal and metabolic/energy patterns, which therefore reduces the jetlag symptoms of nausea, lethargy, dizziness and insomnia.

Paul Reidy, the Olympic Rower, believes that Inflight Strategies are a must in order to arrive at the destination relaxed and refreshed as much as possible. He ensures that he is on the plane early, his hand luggage is stored nearby but away from his feet, so it gives him extra leg room. It appears from the article that sleep is an essential factor to consider and if you have a morning arrival then you sleep the lastleg of the journey. If it is an evening arrival then be awake for the last leg and perhaps even move around the plane. These approaches on the plane will help adjust the biological clock.

Fluids are essential during these long flights, chiefly water and Juices to prevent dehydration. Coffee, Tea and Alcohol should be avoided or severely restricted as they are diuretic (a drug effect to increase the flow of urine) and increases dehydration. As soon as Paul is on the plane, he changes his watch to the destinations time and starts planning his rest and meal times around the airlines menu.

Most of the athletes prefer to change from their walking out dress to tracksuits and T-shirts so that they are comfortable. Quite often they also carry a toothbrush and other toiletries in their hand luggage to assist in personal freshness and comfort. During the athletes 'wake' period they often get up walk around, chat, play cards or occasionally do isometric exercises. Most prefer to avoid 'sweaty' exercises as it creates discomfort. Paul Reidy says that getting off the plane at short stops, walking around nice and easy, is part of the process to 'switching off.'

As part of the Destination Guidelines, the athlete has to quickly adjust or readjust their biological clock. To quickly adjust to local time, be discipline about rest, sleep and activity times. If one feels tired in the middle of the day, then reset for around 15 to 20 minutes and no more as it makes it harder to adjust. Otherwise if you do feel sleepy or tired, take a brisk walk or jog as this will lift the arousal level and combat the tiredness. If you have trouble sleeping, interdisperse writing/reading or if these fail, then consider a warm milk drink or hot bath as they can both have a sedative effect.

Acclimatisation in general takes up to 3 weeks and so it is essential that Australian athletes and travellers take every opportunity to acclimatise, particularly if they come from an Australian winter. As far as acclimatisation to local water, most of the sports medicine advisers, advise against local water for sealed bottled water. This even includes washing teeth, avoiding ice blocks and salads washed in local water. Seriously consider the method by which your food is cooked. Dr Pyke even suggests that as part of your travel kit, put in Lomotil (for diarrohea) and Stemitil (for nausea).

In summary, all travellers can gain more from their travel experience by thinking and planning their trip. In the same way as our top athletes have learned, a carefully considered approach to travel is more likely to lead to success.

#### **JUNE 27 & 28**



## INTERNATIONAL TRAP TEAM REPORT

A report on the Australian Team competing in Wales for the Van Diemen Trophy.

After arriving at Heathrow at 7.00am on Saturday 4th, we went through customs and got our hire cars, then started off for Bristol on the M4 freeway. Twenty minutes later we saw Windsor Castle on our left and it made us realise we definitely were in England.

We lunched at a little village called Pickwick. We said we were Australians and inquired if there was a local gun club. The guy replied, in a heavy cockney accent, "I could tell you weren't locals," and directed us to an old quarry 10 miles away, where, he assured us, there was a shoot. Arriving at the quarry and finding not a soul in sight, no trap houses, nothing except a few empties on the ground, we concluded that it was a rather 'small' shoot with hand throwers – we continued on to Bristol.

Finding our accommodation in Bristol with no map, half a dozen different local opinions as to where it was, took nearly two hours. We dined that night at a local pub that had been visited by Queen Victoria in 1836

Next morning we drove into Wales and through very picturesque countryside to Caersws, where we booked into Maesmawr Hall Hotel. As it was Sunday afternoon we went straight to the Gun Club, to find a 100 target pointscore event underway. Scores for our first 100 targets were Brett 298 (2nd in event), Jon 296 (equal 3rd), Craig 295, Tony 295 and Desiree 289.

No official shooting was organised for Monday so we took the opportunity to look over 'Powis' Castle near Welshpool, 20 miles north. This was an incredible look at history which we can't see in Australia. It was built in the 12th century, surrounded with acres of gardens and red deer roaming the grounds and was well worth the visit.

Tuesday to Thursday were official practice days. During this time we shot varying amounts of targets which were slightly less angled and distanced to what we have at home. Our practice scores led us to believe that we might be able to do quite well in the Van Dieman Trophy, as some shot breaks of 300 and 400 during this time.

Friday 10th was the first official competition day, which was the International Teams Match and included the Van Dieman Trophy. Our first round scores were Tony 75/75, Brett 75/75, Jon 75/75, Desiree 74/75, Craig 74/75.

Things were looking good at this stage as we led the Irish by one point.

Second round scores were Tony 69/75, Brett 75/75, Jon 75/75, Desiree 74/75 and Craig 74/75. This put us down a little but our third round with Tony 75/75, Brett 75/75, Jon 72/75, Desiree 75/75, Craig 75/75, left us with a one point lead over the Irish again coming into the last round.

Last round scores Tony 68/75, Brett 75/75, Jon 74/75, Desiree 75/75, Craig 75/75, unfortunately left us in second place and four points behind the Irish Team, who only dropped three points in the last round – Ireland 1483/1500, Australia 1479/1500. The highlight of the day was the brilliant 300/300 shot by Brett – other scores Desiree 298/300, Craig 298/300, Jon 296/300 and Tony 287/300.



## Tasmania leading on gun training

From the Minister for Justice and Consumer Affairs, Senator Michael Tate.

A new Tasmanian business venture has been hailed as a national leader in firearms safety training and encouraging responsible gun ownership.

The work of the Hobart based firm Gun Safety Tasmania Pty Ltd was outlined during question time in the Senate this afternoon by the Minister for Justice, Senator Michael Tate.

And the Minister described the company as an exceptional example of the positive approach being adopted by responsible gun owners and shooters' organisations as part of the effort to improve safety and community attitudes to firearms.

Gun Safety Tasmania Pty Ltd is the initiative of Mr Graeme Norris of Hobart, and has been established following the national agreement last year on uniform standards for firearms legislation, and the passage of Tasmania's Guns Act.

In Federal Parliament today Senator Tate was questioned about claims made by the Liberal Party in New South Wales that the Federal Government had a 'secret agenda' to ban private gun ownership throughout the nation.

Dismissing the suggestion as a nonsense scare campaign, the Minister held up the Tasmanian initiative as an example for the rest of Australia on co-operation between shooters and authorities to protect the community and help shooters safely enjoy their sport.

In Tasmania the legislation requires new gun licence applicants to undertake a course of gun safety training and pass an examination before the issue of a licence.

Gun Safety Tasmania Pty Ltd has established a network involving more than 50 shooting clubs throughout the State to participate in the training program.

On Saturday Senator Tate attended a special training course for instructors at the Rokeby Police Academy, the first of a three stage program for people who will become accredited instructors.

He said that with such positive work being done in Tasmania, he was disturbed that efforts were being made in New South Wales to needlessly alarm responsible gun owners.

Senator Tate slammed as a groundless scare campaign the efforts by the New South Wales Police Minister Mr Ted Pickering to claim that the Federal Government has a secret plan to ban all private gun ownership.

"There is no such plan, and there never has been such a plan," he said.

"On the contrary, as the Tasmanian situation shows, efforts are now being made in various parts of Australia to provide responsible shooters with specialised training so they can safely enjoy their sport."

The Minister said he was bitterly disappointed that after all States and Territories had reached agreement on a uniform approach to gun laws more than seven months ago, a baseless and politically motivated scare campaign should have been started.

"The Federal Government has no plans whatsoever to make criminals of those who hold a valid licence under State laws. What the various governments are doing is acting to take firearms out of situations where there is a risk to human life – for example by removing them from homes where a domestic violence restraint order is in effect."

"The common aim is a safer, less violent Australia, in which shooters can enjoy their recreation while the relatively small irresponsible element in the community is subjected to proper controls," Senator Tate said.

## NARROGIN CLAY TARGET CLUB

## 1992 Centenary Celebration Trap Shooting Carnival

Who said we were having a recession? This relatively small club situated in the great southern region of Western Australia is gaining new members and has broken its 1990 trap shooting carnival attendance record of 97 with an excellent roll up of 128 competitors. Although club members had an indication from around the traps that they could expect good entries for their carnival they did not count on such a large increase on previous nominations, as it was with a 210 target program over the two days of 4th and 5th July the number did place a fair strain on the club facilities and personnel. The winner and grade winners of the final event, the 1992 Narrogin Centenary Cup, were each presented with a medallion by the Chairman of that Committee.

A number of competitors arrived at the grounds with their families on Friday afternoon and availed of the pool trap facilities to practice. Several set up camps and caravans which created a holiday atmosphere.

On Saturday the traps were opened for practice at 8am and it was fairly evident from the steady stream of arrivals that there would be a good field of shooters. Shortly before 9am Club President, Lambert Jackson, called the competitors together to thank them for their attendance and welcome them to Narrogin. A very special welcome was extended to Miss Viktoriya Chuiko, a recent arrival from Russia. Viktoriya was a member of the Russian ladies team which competed at the 1991 World Trap Shooting Championships in Perth last November. During that event she expressed a desire to return to Australia. This was arranged by the President of West Australian Gun Club, Ted Dickenson and his wife Sonya who are sponsoring Viktoriya's

stay in Australia. A warm welcome was also given to Craig Gray of Morwell, Vic, who was visiting friends in the west and decided to include the Narrogin competition in his itinery.

The shooters were advised that tea and coffee, morning and afternoon teas and lunches would be provided by the club free of charge for the weekend, also that they were all invited to be guests of the club for a meal in the clubhouse on Saturday evening and for a barbecue and refreshments on Sunday evening after the presentation of trophies.

Club Captain John Bates then outlined the program for the day and asked that all competitors co-operate wherever possible and assist with scoring and refereeing to keep the competition flowing. Shooting commenced in mild overcast conditions with some wind, rain threatened on numerous occasions during the day but the conditions were quite satisfactory until the light failed at about 4pm due to heavy cloud cover followed by light rain.

The first event, Rural Traders Co-operative 25t DB Championship was won by Lex Shipp of WAGC 36/36, he took A grade with Ken Dew runner up on 35/36. B grade victor Scotty Gibson 27/27, C grade Dennis Rollond of Salmon Gums 23/25.

Event 2 Ivomec District Championship of 25t DB was won by Terry Fraser 38/38, Terry took the A grade with Peter Tyler of Collie taking B grade 39/41 and Dennis Rolland once again the C grade winner.

Mr Peter Hayman has prepared a report on the meeting, which has been circulated to all Zone Delegates and Zone Secretaries.

The Government representatives assured the delegates present, that items mentioned and discussed would be forwarded in a report of the meeting to Mr. Pickering.

## COROWA GUN CLUB

On Sunday May 24th, the Corowa Gun Club dedicated the naming of the club house in honour of its oldest member, Mr Alex Jamieson who will be 84 in September.

Perhaps no truer word was said when Mr Bob Blake, President of the Riverina Zone of the NSW Clay Target Association, who officially unveiled the plaque, described Mr Jamieson as a thorough gentleman. Members of the Jamieson family and gun clubs throughout the region who had gathered to acknowledge Alex's years of success and dedication to the sport he loves so much would have no hesitation in agreeing with Bob's remarks.

In reply Mr Jamieson explained the reason for this reputation was that he had always tried to be a sportsman and that he had made a lot of friends through shooting which he always enjoyed.

Mr Jamieson won his first trophy at the age of 12 at a clay target shoot at a Hopefield sports meeting. The trophy was a shaving bowl and brush!

He won his first championship – the North Eastern Mixed Bird Championship – in 1929 at Rutherglen and his last in 1989 at his home club Corowa, a period of 60 years.

Mr Jamieson joined the Border Gun Club at Wahgunyah. shooting live birds in 1928 but stopped during the 1930 depression. With encouragement from his wife, Mary, he began shooting again in 1953 at the club which had shot at various venues before finally moving to Cemetary Road, Corowa and later changing its name to Corowa Gun Club. The club went into recession for approximately five years during the 1960s, during this time Mr Jamieson shot in Victoria at the Rutherglen Gun Club.

Mr Jamieson's achievements are many but amongst the highlights are the 1956 Olympic elimination trials in Melbourne where he was one of 10 shooters representing NSW. Only two men were selected, although Mr Jamieson did not represent Australia at the Olympic Games it was a remarkable achievement to have reached final selection.

Also in 1956 Mr Jamieson competed in the NSW State team in Griffith where he shot 273/275. In 1961 he shot with the Australian team at the international ACTA shoot in Melbourne and in 1963 he represented the Victorian State team twice – at Alexandra and Mildura.

In 1955 he won the Grand Prix at the Coburg Gun Club. The prize was a caravan and was the first of big prizes offered for shooting. Mr Jamieson had no idea how he was going to get the caravan home to Corowa because he had travelled down to the shoot by train. The late Claude Dean offered to tow the van to Corowa.

A trophy which has given Mr Jamieson an enormous amount of pleasure was the Harry Pettit Memorial Shield which he won at St. James in 1980. The two had shot against one another in the past, therefore as an old friend Alex was pleased that he had done the event justice.

During the years the list of championship successes was long with wins at Hay, Wodonga, Mansfield, Warren, Narrandera, Echuca, Mangoplah and Bairnsdale. In 1980 he won the Veteran trophy in Darwin. His successes were even more remarkable in the fact that he only ever competed in competitions and never practiced.

Mr Jamieson was president of the Corowa club from 1955 to 1979, official referee in 1960 and official coach in 1988.


Although plans for the new club house were completed after Mr Jamieson's term as president, he instigated the building of it and the connection of the power to the site.

The enormous amount of time and effort he freely gave, has greatly contributed towards the establishment of the Corowa Gun Club. In 1978 he was awarded a Life Membership to the club, an award he is justifiably proud of.

Sadly, although in very good health, failing eye sight prevents Mr Jamieson from competing in a sport which has given him and his family a tremendous amount of enjoyment, but his son Robert and daughter Heather together with their children carry on the sport their father and grandfather taught them.

Mr Jamieson's devotion to assisting young people and ensuring they gain the enjoyment of the sport is very evident whilst he freely gives his time to the club and community coaching the Corowa High School students in the art of clay target shooting.

# BISMUTH NON-TOXIC SHOT

Rather than be saddled forever with steel, researchers and ballisticians around the world have been working hard at producing a kind of non-toxic shot from some new material that will be more closely equate to lead in performance.

By now many shooters will be aware of the rumours circulating about the manufacture of a new shot in England, this time made out of the little-known element called bismuth.

A Canadian hunter by the name of John Brown, backed by the Peterson Publishing Company in the United States, has taken out a patent on a process to make shot from a bismuth alloy.

This is the most promising of all developments about which I have been able to glean any information. And there have been many attempts along these lines, with all sorts of mixtures of zinc, tin, lead, copper and iron, with various plastics, and also, of course, the ill-fated tungsten, which was found to be far from satisfactory.

In producing a non-toxic alternative to lead, there are two main problems, and not one. The first is to gain good ballistics at reasonable cost effectiveness. The second is to demonstrate the non-toxic properties to a wide range of world authorities who by now have generated for themselves varying degrees of sympathy for steel, ranging from total acceptance in parts of Europe to grudging part-acceptance in Canada.

This article is going to devote itself to the first of these, showing the results of testing conducted by the SSAA in order to find out whether bismuth really could be the answer to steel shot in those few hunting places which may be able to be shown to have a toxicity problem.

Next month I hope to explore some of the more sociological and less ballistic aspects.

With regard to the purely ballistic properties of bismuth shot, however, the story is a whole lot more uplifting than the steel one is.

Eley Hawk in England was given the task by the bismuth shot backers of producing the prototype shot for its initial trials in the field.

Samples I have on hand give me plenty of cause for optimism.

The specific gravity of lead is 11.4. The soft iron which we are calling steel shot is 7.9, making it only two thirds as heavy as lead. Bismuth is 9.7, which gets it very much closer to the weight of lead.

In practice, lead shot as we know it is almost never used in the pure state, so it is never as heavy as these figures imply. It has to be hardened, and the agent that is universally employed for this job is antimony, which is very much lighter. Consequently, lead shot has a specific gravity rather less than pure lead, and just how much less is variable.

Similarly, the bismuth has to be alloyed for it to hold together sufficiently to make a projectile. It is a brittle metal. The good news is that analysis done on the Eley Hawk pellets supplied on test demonstrated that very little weight indeed had been sacrificed in the production of this alloy; the pellets had a specific gravity of 9.6, which is obviously near to that of pure bismuth.

In other words, for practical purposes in terms of weight the shot supplied was giving away very little to lead. This is an excellent start.

In any test of lead shot, regular readers will know I turn to the time honoured English industrial standard which involves a crush test, designed to give a demonstrable figure to the measurement of the distortion of a pellet under a blow of a known force.

#### BISMUTH NON-TOXIC SHOT

Historically, this was designed more than anything else to recognise and quantify the way manufacturers can vary the nature of their shot by adding antimony as a hardening agent. Lead shot varies enormously in its hardness and hence in its patterning density, because the softer it is, the more it distorts and the more openly it patterns.

When the bismuth pellets were crush tested in an attempt to assess their hardness relative to the usual range of lead shot, what came to light was their obvious molecular difference from lead. Under the force of the dropped weight, they fractured, so that it was very difficult to get a reading which would equate them with other, more conventional forms of shot. In this way it was clear that we really are dealing with an entirely new material here.

I concluded from this that the test method was inappropriate. Nevertheless, some comparisons were able to be made, and the good news is that by this crush test, regardless of how inefficiently it was being carried out, the pellets gave the overall impression of being comparable to lead shot in the two to three percent antimony range. This makes them similar in hardness to the widely available Winchester lead shot.

When checked for sizing, the pellets, which I had from two different samples, appeared to be better in the second sample than the first, possibly indicating that the makers are getting more deft as they go at adjusting the short-drop shot machine on which they are made.

The pellets were reasonably well sized, and ranged from .092" to .098", and averaged out at .095", which is exactly English (and hence Australian) number 7. This limited the testing, in some respects, but we have to bear in mind that the shot, as pirototype only in manufacture, was not available at the time of testing in the more popular game sizes. I might say in passing that to my knowledge this pattern testing by the SSAA has been the most extensive carried out anywhere in the world. It is certainly among the very first of the trials. It's only early days yet. However, one thing at a time; we come to the field testing later.

Telephone conversations with the factory in England indicated that they are taking orders for cartridges in all sizes from number 2 to number 9. This is very heartening. It seems they aren't far from serious production.

Bismuth, as we already know, is a bit lighter than lead. The question of how much lighter is really one of the most important ones in the whole issue, because if the pellets it makes are as light as steel shot, then there would be less advantage in arguing for this material instead of steel.

Consequently, the thing to do was to get a feeling for the weight in a way that lent itself to comparison with lead pellets, the material with which we are all familiar.

Each bismuth pellet weighed 1.20 grains; by comparison, pellets of standard Winchester number 7 lead shot, of the same diameter and containing three percent antimony, weighed 1.33 grains. The new Winchester high antimony shot, which is offered at six percent antimony, ran at 1.24 grains in number 7 pellets.

Obviously the new material is lighter, but rather than trying to state this in the form of a percentage weight difference, which would have no practical field application even after it was arrived at, it makes more sense simply to say that this .095" number 7 bismuth pellet has the same weight as a conventional Winchester number  $7\frac{1}{2}$ , which also comes in at exactly 1.20 grains when it is fitted with the usual three percent or so of antimony.

This means that in the test samples, at this small end of the shot size scale, there was a difference in weight of about one half of one shot size between lead and bismuth. And this is very welcome news indeed. Why is steel not an acceptable material for projectiles in my opinion? – primarily because it is too light. How light? – steel is approximately one and a half Australian shot sizes lighter than an equivalently sized pellet of Australian lead.

This has enormous significance.

For practical purposes, let's just assume a shooter of a shotgun has the choice of material for his projectiles; as the weight difference gets greater between any two materials, lead and anything else, this means that in the lighter material the shooter will have to select a larger pellet if he wants it to have equivalent energy retained in its flight to the target. However, there's a big problem here; the greater the difference in the weight between the two metals, the larger the pellet size difference is going to have to be if you want the lighter material to have enough weight to do its job. And the larger this pellet is, the bigger the problem it is going to have in overcoming air resistance, and the more it will be slowed down.

In other words, the closer the new material is in density to lead, the less important will be the weight difference. And a difference of one half of one shot size in the case of the test bismuth shot gives it a gigantic advantage when it is being compared to steel, and almost no disadvantage when it is compared to lead, because as we've seen, lead can go almost to that lightness when enough antimony is added to it.

Looking at the specific gravity figures, it appears that the lead and steel are two poles, and the bismuth lies in the middle. But in reality of field application, the bismuth as it was supplied on test is much closer to the lead.

This can easily be translated into more practical terms, I believe, in that once the shot gets into the larger sizes, starting at five or four, such a weight difference should be completely unimportant in the field. If later shot has the same density as the test shot, it should be unable to be distinguished from lead in its ballistics.

It goes without saying, of course, that sizes of five and four are the preferred waterfowl shooting ones, and the sevens on test really wouldn't enter into the discussion. There is no need for the smaller sizes such as this ever to be brought into the country, as the toxicity question is related to waterfowl only, and ducks will be shot with the larger sizes.

I am happy to go on from there to report that my fairly extensive field testing did in fact bear out great similarity of performance to lead.

I carried on as wide a range of test as I could manage, using a variety of barrels, propellants, velocities and shot weights, and then using the shot against live targets.

First, the patterning.

Despite the apparent proneness the pellets had to fracture under the sudden impact of the shot tester, when they were patterned they indicated good ability to survive the impact of breech pressures.

Because bismuth is often described in text books as a brittle metal, initially I was afraid that the pellets might break in the breech, and thereby thin out the density of strikes at the target. But after close examination of many patterns, I can say that the average sheet of patterning paper contained one strike that was made by a pellet fragment. This is hardly something to lose sleep over.

Most pellets that disintegrated wouldn't get as far as the paper downrange, and most of the fragments would be too light to penetrate it anyway, so it can only be guessed at as to how many did break up along the way down the bore. But it doesn't matter. The only important thing from the shooter's viewpoint is that the patterns should be adequately dense, in the same way lead patterns are, and this proved to be the case.

I began with my usual quarter choke test barrel which most of the time wants to shoot 55%, and gave pattern quality of just above normal. I was very much heartened by this start. The load gives about 1220 fps and has a pressure of around 9,600 psi, so could be called fairly average in most regards.

I then set out to create a pressure hike, to see if the shot could be made to break up in the bore. Accordingly, I loaded an ounce of bismuth ahead of 19 grains of Red Dot. This is a brisk load at 1290 fps, with high pressure at 10,500 psi, not a pressure I recommend for regular use. I assembled it with a lead control, and fired both in a series through my standard .025"

three-quarter choke barrel, which most of the time wants to shoot 65%.

The results were again quite pleasing, in that the lead load gave 68% and the bismuth gave 66%, both of which would qualify as three quarter choke patterns. The bismuth pattern quality was slightly higher than that of the lead, there being considerably fewer five inch pellet-free voids in the bismuth patterns.

I also found that in these patterns particularly, the pattern fringe was better with bismuth than with lead. The Oberfell and Thompson pattern testing scheme falls down a bit here, in that it does not measure this fringe and so it fails to bring out the advantage of having the thirty inch killing circle stacked around its outer perimeter with a good supply of strikes. To mention it as we go is the only way I can acknowledge that it took place, and it does not officially make the pattern better; however, in my experience it makes more targets break and more game fall down cleanly if such a fringe exists, and the fact is that in the case of this load, the bismuth outdid the lead, and that's another pleasing point in is favour.

The next step was to put the fast and higher pressure Red Dot load above through the quarter choke .014" barrel and compare it with the milder Green Dot load which I reported first. This I did, and the result was 53% pattern, still quarter choke, and only just two percentage points down on the slightly lower pressure Green Dot load as I've already described.

This doesn't prove that the shot fairly vigorously resists distortion under the stress of higher pressure and velocity, but it certainly suggests it, and you don't know how glad I am to be able to tell you it's so.

The tungsten shot that was extensively tested last year blew all over the half-acre under this kind of treatment, but the bismuth lapped it up.

Now, if this were lead we were dealing with, I'd expect to be able to shoot a tighter pattern through this barrel if I could drop the pressure and velocity very considerably; so, I stayed with the quarter choke and put 20 grains of Green Dot behind an ounce of bismuth, still using all AA components, and got 1220 fps and about 7,800 psi. This took the 53% (quarter choke) pattern up to 59%, which is half choke, with normal distribution quality.

Once again, this performance is predictable, and it conforms exactly to what I would expect of any standard lead shot mix on the market.

I thought by this time I was beginning to understand the bismuth characteristics, so I set out to make a very quiet cartridge which would tighten up the patterns by virtue of lower pressures and a flatter pressure curve.

For this, I chose Winchester 540, which is highly suitable for the purpose. I put an ounce and a quarter, 35.5 grams, of bismuth in front of 31.5 grains of 540, AA case, wad and primer, and shot it through the .014" quarter choke, the .025" three quarter choke, and a .040" tight full choke.

Nothing about shotgun patterning is guaranteed to turn out the way you expect it to; it gave 49%, improved cylinder, out of the quarter choke, which was more open than I thought it would be. It gave 64% out of the three quarter barrel, which is spot on; lastly, it gave 68% out of the full choke, which is again much more open than I expected.

The pattern distribution quality was a little lower than normal, and because of this and the way it was unexpectedly a little more open as well, I thought I'd have one more go and try to find an equivalent to 540, another pattern tightener, and see what happened.

I selected Vectan D20, which is another propellant with a flatter pressure curve, suitable for launching shot with less distortion and hence bringing up the pattern percentage count.

The results were such a delight I stopped there, and I consider the matter is proved.




