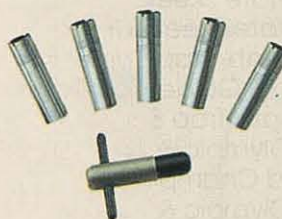

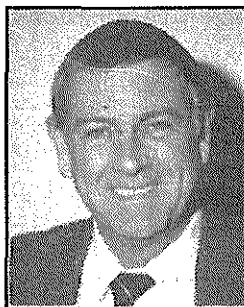

Conditions of Competition — Entry

Entry into the 1995 Australian Trap Championships is open to all shooters who are registered for 1995 with the Australian Clay Target Association. Temporary honorary membership will be offered to overseas visitors who can produce evidence that he or she is a current financial member of their home country's equivalent body to the Australian Clay Target Association.

Australian competitors **must** produce their 1994 and 1995 registration cards, before nominating, to the 1995 Nationals Office Handicapper. Where a competitor was not registered for 1994 he/she must produce his 1995 registration card.

Divisions

The competition will be divided into separate Championship Titles for Open (with a Veterans division), Womens and Juniors, excepting the Grand Australian Handicap where places shall be awarded from 1 to 10 with divisions for Womens, Juniors & Veterans.

The payment of a reduced nomination by Women, Junior or Veteran competitors entitles those shooters to only be considered for awards in the Womens, Junior & Veterans sections.

Any competitor paying full nominations is entitled to receive awards in the Open, Womens, Junior & Veterans section. ie: A woman paying full nominations (OL) shoots 50/50 to win the Womens Championship is entitled to contest the Open Overall/Grade placings.

Note: A junior female must decide which section she is to enter, either Womens or Juniors, she is not eligible for both.

A minimum of three persons must compete in any grade or section before sashes/medals/cash/trophies are awarded.

When team selection is involved shooters shall be eligible for the Open team irrespective of the section nominated for. In addition to Open teams, shooters shall be eligible for team selection for the section nominated, Womens, Junior, Veterans.

To be eligible for selection or naming in any team, competitors must have competed in a clear majority of programmed events.

Age Qualifications

Veterans — are those competitors over the age of 65 years on March 25, 1995.

Juniors — are those competitors who, on March 25, 1995 will be under the age of 18 years.

Starting Time

Each day's event shall commence at 8.30am.

Shooters who fail to appear in time for their squad will forfeit their nomination. Upon the payment of a second nomination, shooters will be re-squadded towards the end of the event.

Should a shooter being late for his squad then elect to withdraw from the event, he shall not be eligible for any refund of nominations paid.

Cartridges

For all events, excluding the Grand Australian Handicap, load size for all National Title events is limited to 28gr struck measure or equivalent shot size not larger than No. 6.

Cartridges of the competitor's choice, including re-loads, may be used in all National Championships. Cartridges will be available for purchase at the National Championships.

Target and Traps

Targets through the program are to be Bay City black. All targets thrown remain the property of the organisers.

All throwing equipment will be electronically operated.

Classification

It is the responsibility of the competitor to see that their entry is correctly classified — and indication can be obtained for the daily scoreboard. This applies to trap grades, **Open, Womens, Juniors and Veterans** divisions.

Contestants are reminded that re-grading and re-handicapping will be carried out on a daily basis, where required by the rules.

Womens, Juniors and Veterans who have elected to enter the Open section, will be indicated on the High Gun Scoreboard as: OL, OJ, OV.

Practice, subject to trap availability, will be available throughout the championships. Tickets may be purchased at the designated area.

Services and Facilities

Catering: The catering service will be provided by an outside contractor. Arrangements are being made for meal services to be available with an extensive but practical menu.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

1. In the event of any shooter not being able to produce his/her Handicap Card, a duplicate shall be issued for the duration of the National Championships. This card will then be forwarded to the Club Secretary to enable scores shot to be recorded.

NOTE: A \$20 fee will be charged for the issue of any duplicate Handicap Card.

2. Squads of 6 to shoot 50 targets/75 targets in brackets of 25, one visit only to the traps.
3. While shooters may request to be squadded in the same wave as other shooters, under no circumstances are shooters allowed to arrange their own squads. All squads will be determined by the Nationals Office whose decision shall be final.
4. Each shooter is to take enough cartridges to shoot at 50 targets/75 targets. A time limit of two minutes will be imposed for the changeover for each 25 targets. **Should the two minute time limit be exceeded then a penalty of the LOSS OF ONE TARGET shall be incurred.**
5. Shooters who fail to appear in time for their squad will forfeit their nomination. Upon the payment of a second nomination shooters will be re-squadded towards the end of the event.
6. Should a shooter being late for his squad then elect to withdraw from the event he shall not be eligible for any refund of nominations paid.
7. All shooters must sign the score sheet after each 25 targets. Once a shooter has signed his score sheet he has accepted his score. Any score sheet not carrying the shooters signature will be credited with the lowest recorded.
8. Any competitor may be called upon to referee and/or score throughout the period of competition. The persons designated to referee and score must fulfil their obligation to do so. Failure to either referee or score will incur a penalty of the **LOSS OF ONE TARGET IN THE NEXT EVENT**. Should a following event not be programmed then the penalty of the **LOSS OF ONE TARGET** will be incurred in the event concerned.

9. Shooters will be drawn from each day a last round squads to referee and score the first rounds of the following day, being ready to officiate at the advertised starting time. Shooters who fail to fulfil their responsibility shall be penalised one target. While replacement referee and scorer are permissible, the penalty of a loss of one target for their failing to officiate shall be made against the officially designated person.
10. Any unauthorised shooter interfering with or attempting to interfere with the trap will be penalised **FIVE (5) TARGETS**.
11. All disputes must be in writing together with a \$20 deposit, which is refundable subject to the appeal being upheld.
12. All disputes and deposits must be lodged with the Tournament Director, who shall arrange a hearing with the appointed jury.
13. Optional sweep/purse nominations shall be noted on a separate form from shooting nominations. Entries for sweep/purse will only be accepted at the designated area, which shall be at a different location of the area accepting shooting event nominations.
14. Options sweep/purse prizes will be available for collection on the following day of each event with the exception of the final day. All payments must be signed for and proof of identification given if requested.
15. When team selection is involved, shooters shall be eligible for the open team as well as section teams irrespective of the section nominated for. To be eligible for selection in any team, competitors must have competed in a clear majority of programmed events.
16. The payment of a reduced nomination by women, junior or veteran competitors entitles those shooters to only be considered for awards in the Womens, Junior and Veterans sections.

Any competitor paying full nominations is entitled to receive awards in the Open section, Womens, Junior and Veterans section ie. A women paying full nominations (OL) shoots 50/50 to win the Womens Championship is entitled to contest the Open Overall/Grade placings.

Note: A junior female must decide which section she is to enter, (Junior or Womens). She is not eligible for both.
17. A minimum of three persons must compete in any Grade or Section, including High Gun before sashes, medals, trophies are awarded, irrespective of nomination paid.
18. Nominations will close daily at 11.00am.
19. The practice of card playing at the National Championships is prohibited in areas embracing the club rooms, bar, dining areas or such areas as may be determined from time to time.
20. Any interpretation of the program and conditions of entry will be the responsibility of attending members of the Executive Committee, whose decision shall be final.
21. An acceptable standard of dress is required for all competitors - Tournament Director to adjudicate.
22. All competitors must comply with firearms licencing laws in their state of residence and in the state of Victoria.

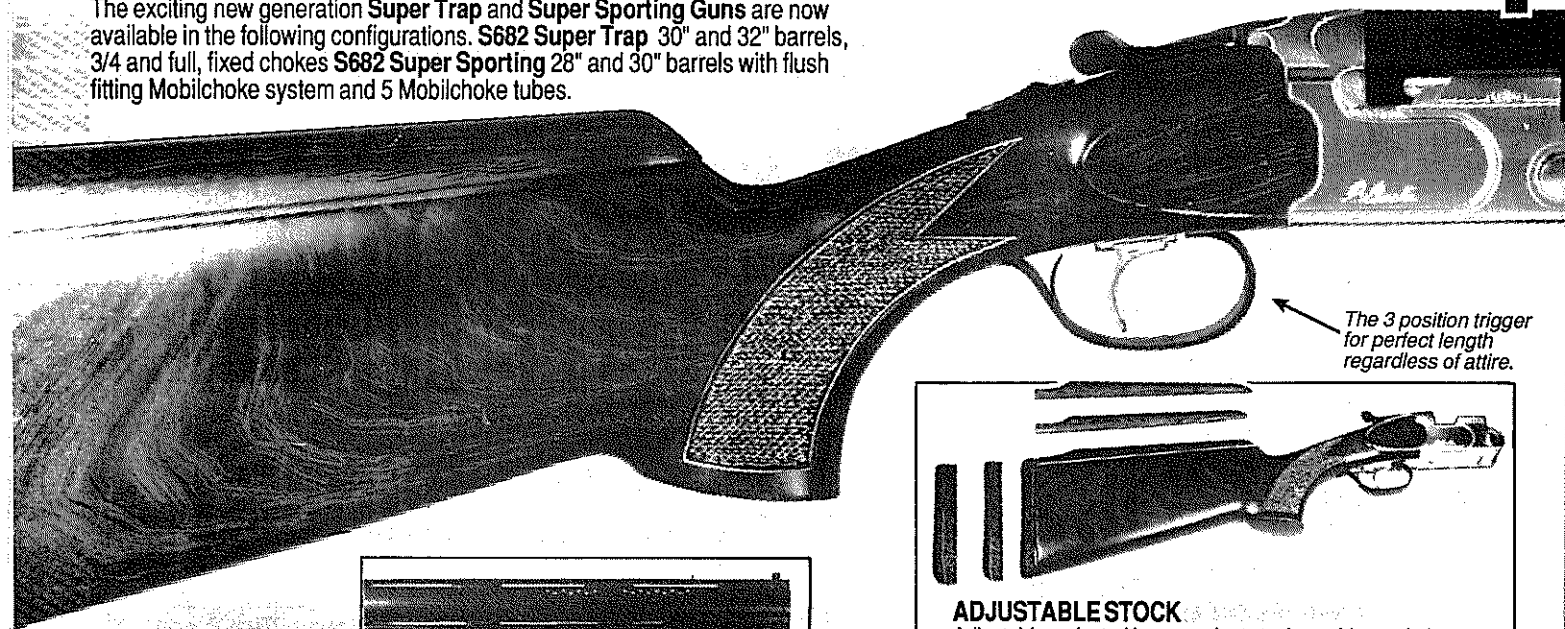

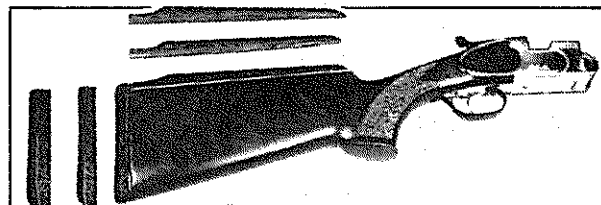

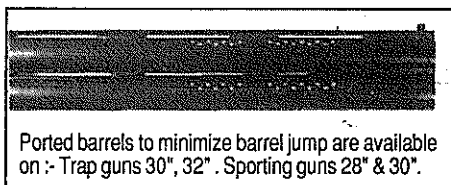

Southern Zone

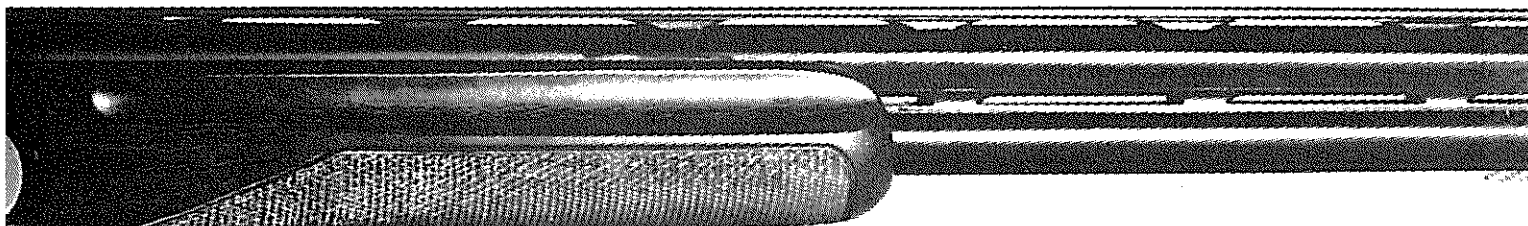

On Sunday the 15th January 1995, the current ACTA Junior Development Squad assembled at the Australian Institute of Sports for a five day training camp.

The squad for the jointly sponsored National Sports Program (NSP) and Australian Clay Target Association camp, was made up of the following individuals representing the five shooting disciplines.

With the unavailability of Mr Greg Chan (NT State Coach) and Mr Ian Hale (Victorian State Coach), the coaches selected to assist the squad were Mr Fred Schmetzer (NSW State Coach), Mr Pud Burgess (Level 2), Mr Russell Mark (Level 1) and some timely assistance from Mrs Robyn Faber (Level 2).

Sunday the 15th saw the arrival of the squad members and coaches to the AIS Hall of Residence. Here each person was assigned a room in the accommodation wing and allowed to settle in. For some, for the first time to make their own beds. That evening following the evening meal, the squad members and coaches were given an introduction into the camp and an overview of the coming days and the program involved.

Monday morning at 9am everyone gathered at the Gold room in the Lecture Hall and began the first segment of the day. Mr Tony Wind of the Australian Sports Drug Agency (ASDA), took everyone through the maze of both banned and acceptable drugs. To complete the lecture, a video on the procedure and reasons behind an athlete selected for drug testing was shown and drew from the squad considerable questions. The video

on drug testing, which is in the ACTA library, opened the squad members eyes to the reality of drugs.

Next came nutrition by Ms Liz Broad, whose task was to bring to everyone's attention better nutrition and eating habits. Considering the assembled age group and the ability to consume great mounds of food, she did a great job. The subjects covered were from 'The Travelling Athlete', 'Eating to Win', and 'Life in the Fast Lane'. Liz handled her task well and answered many questions on particular foods availability in everyday life.

Following a well deserved and nutritious lunch, the squad re-assembled back at the NSP room for Sports Psychology. Ms Vicki de Praza, who has worked with previous clay target groups, conducted the session covering Goal Setting, Focussing and Centring. The session involved input from each squad member finishing with great benefits derived from maintaining a diary on training and competition activities.

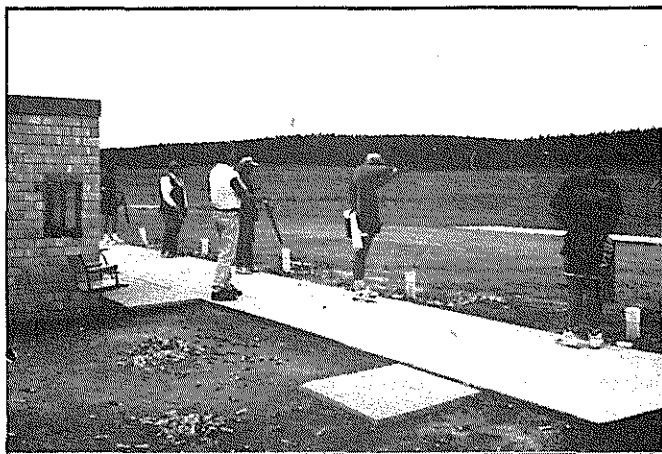
With conditions in the NSP room very hot, most of the squad took the break before the next segment, Strength and Conditioning, to change into suitable clothing.

Mr Harry Wardle, the AIS Head Strength and Conditioning trainer, took them over to work with the squad on Warm Up and Warm Down techniques, as well as physical fitness as related to a clay target shooter. The latter part of the lesson was in the Weight Training Centre whereby squad members went through the different routines. There was some sweat raised and a lot of deep breathing as some found the Christmas break had created a 'spare tyre' syndrome.

As with each of the programs and especially the last two, individual squad members discussed problem areas or plans to correct situations long after the time allocated had passed.

Following the evening meal, the day was wrapped up with a short video presentation and discussion on the program for the next two days.

Tuesday started overcast and raining as the first group, under Fred Schmetzer and Pud Burgess, headed for Majura Park Gun Club for the DTL & Skeet practical training. The second group were escorted into Canberra, where a full day of Vision Testing took place under controlled conditions. This testing covered all aspects of vision and left no area uncovered. At Majura Park it kept raining, but apart from recoil testing, the training went on regardless.

During the afternoon, Russell Mark arrived to take part in the camp. After the evening meal, the squad and coaches gathered in the NSP room to listen to Russell as he discussed issues that are a part of everyday requirements of an elite shooter. From goal setting to keeping an accurate diary and the common sense reasons for keeping of records. Russell spoke for some 2½ hours and freely gave of his knowledge and experience to everyone assembled in the room. To save his voice for the next day, a video on the Commonwealth Games (Clay Target section) was shot to round off the night.

Wednesday was an early start for the ISU members, as the venue for training was the Canberra International Gun Club, some 40 minutes by road. The DTL & Skeet members, because of the previous days rain, were also bussed to Canberra International Gun Club, to do Recoil filming before undertaking their Vision Testing. With Robyn Fabers assistance and Fred Schmetzer's organisations, the impossible was accomplished. Under Russell's guidance, the ISU Trap and Double Trap training was a great success with a clear improvement in techniques showing through.

It was a weary squad that assembled after dinner, so only a short session on Goals and a question of 'What did the individuals want from shooting in the next two years', being posed.

Thursday morning saw the squad pack their gear before heading for a lecture from the LEAP program. This program gives the athletes, opportunity of employment and directions that may be available. Following on, Mr John Baker, presented the raw footage from the Recoil testing and it was a very surprised group that viewed themselves on video. The high speed footage showed each squad member at the point of firing and the recoil delivered to the shoulder. From this footage, the individuals with their coaches, will be able to make quality adjustments.

Before the camp broke up, a tour of the Institute of Sport was organised followed by a question time and debriefing. At 2.30, the 1994 Junior Development Camp came to an end as all departed homeward bound.

To me the camp was an unqualified success and the 20 elite juniors of our sport took every advantage offered to them. They undertook each session seriously and when time allowed, enjoyed themselves to the full.

As with every program, there are many people to thank and this camp is no different. On behalf of the ACTA Coaching Council and the 1994 Junior Development Squad, I wish to thank the following people.

- i The ACTA Executive for supporting the program and believing in the Junior Development Program.
- ii The NSP and Ms Jenny Peereboom (spelt correctly this time) for their support and the organising of the travel and infrastructure required for a successful camp.

- iv Canberra International Gun Club for their facilities and assistance. The change in 12 months has shown an incredible amount of work being undertaken.

- vi Mr Fred Schmetzer, the New South Wales State Coach, whose dedication to coaching and juniors, is second to none.

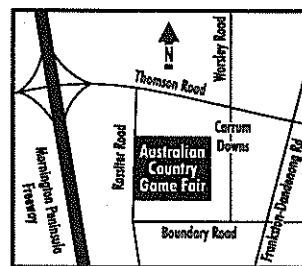

Australasian-Pacific 'GRAND PRIX'

Olympic Trap, Skeet and Double Trap

Current indications are that the response will be very good for the competition and as the number of competitors in all events will be restricted to allow all events to be run smoothly and completed on time, pre-nomination for this competition is essential.

It is most unlikely that competitors will be able to nominate on the morning of the competition, as it is expected that all starting positions will be filled before that. The draw will be completed by the tournament jury following the close of nominations on Wednesday 8th March at 1.00pm.

As a fitting 'finale' to this prestigious competition, the organising committee will host a buffet style presentation dinner at the Brisbane Gun Club at 7.00pm on Sunday evening 12th March. All presentations except for the Australasian-Pacific Double Trap 'GRAND PRIX', which is to be conducted the following day will be made at the presentation dinner.

Overall the success of the inaugural Australasian-Pacific 'GRAND PRIX' seems assured, and it is envisaged that all in attendance will benefit from the serious competition and exposure to International competitors from Australia and overseas.

Editor's Mailbox

Dear Sir,

I wish to have the following matters aired in the CTSN and sent to all Executive Members.

As at the end of November 1994, the membership of the ACTA stood at 7,935. State breakdown was as follows:

NSW	2,826	35.6%
VIC	1,958	24.6%
QLD	1,452	18.3%
WA	779	9.8%
SA	584	7.4%
TAS	195	2.4%
NT	141	1.8%

Therefore it can be said that 78.5% of the total membership were registered in the three eastern states. Further it can be said that NSW and either of the two eastern states combined would contain a majority of ACTA members.

The current ACTA Executive is made up of two delegates from each state. NSW has two delegates representing 2,826 shooters, whilst the NT has two for 141 shooters and Tas has two for 195 shooters.

Could it be possible that these figures expose what is the single biggest problem within the ACTA?

Could there be too many representatives sitting at the Executive table with a franchise from such a small number of shooters that their opinions and the way they generally vote may not be representative of the overall ACTA membership?

Is it possible for the Executive to consistently make decisions beneficial to the majority of ACTA members when eight delegates representing less than 22% of registered shooters can outvote six delegates representing more than 78% of registered shooters?

Perhaps they all vote for what is best for the ACTA as a whole and leave the detrimental impact of any decision on their state out of it?

When the ACTA constitution was devised no doubt our predecessors believed that future Executive members would put the ACTA before their home state. Is this the case?

Should state voting rights be in some way proportionate to each states membership to allow even the most parochial delegate to cast a vote which is 100% in his states interest but also serve the overall membership?

I am not criticising Executive Members for voting for what is in the best interests of their state members. I am saying that this should be the case, but state votes should be proportionate in some way to state membership so the greater interests of the ACTA are served by a vote taken amongst generally parochial people. This would allow delegates to openly and honestly represent their states interests without the minority being able to control the majority which is certainly possible at the moment.

Therefore it appears that until such time as the constitution is altered to give all shooters equal representation on the ACTA Executive, regardless of which state they come from, we will have to continue to put up with rule change decisions that are indefensible and continue to heap work on unpaid office staff, changes to training squads that are unbelievable, contrary to what was advertised, and which could have been avoided, and the inevitable end result of disillusioned people leaving what they always thought was a great and well administered sport.

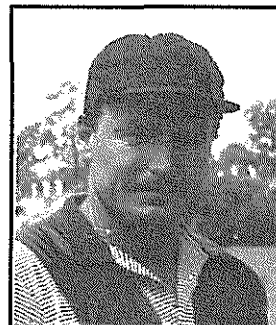

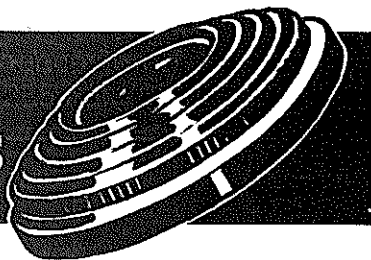

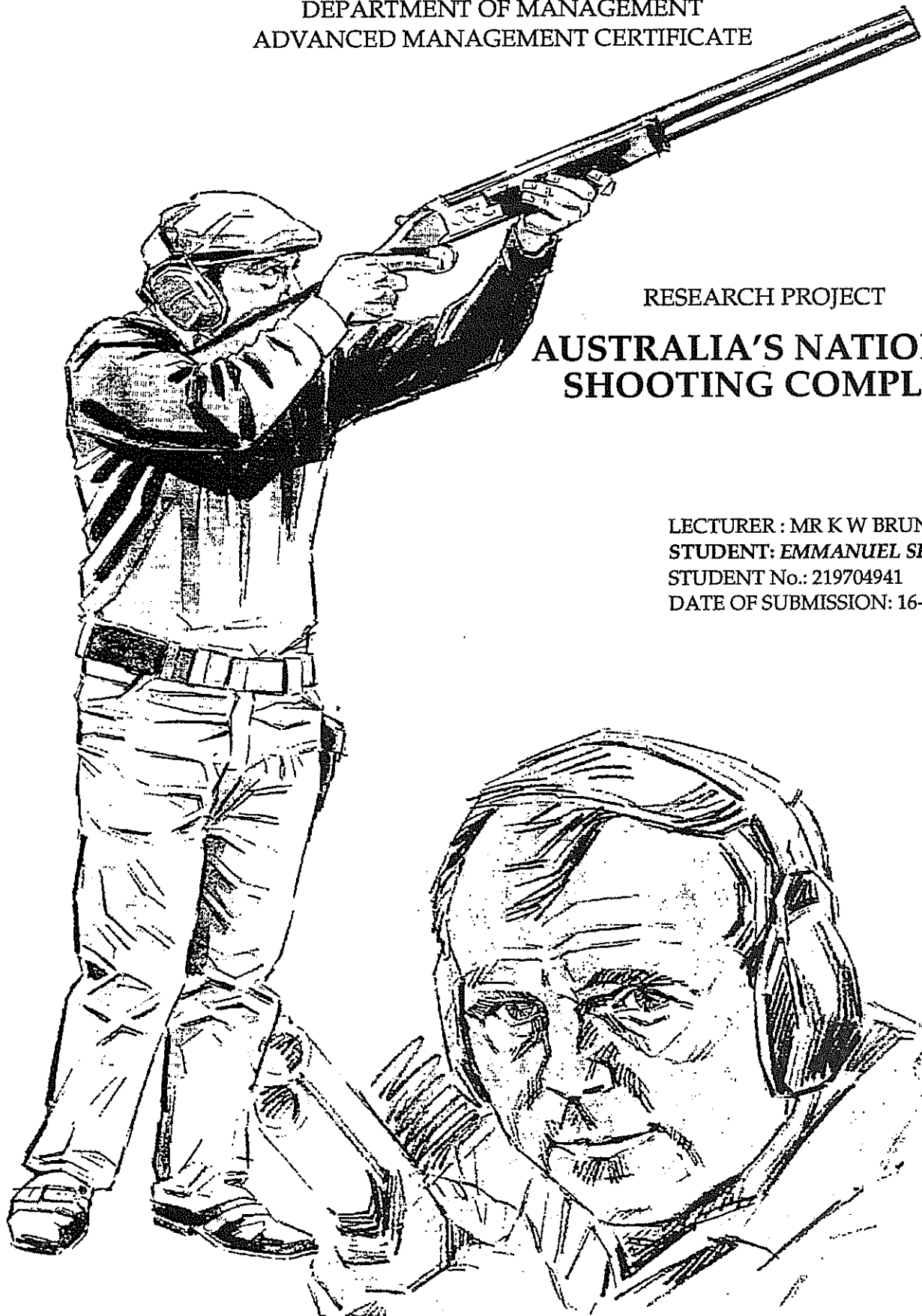

In fact these statements are as false as the various magazines who print that shooters are a silent group of sports people with a 'She'll be Right' approach to their sport.

In this report you will see that quite the opposite has been found.

Australian Clay Target Shooters have responded positively to the questionnaire which was mailed to them. By this positive response we have been able to draw firm conclusions from the research findings.

This report will highlight areas considered important for future National Shooting Complex (NSC) clients, 'The Australian Clay Target shooter'.

The results will also contain possible trends which could impact on whether Clay Target Shooters and their families patronise such a venue.

Issues such as Geographical Positioning of the NSC and the types of facilities that should be offered to Clay Target Shooters have also been investigated.

Competitive survival in today's sporting world demands a complete understanding of your market niche.

This report will show that Australian Clay Target Shooters have firm ideas of what they want and demand from such a venue and have expressed their views in this study.

Both 'Clay Target Shooting' and 'Croquet', are very civilised sports but little understood in the wider community and probably very similar in reasons why they attract active participants. (c.f. Douglas, 1994:3)

1. INTRODUCTION

1.1 Authorisation

As requested by the Australian Clay Target Association.

1.2 Aim

To report on the viability of an international standard venue for Clay Target Shooters and their Families, incorporating Competition, Leisure and Training Facilities.

1.3 Why is this Study Necessary?

This study was commissioned to assist the Australian Clay Target Association (ACTA) in its decision making process for a National Shooting Complex (NSC).

The study was needed to be able to determine actual needs of users which were previously unknown. By doing so funds could be strategically allocated to ensure maximum return from the facilities available.

1.4 Scope of the Project

This research project will investigate and report on primary issues affecting whether a National Shooting Complex should be built.

The following research objectives are addressed:-

1. To identify areas considered important for future NSC clients.
2. To identify possible trends which could impact on whether Clay Target Shooters and their families patronise a NSC.
3. To investigate and report on issues such as geographical positioning and the types of facilities that should be in a NSC.

Primary research data will be sourced from a mailed questionnaire.

The number of people chosen to participate is proportional to active Clay Target Shooters in the state. Questionnaire construction was aided from in depth interviews with senior Australian Clay Target Association members. Interviews with experienced local shooters were also sought to gain feed back on what was required for a NSC. The questionnaire itself had two sections.

Section '1' had general questions about the questionnaire participants and what their thoughts were on issues such as location of the NSC and important NSC facilities.

Section '2' canvassed issues about goods and services which would lead to Clay Target Shooters and their families patronising such a venue.

1.5 Outcomes From The Project and Benefits for Management

The outcomes expected from this study are to gain a more thorough understanding of what Australian Clay Target Shooters want and expect from a National Shooting Complex.

In addition to satisfying the objectives shown above we will show that Australian Clay Target Shooters have specific needs when it comes to selecting a venue for their holidays.

The direct benefits to the Australian Clay Target Association will be that they can focus their energies and funds on goods and services which are identified as important by the members in the body of the report and therefore increase the chances of success.

The management of areas such as marketing and advertising will be impacted on by this report. Through the results will be a base where a marketing strategy can be developed and possibly overlooked areas can be further developed.

It is important that management understands that a well patronised NSC is more than several shooting traps being placed in the middle of a paddock.

Even the cost of 25 targets is not the overriding factor whether an Australian Shooter will travel to use such a venue.

Therefore by researching the topic of a National Shooting Complex, the Australian Clay Target Association will have a platform to begin from. This platform will help to reduce some of the risks involved in building, marketing and maintaining an international sporting venue.

2. HISTORY OF CLAY TARGET SHOOTING

2.1 In the Beginning

The earliest recording of 'Trapshooting' as it was called then was on or around 1793 in the UK. An area on the outskirts of London, near Ealing was the first documented trapshooting sites.

This area was named 'Old Hats' derived from the practice of placing an old hat over a hole which contained a live bird. When the shooter was ready to fire the hat was removed and the fleeing bird was shot.

After continual improvements, in the year 1800, the House Pigeon Club near Hornsey Wood held what was the predecessor to today's Clay Target Shooting. Live birds were still used but they were placed in sunken wooden boxes at five equally spaced positions.

When the shooter called 'Pull' the trap boy would pull a cord which slid open the lid and the escaping bird would be shot. Various species of birds were used, which included sparrows, quail, wild and domestic pigeons. Larger pigeons became popular in trapshooting circles and although today live birds are no longer used some clubs still have the word 'Pigeon' in their name. Names such as 'Clay Pigeon Shooting Clubs' exist in England and lead people to think that live birds are still shot.

2.2 Clay Target Shooting in America

Clay target shooting was exported to America from the UK in the early 19th Century. The 'Sportsmen's Club' of Cincinnati Ohio hosted the first live bird shoots in 1931. Domesticated and in particular passenger pigeons were the favoured target of the day. Nine years on, saw the formation of the 'Long Island' and the 'New York Sportsmen's' clubs. They added live pigeon shooting to their sporting activities. By the 1850s live pigeon shooting as a sport was gaining momentum in the USA and so were its detractors. The 'Green' movement of the day resented pigeons being used for such sport and so began the search for a target which simulated the live pigeon.

In the year 1866, Charles Portlock of Boston, developed glass balls and a trap to throw them that would take the place of the live pigeons. Although this was an improvement, the glass balls were inconsistent in flight and at times proved hard to break even at close range.

During 1880 a trap shooter by the name of Ligowsky was watching children skipping flat stones over water in the town of Cincinnati.

From this simple observation was born the idea of 'Clay Targets' as we know them today. Ligowsky's first clay pigeons were flat clay discs baked in an oven.

They flew well but were virtually indestructible to the point where the shot charge completely knocked them from their flight path without breaking them.

An Englishman named McCaskey took this variation one step further. He approached this problem by looking at the composition of the target and developed a target made from river silt bonded by pitch. His next prototype used limestone in lieu of river silt and the first true clay targets were born. They flew consistently but just as importantly broke consistently therefore allowing for true competition to take place.

America's premier Clay Target Shooting event is the Grand American Handicap held at Vandalia, Ohio. The American Target Association also has its headquarters at Vandalia which is approximately 97 acres in size.

During the Grand American Handicap 5,000 shooters will shoot at 4 million targets.

At these 4 million targets approximately 5.5 million shot shells will be used and the spin off from all this shooting is that all these people must buy their ammunition at the venue. They must all eat, sleep and do all the activities people do when they holiday for a minimum period of 9 days.

2.3 Clay Target Shooting in Australia

The English Association of Clay Pigeon Shooting introduced clay target shooting to Australia during the mid 1920s. Melbourne housed the Nobel Gun Club which became Australia's first clay target club. Nobel Gun Club was situated at Tottenham in the Melbourne western suburbs and was adjacent to the Elley Ammunition Co. who was Nobel Gun Club's major sponsor. The Australian Clay Pigeon Trap Shooting Association (ACPTSA) as it was known then began to expand to other states after 1946. Melbourne's 1956 Olympic games saw Australia competing in ISU Trap for the first time. From 1974 Australia has competed internationally in ISU Trap and ISU Skeet. This competition is far removed from the days of the Old Hats in the UK.

The ACPTSA is now called the Australian Clay Target Association (ACTA) dropping the name 'Pigeon' for the benefit of today's politically correct society.

Australia currently has 290 registered clubs and there are around 10,000 shooters including members from affiliate clubs. (Biggs, 1993:17)

2.4 Past Research Studies on National Shooting Complexes in Australia

In 1992 the ACTA commissioned an in-house survey on a National Shooting Ground. It comprised of 9 questions which one of them was optional. This survey was reviewed by the author and it was taken into consideration when forming the questionnaire for this research project. Appendix 1 on pages 12-15 has the covering letter and questionnaire sent to 500 ACTA members in May 1992.

2.4.1 Research Studies on National Shooting Complexes in Other Countries

Contact was made with the clay target association from other countries about the issues in this project. These countries included New Zealand (NZCTA), England (CPSA) and America (NSCA). All three countries were contacted by facsimile but there was no response from them on the issues contained in this study. Therefore the research contained in the study was the only data available to form our conclusions and recommendations.

3. RESEARCH METHODOLOGY

3.1 Why Use a Mail Survey?

A mail survey was used to gather the primary data for this study. Although some personal interviews were conducted the mail survey was the best medium to reach the large sample required.

It was proved to be more effective and cost efficient than personal interviews due to the respondents being located throughout Australia. After reviewing a smaller survey on the same subject and meeting with market research firms it was decided that a sample size of 415 participants was sufficient.

What was more important was encouraging a response size large enough which would aid the ACTA in their decision making process.

3.2 Questionnaire Construction

For the questionnaire/survey to be successful the respondents needed to be encouraged to reply. For this to occur, the covering letter attached to the survey was the main medium of encouragement.

This letter was revised with the project supervisor in order to ensure its readability and its appropriateness for the target audience.

Coupled with the covering letter was the title page which also had a great bearing on how many responses would be sent back.

The background of the title page was white, with the title in bold black letters, mounted on an arrow. This in itself was not overwhelming but breathed a quiet strength which encouraged the reader to continue.

3.3 Question Selection and Preparation

The selection of questions and their wording was deemed to be critical. Therefore great lengths were taken to ensure the question types were appropriate for this study and to the target audience. With this in mind a list was drawn up of question types and statements not to be used. These included the following types with a brief description of each:-

- Double Barrel Questions – giving two possible meanings.
- Leading Questions – giving possible clues on how to respond.
- Implicit Alternatives – no alternative given in option.
- Implicit Assumption – making explicit the consequences.
- Large Estimates.

Multi-meaning words were also listed and avoided so as not to confuse the respondents.

After deciding what not to use we progressed to the stage of what was required for this survey.

Our target audience were all unsolicited for their responses, therefore one of the questionnaire's requirements was to offer assistance without leading the participants. The above criteria was met by the selection of the following question types :-

- Multichotomous Questions – a question which allows a choice within a range or a specific choice. ie a choice of a range of where the age of the respondents could fall. Question 3 of the questionnaire in Appendix 2 on pages 16-22 displays this example.
- Dichotomous Questions – a question which allows for one only answer from two fixed alternatives. ie Yes or No answers.
- Scale – questions which use fixed alternatives and allow a single choice from an ascending or descending scale.

After selecting the above question types, we then needed them to be positioned accurately to allow the respondents to fully complete the questionnaire.

In this instance the questionnaire used a question which was easy, to open with and then the questionnaire proceeded to fan out.

The difficult or classification information was positioned in the rear of the survey, so not to discourage the respondents. Two other areas were highlighted as being important and they were:-

- (a) How many questions will an average person answer whilst giving us the maximum amount of information?
- (b) This was difficult to answer but could be best answered as the "minimum number of questions which gave the maximum number of answers." This was achieved by culling the number of questions several times. Any questions which appeared similar were either reworded or deleted. The questionnaire showed a total of twenty-six (26) numbered questions. By using question types such as Multichotomous and Scales with Fixed Alternatives we were able to ask (72) seventy-two questions. Using this technique the respondent was not overwhelmed with a questionnaire numbered to 72. Instead section one had eighteen questions and section two had eight numbered questions. The other area that influenced the make up of the questions was how to reduce the instance of the respondents choosing a middle ground when answering questions.

This was important in the final analysis to assist in producing clearer conclusions.

Using scales with fixed alternatives and only one choice from four alternatives being allowed, helped reduce the instance of number (3) being chosen if there were 5 items to choose from. Open ended questions were not used and the respondents needed to tick or circle their choices throughout the questionnaire to complete it. No areas allowed for long answers although some participants just could not resist. Lastly stamped addressed envelopes were provided for the respondents to further assist them to participate in this survey.

3.4 Testing the Questionnaire

Eight completed questionnaires were taken to the Illawarra Gun Club and people were chosen at random to complete the questionnaires.

Seven men and one lady were chosen, with seven questionnaires being completed. Five shooters from other disciplines mainly rifle and shotgun hunters were also asked to participate in testing the questionnaire.

When the test questionnaires were received a central edit was performed. This was necessary to check for obvious omissions and inaccuracies.

After carefully reviewing the completed questionnaires they were judged to have been completed satisfactorily.

Based on the above testing procedure the questionnaire was deemed completed and ready to be mailed.

3.5 Validity of the Survey

One area that was stressed by my client the ACTA was that the survey should remain within the parameters of valid surveys.

Based on the above, the survey size of (415) four hundred and fifteen participants was chosen.

The Australian Clay Target Association has 7,934 members, therefore 415 was a sufficiently large sample to ensure validity. The participants were allowed two weeks to complete the survey and two weeks mailing time for it to be

returned. After the nominated cut-off, no further surveys were considered for collation. Of the 415 mailed questionnaires every state in Australia was included. The total number of respondents were (163) one hundred and sixty-three. Respondents to the test survey had their questionnaires clearly marked TEST ONLY and were not included in the main survey count. Questionnaire respondents were chosen on a 'Systematic Stratified Sampling' basis.

These were judged to be the most appropriate methods due to various population sizes of the different states of Australia. Using this method a more accurate response would be collected due to the number of participants per state. All participants were chosen randomly from the existing ACTA database. From this random sample, every 10th person was then chosen to participate. To ensure adequate female participation the sample included a 10% female participation rate.

Refer to Fig 3.5.1 below for the number of participants per state.

After reviewing various textbooks, a response rate of 10 to 15% was considered a good result for mailed questionnaires. Our return rate of 39.3% was more than double the average return rate. This high return rate validated the approach taken in the preparation and execution of the research methodology.

From these completed questionnaires we will collate the responses which will form our findings, conclusions and recommendations.

4. RESEARCH FINDINGS

4.1 Characteristics of the Respondents

The first part of this chapter will look at the responses which were received for each of the questions from the survey. Some of these questions needed to be taken out of the questionnaire's order and grouped with others to assist us in drawing our conclusions. This was necessary because the methodology required the questions to be set in a specific order. Notwithstanding this all the questions will be used in our findings.

4.2 Who Are They?

There were several things which we were able to determine about our participants without referring to any primary data. These common areas are:-

- (a) Australian residents at time of participation in the survey.
- (b) Current members of the ACTA.
- (c) They are male or female.

Any further detail requires referencing to the primary data. All responses were entered into a computer which produced several reports and the results. It is these results that we will look at which will form the profile of our participants.

Our first question was designed to generate interest. It asked the participants if they enjoyed shooting. The response to this was overwhelming as all 163 respondents answered YES.

Question two asked whether they were Male or Female. From these results we were able to determine that 89% of the respondents were male and 11% were female. Further to this, the 'Survey System' software which was selected for this project allowed for demographic information to be entered. The subdivisions which were chosen were all the states of Australia. They were selected so we could do specific cross-tabulations against various questions and compare them to the demographic groups. ie the number of people from each state could be compared to each question's results.

Table 4.2.1 below shows the number of surveyed shooters and the state of Australia which they lived in, at the time of answering the questionnaire. The age of our survey participants was not limited to any one of the age groupings made available in the questionnaire. In this table we can also see their age groupings in relation to the state where they lived.

Figure 4.2.1 Where did our Survey Participants Live and what was their age? From this table four out of the five age groups are within 12% of each other. The largest variation was in the 'Under 25 years' category which represented 8.6% of the total surveyed.

4.3 Areas of Specialisation

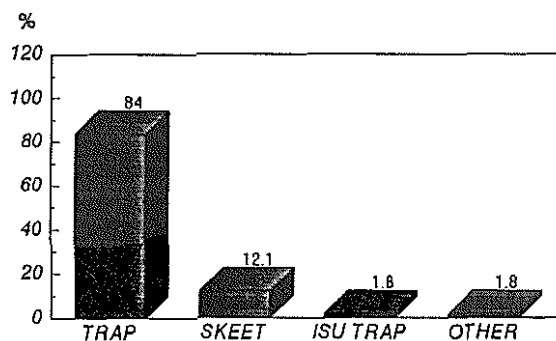


Figure 4.3.1 Which Shotgun Discipline Do They Specialise In?

Clay target shooting is divided into several disciplines. For most people to enjoy a degree of success in their chosen sport, there is normally an area of specialisation, whereby competitors can learn the intricate details of that particular discipline. In Question five Trap or Down the Line (DTL) shooting was clearly the most popular discipline in the survey with 84% of the responses. Skeet shooting recorded 12.3% of the responses with ISU Trap and other both having 1.8. None of the survey participants specialised in ISU Skeet. See figure 4.3.1.

Further to this we inquired to whether they had attended National Championships in the past and which discipline they competed in. From questions (6) and (6a) we found that:-

- (a) 52.8% or 85 respondents attended National Championships.
- (b) 77.4% or 65 of these respondents competed in Trap.
- (c) Participation in Trap exceeded other disciplines by a minimum of four times.

- (d) Skeet was the next most popular discipline with (13) thirteen competitors.

Figure 4.3.1 below displays the various disciplines shooters competed in.

In the next two graphs we see the following illustrated:-

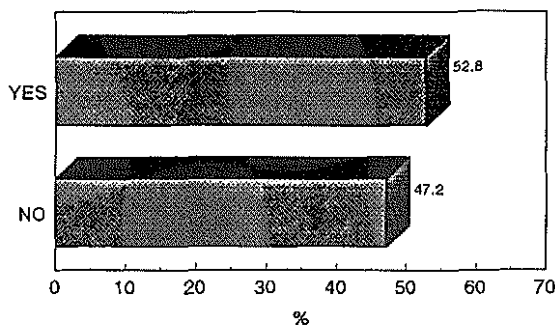


Figure 4.3.2 Attendance of ACTA National Championships.

- (a) Whether or not our respondents had attended ACTA National Championships. See figure 4.3.2. on this page.

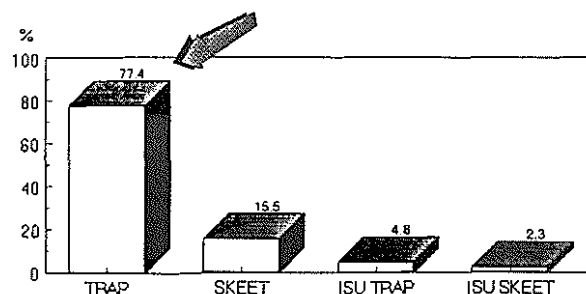


Figure 4.3.3 Most Popular Discipline Competed in at the ACTA Nationals.

- (b) If they had attended ACTA National Championships which discipline did they compete in. See figure 4.3.3. on this page.

4.4 Australian Clay Target Shooters on Holidays

Australians as a whole are a great nation of people who enjoy going on holidays away from their home.

Four weeks is the normal amount of annual leave that most Australians receive excluding long weekends.

Therefore it was considered beneficial for the ACTA to be aware of how and where our survey respondents spent their holidays. If the NSC was to cater for the holiday shooter we needed to know a lot more about their holiday habits.

4.5 Do Australians Shoot Clay Targets During Their Holidays?

Question seven from our survey revealed that 108 respondents shot at other gun clubs whilst on holidays. From these 108 people, 79 competed on a yearly basis and 40 would participate a minimum of twice a year at other shooting venues. Another factor which needed to be clarified was whether shooters attended other venues on their own.

In section one, question eight we see that 67.9% of those surveyed brought along their spouse to other gun clubs. In question eleven we see that 58.4% of people attended interstate events with their family or friends and 65.4% of all respondents made shooting part of their official holiday itinerary.

4.6 Other Important Holiday Trends

Now that we have established that ACTA members do shoot on their holidays there remains some further questions to be answered. The time or season in which holidays are taken is one of these questions. From question 11a we saw that 69.3% of respondents holidayed from September to February. This in itself was important in that it incorporated two major school breaks.

These breaks are the October school holidays (2 weeks) and the Christmas school holidays (6 weeks). It should be noted that September is the start of Spring and February is the last month of Summer.

This trend should be highlighted because a family planning a holiday other than the Easter break would target the September to February period. Other important points about this period would relate to overseas tourists. September in the northern hemisphere is the beginning of Autumn and the end of their summer tourist season. Therefore the likelihood of our northern neighbours visiting in this period would increase.

From a marketing view point consideration would have to be given to increasing the advertising of the NSC as a holiday venue for people of the Northern Hemisphere during this period.

Further to this we can see from question 9 that 92.5% of our participants did holiday in Australia.

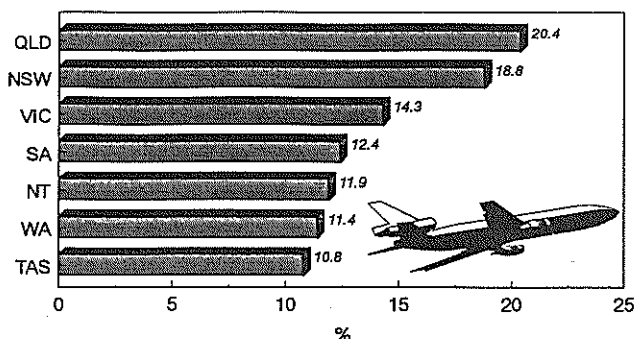


Figure 4.6.1 Preferred Holiday Destinations.

Figure 4.6.1 below shows in descending order their top three holiday destinations. Which are:-

- 1) Queensland
- 2) New South Wales
- 3) Victoria

Now that we have established which are the most popular Australian holiday destinations, we also needed to establish how much our survey participants actually spent on their holidays.

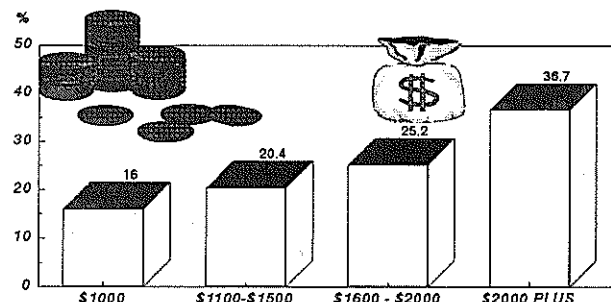


Figure 4.6.2 Shooters Annual Holiday Budget.

Figure 4.6.2 below displays the amount of money people spent on their holidays.

4.7 The National Shooting Complex

As with all major projects they require a mandate to be given by the majority of members to ensure some degree of success.

Based on this statement the following question was asked:- "Would You Support a National Shooting Complex?"

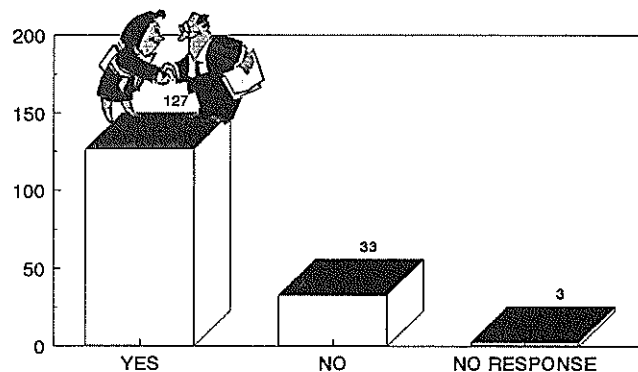


Figure 4.7.1 Gauging the Support for a NSC.

The response received in the questionnaire was positive as can be seen in Figure 4.7.1 below with 79.4% of respondents supporting such a venue.

The survey participants were then asked in which Australian state would they prefer to see the NSC located.

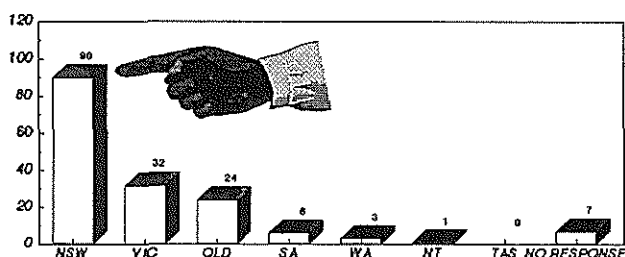


Figure 4.7.2 Preferred Location for a NSC.

By viewing Figure 4.7.2 on page 8, we can see the most popular locations. The most preferred location in order of popularity was:-

- (1) New South Wales
- (2) Victoria
- (3) Queensland
- (4) South Australia
- (5) Western Australia
- (6) Northern Territory
- (7) Tasmania

Now that we have established where the NSC could be built, we need to determine the types of facilities that should be offered. Both section 1 & 2 had similar questions which asked what facilities would attract shooters and their families to holiday at an interstate NSC. This was done to check their importance, as Australian tourists are practical people and if the necessities are not catered for they will stay away in droves. Figure 4.7.3 below displays a table of results for question 12 of section 1 and question 4 of section 2. When there were similar questions they were averaged to produce a new category. We combined the categories of 'Most Important', 'Important' and 'Consider' to form a new category called 'Essential' (E) and the other category remains as 'Least Important' (L).

4.8 Shooting at Australia's National Shooting Complex

The main activity which will draw Australian and overseas tourists to the NSC will be the variety and quality of shooting offered. When examining Figure 4.7.3 on this page you will see that 'Variety of Shooting' ranks number 3 as essential things that will draw people to this venue.

Section 2 of the survey in question 1, we asked ACTA shooters what Clay Target discipline they considered attracted the most support. Here they are asked to rank each discipline as 'Most Supported', 'Moderate Support' and 'Least Support'.

The top three of the clay target disciplines were:-

- 1) DTL
- 2) Skeet
- 3) Sporting Clays

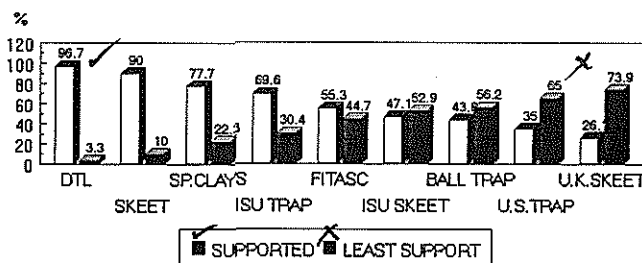


Figure 4.8.1 Most Supported Disciplines.

Figure 4.8.1 below displays the various disciplines and how they are perceived in attracting support by shooters.

Now that we found out what discipline they wanted to shoot the most in, one of the factors which would make it available was whether it was financially viable. ie Question 2 of the survey.

How much would shooters be prepared to pay per round (25 targets) to participate in any of the above mentioned disciplines?

Interestingly enough, 29.7% of respondents which represented the largest group were prepared to pay in excess of \$8.00 per round (25 targets) for the privilege of shooting at the NSC.

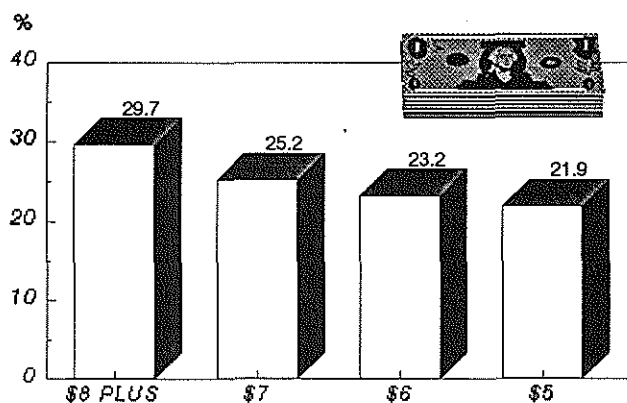


Figure 4.8.2 Assessing Cost Per Round.

Refer to Figure 4.8.2 below for the breakdown of cost per round (25 targets).

Shooting related services were also canvassed by the questionnaire.

Due to Clay Target Shooting being such a specialised shooting discipline we asked what services they thought were important to have. Question 3 of section 2 in the survey looked at this area with a view in carving a potential sales niche for the NSC.

Again we combined 'Most Important', 'Important' and 'Consider' to form the category of 'Essential' and the other category remains as 'Least Important'.

Classifying the above three categories as 'Essential' is important as it will firstly sway a person to attend the NSC and secondly when they use the services they will create revenue.

Figure 4.8.3 on page 9 does show two interesting things.

Firstly 77.8% of respondents indicated they would have stock modifications performed while 88.9% replied they would have their shotgun serviced. After consulting with various gunsmiths they advised that shooters would prefer to have a limb amputated rather than leave their shotgun to be modified at a strange place.

The higher than normal acceptance could be explained due to being on holidays, the client could supervise the modifications and they would be performed in the same complex that they were staying in. These factors would decrease the anxiety of leaving expensive equipment to be altered and by doing so open a distinct 'Marketing Niche' for the NSC.

4.9 Identifying Areas to Produce Income for the NSC

As with all successful ventures there needs to be a basic plan of where income will be generated from. Whilst this study will not go into a detailed business plan there were certain areas which would be highlighted as generating revenue for the NSC.

The first of these areas was canvassed by Question 6 in Section 2 of the survey which asked the respondents whether they would support an annual membership fee, if discounted services were made available to them. 65.6% of the respondents answered YES to this question. Further to this we asked our participants what they considered was an reasonable annual fee for ACTA members.

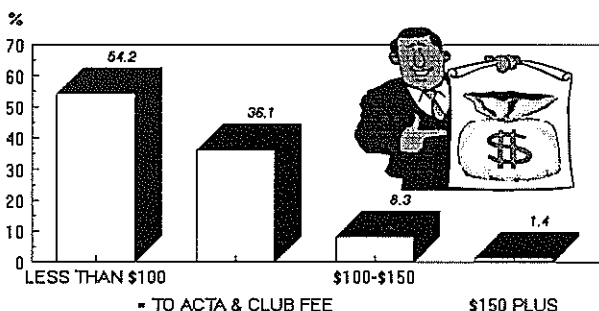


Figure 4.9.1 Possible NSC Fees.

Figure 4.9.1 below shows breakdown of proposed annual fees.

The next area that was investigated was whether International Guests should pay a higher tariff for goods and services whilst visiting the NSC.

To this question 83.1% of the respondents answered NO, that International Guests should not be charged higher tariffs.

Of the 16.9% which responded that International Guests should pay more, 44% of these participants considered that 10% extra was the amount to be charged.

Figure 4.9.2 & 4.9.3 on this page shows a breakdown on whether International Guests should pay more and by what margin.

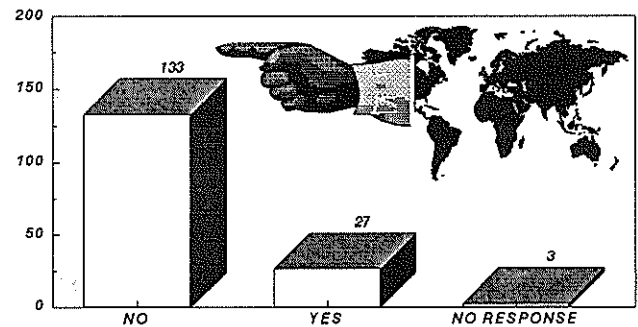


Figure 4.9.2 Should Overseas Visitors Pay More?

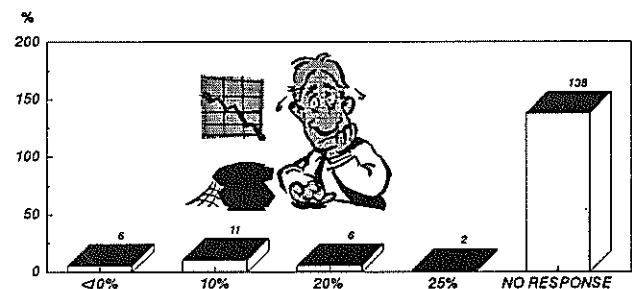


Figure 4.9.3 Additional Charges for Overseas Guests.

Other areas which will generate income are all goods and services that would be offered at the NSC.

These goods and services would include such things as:-

- (a) Accommodation – motel, caravan site and tent site.
- (b) Catering – restaurant, kiosk, alcohol/club facilities.
- (c) Child minding facilities.
- (d) Recreational facilities for non shooters – videos etc.
- (e) Tennis, golf, bike riding – leisure activities.
- (f) Heated swimming pool.
- (g) Shotgun services – modifications and servicing.
- (h) Purchase of memorabilia.

If the NSC is marketed effectively, the visitor should not have to leave the complex other than visiting other tourist areas.

While the tourist is happy and relaxed in an environment which caters for most of hers/his needs, the chance of a repeat visit is high.

Within reason Australians as a whole are prepared to pay for goods and services so long as they can see quality and value for money. This holds true for families, who although on a budget, still need to enjoy themselves whilst on holidays.

4.10 Communication within the ACTA

As with all organisations communicating with its membership is crucial. I have posed a few questions in the middle of this study to see how well the ACTA is received with its members and whether there are any major areas that require addressing.

The results of these five questions showed that in question 17a, 78.2% of the respondents considered the National Executive to be doing a good job.

The ACTA's official journal is the 'CTSN' or Clay Target Shooting News. Although there are various opinions on its worth as a magazine 80.3% of respondents considered it an interesting magazine worth reading. When we compare this to Question 8 in section 2 of the survey, which asked the respondents which advertising medium would most effectively promote the NSC the highest response of 43.7% went to Shooting Magazines.

Therefore based on the results of these two questions 'Shooting Magazines' could provide a worthwhile advertising medium.

Two other areas which are always topical are whether Clay Target Shooting should be televised and prizes such as cars, boats etc should be sought for major competitions.

The respondents to this survey positively responded to the televising of Clay Target Shooting. 84.5% of respondents agreed that it should be shown on television. As for major prizes such as cars, boats etc 55.2% of respondents agreed they should be sought, with 44.8% disagreeing.

The final question which will be looked at from the questionnaire is whether members of the ACTA find it easy to communicate with State and National Executive members.

93 survey participants agreed that it was easy to communicate with State and National Executive members, while 49 disagreed.

21 people did not respond to this question.

4.11 Summary of the Research Findings

Section 4.11 is a summary of the research findings from throughout this chapter.

There are three sections which are the research objectives of this project. All questions which pertain to a particular research objective will be listed and their relevant scores/percentages will be displayed next to it.

All questions will NOT be listed in number order as they appeared in the questionnaire, although they will still have their questionnaire number preceding them. This has been done to group relevant areas under the research objectives.

Most of the questions have been abbreviated for the benefit of this summary. Where possible all answers have been converted to YES/NO responses. The full questionnaire can be seen in Appendix 2 pages 16-22. From the profile below and previous analysis we have brought together our research findings to form a basis for the conclusions and recommendations.

5. DISCUSSION/CONCLUSION

From the results of this study we have been able to draw the conclusion that there is a high probability that a National Shooting Complex would be a successful venture in Australia for the ACTA.

The foundations of a successful project have been confirmed from the positive results as seen in the 'Summary of the Research Findings' (page 10-11).

As with all specialised sporting venues its main sporting facilities will initially attract the bulk of the clientele. With the NSC, DTL, Skeet, Sporting Clays and ISU Trap, they were the disciplines nominated by shooters which would attract the most support. DTL exceeded all other forms of clay target shooting by 4:1, therefore it would require 1st priority when building the various clay targets traps.

In terms of geographical positioning NSW would be the preferred location as seen in Figure 4.7.2. Coupled with being the second most popular Australian holiday destination it has confirmed its place as a front runner to have the NSC built there.

Australians have shown from the results of the survey that they are prepared to support the NSC in monetary terms.

An annual fee of between eighty to ninety dollars was the most popular nominated in the questionnaire.

Shooters also indicated they would use the shooting services as shown in Figure 4.8.3 on page 9 and therefore create direct revenue for the NSC to have all the facilities of an international holiday/sporting venue as seen on this page, questions 4 & 12. Only 3 from 16 facilities had a lower than 70% acceptance and two of these still attracted 43% support. The facilities, which ranked 43%, were (a) Tennis, golf and bike riding, and (b) Heated swimming pool. These facilities should remain in consideration due to them being attractive to overseas visitors and non shooters.

Of all the facilities which attracted shooters, youth and senior training, had the highest approval rating and therefore becomes a high priority.

The findings showed that the majority of survey participants spent in excess of \$2,000 on holidays in Australia.

From these families, the largest proportion (65.4%) made shooting as part of their official holiday itinerary. This is a ready made market segment awaiting to be exploited.

Overall Australian Clay Target shooters are looking for a high quality product and are prepared to pay for the privilege to use it. With an appealing and well equipped clean NSC, this venue would heighten its attraction to overseas clients for not only its shooting facilities but also all the other non shooting facilities nominated in the results.

To be successful in the world arena, requires the ability to make changes according to your environment. With the Year 2000 Olympics quickly approaching, Australia and in particular NSW are ready for a National Shooting Complex.

6. RECOMMENDATIONS

On the basis of the research presented, I recommend that :-

- 6.1 The approval for the design of a National Shooting Complex to be granted from the ACTA.
Effective Immediately.
- 6.2 NSW to be the preferred location of the NSC, subject to statutory requirements.
Effective Immediately.
- 6.3 The NSC to provide facilities of a level comparable to any world class shooting venue. Subject to consideration of 6.5.
Effective Immediately.
- 6.4 The marketing emphasis of the NSC to be not only on training and sport but also to attract families and international visitors.
Effective Immediately.
- 6.5 NSC project to be completed prior to 1998, so a fully working venue is available to reap the benefit of the Year 2000 Olympics.
Effective - after the completion of 6.1 to 6.4.

HERE'S WHAT YOU SAID

Earlier this year a poll was conducted of general members by the former Promotions and Development Sub-Committee in an attempt to gauge feelings regarding the possible establishment of a national shooting ground. Advice was sought from professional pollsters but as they wanted to charge an arm and a leg to conduct a poll for us it was conducted "in house" and so, I suppose, some criticism could be levelled at the design as professional pollsters we certainly ain't! Nevertheless it was a genuine attempt to provide objective feedback to the national executive in their consideration of this important issue.

Many of the returns had some illuminating comments some of which could not be repeated here. One common statement was that we should have surveyed all members, not just the 500 sampled. One good reason was simply the amount of work - I calculated that just to record the 241 returns on a database took almost 5 000 key-strokes and that was after I had designed the database. That represented about 8 hours work. If we had sampled the whole membership and assuming a similar return rate (48%), it would have taken probably 150 hours just to record the data let alone analyse it. Remember that this is all volunteered time! The professional pollsters advised that a sample of 200 would be adequate as they work on very much smaller samples. We sampled 500 and got 241 returns and so I am confident that we obtained a reasonably representative sample.

Shooters names were randomly sampled from the total national membership and one criticism was that it may have better to stratify the sampling on a state basis. This is a fair criticism and if a similar poll is conducted again I would suggest that the samples be selected on both a state stratified and on a proportional (to numbers of members in each state) basis. We were a bit lucky, as our random sampling gave numbers which more-or-less reflected the proportions of state membership numbers.

Except for the returns in Question 1 and Q.7 (A), figures are shown as rounded off percentages and, for better or worse, here is what you said:
